# **Test Reactor Fails; Annihilates Campus**

The scene at UCSB can be described as nothing less than panic and bedlam, as the campus recovers from a meltdown at the research reactor. Previously described as using the power of less than a lightbulb, the reactor has surprised even the experts at the destruction it as caused.

Students and community members are dead, bruised, and burned after this accident, and the cause is only hypothesized at this point.


The nuclear reactor at UCSB has melted down, Environmental Protection Officer Frank Galavanter announced today, but said there really is no cause for alarm. "We have a crew on the scene at this time to protect against possible radiation leakage," he said.

At the reactor this morning several onlookers and student protestors milled about as the cleanup crew of five men in white overalls attempted, in vain, to stuff cleaning rags into the air ducts on the reactors roof. Others were spraying entire bottles of 409 on the ground outside the reactor, in an effort to "get rid of this funny stuff before we're all in China," explained Assistant Maintanance Specialist, Joe Mama.

"All my friends were charred," tearful bystander Fluffy LaZar said. "It's like, we were all sitting in the sun in Storke Plaza and the next thing I knew the blast flattened Sissy and Chip against the wall.

"Nobody knows just how they got there, but one thing's for sure, they ain't got no hair," Police Chief Randy Jingle said.

# Oil Companies Buy Coastline

In a unamious vote yesterday the California Coastal Commission approved the sale of the entire coast of California to several local oil companies.

Oil exploration, extraction and spilling will now be allowed on the over 700 miles of available coastline and outlying waters.

Tarco Field Representative Roy Gooey requested the commission sell the entire state, along with the coastal areas, to his company. Gooey believes this would diminish the number of theories stating that California is going to fall into

"Our state would become completely unified. There is a certain sticktuitiveness prevalent in this business," Gooey added. However, commission members believed this action would be too excessive, despite Washington's assertion that power should be returned to the states.

Texon representative Iam Slick convinced the commission "what the public really wants is an oil drill on every beach and an oil platform in every window." Commission reaction to this statement was extremely positive.

"I really am a lot more successful on a date when I have the lights of the offshore platforms to look at, I think we should thank the oil companies for this free aphrodesiac," commission member

"We are sick and tired of all the belly aching done by the fishing industry, long haired environmentalists, and the sun-fried surfers. We are talking money here," commission member Kirk Kickback said.

The fishing industry provided a strong argument against the sale. The estimated half million oil platforms would "definitely hamper our productivity," Fisherman's local 7/8353 spokesman Bjorn Tocatch said. The state's coastline offers some of the richest supplies in the industry, Tocatch said.

Commission member Bud Wyser questioned the industries ability to meet the growing needs of the state, primarily fuel for his Porsche 911SC and heating his 11 acre Malibu cottage. Wyser also provided practical solutions for the fishing industry to keep their losses at less than 50 percent. He believes a 24 work day, seven days a week, should adequately supplement the average fisherman's income.

Tocatch explained he barely had enough to feed his family of seven and to operate his moped for his 80 mile journey to work. "The wife and I had to take drastic measures this past winter, and offer our 14-year-old daughter to Mr. Wyser for maid

### Safety Team Given A License To Kill

The Bicycle Education And Safety Team has been issued firearms and a years supply of ammunition by the National Rifle Association to facilitate student compliance with bicycle safety codes, BEAST program coordinator Mo Themover said.

Several areas have been designated as command posts for BEAST sharpshooters. Machine gun emplacements have been built on top of Storke Tower, Cheadle Hall, and the library. "From such vantage points BEAST people should be able to pick off passing speeders and those making the sprint across the library boardwalk," Themover laughed. "We're trying to develop, in the minds of bike riders, the idea that a bike is a vehicle which must be driven with care and

parked in a designated parking lot.' "Guns will help BEAST people alleviate congestion in certain areas," Themover added.

A hope of BEAST organizers is that less students will ride bikes to campus. "We needed an excuse to clear out campus bike congestion," Captain Bob Buttinfront said. "The threat of death or bodily injury could be the necessary incentive," he added.

Buttinfront ordered the issuing of firearms after a rookie BEAST officer was mowed down by a zooming cyclist. University Police Chief Randy Jingle said, "We have apprehended the offender, she almost got into a fender bender, she ran into the library and we decided to end her."

To date the BEAST organization has 15 members. Recruitment is being held and ROTC members are encouraged to join. BEAST of-Please turn to page 12, col. 1

# Leg Council Degenerates Into Alcoholic Free-for-all

Legislation creating a new method of Associated Students money allocation was passed by the A.S. Legislative Council after heated debate, Wednesday night.

Money will now allocated by the "hopscotch" method, which calls for the tossing of a coin into a hopscotch square by Leg Council Chair, Nocturnal Vice President Brian Brainless. Brainless will flip a coin over his shoulder and depending on the square it lands in, will allocate that much money to the cause at hand.

"We have determined this to be the fairest method possible," Brainless said. "Now, if the cause is undeserving of student funds, we will know by where the coin lands. If it lands in on a line we'll know the bill is a bad one, and will have to be ammended.

If the coin lands in squares one, three, or six, the group will get twice as much as they request; if it lands in the fourfive or seveneight double squares, the group only recieves half, Brainless explained.

# Democratic Candidate Jackson Jailed

Democratic Presidential Candidate Jesse Jackson was thrown in jail by Santa Barbara Police when they mistook him for a Harlem Globetrotter yesterday on the UCSB campus.

As Jackson walked across UCSB's Storke Plaza on his way to a voter registration rally, police allegedly tackled the presidential hopeful and knocked him into Storke Pond.

Police ignored pleas from Jackson's aides who attempted to identify the unconscious religious leader and arrested Jackson on the spot.

Santa Barbara Police Chief Harry N. Gory justified the officers' actions, stating the department had recieved reports that one of the Globetrotters was in the area to discuss the pending lawsuit with city officials. "They were just doing their job," he stated.

"It's very unfortunate when this sort of thing happens," Mayor Shewill Dodge said during a live television broadcast aired last night. "But some democratic candidates look more like Globetrotters than others do."

When the K-SLANT reporter asked her if she was equating being a Globetrotter with being a democratic candidate Dodge replied angrily, "Don't be ridiculous. Some of my best friends are democratic candidates.'

The city has received no word as to whether another lawsuit will develop from the incident, but Dodge said with a sigh, "Well, that certainly seems to be the trend."

A.S. External Vice-President Vanessa NoMoore had no comment on the matter.

Jackson has remained silent over the incident due to a concussion which has rendered him unconscious since yesterday. Police say he received the injuries when he "slipped" as police took him into custody.

The city is taking a firm stand on the incident and will stand behind the Police Department

# Reagan Makes Big Booboo

Washington - "I'm sorry," President Reagan said Monday. "I had no idea that once you shoot the missiles you can't call them back." The mistake happened Sunday when Reagan shot the missiles aiming at Moscow and Leningrad after an alleged dirty letter from the dying Soviet President Chernenko.

The Soviet government agreed not to retaliate on the condition that the United States withdraw from the Middle East, Latin America and western Europe immediately, White House officials said. Reagan decided to accept the conditions of the Soviets. "It's not that I worry about the nation," he said. "But those slimy, godless, pinko spies said they'd blow up my ranch in Santa Barbara."

# **Horrific Midnite Fight To Survive**

I spent a night in the campus lagoon — A Goleta Moon exclusive!



# Peking Duck

# **Boy Scouts Toss Final Cookies**

Needles, California — 25 boyscouts and a scoutmaster were found dead today after eating girl scout cookies at a Wednesday night scout meeting. Three troops of girl scouts were arrested and charged with the murder of the scouts, who were found prostrate with open boxes of mint thins beside them. Bail was set at 1,000,000 dollars for the thirty—two girl scouts and three den mothers, who reportedly conspired to lace the cookies with pins, thumbtacks, staples and cyanide.

Led by den mother Mildred Nicety, 33 girl scouts served the poisoned cookies at the home of scoutmaster Richard Upton. The girl scouts customarily provided refreshments for the meetings, which was "the dead giveaway" according to Sherrif Louis Lindsay. "How they planned to get away with this act is beyond me" said Lindsay. "We didn't try to get away with anything" said April Vixen, age eleven. "The boy scouts have been exploiting us ever since I was a brownie. They got what was coming to them" she added.

In a flurry of accusations the head of the Girl Scouts of

America, Suzanne Bloomer, blamed Nabisco Corporation with setting up the slaughter. "The threat of the GSA to their (Nabisco's) sales is obvious" said Bloomer. "They're attempting Tylenol scare tactics" she added. Nabisco spokesmen were unavailable for comment, but according to one source Nabisco posted bail for the 34 defendants.

Girl scout ring leader Sarah Peterson referred to Nabisco's allegations as "simply preposterous." "Don't get me wrong" said Peterson, "but look how the GSA has treated us. Our sales are overwhelming and we still only get 15 cents to the box. Boy Scout deaths will continue until we get a fair share." Peterson was interviewed from her Alcatraz jail cell, where she plans to go on a hunger strike.

In a written statement Judge Frank Burger said "the malicious plotting and premeditative nature of this crime warrants a death sentence if the girl scouts are found guilty. Perhaps an appropriate execution would be in front of a firing squad of cub scouts." Local boy scout leaders shrugged off the deaths saying "Future eagle scouts should always be prepared." A preliminary hearing is scheduled for later this month. Ironically, sales of girl scout cookies have skyrocketed since the murder.

# **Bloodless Coup At Bank Arcade**

Student radicals of the Eighties stormed a video arcade on Embarcadero del Norte in Isla Vista Sunday night, in a violent attempt to establish what they say will be "the nouveau riche Bank of America."

The UCSB students, mostly business economics and accounting majors, overturned Space Invaders and Ms. Pac Man games on their way into the building, and then used hammers to destroy the rest of the video machines. The rioters reportedly secured over \$1,100 in quarters, which they plan on using to begin their enterprise.

"According to our graphs, the demand for student banking systems was greater than the available supply in the local community," Future Economists of America President and UCSB Senior Milton Freeman said. "Therefore, we concluded the only feasible way to meet our needs was by taking direct action."

The radicals were armed with calculators, computers and security deposit boxes, which they say will be installed "even if it means extra expenditures." They said they

prepared themselves for possible bloodshed by taking out special insurance policies at the Student Health Center.

Isla Vista Foot Patrol officers responded to the incident by shooting firecrackers and bottle rockets at the rioters, who have barricaded themselves inside the building with their textbooks.

"I must express dismay at this childish display," UCSB Police Chief Randy Jingle said.

"I don't understand why they would want to shut us down," Arcade Manager Pinn Ball said. "They could make just as much money with videos as they can in banking."

In a statement issued from inside the building, Ira Poindexter, head of Students For a Capitalist Society, said his "projections show that a savings and loan operation will be much more profitable than video games in the future." Poindexter's statement was written on a slide ruler and thrown to officials from a window.

The National Guard has been called in to remove the students, who have said they will remain inside the building until they recieve federally insured funds from the U.S. Treasury.

A.S. External Vice President Vannesa NoMoore could not be reached for comment.

front page about her sorority sister.

The meltdown was entirely unexpected but not entirely unforeseen," Galavanter said. "Periodically we conduct test runs of nuclear holocausts here at UCSB, making us that much more prepared if the event should occur. We've had a stockpile of rags and 409 for the last five years," he said.

"We're rallying thousands of students from across the globe to join the fight against reactors on campuses," spokesman for Students for a Nuclear Family Free Future, Daily Breedlove, said. "We want everyone to have tons of kids and we never will as long as there is the threat of nuclear holocaust hanging over their heads."

The cause of the meltdown is as yet undetermined, however many are pointing their finger at those infamous Storke Tower sparrows who invade the campus each Spring. "We think that the sparrows may have chosen the reactor as a favorite nesting spot because of the warmth that emanates from the structure," Galavanter said. "The problem is that once inside, the little buggers take baths in the reactor coolant tanks, making a terrible mess and splashing all the water out onto the floor," he said.

# **Department Store Is Coming to Isla Vista**

Frustrated in its dealings with the Santa Barbara city council, Bullock's department store announced yesterday it will set up a store in Isla Vista.

The new store will be located in the old Bank of America building, now an arcade. "We took a survey and the majority of respondents said they only hang out in the arcade because there is no local department store to go to," a Bullock's representative said.

When asked if he thought Isla Vista had the proper clientele, the representative responded, "Right across the street there's Borsodi's, and we expect to attract most of their clientele. That's why we chose this site."

He added, "We've set up a program with the Isla Vista credit union enabling their clients to have a portion of their monthly welfare checks sent automatically to us, eliminating the need to write checks and carry cash. Also, we plan to honor food stamps and stolen checks."

The move has been met with much protest. "We want Saks! We want Saks!," a group of about 4,000 students and local residents chanted outside the old bank building, disappointed with the IVCC's inability to bring a Saks' Fifth Avenue to the community.

"We tried," IVCC Member Welcome Malt-Liquor said.
"But they (Saks) wanted us to provide extra bike racks, which I found totally unacceptable. Residents will just have to live with Bullock's."

Santa Barbara Mayor Shewill Dodge was upset by Bullock's decision. "I can't believe it! Those bums! Shoot!"

Dodge said the council plans to sabotage the new business, but she said they have to overcome one obstacle. "We don't know where Isla Vista is." Coincidentally, the president of the Bullock's chain asked the same question.







Students With No Future, a campus historical club, will never hold its annual fundraising drive.





# Working Girls Complain About Treatment By University Employers

Faced with the reality of being denied the right to watch "Dukes of Hazard" reruns on their lunch hour, American Society of Kooky and Moronic Employees members have vowed to fight back by working during their lynch breaks.

"They (University of California) think they can control us. They tell us we have to have a lunch break and we can't watch "Dukes." So, we'll get back at them by working nine hours a day instead of eight. And we'll be especially productive during the lunch break. We'll show them they can't mess with us," under-the-desk-gum-cleaner Louie "Sticky Fingers" Smith said.

Originally, ASKME demanded the right to see "Fantasy Island" reruns also, but it was too big a demand to ask for both shows.

"We had to limit our demands," ASKME union representative Dudley DoLittle said. "Someone actually had the gall to suggest the Marx Brothers' movies, but we only go for the high-quality classics like the "Dukes."

The UCSB administration is perplexed about the situation. "We have a limited budget. If we were to show the reruns, we would have to lay-off all the employees to buy the television rights," Captain Bob Buttinfront said. "In the long run, the employees will suffer because the reruns would be available, but there would be no one there to run the machine," he added.

Vanessa NoMore had no comment.

One problem that has arisen as a result of the employees' action is efficiency. Computer breakdowns are immediately repaired, and while the computers are inoperable, the employees have been doing the work manually to maintain efficiency. In addition, students are amazed their questions are being answered immediately without being thrown into the bureaucratic vicious circle

"I was shocked. I came to the Registrar's office at noon and they didn't slam the door on my face. They invited me in for coffee and solved my grade problem. I hope they keep protesting," Richard Richard Squared, a math major said.

Many employees are dissatisfied with the union's representation and no longer want to be members.

"I don't know what the dissatisfied members are talking about," DoLittle said. "We have done a lot for them, even though we never asked them what they wanted. We got them pay decreases, less vacation time and eliminated promotions. Our strategy was ingenious—the UC accepted our offers immediately," he explained.

"They can protest about this issue all they want," Buttinfront said. "We'll just wait until they don't come to their senses."

Union president J. Hoffa could not be reached for comment.





As the fabulous Academy Award ceremonies draw ever closer, it's time for us, the Goleta Moon film critics, to cast our ballots for this year's OSCARS. 1983 was a skimpy year at the movies, a time when only a few worthy films graced the silver screens of Santa Barbara's finest theatres.

A truly stand-in talent, Jennifer Feals was smashing in the much underrated Flashpants, the grippingly realistic and stirringly poignant tale of a girl from the mid-west who taps her way to New York to give color and someone else's movements to the dying world of the leg warmer manufacturer. It was a clear oversight of the Academy that Miss Feals was not nominated for her fabulously subtle variation of the classic musical genre heroine (ala Ruby Keeler in Footlight Parade).

In the supporting sweepstakes, Share is a sure bet as a woman of loose morals in Silkworm, the updated nuclear version of the fabulous Astair-Charise musical classic Silk Stockings, this time with the big production number, "I'm Aglow Over You," sung by Share and her lesbian lover, Mirror Streak, during the film's meltdown sequence. Damn Shepard is a likely winner for his barking portrayal of a love-struck taxadermist in The Right Stuffing, although Jap Nickelsworth is also a favorite for his sterling portrayal as a coin exchange teller who befriends the lonely Surely Mundane and exterminates the bug up her ass in

Hands down, the best foreign film accolade will go to Inkmarred Birdman's Alexander's Fanny, the gripping, quasi-autobiographical tale of an anal retentive boy trying to earn his commission as a rear admiral. 

# **UCSB** Bound ajuwon Says Later To Houston

SEATTLE — University of Houston center Akeem Abdul Olajuwon announced in a press conference Sunday that he will leave Coach Guy Lewis and the Cougars to play his final season for the University of California, Santa Barbara.

The Houston All American was accompanied to the hastily called press conference by an openly weeping Lewis and an ecstatic UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm.

Olajuwon listed many reasons for his departure from Houston including his objections to the university being in Texas and to the university colors.

"I don't like it there, and besides I look terrible in red and white," the seven-foot Nigerian basketball sensation said. "I want to be an engineering aerospace major, but Coach tells me to take P.E., I am very frustrated intellectually."

Olajuwon said he chose UCSB when the Cougars played the Gauchos in a

Barbara. "I just loved the beaches, they reminded me of the coast of Nigeria," he said. In addition Olajuwon cited the excellent reputation of UCSB as an academic institution.

Houston led by Olajuwon will meet Georgetown tonight with the NCAA championship at stake. It was unclear how Olajuwon's announcement would effect the Cougar's chances to win the title.

"I don't care whether Houston wins or not," Olajuwon said. "I really don't care either," Pimm said echoing his new center's sentiments. "All I know is we've got him now and nothing else matters.

Lewis, his body wracked by sobbs, said he hoped Olajuwon would play well in the championship game tonight, and then change his mind after the Cougars won.

"I'll do anything to get that boy back," Lewis said. "Without him I might have to start coaching, and I'm just too old to learn how."

"We are very happy to get

December game in Santa a player of his caliber." Pimm said. "I'm pretty sure that he will be able to make the team, and I would not be surprised to seem him start if he is willing to work."

Many basketball people felt that Olajuwon would forego his final collegiate season to sign a lucrative NBA contract, but the new Gaucho said the thought never entered his mind.

"My parents in Lagos always wanted me to be a college man and earn a degree," Olajuwon said.

Olajuwon will have to sit out a year, as part of the NCAA's rules on transfers, but he will be eligible to play in the 1985-86 Gaucho campaign.

"The year off will give me a chance to raise my GPA, and to work on my tan,' Olajuwon commented. "I think a year of playing co-ed IM basketball will improve my game and help me stay in shape."




