## Eye Ease...

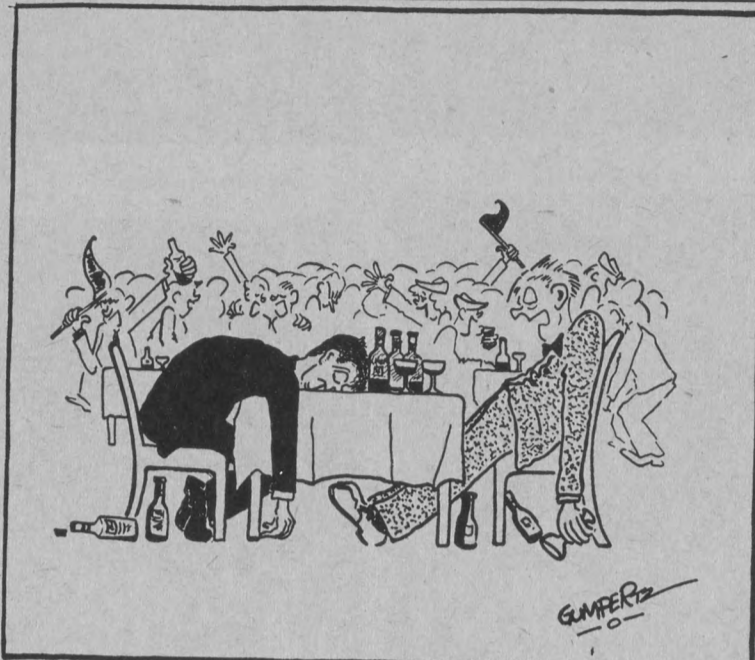

## Gaucha-Aztec Tilt Rated Even-Up

In the final and most significant football tussle of the '46 grid season the Gauchos will face their arch traditional rivals, the San Diego Aztecs on home soil tomorrow night for the homecoming epic which will officially end football for this year. The Aztec Red Devils and the Gaucho aggregations have been gridiron foes historically since 1923. Santa Barbara squeezed out a 7-6 victory the last time the two squads met in 1941 and broke a long-standing jinx over the San Diego hold. In thirteen times since their initial game with the local club the Aztecs have piled up nine wins.

The invading team has done very well this year having won the league championship, and will undoubtedly be one of the Gauchos' most rugged oppositions to date. A brief view at their past record is valid to point out that the Aztecs have a record worthy of commendations.

The Red Devils stole an opener from Pomona to the tempo of 34-0 but lost their next tilt to Cal Poly 21-13. Whittier succumbed to the Aztecs a week later in a 35-7 loss but in the next game San Diego received a severe loss to an overbearing Nevada team 26-0.

In the latter part of October, the San Diego squad moved up to an equal standing with C.O.P. after they upset Fresno 7-0 and received zealous attention in the Pacific Coast football picture, for their two previous losses were in non-conference competition.

Celebrating their school's 50th anniversary and a homecoming game with Occidental college, the San Diegos copped a 21-12 win over the Tigers on November 2. The following week the Aztecs rolled through Loyola, 20-7, at Gilmore stadium to claim its fifth victory in seven games played.

**San Diego in First Place**  
The paramount game took place last Saturday night in which San Jose and San Diego wrestled for the league championship. As might be expected, the contest was a close-knit one and although both teams were quite equal, the Aztecs won a 7-0 title to make them this year's champions. Thus the Gauchos will not only be facing their traditional adversaries, but the 1946 champions as well.

The Aztec forward wall has been the main factor in the team's success to date and it is strengthened by such capable gridmen as John Richards, 218 pound first string center, and ends Leo Heaton and Dale Brassey.

Although the Gauchos will be up against an extremely proficient team, they have, nevertheless, a good opportunity to supply able competition for the manner in which they led the Cal Aggies about in last week's classic is proof that they are a positive threat when the team is operating coordinately, and so it is more than likely that Santa Barbara has a prospective chance to prove their mettle in tomorrow night's grid battle.

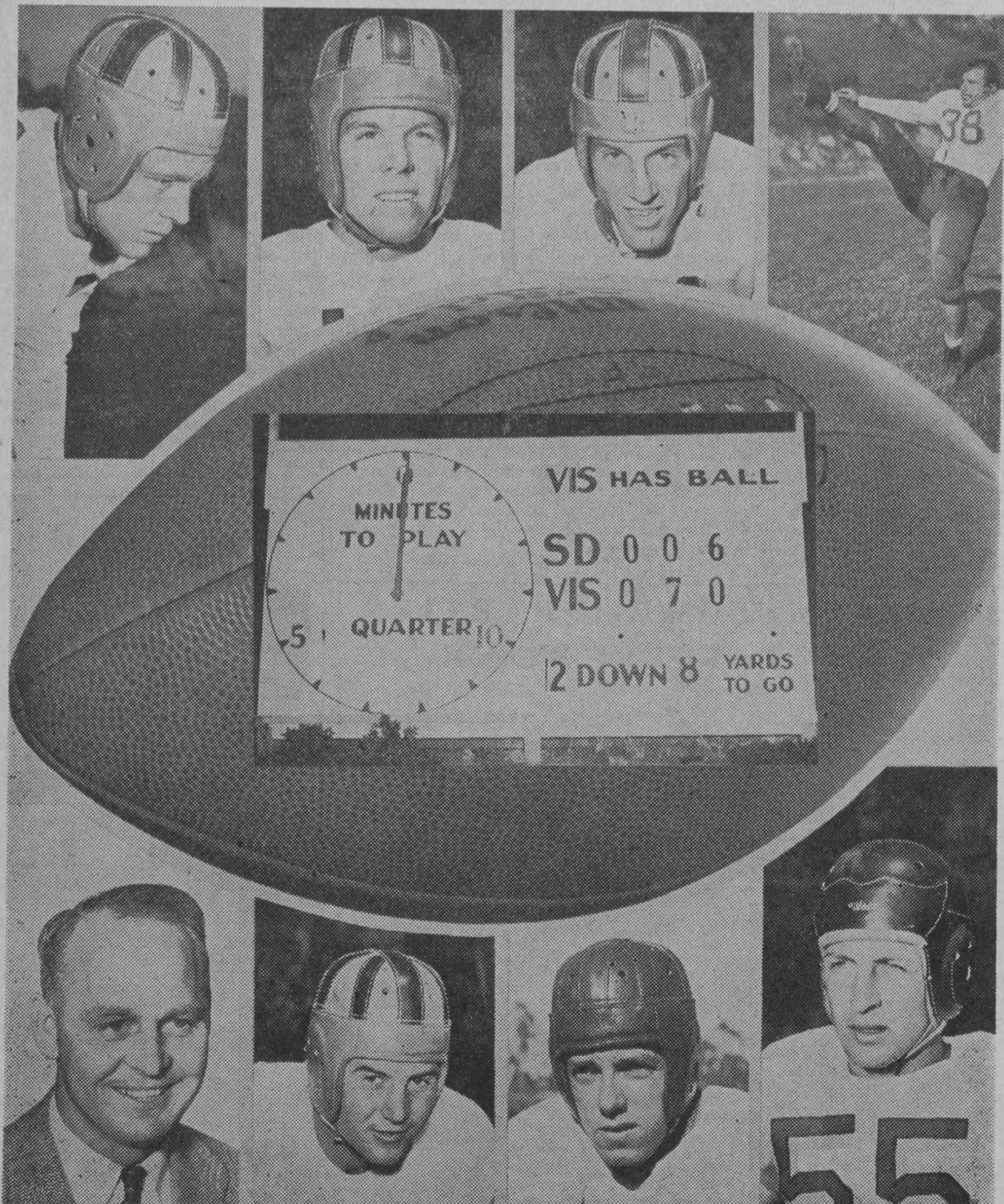

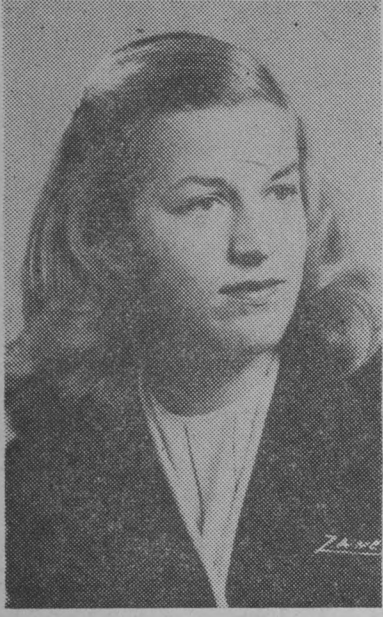
**Past Events**

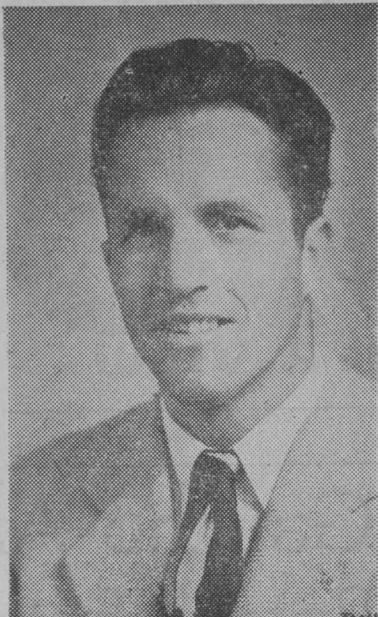
**June Convention**

Do you have any idea how many companies are making records? The number at the present time is near 200. "Fine," you say, "that is a demonstration of free enterprise." But before drawing any conclusion let's examine the situation.

Record-pressing is a very ticklish business and calls for expensive equipment. Therefore, many companies don't even have recording studios but use the recording studios of larger companies or go to organizations that make a business of running recording studios. Some companies don't even do their own manufacturing, so all it takes to set up a record company is a contract with a performer and a few labels. Of course all this raises the manufacturing cost which is passed on to you when buying records.

The worst part of the whole deal is the quality of the records put out by small companies. They usually have terrific talent but you can't hear it through the surface noise. Small outfits pressing records don't have the know-how and money to record properly. For example Asch records put out an album called "Jazz at the Philharmonic," with possibly the finest talent ever assembled at a jazz concert, playing their best music. Such men as Krupa, Ventura, Callender, Smith, and Jacquet are on these three records. Krupa takes a solo on the third side of "How High the Moon" which, as far as I'm concerned,

## GAUCHOS RECOVER POWER TO GARNER SECOND WIN

For 30 minutes the Gauchos showed the power and smart quarterbacking that might have been theirs all season and it was enough to down the not too strong but big, scrappy Cal Aggies from Davis, 14 to 7, before a crowd of 4000 fans at La Playa stadium last Friday night. The Gauchos' play was typical of the type they have been displaying all season in that they were strong and seemingly unstoppable in the first half as they rolled up 143 yards to Cal Aggie's 91, however, the Gauchos' total of 22 yards for the second half was also typical.

Royal Cathcart receiving the opening kick-off on the Santa Barbara 10 and advanced it to the 33 in a nice runback. Three tries directed at the Aggie's line netted 9 yards and Jack Miller was forced to kick to Harper on the Aggie 12. From this point possession of the ball saw-sawed back and forth between the two teams. However, late in the first quarter Santa Barbara fans saw what they have been wanting to witness since the Cal Poly game—the Gauchos with the ball, smart and playing hard, in a sustained drive over the greater length of the field with their efforts resulting in a touchdown! The Gauchos did just that and more as both Cathcart's distinguished themselves with their flashy running and Tommy White, who was not to be outdone, directed his plays at the Cal Aggie weak spots. Tommy ran the ball, passed it, and otherwise out-smarted the opponent at every turn. His beautiful quarterback sneak from five yards out which resulted in the first Santa Barbara touchdown, was his final gesture in complete mastery of the situation. Sam Dimas' conversion was blocked. Gauchos 6, Cal Aggies 0.

**Fumble Leads to Second Score**  
A Cal Aggie fumble on their own 33 was capitalized by the Gauchos and it led to their second touchdown. This time it was Billinger, the Gauchos' outstanding passer who held the controls. Three successive Billinger passes, one to Max Diamond, one to Katich, and one to Doug Spence rolled up the first downs and brought Santa Barbara into scoring position with five minutes left to go in the first half. Here again it was Doug Spence who crossed into pay-dirt after five yards worth of hard drive over left guard. This time the conversion by Sam Dimas was low. Score, Santa Barbara 12, Cal Aggies 0.

**Cal Aggies Score**  
Cal Aggies' lone score was made in the fourth quarter as they terminated a 38 yard drive with a touchdown pass from Brown to Nedderman. The drive was characterized by successive and sharp lunges by Brown, Richards, and Ward right through the Gaucho line. However, it was the same Gaucho line which pushed the Cal Aggie offense back to the shadows of their own goal posts from the 19 yard line later in the fourth quarter. Here, Dible, Cal Aggies' persecuted and over-excited center, contributed the Gauchos two more points by overpassing his prospective and surprised punter, the ball crossing the end zone which resulted in an automatic touch-back. Final score, Gauchos 14, Cal Aggies 7. Gaucho mentor Stan Williamson was very satisfied with his starting backfield combination. The play of lineman Pickert, Golson, Rossi, Steele, and Daniels should be very enthusiastically cited for they are the men who are being depended on against San Diego where Stan Williamson states the presence of fire and spirit on the Gaucho squad will determine the results on the score board.

### LAST GAME

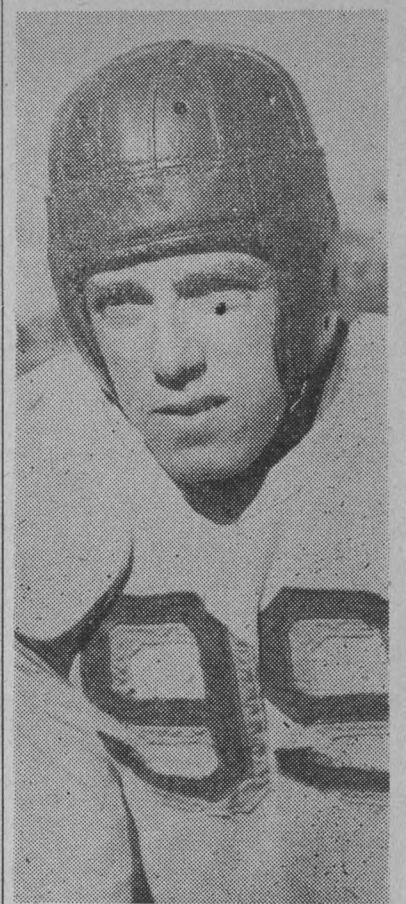
