Gauchos Continue To Swing the Bats

■ Brontsema Earns His 100th Win

The UCSB baseball team's offensive surge continued this weekend, when the squad took two of three games from the University of the Pacific.

The Gauchos (23-23 overall, 13-11 in the Big West)

opened the series with a 9-8 loss Friday before rebounding to overpower the Tigers on Saturday (18-5) and Sunday (16-5).

Santa Barbara Head Coach Bob Brontsema earned his 100th victory as a Gaucho in the process.

"I have no thoughts on my 100th win," Brontsema said. "We have a long way to go in this program. Hopefully I'll be there to see it happen."

The team is certainly on the right track as of late, win-

ning its fourth straight series. This is due to the team's awesome offensive output, combined with savvy pitching.


"We've had some incredible individual offensive performances this season," Brontsema added.

Sunday the power was supplied by senior center fielder Joe Kemper and junior shortstop Michael Young. Kemper pounded out two home runs, as part of a 5-6 performance. He also drove in six RBIs for the day.
Young continued his torrid hitting by getting his sec-

ond grand slam of the season, his 12th round-tripper of the year. Young has been the heart of the Gaucho offense for the last few months.

"Mike has been very good for us for a very long stretch now," Brontsema said. "We don't expect a guy to go on a streak like this, but we do expect a lot from him. He is a good player and living up to all of the expectations."

SB Finishes Eighth in Big West; **Team Optimistic for the Future**

The UCSB women's tennis team battled its way to an eighth place finish at the Big West Championships in Ojai

to conclude its season this weekend.

The Gauchos began the tournament with an impressive 5-3 triumph over the University of North Texas, only to be dropped successively by the University of the Pacific, Boise State University

and Cal Poly San Luis Obispo.

"We played great all weekend," said
UCSB Head Coach Pete Kirkwood. "North Texas was the best obviously because we won. That was a great win. [North Texas] is a solid team. [Sunday's] match [against Cal Poly] was un-believable. We had so many chances. It was a bitter [5-4] loss."

Leading the way for UCSB Thursday was sophomore Kristina Donehew, Texas 6-1, 6-2. The Gauchos' #1 player

also joined freshman Dana Mazza to defeat NTU's Melissa Spann and Dawna

Denny 8-4 in doubles play.

Donehew continued her fine play against Cal Poly with a hard-fought 1-6, 6-4, 6-4 victory against Karen Apra. "I played really well," Donehew said.

"Today was pretty good. I fought back and won in the third. I have a lot more confidence. Playing such a tough schedule has made me improve.' Freshman Tracy Keyser had a thrill-

ing 3-6, 6-1, 7-5 victory against Denny from North Texas. Trailing 5-2 in the decisive third set, Keyser took the remain-

ing five games to win the match.
"I was so happy," Keyser said. "I just came on and didn't stop until I won. I needed to do that. I was really proud of the fact that I came back.'

Freshman Erica Frantz scored a pair of victories in the #6 singles position. She ousted Stacey Whitaker from North Texas, 7-5, 6-3. Frantz came out on top who throttled Patty Vital from North again in a 6-2, 6-3 victory against UOP's
