Intramural Speech Contests Scheduled by Department

Scheduled for the latter part of this month are the Annual Intra-Mural Speech Contests, sponsored by the speech department. According to Ross Everman, chairman of the affair, all regular students of Santa Barbara College are entitled to participate in any or all of the contests, except that any

previous winner will not be eligible to enter the same event, although he may enter any contest in which he has never won an award.

The after dinner speaking contest tryouts will be held next Wednesday, May 21, in Oak hall at 3:00 p.m. The speeches, which are to be entertaining, will be limited to five minutes. Each contestant must deposit in the speech department one card stating the topic of his speech, and giving his name. All contestants will participate in the first round, with high ranking speakers entering the semi-finals. Judges will select the winners to participate in finals which will be held at a dinner, the date of which is to be announced later.

EXTEMP TALKS

Students interested in extemporaneous speeches must submit three topics on which they are prepared to speak to the speech department three days prior to the first round. Two days before the speech, the instructor will select one of the topics submitted by the entrant. These speeches will be limited to five minutes. Laguna park will be the scene of a baseball battle royal Monday night at 8:00 p.m. when the flashy Golden Bears from the University of California attempt to muffle the big bats of the giant-killing Gauchos of Santa Barbara College.

The Bears, top dog in the CIBA with only one loss in eleven starts, will be playing to win from the moment the umpire calls "Play Ball" until the third out is made in the ninth inning, as the Gaucho horsehiders have earned a reputation on the coast as a team to be feared. Twice this season the Hilltoppers have knocked off CIBA teams (USC and UCLA) and Coach Spud Harder and company will really be gunning for a third victory over the big boys. It's not impossible. The San Diego Aztecs clubbed the Bears 13-2, but had a much harder time disposing of Santa Barbara. A two-run difference was the best they could do in any of the four games they have had with the Gauchos.

Carter May Enter Seven Thinclads in

One of the outstanding track and field carnivals of the nation will be held on May 17 when the West Coast Relays, which will be held in Fresno, play host to more than 1200 leading track and field athletes.

Known as the "Carnival of Champions", the Relays have made rapid progress since their inauguration back in 1927 and now rank among the greatest track and field events of the nation.

No less than eighteen world records, along with two American records and six world junior college records, have been established at these Relays; and with virtually every university and college on the West Coast sending men to compete, many more records are in the making.

Into this array of track stars, Coach Nick Carter will send possibly seven men to represent Santa Barbara College.
