Name tags are to be no larger than 4" x 4". There is no limit on number of name tags. Car banlers are allowed with no limit on size or number. All regularly registered students of Santa Barbara College of the University of California carrying seven units or more shall pay the Associated Students membership fee of fifteen dollars (\$15) and may receive the benefits of active membership in this organization. This fee is compulsory and shall be collected by the University officials at the time of registration.




