

After two years of trying, other conference schools have almost given up trying to round Danny. The clever manner in which he piles through interference to come up with the ball carrier and the calmness with which he conducts himself on the field make him invaluable to the team. Al Young plays a waiting game at the other end of the line. Weighing well over 200 pounds, he makes it very difficult for the opposition when they try to run a play over him. 




