



**NEUMEYER BEGINS SUMMER SERIES  
WITH WESTERN ART LECTURE**

Dr. Alfred Neumeyer, professor of art history at Mills College, will speak on "The Spirit of the Nations in Western Art" at the first All-College lecture at 3 pm today in Pine Hall 100.

A native of Munich, Dr. Neumeyer came to this country as a young man, was naturalized and educated, and then returned to Germany to take a doctoral degree at the University of Berlin.

Five visiting faculty members will deliver lectures during the Summer Session, according to Upton S. Palmer, head of the department of conferences and special activities for the University Extension. The lectures are free and open to the public.

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**SUMMER SESSION ENROLLMENT FIGURES  
REACH 709 INCLUDING 264 VETERANS**

Enrollment figures to date for the Summer Session show a total of 709 students according to Dr. Lewis F. Walton, Acting Registrar. This includes 264 veterans and 445 non-veterans. Registration figures, however, are not yet complete.

On the first day of registration at last year's Summer Session the enrollment was 1007 while this year it was only 656. Much of the blame for the decline has been placed upon the uncertain draft future of many men students.

At a later date figures will be released announcing the ratio of men to women.
