### STUDENTS ASK GUESTS

Combining forces for the first time under direct authorization of the college social committee, the sophomore and freshman classes will stage a "Hay Hoedown" Friday night, February 7, at Cerca del Mar.

A car caravan will leave the campus at eight-thirty. Transportation will be furnished for those who need it before the caravan starts. Guests, either upper-classmen or off-campus persons, invited by frosh or sophomores will be admitted upon presentation of a guest card. These cards may be secured for 25 cents in Dean Benink's office. No admission will be charged for lower-classmen who have paid their dues; all who have not will be charged 25 cents.

Music for the evening will be provided by Fred Lambourne and his Collegians. The dance will last until twelve-thirty and will start at nine p. m.

Prizes will be given for the best costume, both men and women. A surprise program and novelty numbers have been arranged by Danny D'Alphonso, Frosh president. This will not be a program dance. Petie McKinney, Soph social chairman, and Harry Sloan, Frosh committee head, will act as co-chairmen for the affair.

## Out on the Pampas

### BORAH FOR PRESIDENT

Senator William E. Borah has announced his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination. This was made public when Borah made a definite statement of presidential intention to enter the Ohio primaries by filing a list of Borah-for-President candidates for Ohio's eight delegates-at-large. For the initial campaign he stated, "I shall make a number of speeches in Ohio and present the issues as I see them."

### U. S.-JAPANESE PEACE

At a dinner meeting of the American Council of St. Luke's International Medical Center at Tokio, Ambassador Hiroshi Eaito of Japan in a speech forecast only peace between the United States and Japan. He also made the prediction that the navies of these two great countries would never be used against each other, but warned against the recent developments of distrust and suspicion by each nation for the other as not being compatible with the best interests of each.

### ULTIMATUM OF LEAGUE

Yesterday what really amounted to an ultimatum, was dispatched to the United States by the League of Nations. Either cooperate in halting the shipments of oil to Italy or "bear the moral responsibility in the eyes of the world" for the failure of the league sanctions. A definite date will probably be set by the committee before which Washington must reply as to what alternative will be taken by the United States.

### SENATE INVESTIGATION

While the senate munitions committee was seeking to show yesterday that the allies overrode treasury objections and paid off American private bankers with part of the first money they borrowed direct from this government during the World War, J. P. Morgan appeared to hear the opening of the investigation even though his presence had not been required. The testimony offered showed that allied nations owed American bankers and investors \$2,262,000,000 most of which was loans negotiated largely by J. P. Morgan and Co.

## Council Group Fill Positions

Smith, Kindred, Anderson, Main Suggested for Welfare Chairman

The appointments of several positions left open by the change in semesters will be the subject of discussion before the associated students' legislative council meeting tomorrow night at 7:00 o'clock in the women's clubroom.

Robert Smith, Robert Kindred, Al Anderson and Robert Main have been suggested to Garlyn Basham, student prexy, to fill the welfare chairmanship vacated by Thomas Merrill. Although the position is appointive, selection of the candidate for the office will rest upon the approval of the whole council body, Basham stated.

James Shaug, ticket sales manager was forced to resign because of student teaching in Lompoc and thus a new manager will be chosen by "Goldy" Goldsmith, head of the finance committee, and announced to the legislative council. Appointment of a new chairman of the athletic board will also be considered upon the recommendation of the outgoing chairman, Joe Robinson, to the athletic board. This board consists of the senior managers of each major sport, a representative of the Block "S" club, two members appointed by the president of the student body, the student controller, and the head coaches of each inter-collegiate sport.

Johnny Varner is also expected to present the constitution of the boxing club for acceptance to the council.

## 746 Students Register for New Semester

Office Records and Gives Out Grades on Time; Women Aid Staff

### 100 MORE TO REGISTER

Allred Issues 695 Student Body Books; Twenty Nine Exempted

With 746 students officially registered and approximately 100 more expected, the registrar's office closed its first day and a half of second semester registration.

For the first time in State college history, grades were sorted, recorded and given out on time, due to the aid of women administrators. All students received grade cards, with the exception of those who owe library fines or have not completed work. These grades will be released as soon as the difficulties are cleared up.

### Allred Issues Books

From the office of Fred Allred, student body controller, come statistics that show the purchase of 695 student body tickets, 72 of which have been deferred, two of which have been rehabilitated, and seven which have been awarded on scholarship. Nine student teachers and 20 special students were declared exempt from purchasing student body tickets.

"One day registration has been markedly successful! After completing our plans for registration next semester, I believe we can speed up the time, and register all students in one day," said Mrs. Jane Miller Abraham, registrar.

"An interesting registration," continued Mrs. Abraham, "was that of a woman entering as an art student, who received a degree in music 50 years ago at the Trinity college of England."

### Students Aid Registrar

Students who helped with the entrance work were Gretalie Fitzgerald, Howard Arni, Elizabeth Hartwell, Neva Freeman, Mary Margaret Winter, and Wilhelmina Menken, secretary to the registrar.

Beginning today, a fee of two dollars will be charged for each person entering late. No additional amount was required of a few students who turned in registration books yesterday.

## J. C. Lewis Speaks Before College 'Y' on Club Objectives

At their meeting this morning the college "Y" heard J. C. Lewis, program secretary and physical education director of the Santa Barbara YMCA, give a short talk on the ideals and objectives to be attained during the coming semester.

Lawrence Connell, president of the organization, told of the plans for the active program that is being arranged for the remainder of the school year.

Among the plans which the college "Y" is organizing is that of bringing to the Gaucho campus prominent local business men as speakers. When such townspeople will speak, announcements will be made in advance and all students will be invited to attend an open meeting.

## History Department Elects Don Follett

Electing Don Follett to the office of president, recently vacated by Joe Nightengale, who has gone to Santa Maria to do cadet teaching, the history department met yesterday morning second hour in room 44.

Allan Frick was elected to the office vacated by Follett, that of vice-president and program chairman.

Tomorrow night Trudi Schoop's Comic Ballet appears at the Lobero, and all reviews we have seen elsewhere point to an evening of rare humor.

### Coming Events

Then next Tuesday night the Los Angeles Symphony will play its second concert. There will be student rates again and Mrs. Barnett will handle these special tickets. Almost 100 students took advantage of this rare opportunity last month, and it is hoped there will be an equal number take advantage of it again.

Also, this month the Art Gallery is showing an exhibit of Santa Barbara artists, and it is a revelation to find so much fine painting done locally. ### "Anything Goes"

Meanwhile we have been to see "Anything Goes" at the Fox. As a musical comedy it ran one year in New York. The movie will never approach that record. Musical comedy on the stage is often a midway point between light opera and burlesque show—the songs are more popular and the dialogue less vulgar; but the girls are still picked on the basis of physical measurements rather than voice quality. Such a musical comedy on the screen is a bird of another color. The songs lose their freedom in a detailed close-up; the dialogue is enfeebled until practically pure and undefining in comparison; and the girls just do not seem to have the same opportunities to display their measurements.

In other words, the qualities that make a good stage musical comedy are not transferable to cinematic success; and any of you who saw "Anything Goes" in the flesh last fall in Hollywood as we did will agree with us. So long as Hollywood must (and we do not deny it apparently must) produce for an audience inclusive of impressionable offspring and sensitive grandparents we are thankful for what is left of the illegitimate stage.

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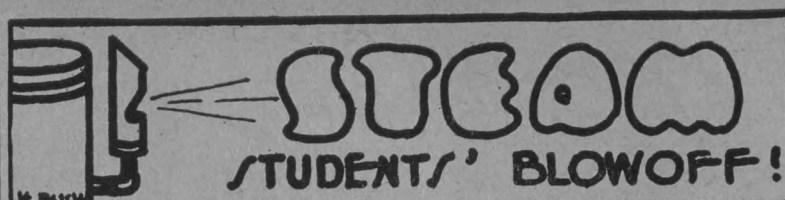
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## BASKETBALL RETORT
