DOWNEY YEARBOOK ED; APPROVAL DUE TONIGHT

Arlen Collier was appointed next year's *El Gaucho* editor by the Press Control Board. Collier is currently news editor of the paper. PCB's recommendation will go to Council tonight for final approval.

Office Post Open; Pays \$14 Monthly

Applications are now available in the AS office for AS office manager next year. The manager's duties entail keeping files, mimeographing, organizing the secretariat and performing clerical duties for the president.

The office manager receives an expense account of \$14.50 a month. Sign-ups close Friday; use pink application forms in the AS office to apply.

Applications are available also for the administrative assistant to the president. His duties are to assist the AS president in the performance of executive duties.

Anyone interested in signing up for either position is requested by Guy Shipp to apply before Friday.

The PCB also selected Pat Downey as editor of the yearbook, *La Cumbre*, and Jeanie Bjerk to edit the *Student Directory*.

Collier was given unanimous endorsement by the PCB over two other applicants, Jerry Bradley and John Lauritzen.

5-Hour Meeting

The PCB met for almost five hours Thursday night before coming to a conclusion. The three applicants were interviewed at length by the board, after having submitted qualifications and string books.

As assistant editor of *El Gaucho* this year, Collier has worked in all areas of the paper. He is a junior English major.

JC Editor

Collier came to UCSB last year from Hastings Law School and American River Junior College. At JC he edited the school paper as well as the yearbook.

Collier says that with a new administration coming in next year and a fresh student council with new ideas, it should be an interesting year for the paper.

"I am happy that I will be the editor in such a transitional year. The newspaper will play an important role in informing the students of the progress made and helping to stimulate this progress."

"For the most part I intend to carry on the editorial policies of this year's *El Gaucho*. The editorial board will be increased in size to allow more diversified opinion on the editorial page."

Miss Downey served as assistant editor of *La Cumbre* this year. In addition she has worked on her high school yearbook and newspaper. She was highly recommended by outgoing yearbook editor Tom Taylor.

Bjerk Experienced

Miss Bjerk has worked with the *Student Directory* staff for the past two years.

PCB voted to postpone selection of news editor, editorial director and sports editor until next fall. It was the opinion of the board that perhaps qualified journalists would apply at that time.

These three positions are also selected by Legislative Council.

AWARDS ASSEMBLY THURSDAY

'Big 3' -- Honor Copy, AMS, AWS Honors, Guy Shipp Inauguration Highlight Evening

Who are the outstanding students of the year? The question will be answered Thursday night at the annual AS Awards Assembly in the campus auditorium. The assembly begins at 8 p.m.

Over 20 different types of honors will be presented. Most attention is centered on the "Big Three" awards—the Honor Copy and the AMS and AWS plaques.

The Honor Copy of *La Cumbre* is given to the student who has contributed most to the AS over a period of four years. It is the highest honor of the AS.

Best of Year

The AMS and AWS honors are given to the man and woman who have been most outstanding this year. The criteria used for selection is service, character, scholarship and leadership.

The recipients of these three awards, plus the senior honor keys, are selected by an anonymous faculty committee.

Honor Keys

A maximum of 15 senior honor keys can be presented. The honor key was established several years ago to grant recognition to those seniors who have consistently contributed to the welfare of the AS.

In addition to the awards, Guy Shipp will be sworn in as president of the Associated Students by outgoing president Stan McGinley.

Entertainment

Entertainment for the evening will be provided by the SAE

Quartet, first-place winners at Spring Sing, the Women's Glee Club, and Diane Harrington, who will present a reading. George Hart will be master of ceremonies.

Other awards to be presented include: Chi Omega Social prize to the top senior woman in social science, and the Lois Linn Memorial Prize in biological science.

New Prize

A new honor, the C. D. Woodhouse award to the outstanding student in geology, will be presented. Delta Zeta sorority will honor the outstanding student teacher and the highest scholastic fraternity will receive the IFC award.

Crown and Sceptor will give a plaque to the senior woman with the highest grade point over four years. Blue Key will honor the athlete with the highest grade point.

In addition, various awards will be made in the fields of journalism, speech, drama and music.

Legislative Council members will receive council pins.

FINAL EL GAUCHO

The last issue of *El Gaucho* will be published Friday. It will be an eight-page issue featuring the awards winners, with features on the "year in review."

The paper also will contain an interview with Vice-Chancellor Elmer Noble on the accomplishments of the year and some of the challenges for UCSB in the future.

Gauchos Give Books To Korean Colleges

South Korea's 15 universities and 38 colleges are the object of the Charities Committee's Book Drive which kicked off yesterday. Students are donating books they do not want or need any longer.

These books go to the understocked libraries of the Korean institutions. The drive ends June 10.

Nearly all of Korea's textbooks and other school materials were destroyed during the war; leaving the financially depleted schools to try to restock their shelves. The students of UCSB are being asked to help them.

Some Books to India

"This year," announced drive chairman Candy Collins, "some of the books will be allocated to India. This is because Project India, which is sending some of our students to India this summer, has stimulated interest in that country among the students here."

Miss Collins said that the books most needed are: All types of textbooks copyrighted after 1945; paperbacks (good literary quality) in good condition, and the "classics."

Almost all Korean college students speak English, so there will be no language barrier for them.

Collection Boxes

Collection boxes are placed at the Student Union, the Library and the recreation room in Santa Rosa Hall on campus, and downtown at Kisch's Book Co., The Bookshop and Tecolote Book Shop.

The Santa Barbara City Library has donated books to the drive.

Faculty Picks Dr. Paul Kelly Outstanding UCSB Teacher

Dr. Paul J. Kelly, associate professor of mathematics and chairman of the department at UCSB was named by his colleagues for the fifth annual faculty teaching prize of \$200.

The award is given to "the faculty member who in the judgment of his peers has been most effective in opening new intellectual and cultural vistas to undergraduate students."

For the prize an anonymous donor gave the University \$1,000 in 1955 for the annual awards. This year's prize is the final award provided by the gift.

Last Year's Winner

The recipient was announced at a faculty meeting by Howard Warsaw, assistant professor of art and chairman of the selection committee, who won the prize last year.

Dr. Kelly, who came to UCSB 10 years ago, was a 1955 winner of a Ford Foundation Fellowship from the Foundation Fund for the Advancement of Education. On this grant he spent a year at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, N.J., where Einstein worked and the headquarters for other distinguished scientists.

Math Author

He is the co-author of *Projective Geometry and Projective Metrics*, one of a series of books published by Academic Press in pure and applied mathematics. Last year a Moscow publishing

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German Dramatist, Mahlendorf's Topic In Last of Series

Ursula R. Mahlendorf, instructor of German at UCSB, will conclude this semester's All-College Lecture Series with a talk entitled "Friedrich von Schiller: Poetic Pedagogue" at 4 p.m. today in the classroom auditorium.

The lecture will commemorate the 200th anniversary of the birth of Von Schiller, who is generally considered one of the two greatest poets Germany has had. He was very popular in the English-speaking world of the 19th Century, but today is considered to be too much of a moralist.

Schiller Was Moralist

States Dr. Mahlendorf, "My thesis is that Von Schiller was a moralist, but we no longer have the right concept of this. During my talk I will discuss his life and ethics, which are quite intimately connected with his theory of art.

"He believes," she went on, "man has to be educated by art to attain to human goodness. I will conclude my talk by giving Von Schiller's philosophy as background for the better understanding of the poet."

World Educated

Dr. Mahlendorf was born in Strehlen, Germany. Having studied at the Universitaet Tuebingen and Universitaet Bonn, as well as London University in Europe, she came to Pembroke College in Rhode Island to continue work in German and English literature.

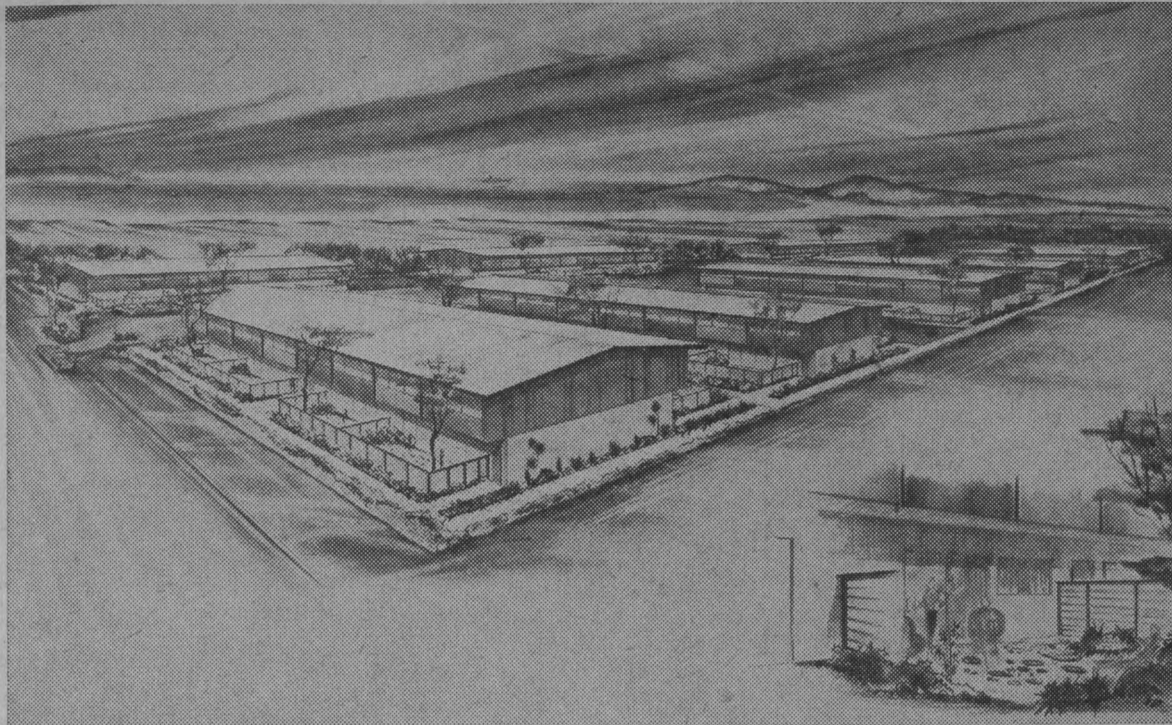
She earned her MA degree at Brown University in English and just this past year she received a PhD in German at the same institution.

Moral Interest

Miss Mahlendorf's interest in Schiller stems from a general interest in the moral problems of 18th Century literature.

Joining the faculty at UCSB in the fall of 1957 as an instructor in German, she is a member of the Modern Language Assn. She also has participated in a forum on Contemporary European Affairs for Alpha Mu Gamma, national foreign-language society.

Today's All-College Lecture will be the last in the spring series of talks given at UCSB by the faculty Committee on Drama, Lectures and Music. There will be a brief series presented during the summer session.

Dr. Webb Re-elected To Top Faculty Post

Dr. Robert W. Webb, professor of geology, was re-elected vice-chairman of the UCSB faculty for 1959-60, it was announced by Dr. Henry M. Adams, secretary.

Next year the faculty organization, after completion of affiliation procedures with the University's Academic Senate, will be known as the Santa Barbara Division of the Academic Senate, Southern Section.

Committee Co-ordinator

As vice-chairman of the Santa Barbara Division, Dr. Webb presides at the faculty meetings, co-ordinates the work of standing and special committees, and handles other details of the faculty organization. The president of the University, Clark Kerr, is automatically chairman of the Santa Barbara Division.

This will be his second year in office as vice-chairman. He

joined the Santa Barbara faculty in 1948 after several years on the geology faculty at UCLA. He was state-wide co-ordinator of veterans affairs for the entire University during the peak veteran-enrollment period.

Others Elected

Also elected were members of the committee on committees—Drs. Hugh Kenner, professor of English; Paul Scherer, associate professor of industrial arts, and John A. R. Wilson, associate professor of education.

Those elected as legislative representatives were Dr. James Walters, associate professor of biology; Upton S. Palmer, associate professor of speech; Edmond E. Masson, associate professor of French, and Henry M. Adams, associate professor of history.

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IBM CHANGES REGISTRATION PLAN

Registrar Wright Explains New Procedure; Total Time Cut to Half-Hour Per Student

IBM machines will appear for the first time on the UCSB campus for fall registration and the new record files, according to Dr. Paul Wright, Registrar. With the coming of IBM machines, students will see a great change in the new registration system. For continuing students, the following important changes have been made:

1. By mailing in registration fees in August the student will be sent his registration packet if he includes a self-addressed, stamped envelope. These cards may then be filled in at the student's leisure and turned in the second week of instruction.

Half an Hour

2. Registration will take place only on Thursday, Sept. 17, and will take less than a half-hour per student. Admittance will be alphabetical, not by classes.

3. Registration on Sept. 17 is only to "reserve space in classes." Official enrollment takes place in classes during the first week of instruction.

4. Registration cards will be issued when fees are paid. Cards consist of the student's receipt, student-body card and identification and must be presented when registering.

Counseling with faculty advisors begins today and continues until May 23. UCSB catalogues are now on sale in the book store for 25c and class schedules will go on sale later in the week for 10 cents.

Pay by Mail

Dr. Wright urges that continuing students pay their fees by mail in order to avoid long lines and delay during registration week. Fees will be accepted from Aug. 1-31 and self-addressed envelopes with 8c postage must be enclosed.

The new registration packets will then be returned to the student by Sept. 4. If self-addressed envelopes are not enclosed, or if fees are mailed in after Aug. 31, students may pick up the registration packet at the registrar's office during registration week. Fees should be made out to: Regents of the University of California.

Pre-Enrollment

Pre-enrollment in classes will take place Thursday, Sept. 17, in the old gym. Students are to bring their registration card and counseling card. The registration packets are not needed. Admittance to the gym will be alphabetical, not by classes, from

8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m., Sept. 17.

The purpose of pre-enrollment is to obtain a temporary class card for each desired class from the class - enrollment station. These cards are then signed by the student and returned at the station.

Class Cards

Official enrollment in classes takes place during the first week of instruction. Instructors will pass out official class cards first to those who have pre-enrolled and then to others desiring enrollment only if space is available.

Enrollment is completed when the official enrollment cards are returned to the Registrar's office along with the registration packets during the second week of instruction. Changes in programs will not begin until the first week of instruction.

Complete registration instructions may be found in the fall semester *Schedule of Classes*, pages 11-15. The Registrar will personally answer any questions regarding new registration procedures Friday, May 22, between 1:30 and 2:30 p.m., in the Classroom Building, Room 1124. A series of open houses will be held later so that students, faculty and staff may see the new IBM machines.

Students Can Enroll Early For Summer

Students who wish to pre-register for summer session may do so, either in person or by mail, on or before June 9, it was announced by Lewis F. Walton, Director of Summer Session.

If a student wishes to pre-register by mail, the form Notice of Intention to Register, a copy of which appears in the summer-session bulletin, must be filed with the Registrar on or before May 22.

Additional copies of the NIR may be obtained at the office of the Registrar or at the Summer Session office. Inquiries about summer session may be made in person at the Summer Session office or by calling 2275 or 3191.

The policy of the present Associated Men Students administration has been the creation of a permanent AMS Council which would be in a position to express the needs of the male population at UCSB.
