

Americans came together a month ago and, for the most part, rejected what some saw as a cynical co-option of "family values" by declining to vote George Bush to another term in the White House. But it's another season now, and a time for many in this nation to look back and examine what those family values are all about in time to make those purchases that provide the glue that holds together a healthy household — toys

for the kids. And as the tumultuous year 1992 sighs to a close, it becomes apparent that a renaissance of Toyland Americana is upon our nation's youth.

That's right boys and girls — Barbie's back. Barbie? With Hillary Clinton packing to move onto Pennsylvania Avenue? Believe it, man, it's true. According to Dan, at Kay-Bee in La Cumbre Plaza, shoppers so far have been sticking with tradi-tional favorites — electronic games for boys (a tradition since those bygone days when Nintendo was spelled A-T-A-R-I), and for girls, dolls. Dolls?

Barbie Dolls. The folks at Kernahan's Toys on State Street agreed. "Dolls," they said. Like collector's dolls? (Kernahan's has those really oldfashioned pre-aerobics, heads-bigger-than-breasts

models.) "No, like Barbies." It's not just Barbie's resurgence that indicates this everything-old-is-new-again trend. G.I. A Cut Above: The Eco-Correct Tannenbaum

As the demands of capitalism push the yuletide season back ever earlier, thoughts of that perennial holiday symbol, the Christmas tree, sprout in the minds of consumers everywhere.

While wading through the malls of America in search of the perfect acrylic sweater or the latest Michael Bolton CD, they are reminded that Christmas would not be what it is without the faithful Tannenbaum. The togetherness of decorating its branches, the danger of the green giant falling over and crushing an unsuspecting family member, the fear that you'll step barefooted onto a glass orna-ment, all contribute to the thrill that only a Christmas tree can bring.

But there is a sinister side to all this merriment. As cash registers ring in the season and schoolchildren fidget beneath reindeer costumes, millions of trees si-lently meet an untimely end before the tree farmer's ax.

After being doused with green paint to simulate that healthy forest look, they are hacked down, bound up with wire and crammed onto the backs of semi-trucks. Eventually they are unceremoniously dumped onto curbs across the land, creating a gruesome scene of destruction for tree-lovers everywhere. Latter-day Johnny Appleseeds wonder what those trees would have been if they had been allowed to grow into a forest. Visions of wanton, heated rendezvous beneath the pines dance through their heads.

But before giving in to visions of a Christmas chain saw massacre, your local nursery or all-purpose hardware store may have the answer. A variety of unharvested Christmas trees are available, from large potted pines to diminutive holiday bonsais.

According to Bernd Schroeter, manager of La Sumida Nursery on Patterson Avenue, potted trees are easy to grow and last year after year, making them more

economical than cut trees. "They grow real fast. They'll jump right out at you," he said.

La Sumida offers a range of potted holiday plants, such as the poinsettia, blooming Christmas cacti, and small pine trees that come pre-decorated for the customer on the go.

Still, Schroeter said people buy cut fir trees 80% of the time. A major factor contributing to their popularity is their distinctive aroma, he said. "It's also the most decoratable tree," he added. Tim O'Toole of Builders Emporium

said he prefers to use potted Christmas trees because "it becomes a personal thing with your tree, rather than just cutting one down every year."

Builders Emporium, in addition to cut trees and potted varieties, also sells a rosemary bush shaped like a Christmas tree. Could customers who do a lot of cooking get Christmas cheer and a tasty kitchen spice out of this plant?

"No one's mentioned that before, but I wouldn't see why not," O'Toole said. For people who desire the perfect tree

under which to hide good things that come in small packages, Builders offers a 3-inch-tall bonsai, complete with a red bow

"I guess you could use it as a Christmas tree. You wouldn't be able to put many decorations on it," O'Toole said.

Although "you can only put like one ball on it," the potted tree has become a tradition for Randy and Mary Quattrin. "We planted a tree the first Christmas

we were married. If we're married for 60 years I guess we'll have 60 trees planted all over the place," Randy said.

For people who prefer to buy cut trees, the county's Solid Waste division offers a Christmas tree recycling program to keep the discarded decorations out of overcrowded landfills.

According to Jennifer Lemay, recycling program manager, the county recycled about 13,300 trees in the Santa Barbara

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

#### Christmas: The Early Years



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

But what of the merchants? Bruce the Mobile Merchant said, "I want everyone in Santa Barbara



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
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
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**Jet-Powered Santa?** 

We figure he'd need jet engines and a million square feet of parachute.

Every Christmas Eve, hundreds of airports across the country call hundreds of radio stations across the country to report that Santa Claus is flying, presumably in a sled, somewhere nearby. Shrouded in the dead of night, a radar blip is all we can see of St. Nick and his presumably impressive rig.

But modern engineering can go a long way tow-ard explaining just how Santa's sled actually soars with the night owls. What follows is pure conjecture by one reporter who has spent months pouring over the latest volumes in aeronautical engineering. Nothing regarding Santa's sled has been proven, but what you are about to read is the most complete effort to date at explaining this

very important part of the miracle of Christmas. It's all engineering

As any engineer will tell you, flight is no miracle at all. Not hardly. It's all engineering, as a scan of the nation's top engineering journals reveals.

When an object, such as a sled, is heavier than air as St. Nick's sled is presumed to be - flying requires lift. That lift can be generated in one of two ways: by pushing air down from the sled, or creating a vacuum above the sled. The latter method allows for more speed, and - since rounding the globe in a matter of hours requires speeds upward of 7,000 mph — Santa Claus' sled is thought to use this method.

Making a sled produce lift in this way would most feasibly be achieved by fixing one or more horizontal surfaces to the sled, which would be rounded on top and flat on the bottom. As the sled travels through the sky, the air would pass faster over the rounded

top surface than the flat bottom, and a vacuum would be created, lifting the sled.

But such surfaces — we'll call them "wings" would only stabilize the sled on one axis. To really stabilize the sled, two more surfaces would need to be fixed to it, one horizontal to serve as small "wings" and one vertical, to keep the sled from spin-ning. Such an assembly would most feasibly be placed behind the sled, so for now we'll call it a "tail."

Now, traveling 7,000 mph would require two more features: a remarkably strong power source, and a streamlined body, to cut down wind resistance.

First the power. We all know that eight reindeer pull the sled. To do this, the deer would need to be commanding a craft much like the sled itself, but equipped with jet or rocket engines that could put out upwards of 120,000 horsepower. At

Reformation, everybody was too busy running around exiling each other to pay much attention, and when nobody was looking, the English Puritans forbade Christmas. This was in the mid-17th century. After a while, it just started up again, no problem.

#### **Christmas: The Traditions**

•Perhaps the most eagerly recognized symbol of Christmas is the Christmas tree or Tannenbaum. Although historians are divided as to the origin of this tradition, most agree that you should put a tablespoon of sugar in the Christmas tree stand's water supply so that the tree doesn't dry out as fast. Out of this tradition grew the current custom of hanging mistletoe from doorjambs and ceilings so you can kiss people you shouldn't be kissing. •The yule log originated with the Germanic tribes of Northern Europe. It is just like the Christmas tree except that it's smaller, you burn it, and it's a log.

nylon, a third craft, close in design to the first two, would need to be towed behind.


