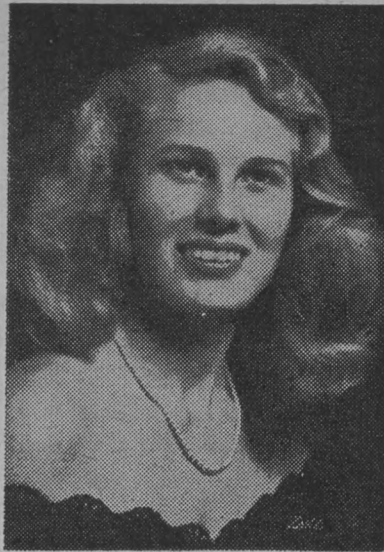

Twenty-five unique and beautifully decorated floats will roll down State street Saturday at 2:15 p.m. sharp in the giant annual Homecoming day parade.

Provost J. Harold Williams, Stewart Maitland, president of the city council, and ASB officers from both Whittier and UCSBC will be among the leaders of the procession.

### Homecoming Queen Prospects To Be Introduced This Noon; Five Men to Act as Judges

Homecoming queen candidates will be introduced today at noon in the quad. Eight girls are vying for the honor.

The judges will be on the stage to observe the girls and score them. Although the names of the judges cannot be revealed, Joyce Fenstad, chairman of the contest, stated that there will be five men who have no Greek affiliations. Among them will be representatives of the downtown businessmen, the faculty and administrative officers.

The girls will be judged on five points: poise, beauty, first impression, personality and applause. They will be scored on the basis of 20 per cent for each point.

John Robey, master of ceremonies, will interview the candidates over the microphone. This is the only time the judges will see the girls. Pictures of all candidates have been on display at Kerry's downtown.

If it is possible, the girls who are chosen in the queen's court will be announced at the end of the assembly in the quad. Candidates for the title are:

- Margie Alexander, a senior from Santa Ana, is 19 years old. She is a Home Ec major and vice-president of Alpha Phi in charge of scholarship.
- Lura Bousman is from Pasadena and also a senior. She is 20, an ECE major, and Delta Sigma Epsilon's representative to Panhellenic council.
- Gerry Cox is a Speech major from Ventura. A junior, Gerry is 19 and was active in dramatics at Ventura J.C. where she was also a song leader. She is sponsored by Sigma Tau Gamma.
- Barbara Hancock is 20 and a junior. A local girl, she is an Elected major and social chairman of Alpha Delta Pi.
- Peggy Havekorst is a 21-year-old senior from Long Beach. A Home Ec major, she is a member of Rally committee and election chairman of Delta Gamma.
- Kris Johannesson is 19 and a junior from Pasadena. Majoring in Biology, she is a song leader and a member of Pi Beta Phi.
- June Murphy is from Los Angeles and a Junior High education major. She is 21 and campaign manager of Kappa Alpha Theta.
- Melisse Straszer is a 19-year-old ECE major from Los Angeles. She is secretary of the sophomore class and a member of Chi Omega.

### One Touchdown

Under new head coach George Allen, the Poets have not fared too well this year. In the four games they have scored one lone touchdown. Their defeats were at the hands of the Submarine Force of San Diego 50-0, San Francisco State 26-6, Arizona State 6-0 and Occidental 7-0.

Operating out of the single wing formation, left halfback George Sackman, freshman from Alhambra High School, will do the bulk of the ball carrying and passing for the Poets. Bob Dunham, up from the frosh, has the berth of fullback. At the quarterback spot, letterman Jack Pickering not only does the blocking but also punts for the Poets. The starting right halfback will be Rod Burroughs, filling in the vacancy left by the graduation of all-SCIC and UP Little All-Coast Jim Steckline.

Abounding in depth at the end positions, Whittier boasts no less than four two-year lettermen: Jerry Wegner, Jerry Porter, Ed Vanderhoven, and George Corey. The former two will handle the starting assignments. The tackles are possibly the weakest spot on the Whittier eleven, the Poets boasting only one letterman. Captain Don Rothrock and Ben Hartunian are the nominees for the starting spots. With four lettermen-guards returning, the Whittier eleven seems to have this problem quite taken care of. Vic Cantelmo and Jerry Black draw the starting roles for Coach Allen. Handling the center spot will be letterman Bill Cota.

Although several injuries were incurred during last week's game at Fresno, the Gauchos should be in top physical shape for tomorrow night's game. The return of all-CCAA fullback Dave Gorrie to the starting eleven greatly strengthens the Santa Barbarans.

### Halfbacks

Halfbacks Doug Gorrie and Ron Ternquist will be a constant threat for the Gauchos. Ternquist's speed has been shown with a pair of touchdowns on kick-off returns and one on a punt return. Ternquist leads the Gauchos in scoring with five touchdowns. Gorrie not only

The banquet was the closing event of a two-day convention attended by Spurs from the University of Arizona, the University of New Mexico, Redlands University, USC, UCLA, and UCSBC.

## HOMEcoming THROUGH THE YEARS FROM WAY BACK WHEN 'TIL NOW

 Homecoming! The gala week-end of parades, dinners, comedy skits, football, dancing and parties was not always the festival we are accustomed to and are beginning this very day. Our parade Saturday will be typical of those which have progressed down State Street the last few years, with cars and huge floats decorated to a theme such as the current one, "C' Shore Hit Parade."

In 1942, a year after the second world war began, a theme was featured around campus, but with a war on, few men around, and interest directed toward war bond drives and such, it had little to do with Homecoming. Then Santa Barbara college sponsored a "Walk-a-Date Plan" to "bring about more friendships and new acquaintances among students." The planners who planned the "plan" said it: (1) helped the government by saving gas; (2) encouraged more dates by keeping boys from being embarrassed to ask a girl out when he had no car or no gas; (3) was practical.

The big dance Saturday night is being widely publicized around campus but such publicity is nothing compared to that given to one in October, 1943. First in a series, it was jointly sponsored by the student body and the Marine Corps and was held at the Marine Corps Base in the metropolis of Goleta. Buses took college girls who signed up in the Dean's office to and from the affair.

October 1944 saw many social events under way: teas, dances, dinners — honoring alumni? No, for the current college girls and held at Camp Cooke and the Goleta air base. Especially exciting (in this case for college students only) was the dinner following the old tradition of freshman "hazing" at which the bloody, terrible, and merciless "Kangaroo Court" reigned. The freshmen were cruelly drilled for answers to questions

like "What is your name?" and "What are you majoring in?" At the end of the experience an "impressive" ceremony took place at which time all freshmen removed their little green bows and sang the Alma Mater.

Homecoming was the homecoming of our day however, in 1946, when a Galloping Gaucho Revue, parade, and dance at the armory, honored returning alumni. The game that year was with San Diego and *El Gaucho* reports we "outplayed the rival team (although San Diego won the game)."

The biggest and best homecoming up to that time was in 1949. It was said to be a "burning" success. Alpha Theta Chi's float caught fire from a lighted hi-way flare and caused a good deal of damage to the whole student body who helped them pay off the debt. A "Bond-Fire Bounce" at which booths, dancing and raffle prizes were featured netted them \$467.90.

Last year was, of course, up to the present Homecoming standards with a theme "Circus Daze" and the crowning of Queen Charm Hill.

Let's hope that when we return to this college as alumni the big festival will be comparable to the ones we work for and enjoy now.

Special features will be Sunday breakfasts at fraternity and sorority houses and a big dance Saturday night.

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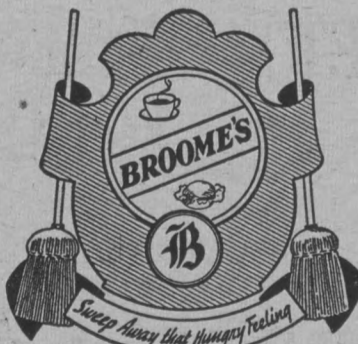
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To all Gauchos:  
Be proud of your football team, Gauchos. They went into the Fresno game the underdog, so the experts said, by 13 or 20 points. After setting the pace early in the game and racking up a 20-point lead, an inspired Bulldog team came back to tie the score and then went ahead. Your Gauchos fought back and finally won the game with barely ten seconds to go.

It was the most dramatic, sensational finish you can imagine. If you had seen it in a movie you would have walked out in disgust. But it really happened. Here are some of the highlights during and after the game.

There is some doubt as to whether Coach Engle sent Bob Laskin in to kick that winning field goal. Bob had been sent into the game a short time before to attempt a field goal but a five-yard penalty moved the ball out of range. The winning goal was kicked a few minutes later under the same circumstances. On this last and successful attempt some say Bob went into the game on his own.

The jubilant Gauchos boosted Laskin to their shoulders and carried him off the field. Such an honor occurs only in the rarest occasions — about like finding a hundred dollar bill on the street.

Bill Davis deserves a lot of credit for catching that high pass from the center and placing the ball. The line was impenetrable.

Eight thousand partisan Fresno rooters went wild as the Bulldogs were erasing a 20-point Santa Barbara lead. The stands were bedlam when a safety gave them a two-point lead. A few moments later, when the field goal made the score 23 to 22 they were speechless. If it hadn't been for a hundred or so Gaucho rooters Ratcliffe Stadium would have been as quiet as a tomb.

Provost Williams attended the game. He was in the dressing room after the game to congratulate the team. His elation was as great as that of the players and coaches. This gesture by the Provost was greatly appreciated by the squad. Dr. Williams also met the bus the next morning as the team was preparing to leave Fresno.

The Fresno coach, Duke Jacobs, suffered a heart attack at the end of the game.

The price in injuries was great. Gauchos: Lionell Purcell, twisted knee; Andy Spaan, fractured wrist; Floyd Fulton, fractured nose; Bill Davis, cut cheek; George Mattias, cut over eye; Less Harris, mild concussion. There were as

### BILL PERRY, JILL KERNS WIN TOP SPOTS IN RUSSELL SWIM MEET HERE TUESDAY

The semi-annual Dave Russell Memorial Swimming meet was held Tuesday afternoon, in honor of the late former collegian who was instrumental in its inauguration into the intramural program of Santa Barbara college prior to his death two years ago.

The outstanding swimmers of the meet were honored with a plaque. They were Bill Perry, an Independent and a repeater to the honor from last Spring's meet. He scored 18 1/2 points to edge Melvin and Hora, nearest contenders. They collected 16 1/3 and 16 points respectively.

The leading woman swimmer was newcomer Jill Kerns, a Pi Beta Phi sorority girl, who won the 50 meter freestyle and picked up points in three other events.

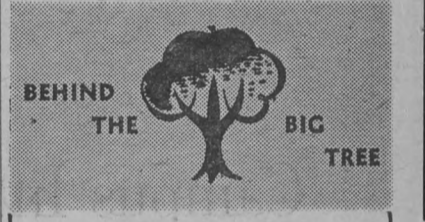
#### Hefty Line

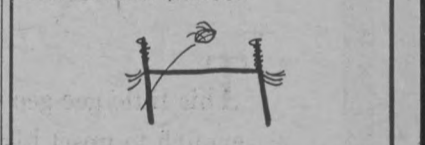

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# LASKEN'S FIELD GOAL GIVES GAUCHOS EDGE FRIDAY

## RANDOM RAMBLINGS

For Homecoming, a brief Ramble through the past.

Ah, for the good old days. Way back yonder when men were men, school was school, football was played for fun and the draft didn't hang over every Santa Barbara student's head like a sword of Damocles.

All the way back, say to 1936, when Santa Barbara had just assumed the nickname of Gaucho and the colors were Green and White.

That season the newly christened Gauchos stomped over nine opponents, had two Little All-Americans and scored 223 points to their opponents' 42.

Guiding the helm of that great quad was present UCSB Athletic Director "Spud" Harder, with two little All-Americans starring for the locals.

It was the last year Santa Bar-

bara competed in the SCIC as we were considered too big, and were dropped by the conference schools.

It was also the year we lost the conference title in the final game of the season to San Diego State 9-8, in one of the most disputed plays in local grid history.

Played as the inaugural game for San Diego's College Stadium, Los Gauchos entered the contest undefeated and untied, while the Aztecs were undefeated in Southern California Intercollegiate play.

Howard Yaeger, Little All-American halfback, carried the opening kick-off 93 yards down the center of the field for a touchdown, only to have the score called back for a clipping penalty. Later in the contest he scored again, only to be called for having his knee touch the ground many yards up the field.

As it was the Gauchos managed to grind out one score, with the conversion blocked. San Diego came back and tied things up, and missed the extra try. A field goal was then good for the Aztecs, and with minutes to play the score read San Diego 9, Santa Barbara 6.

Yaeger took the kick off, but gained little. Down the field the Green and White rolled, to the San Diego three, first and goal. Four line plays netted exactly one yard and San Diego took over with 57 seconds left in the game. Two plays lost yards and with the clock

## Cross Country Men Place in LAJC Meet

Coach Nick Carter's cross country squad traveled to East Los Angeles Junior college last Saturday where Wayne Piercy of the Gauchos took 29th in a field of 77 runners, followed in by Don Crie, 39th; Bob Hamilton 70th, and Duane Mittan, 71st.

University of Southern California's Art Garcia won the meet running the three miles in 16 min. 57 sec. USC took first place in the team competition with 44 points, San Diego State was second with 47, and Naval Training Center third with 102 points.

With two men out because of sickness and injury, the Gauchos were ineligible for team competition, but expect to have a full team for their third AAU meet to be held this Saturday at UCLA.

The pass from center was fumbled in the end zone as the gun winding up the game went off. In the ensuing mad scramble the intended punter fell on the ball, and lost it. Finally a Gaucho guard gained possession.

At this point the little men in white stepped in and gave San Diego the game with the ruling that the Aztecs had been in possession at the finish, scoring a safety for SB. Final total read Santa Barbara 8, San Diego 9.

Also in the realm of past history is our series with Whittier.

On the record the Poets have clubbed the Gauchos nine times, while we hold four decisions. No game has ever been played to a tie.

In the post war era the series was renewed in 1948, with a UCSB win 21-19. 1949 was Whittier 20-6 and last season 18-6. The Poets also managed to hang some corkers on us: in 1931 32-7, 1932 46-6, 1934 46-6, while we have retaliated with only two one-sided wins, in 1936 26-0 and 1937 20-0.

So, with that enlightening bit of information I leave you 'til that game at La Playa Saturday night.

With only 10 seconds standing between the Gauchos and defeat, Halfback Bob Lasken calmly booted home a 32-yard field goal to give the Gauchos a 23-22 victory over the Fresno State Bulldogs at Ratcliff stadium last Friday night in one of the hardest fought and best played games in Gaucho football history.

Over 7500 partisan fans sat in complete stunned silence as the umpire signaled the goal which saw an assured Bulldog victory go up in smoke.

### SB 20, Fresno 0

Shocked early in the game to see the underdog Gauchos score three touchdowns in the first quarter to take a 20-0 lead, the Bulldogs staged a tremendous comeback to tie up the count 20-20 as the final period began. Then Fresno

no snatched away the lead and what seemed to be a sure victory from the tired and injury hampered Gauchos as they smeared Gaucho quarterback Bill Davis in his end zone for a safety.

Coach Roy Engle's squad opened the game with a bang and put on their best offensive effort in several seasons to take that 20-0 lead in the first period. The Gauchos' first score came early in the period when fullback Bob Morton recovered a fumble on the Bulldog 29 and nine plays later end Adran

Adams slipped behind the Fresno secondary to snag a Davis pass for the TD.

### Ternquist for 80 yards

Fresno got nowhere on its series of downs and was forced to punt. They made the mistake of directing the ball toward Ron Ternquist who grabbed it and took off down the sidelines behind tremendous downfield blocking by his teammates for 80 yards and six more points.

The third score came when Fresno's offense once again got absolutely nowhere and was forced to punt from behind their own goal-line. Guard Floyd Fulton knifed in and blocked the kick which was fallen on in the end zone to give the Gauchos a lightning fast 20-0 lead.

Fresno then came bouncing back with a vengeance with Nick Dokoozlian and Fibber Hirayam leading the way which led to a 22-yard pass from Fred Sommers to Marlin Binger in the end zone for the first Bulldog tally just before the half ended.

### Dokoozlian TD

With the start of the third period the Bulldogs intercepted a Davis pass which was run back to the Gaucho six from where Sommers boomed over for the score two plays later. Dokoozlian then finished wiping out the Gaucho lead by galloping through the Gaucho line for 61 yards and the tying points.

By this time the Gauchos were beginning to look as though they were running out of gas, due in a great part to the numerous injuries which forced Gaucho players to leave the field of the rough game, and Fresno looked like the victor when Davis tried to pass from his end zone and was smothered when his pass receivers were covered and he could not get rid of the ball.

### Fresno 22, SB 20

With Fresno now leading 22-20 the Bulldogs tried once again to increase their lead and almost succeeded but their touchdown was called back on a penalty and the Gauchos stiffened and soon got the ball on downs. With 10 minutes left the Hilltoppers began once again to open up in almost first quarter form but after moving down to the Fresno 12 were stopped on fourth down when Davis was dropped while trying to pass back on the 31.

Fresno took over but was stopped by a now determined Gaucho defense and with only three minutes left they got the ball back on their own 44 and began to roll. A 25-yard pass from Gary Morris to Adams got the Gauchos rolling and they ended up on the Bulldog 16 but it was fourth down and still 6 yards to go. The Gauchos then drew a five-yard penalty for delaying the game and the small but boisterous Santa Barbara rooting section all but lost hope. Lasken came into the game and the team lined up for the field goal which was on a very bad angle and to all in the stadium it seemed an extreme desperation attempt.

Lasken finally booted the ball and silence descended upon Ratcliff stadium as there was a delay in the referee's signal; the ball seemed to have dropped below the uprights and there was a penalty on the play. Then the referee signaled a successful attempt and the Fresno rooters filed silently out of the stadium as the Gauchos and their small rooting section went completely crazy.

## 'BUCK-A-MONTH' HELPS GAUCHOS

Football season is here again, and we're hoping our team will have another successful year. Prominent among the many factors which contribute to building this good team is the Gaucho Buck-a-Month club.

Composed of interested townspeople, this group was organized only a year ago, but the Gaucho athletic teams have already realized countless benefits from its existence. Last year the BAMC was instrumental in giving 37 boys grant-in-aid scholarships to help pay registration and tuition fees, they procured 61 part time jobs for Gaucho athletes, and sponsored two post season banquets along with a pre-season football barbecue.

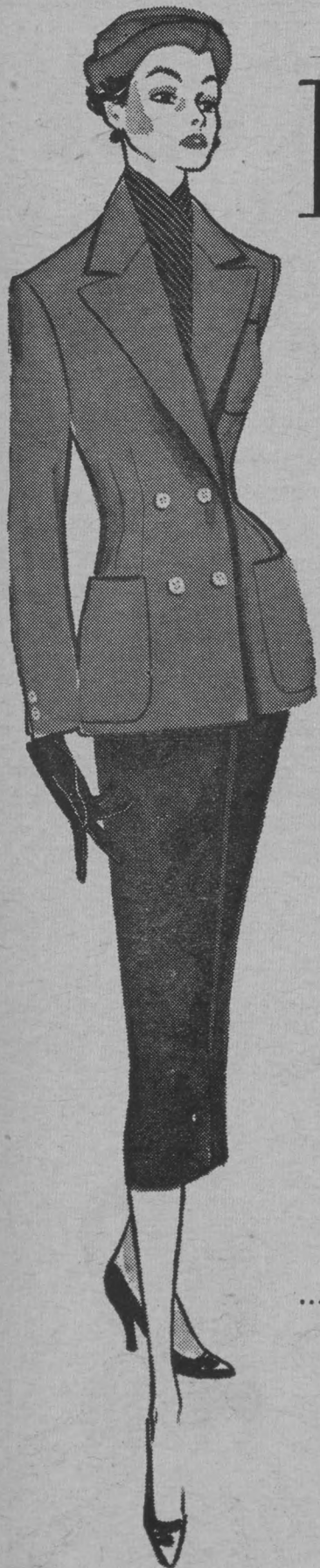

October 22, 1900 — Inaugural meeting of the Empire City Track at Yonkers, and Cherentus won the first Empire City Handicap!

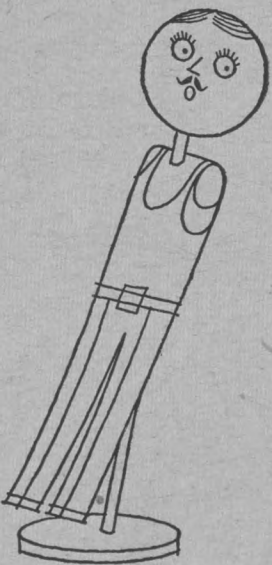

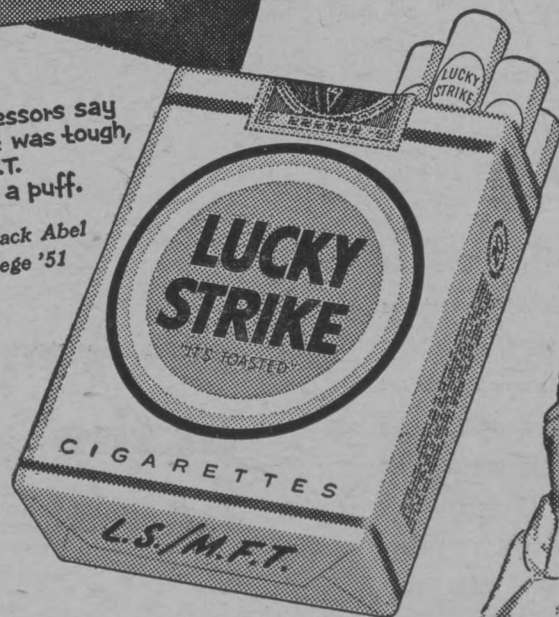
