## Betsy Talbott Reigns as Queen During Homecoming Weekend

Jean McArthur, Mary Halferty Place As Runners-up to Be Maids of Honor

Chosen by popular vote of the men students, Betsy Talbott, freshman woman, will be Queen of '37 Homecoming events. In the Wednesday election, conducted by El Gaucho, the winner was named over eight other candidates presented by sororities, classes, and women's social clubs.

### Attendants Chosen

Jean McArthur, a junior student and member of Tau Gamma Sigma, and Mary Alice Halferty, a senior belonging to Alpha Theta Chi were runnersup and will act as ladies-in-waiting to the Homecoming Queen.

Betsy Talbott, as queen, will ride with her attendants at the head of the float division of the State street parade tonight in a special car. The three winners will be introduced at the auditorium rally. Dick Kaime, publicity director, will also interview the queen over KTMS on the State college program between 6:00 and 6:30 tonight.

### Banquet Honors

At the Biltmore banquet and dance, the Homecoming queen will be the guest of honor. Three hundred ballots were cast in the election held throughout Wednesday with the polls closing at 3 p.m. Petie McKinney, head of the rally committee, Bill McKenzie, chairman of the social committee, and Nat Hales of El Gaucho, acted as official vote counters, with Helen Longawa, Ann Seymour, and Frank Douglas acting as checkers.

Other nominees included Irene Baptiste, Theda Call, Lyndell Brundige, Norma Monson, Betty Palmay-mesa and Marie Navarro.

The class of 1912, which is the honored class of this year's Homecoming activities, will meet old friends and make new acquaintances at a luncheon in Ebbets Hall, Saturday at 11:45 o'clock. Special speakers at the luncheon will be Dr. Ednah Rich Morse, founder and president emeritus of Santa Barbara State, Mrs. Helen Fish, and Miss Orrie Gross, home economics head of Riverside High school and representative of the class.

## Parade and Rally Officially Open 1937 Homecoming Weekend Celebration Tonight

The annual parade and rally will officially open Santa Barbara State's Homecoming festivities tonight, with the march scheduled to start promptly at 7:30 from the foot of State street on Cabrillo boulevard, to be followed by the rally in the college auditorium at 8:45.

Christine McDonald will lead the parade of floats entered by the majority of campus organizations. The band, headed

by Wells McAllister and Barbara Sharp, will also march. President Clarence L. Phelps, Mayor "Pat" Maher, Francis O'Reilly, and Danny D'Alfonso will ride in the official car, followed by the rally committee car and the automobile in which Queen Betsy Talbott, and her two attendants, Jean McArthur and Mary Alice Halferty, will ride. Yell King Jack Kitchen will be in charge of all parade arrangements.

Manson Is M. C.

Jack Manson, assistant yell leader, will act as master-of-ceremonies for the rally program which will feature the music of Fred Lambourne and his Collegians. Other featured performers include Jimmy Belt, frosh student, in a "Tizzy Lish," act; Josephine McBride, who will sing selections from "The Student Prince." And a trucking chorus will also be presented, plus many other skits and dance ensembles.

The Ott's Sweepstake trophy, a 16 inch silver loving cup, will be awarded at the beginning of the rally, to the best organization float in the parade. A first and second prize will also be given, and a first prize for the best decorated car. A. S. B. President D'Alfonso will make the presentations. Two prizes, one organization and one individual, will be given for the most tickets sold.

All organizations entering floats in the parade are urged to report to Cabrillo boulevard at seven o'clock to get their places in the line of march. ## Eight Seniors Play Nevada

Mulock, Oldershaw, Hart, Hayman, Young, Pollock Yeager Close Season

Football followers of Santa Barbara college gaze fondly at the lineup of star players which are collected on this year's roster. It is the best group the Gauchos have ever had and a glance at the height and weight chart also gladdens the hearts of local supporters.

Joy ceases with a glance at the class listings, however, for eight seniors, seven who have been regulars for three years, are winding up their football careers this year.

### Will Be Missed

When Coach "Spud" Harder calls roll for spring practice later this year, he will be missing both first string ends, both guards, the center, and two of his starting backfield quartet. (It leaves several large holes to be filled, and local fans are wondering how next year's team will do without these players such as Danny Mulock, Doug Oldershaw, Don Hart, Frank Hayman and Al Young, out of the line. It is easy to see what a lot of rebuilding Coach Harder faces next fall. The loss of Dave Pollock, Howard Yeager and Bobbie Morelli from the backfield leaves only Fred Monson and Clyde Frisholtz to carry on.)

### Enter in 1934

With the exception of Al Young, all of these players entered State as freshmen in 1934. Their ability was immediately put to use by Coach Harder, and they all were first string as sophomores. Young joined the team last year as a transfer so with seven three-year first stringers and three two-year first stringers—Busby, Monson and Young, it is no wonder that the 1937 Gaucho varsity gets off their complicated reverses with such precision.

Danny Mulock and Al Young form the best end combination in State's history. Mulock is the fast slashing type of player who is forever throwing runners for losses. After two years of trying, other conference schools have almost given up trying to round Danny. The clever manner in which he piles through interference to come up with the ball carrier and the calmness with which he conducts himself on the field make him invaluable to the team. Al Young plays a waiting game at the other end of the line. Weighing well over 200 pounds, he makes it very difficult for the opposition when they try to run a play over him. His height makes him an ideal pass receiver and last year, his first on the Gaucho varsity, he won all-conference honors.

### Hayman Strong

Right guard, Frank Hayman, is also completing his football career this year. Perhaps the most underrated player on the team, Frank has played regularly and well for three seasons. He plays right in the center of the line both on offense and defense, and one of the main reasons why no team has been successful in piercing the Gaucho forward wall is the fact that Frank Hayman is there to stop them.

As a senior this year, Capt. Doug Oldershaw has already won almost every honor available on the football field. As a sophomore he was (Continued on Page 5, Column 1)

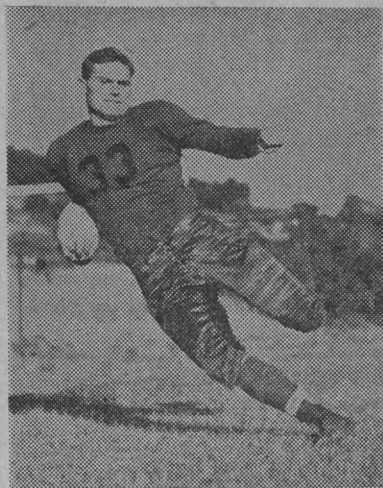

Nevada Seeks to Prove Fresno Game Fluke, Upset Staters

As the feature of the Homecoming celebration this week-end, the Nevada university football team will invade Peabody stadium tomorrow night for an intersectional contest with Santa Barbara State's undefeated Gauchos. This promises to be one of the most exciting contests of the year with both teams somewhat of a question mark.

### Wolves Aroused

The Wolves are an in-and-out team this year, capable of playing fine football when sufficiently aroused. They will be aroused tomorrow night if psychology has anything to do with the game. They have been waiting all year to get even with the Gauchos for last year's unexpected 13-0 beating. In addition, they want to prove that last week's 46 to 8 defeat at the hands of Fresno State was a fluke. If they arise to the occasion they are capable of extending the Gauchos to the limit as was proven when they were nosed out by the College of Pacific, 7 to 3.

### Injuries Bother

Injuries are bothering the Gauchos this week-end, and it is unknown whether they will be at full strength tomorrow night or not. Howard Yeager has been out of the hospital since Monday, but it seems problematical whether he will start the game. Fullback Freddy Monson has been confined to the hospital with influenza but both he and Al Young, who has a sore ankle may open.

The Gauchos are in danger of pointing for the conference championship game with San Diego next week and as a result an upset may be in store. Coach Harder will start Mulock and Young at ends, either Woody or Palmer and Busby at tackles, Oldershaw and Hayman at guards and Hart at center. The backfield will be Pollock, Monson, Frisholtz and either Yeager or Bill McArthur.

Records of San Diego and State Promise Close Conference Tilt

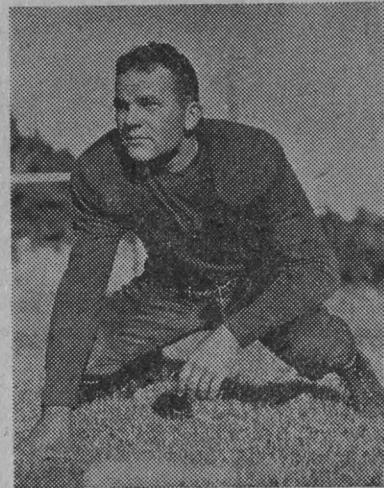

Ratings for conference teams place State far ahead of their nearest opponent. Following is the rating:

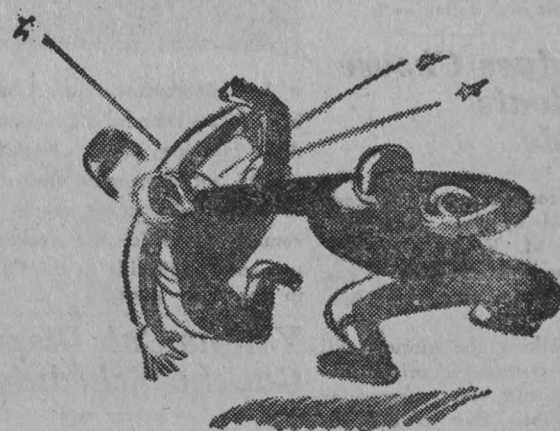

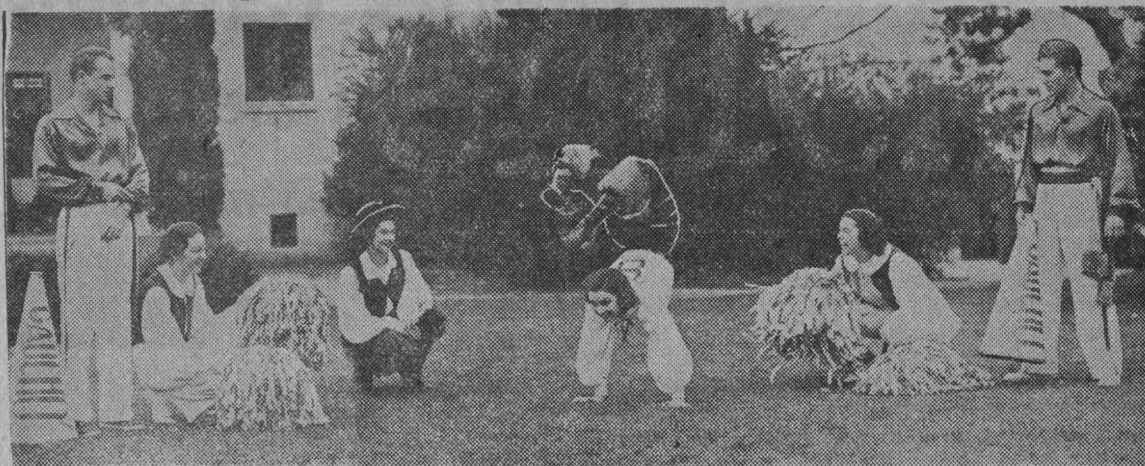

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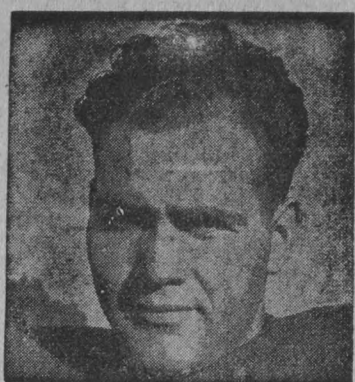

voted the most valuable man on the team. He has been all-conference every year and last season was acclaimed the finest lineman in the history of the Southern Conference. The crowning achievement was his selection as a first string member of the small college All-America football team. His is unparalleled in the matter of interference running and the uncanny way he diagnoses plays while backing up the line on defense spells defeat for opponents of El Gaucho.

Hart Leads

Two hundred and ten pound center, "Donk" Hart, has been a mainstay of the Gaucho forward wall for the past three seasons. A powerful defensive lineman, Hart sets the wheels of Santa Barbara's offense in motion with his exceptionally accurate centering. Not only are all his passes well aimed, but at the same time he keeps an eye on opposing linemen which makes him all the more dangerous to the opposition. "Donk" seems assured of an all-conference birth again this year.

Quarterback Dave Pollock has been a steady signal caller for three years and last year was on the second string all-conference team. Primarily the blocking back, Dave does his job well and this year has blossomed out into a dangerous ball car-

rier as well. Pollock is a very cool, deliberate player and should rate high when all-conference selections are made later this year.

Needs Luck

In the same predicament as Doug Oldershaw is Howard Yeager, Santa Barbara's Little All-America half-back. About the only thing for Yeager to do is to break "Red" Grange's twelve-year-old mark of yards gained from scrimmage. With a little luck he may pick up the necessary 376 yards in the remainder of the schedule. Yeager, all-conference last year, is far out in front in conference scoring this year, having picked up thirty points in two games. Yeager is the competitive sparkplug of the team and his uncanny ability to break loose at any moment puts fear into the hearts of the opposition.

Yeager's "touchdown twin" and running mate for two seasons, Bobbie Morelli, has already completed his competition for the Gauchos. A technicality formed the basis of complaints from other schools and Bobbie was benched to maintain amicable relations. Either first or second string all-conference for two years, Morelli scored 42 points last year. He was counted upon heavily this year and only the brilliant play of Clyde Frisholtz has saved the situation.

STATE TAKES TOP SPOT IN S. C. CONFERENCE

• Possession of the Southern California conference championship has been left to the State colleges for the second consecutive year. Last year San Diego State captured the title by defeating Santa Barbara by a single-point margin, 9-8. This year the championship will be at stake when the State colleges meet again.

Conference play began this season with the Occidental-Santa Barbara game. From the local angle the less said the better.

The following week end saw the San Diego-Occidental game which saw the Aztecs beat the Tigers by a three-point margin when Nichols, second-string quarter, kicking a field goal. In this game the sophomore sensation of Oxy, Moradian, was injured.

Whittier played San Diego and Oxy played La Verne on the next day of football. This saw San Diego take a wide lead as the Aztecs won again, 6-0. Oxy won their only game of the season, 13-0. Both games were warm-ups for the heat that was to be poured on later. In the La Verne contest Oxy lost their second star, Rejebian.

La Verne and San Diego and Redlands and State met the next week. Both Aztecs and Gauchos went to town, Aztecs, 26-0 and Gauchos, 31-0. State schools played their best games on this week end. San Diego and State led the conference.

As the season progressed Santa Barbara beat Whittier, 20-0, Oxy tied Redlands at no score, Redlands beat La Verne, 6-0. Then came the upset called by the Oxy experts. While La Verne was losing to Santa Barbara, 20-0, Redlands dropped San Diego in the cleverest game of the season. With four minutes to go Redlands was leading, 10-9. Jimmy Blaisdell took his time calling signals. In fact he took so much time that after the fourth play there were only two seconds to go.

Many Varsity Men Play Nevada

• As the 1937 season draws to a close one of the oldtimers on the campus took a look around him and sat down to think of what the Green and White teams had done in the past. As he dreamed of yesteryear he saw the fortunes of State rise and fall and then rise again to their present height. Here is a little of what the old timer saw:

State Develops

In 1926 Head Coach Gilliland resigned his job and Dud DeGroot took over the task of building the Roadrunners athletically. For two years Dud held the Staters up near the top of Southern California colleges and then accepted a position in Menlo Park. Hal Davis succeeded DeGroot and the Santa Barbara teams began to take shape as a tough team to play. Davis hit his peak in 1930 by putting a team on the field that was undefeated until the last game when they lost to Occidental by tiring in the last quarter and allowing the Tiger to push across three touchdowns and conversions. State that year had but 17 men out for the team.

Play Doormat

Following the 1930 team came lean years in the local victory program, and the Hilltoppers became known as the doormat of the Southern California conference. A rebirth of spirit was started in 1933 when the campus powers hired Ted Beckett,

All-American guard from California, to assist Davis in guiding the football destinies of Santa Barbara. 1933 found no better win and loss record but a lot better brand of football was shown to the local fans and paved the way for Spud Harder to enter the next year and begin to build.

Harder Comes

Harder's first year was one of improvement with the best thing about the year being the remarkable improvement of the freshman team. 1935 saw the sophomore Gaucho team sweep across the fall horizon and drop only two games, one by one point to Redlands and the other to the conference champs, Whittier, by one lone touchdown. Last year the Gauchos continued their sensational climb to the top of the ladder and registered eight straight victories before a championship game ended with the score 9 to 8.

Since 1934, when the Roadrunner changed his name to Gaucho, State has won 20 games, lost nine and tied four. There have been two Little All-Americans and 11 All-Conference men on the Big Green teams since Harder's arrival.

The fame of State was further spread last year by the hiring of Ken Noble as publicity director and although he served only during the football season a precedent was established that has continued to give the Gauchos inches in many papers throughout the United States.

Nevada Meets State As Darkhorse Opponent

• When the Gauchos meet the Wolves of Nevada Saturday night an interesting comparison will come to view as the invaders become a dark horse that is capable of doing just about anything. State will be on the spot as one of the four unbeaten teams in California and Nevada has no worries and will be playing for the sheer interest of the game.

The Wolves have lost four out of six encounters while the Gauchos have won four out of six. However, an answer to this question is the survey of the opponents on the schedule. Nevada was beaten by St. Mary's, Cal Aggies, College of Pacific, and Fresno State. By these teams it certainly is no disgrace to be beaten. As for the Fresno 46-8 score the Wolves just went completely to pieces while Fresno played the best game of the season.

Nevada's kicking ability is quite good and out of eight attempts succeeded in five. Added to this are two field goals. One of these field goals beat the University of Wyoming. Reason for this is one Pat Eaton. In the attempts-for-points Pat with Jim Twombly holding the ball has missed only one attempt with the exceptions of blocked kicks.

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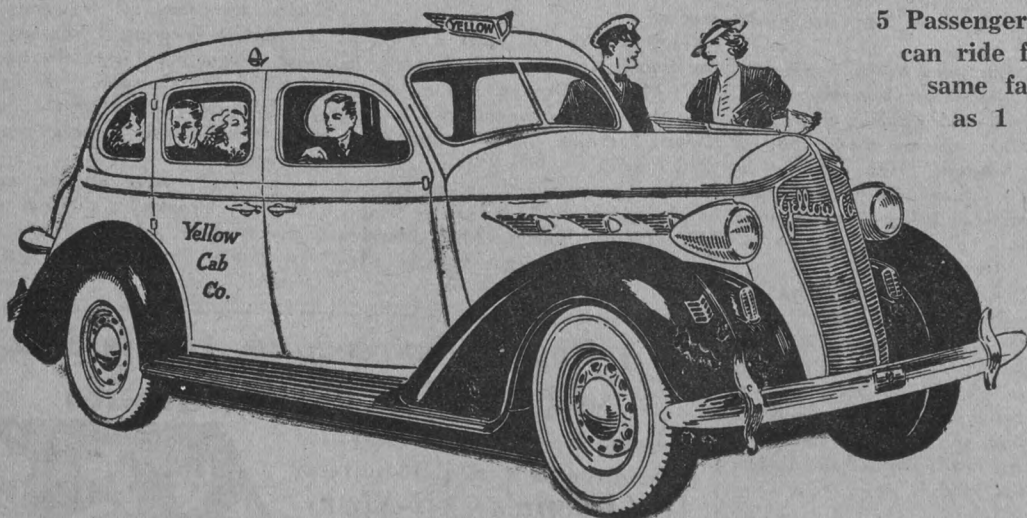

## Love Is Blind

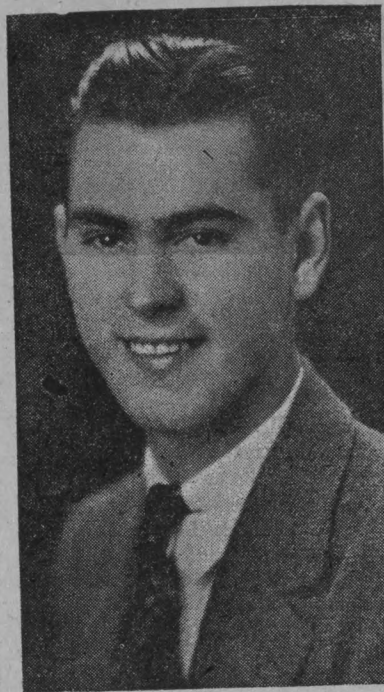
