

## REGISTRATION SCHEDULE FOR THURSDAY, FRIDAY

Thursday and Friday are registration days for Gaucho students when it is expected that over 1900 will enroll in classes. Late registrations should bring this number over 2000.

Students will be admitted to the gymnasium only upon presentation of (1) a counseling card approved by the faculty adviser, (2) a receipt indicating payment of fees, and (3) a slip indicating completion of physical examinations. Since some continued students are not required to take their physicals this semester, they should check with the list posted at the Student Union and in the Health Service to see what is required of them at this time. All fees are paid at the Cashier's Office, Bldg. 427, at any time.

Students will be issued registration books at or subsequent to, but not prior to, their appointment hour.

### Veterans

All veterans, except those under Public Law 550, must process their papers with the Dean of Men Wednesday, Sept. 14, 2:00-5:00 p.m., Bldg. 402, Rm. 202.

New students whose transcripts were not received in time to be processed before Sept. 12, 1955, may not obtain their registration books until such time as their admission is approved. New students complete their physical and psychological exams and also receive important instruction at meetings with the Dean of Men and Dean of women prior to registration. Faculty counsel new students as well as reprogram continuing students Wednesday, Sept. 14.

The registration section in the *Schedule of Classes* contains all the detail needed for guidance through registration week, and should be followed carefully.

## Registration Week Program Planned

The University of California's Santa Barbara College was transformed suddenly from the quietude of the summer vacation to the whirl of a tight-fitting registration schedule on Sept. 12. Before the week is out, over 2,000 students are expected to be on the campus, plus the 175 faculty members. The administrative staff has been on duty all summer preparing for the rush.

The exacting schedule of meetings, talks, assemblies, examinations, counseling sessions, orientation conferences and social events will have a "new look" this year. The registration events, if followed by the collegians as scheduled, will involve little line-forming or delay.

As planned by college officials, the week not only provides the necessary registration and signing up for classes, but incorporates many events which are of utmost importance in preparing the new student for a successful college career.

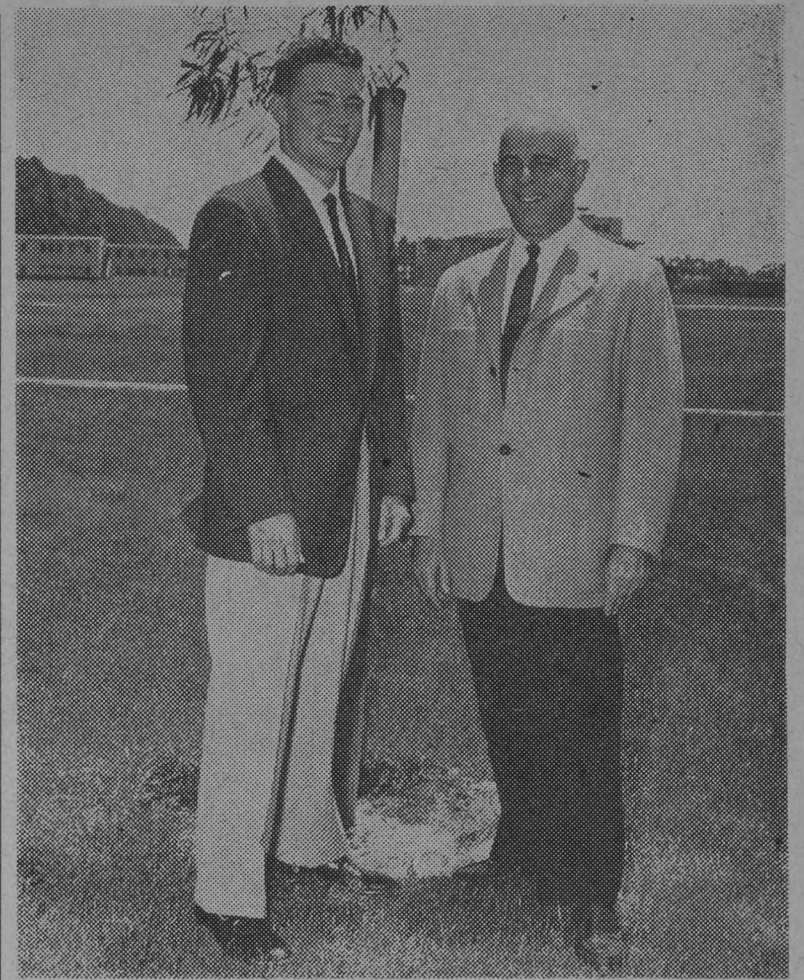
### Orientation Assembly

The newcomers, naturally, have the greatest amount of registration business to complete. On Monday all new students attended the Orientation Assembly in the College Auditorium, where they were greeted by Provost Clark G. Kuebler. Other campus administrative officials also spoke to the students; then Student Body President Jack Christofferson presided at an Associated Students assembly.

Meanwhile, student teachers were getting their registration details out of the way to begin their work in the classrooms of Santa Barbara city and county schools.

Counseling, tests, and examinations were scheduled for Monday afternoon and all day yesterday and today.

The official registration begins at 8:30 a.m. Thursday in the College Gymnasium. To alleviate the traditional block-long lines, the appointment system has been established whereby students will be admitted at or subsequent to their appointment hour, but not prior to it. Appointment periods are set up for upper division and graduate students in the morning and freshmen students in the afternoon. Friday afternoon will be

### To Help Men

Administrative Assistant Mrs. Ruth Percival is in charge of the office. Mrs. Naomi Ashcraft and Miss Sheila Cruikshank are the secretaries in that office.

**Veterans who desire GI benefits are encouraged to consult the dean of men's office as soon as possible. Vet notices are regularly published in El Gaucho.**

The personnel deans are happy to counsel any student. They urge that problems be brought to the deans as soon as they arise.

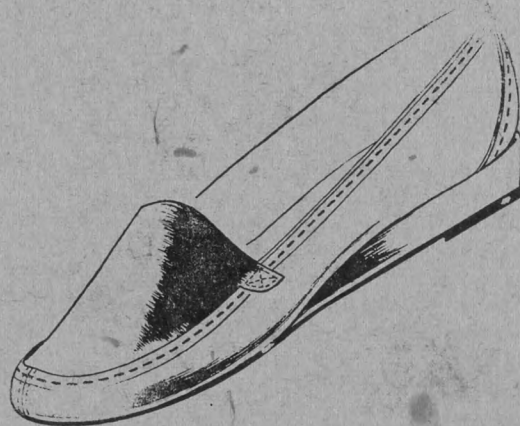

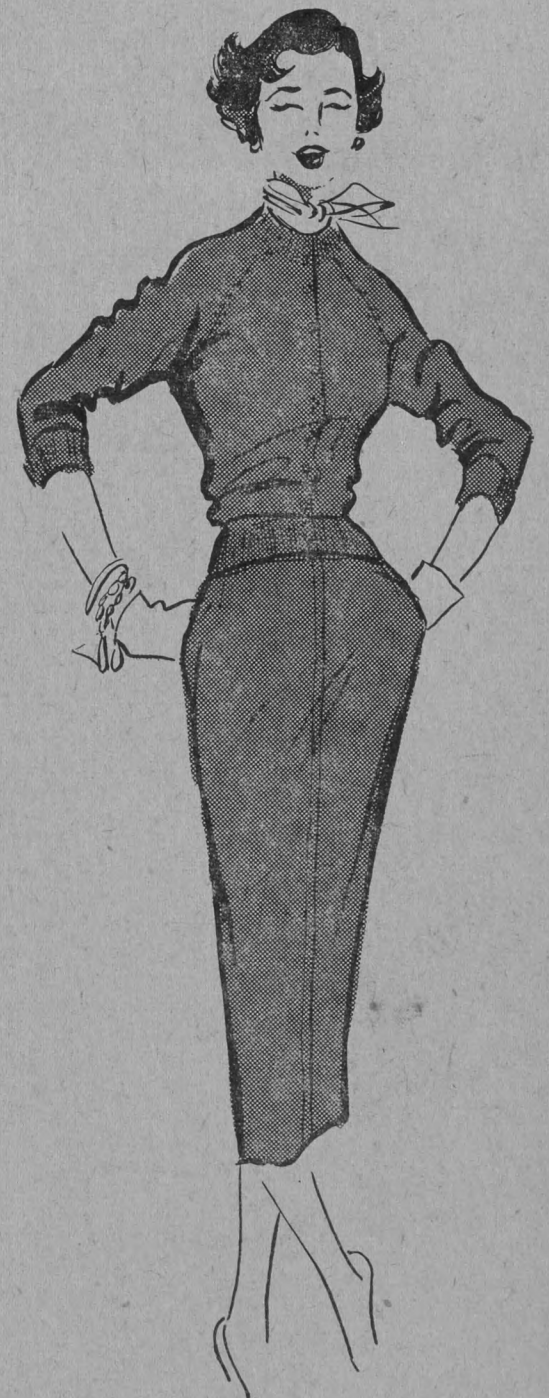

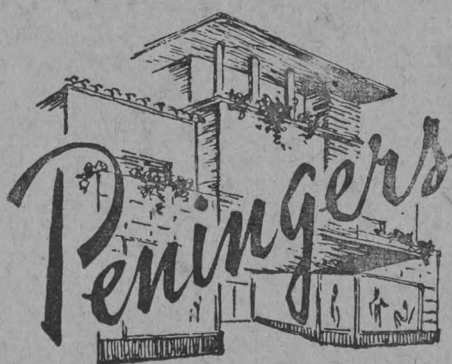

## ASSISTANT TO PROVOST APPOINTED

Lionel J. Livesey Jr., budget analyst in the office of University of California President Robert Gordon Sproul, has been appointed administrative assistant to Provost Clark G. Kuebler.

## More Scholarship Awards Announced

Additional scholarship awards were announced by the University of California, Santa Barbara College, to fill declinations from the list of awards made last June. The scholarships now granted for the 1955-56 college year will go to 90 students, with a total amount of \$33,000 to be distributed.

Of the 16 new scholarships announced, eight go to residents of the Santa Barbara area. Students so honored will each receive \$200 and up to help them begin or further their education at Santa Barbara College. This money will aid students in paying incidental fees, purchasing books, and meeting personal expenses.

The awards were based largely upon scholastic attainment, but financial need, character and promise of future success were also considered. More than half of the \$33,000 scholarship fund is provided from the bequest establishing the John and Ina Therese Campbell Scholarships, willed by Mrs. John Campbell of Santa Barbara.

## LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL GOVERNS AS

Legislative Council, the governing body of Santa Barbara College, is composed of 16 voting members and 20 non-voting committee and board chairmen.

The voting members of Council are elected, with the exception of the editor of *El Gaucho*, who is appointed by Press Control Board with the approval of Council.

Leading the students this year is President Jack Christofferson. Margaret Murdock is vice president and Pat Kennedy is secretary.

### Reps-at-Large

Six reps-at-large, three men and three women, are elected by the entire student body. Julie Jones, Bobbie Redell and Carol Fellman are the women reps-at-large. Serving the men in this capacity are Darryl Vincent, Larry Higbey and another to be elected.

Pat Scruggs, the third men's rep-at-large, is not returning to school this year. A general election must be called to fill the vacancy.

Representing the Mesa Campus of SBC is Stan Reifel. Class presidents for 1955-56 are: Senior class, Bob Carr; junior class, Bill Thomas; sophomore class, Jerry Combs, and the freshman class president who has yet to be elected.

With the exception of Activities Control Board chairman, who is a rep-at-large, and the Election Committee chairman, who is AS vice president, committee and board chairmen do not vote. However, in the event that a change in the by-laws to the Associated Students Constitution comes before council, these members do vote.

## OJAI SCENE OF 3-DAY WORKSHOP

A three-day Legislative Council Workshop at the Ojai Oaks was held from Sept. 9 to 11. Members of Council and their invited guests attended.

This was the third annual workshop in Ojai. The purpose was to orient the new council members to their new jobs. Another excellent feature of the workshop was the informal atmosphere of the gathering. The students were able to become well acquainted with the people with whom they will work this year.

Seminars, Discussions

During the meeting there were several seminars and discussion groups, all centering around student government. Students who attended the first two workshops were unanimous in their praise for these meetings.

Guest speakers at the workshop were Provost Clark G. Kuebler and Dr. Russell A. Buchanan, professor of history at Santa Barbara College.

Freshmen are required to attend all university and freshmen events up to the time of the tribunal.

"Frosh Indoctrination can be lots of fun for everyone if everyone will participate," said Jerry.

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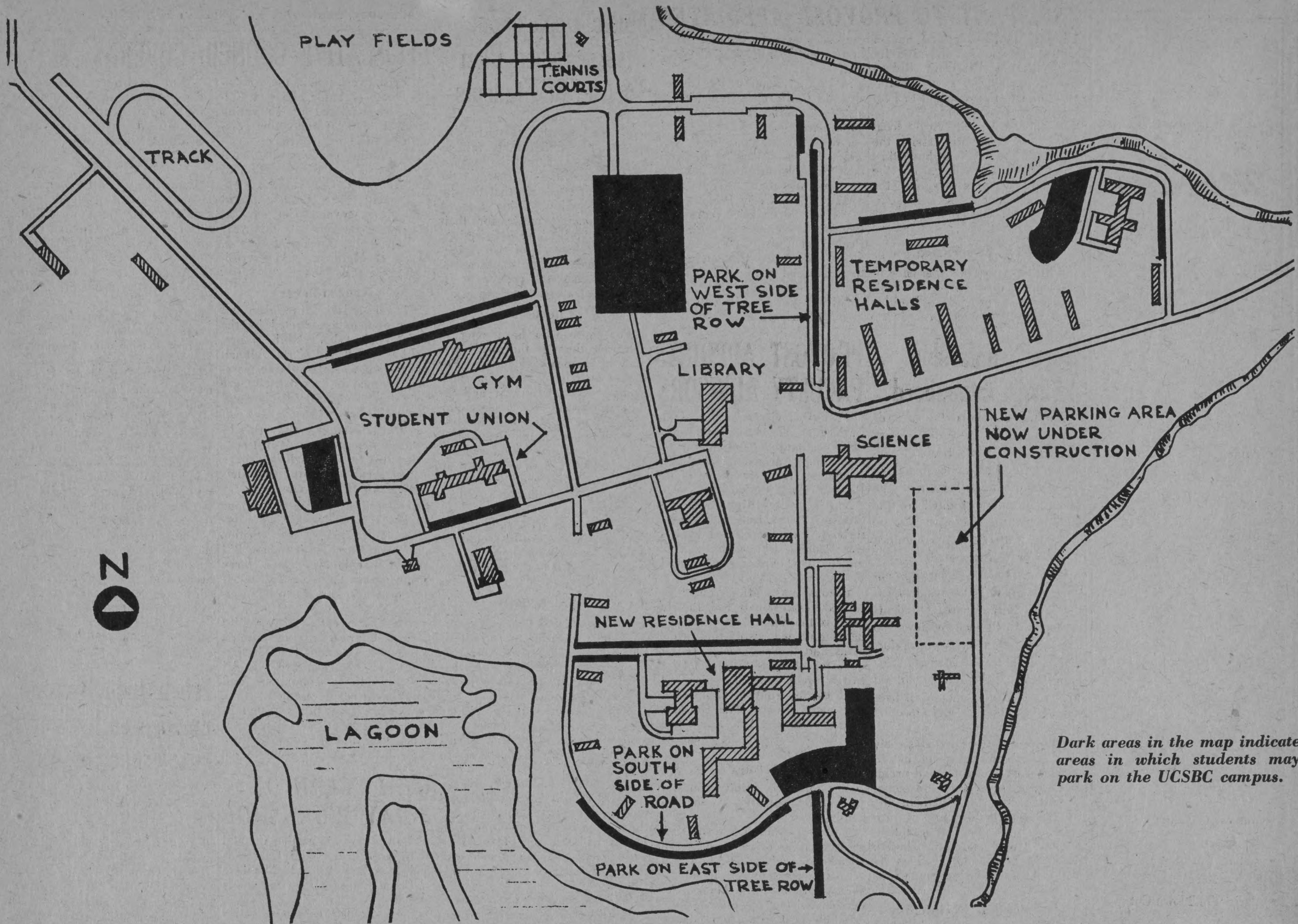
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Dark areas in the map indicate areas in which students may park on the UCSBC campus.

## TRAFFIC REGULATIONS ARE STRICTLY ENFORCED

Regulations for parking on the University of California Santa Barbara College campus are issued and enforced by the University police. The map above indicates the areas in which students may park. Below are the regulations.

### Parking Regulations

1. Operators of vehicles entering the campus of UCSBC shall observe all posted signs and park only in designated areas.
2. Parking areas on the UCSBC campus are divided into two classifications—Restricted areas and Unrestricted areas. (a) Parking in restricted areas is limited to persons who have obtained special parking permits from the University police department. (b) Parking in unrestricted areas does not require a permit, but does require registration of the vehicle by the University police department. (c) Visitors or persons on business may not park in restricted areas without first having obtained permission from the University police department.
3. All vehicles parked in a restricted area must display the appropriate permit for that area.
4. Motorcycles, scooters or bicycles shall be parked only in areas designated for such vehicles.
5. The parking of any vehicle in any of the following places is prohibited unless so directed by a police officer: (a) On a sidewalk; within an intersection; on a crosswalk; within 15 feet of a fire hydrant; in a red zone. (b) In a yellow zone, except for loading or unloading of commercial vehicles, not to exceed 20 minutes.

### Traffic Rules

Traffic regulations on the campus are those of the State of California, and regulated by common

sense. The speed limit on the campus is 25 miles per hour.

Fines collected for traffic offenses are paid to the Municipal Court in Goleta.

## Student Body Cards Give Owners Benefits

In the registration line student body cards will be given out. These cards represent a \$15 investment.

With a student body card admission to all Santa Barbara College athletic events is free. Without it, full general admission price must be paid.

### Checks, Loans

This card serves as an identification card on and off campus. It enables the holder to cash personal checks, up to \$100, at the Graduate Manager's office. Also, with this card at the Graduate Manager's office students are able to receive a short-term \$10 loan.

In Santa Barbara and Goleta the card entitles its owner to a discount on purchases at many places. Gasoline is one of the items discounted at some gas stations.

With both fall and spring semester student body cards students are entitled to a free copy of the yearbook, *La Cumbre*.

### Services Rendered

The \$15 that each card costs pays for the services given to the students. Out of this *El Gaucho* is partly published, athletic events are sponsored and Associated Students' government is run. This list is only partial, as all AS-sponsored events come from this fee.

The important matter about these cards is not to lose them.

## SBCRHA GOVERNS HALF STUDENT BODY

Student self-government has been recognized by the University of California for more than half a century. Nowhere has this been demonstrated more clearly than in the Santa Barbara College Residence Halls Association. This association is student-established.

The association came into being only last year, the first year that the college has had substantial numbers of students living on campus. The students living on campus wrote their own constitution, approved it, and were given full recognition by the college.

### Regulations, Activities

Through this form of government the students have adopted regulations and planned activities within the framework of University policy.

This year the responsibility and scope of the organization will nearly double as the 400 coeds in the new residence hall join the association. Thus the group becomes the self-governing agent of nearly half the student body.

Under the association's constitution each hall or section of the large hall has its own governmental organization. Within each of the units house committees are appointed and most of the social and other activities originate.

The president of each of these governing sections is a member of the Residence Hall Council. This Council determines over-all policy matters and represents the halls on Legislative Council.

### Dues, Functions

Under the by-laws of the association dues are paid by each resident student and are used by the individual halls for their activities. A portion of the dues is turned over to the Council for association affairs.

The Council, in addition to the presidents, includes four non-voting members who serve as publicity chairman, recreation and social activities chairman, and historian. The president, vice president and secretary are elected from the Council membership.

In addition to social events for the resident students the association sponsors campus-wide activities and participates in all-college events. Last year they were represented in the Galloping Gaucho Review, Homecoming Parade and Barbary Coast Carnival. They also took part, and first prize, in the United Nations Dance and in the Senior Torchlight Farewell.

For the resident students the association held beach parties, special events dances, square dances, provost's dinners and a spring formal.

Not only do the residence halls provide a healthful college environment in meeting physical needs but also they offer a basis for the understanding of democratic processes through participation. Finally, they offer experience in living and working with other people.

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## Newcomers to Help As Stan Prepares For Banner Grid Year

There is a definite feeling of optimism around the campus of Santa Barbara College in regards to the 1955 football season.

Head coach Stan Williamson will be starting his eighth year as head mentor for the Gauchos, and he hopes to improve considerably the 4-5 record compiled by the Blue and Gold last year.

### 17 Lettermen

This year the popular mentor will greet no less than 17 monogram winners from last season, which gives him a good nucleus

of experienced gridmen to work with.

Back to assist Williamson will be "Doc" Kelliher, a highly experienced backfield coach.

Also on hand as assistant coaches are two former Gaucho gridders, Ray Thornton and Howard "Corky" Johnson. Thornton will act as end coach, while Johnson will be in the capacity of line coach. Another assistant coach, as yet unnamed, should be around shortly to join the staff.

Williamson indicates that he plans to switch to the T-formation this fall. The single wing has been used for the past three seasons. Williamson feels that it would be to the advantage of the Gauchos to go back to the T because so many of the incoming men are familiar with that formation, and the majority of the returning veterans are also experienced in the T.

One of the brightest points for Williamson to look forward to is the host of experienced backfield men. Sut Puailoa, last season's leading ground gainer, is back to improve on his last year's record. Puailoa, who runs from a halfback spot, is one of the fastest men on the team, very shifty, and a hard man to bring down. Roy Gaebel, first-string halfback last year, has been moved to the left-half spot by Williamson who feels that the 185-pound senior's speed will be put to better advantage from this position. Three year letterman Bucky Baird really came back into his own last season when he was moved from the tailback spot to right half, and the hard running senior should be a great help to the Gauchos.

### Fullbacks

Three lettermen fullbacks are back to bolster that department. Norm Stelle, Bruce Varner, and Bob Boaz came through in fine fashion on many an occasion last season.

The lone returning quarterback is Jerry Humringhouse, but Williamson has indicated he would prefer to have Humringhouse play at halfback position where his fine running would show to better advantage.

### Linemen

There are a host of good linemen returning to give Williamson the beginnings of a fine line. Rugged, fast, shifty Bud Ashbrook comes back for another year at end. Ashbrook in addition to being the Gauchos finest receiver last year was excellent on defense. Al Southworth, a converted halfback should help out considerably on the flanks. Southworth is one of the hardest runners on the team.

At center there are two returning lettermen—Don Smith and Al Kauti. Bill Ryan at guard, and Will Stensland, Russ Young, and Tom Cox at tackles give Williamson another nucleus of middle linemen to work with. Stensland improved rapidly throughout the season last year, and developed into one of Williamson's most dependable linemen.

### Host of Newcomers

To augment this fine nucleus of returnees, Stan has greeted a whole host of good looking newcomers to the squad, among whom the most anxiously watched are a trio of brand new quarterbacks. The three signal-calling prospects are Don Trauthen, ex-Nebraska high school star; John Coutts, who was the quarterback at Pasadena High two years ago and who did not play football with the Gauchos as a freshman last year, and Pat Mills, who was impressive last year at Bakersfield Junior College.

Williamson was impressed early with the work of the three men, stating that they all possessed the qualities of ruggedness, strength and lots of poise.

Mills has been sidelined recently

## THORNTON, JOHNSON TO AID GRID MENTORS

Helping to take some of the Gaucho football coaching load off the shoulders of Stan Williamson and Doc Keliher this year will be two welcome additions to the staff, Corky Johnson, and Ray Thornton.

Johnson, former ace Gaucho tackle, came to SBC in 1950. After playing his freshman year at UCLA and two seasons at Compton College. The Giant tackle not only made the CCAA first team on both offense and defense, a rarity in the days of two-plateau, but was named to the Little All Coast first team. Injuries hampered the star player throughout the 1951 season, but Johnson still managed to play outstanding football.

### Joins Browns

After spending three years in the Army, which included a 16-month stint in Korea, Johnson was discharged and joined the world champion Cleveland Browns professional football team a couple of months ago. A leg injury forced his withdrawal from the team, and he returned to Santa Barbara to accept the job of coaching the Gaucho linemen. Johnson admits that his three year absence from

football also hurt his chances with the Browns. He will complete work toward a teaching credential while at Santa Barbara College.

Thornton is also a former Gaucho griddier and UCSBC graduate who has been appointed to the position of Acting Instructor in Physical Education. Thornton was a 1952 transfer from Compton College who played end on offense and defense, and was also an outstanding member of Lyle Reynolds' Gaucho tennis team.

Having completed work on his Master's Degree in Education at Long Beach State College, Thornton has also had a year's junior high school teaching experience. He plans to begin work on his Doctorate at UCLA in the future.

With Thornton coaching the ends and Johnson the rest of the linemen, Stan Williamson has some much needed help which should be a factor in the Gauchos' success this year. "I am sure the boys will do an outstanding job for us," said Stan, "They know football and want to work hard to give the college and the city a good team."

with a strep throat, but should be back in action before long.

Meanwhile in scrimmages held last Saturday, Trauthen and Coutts showed to advantage. Trauthen completed five out of eight passes while piloting the tentative first team. As opposing quarterback, Coutts hit on four of seven passes, even though rushed by a tougher line.

In a rough and tumble fight for other starting berths in the Gaucho backfield, Puailoa is the only runner who is even close to clinching a regular spot, this at right half. At that, Sut is being pressed hard by the flashy running of Ex-Marine, Jack Garrett of Firebaugh, who utilizes his 170 pounds expertly in running with tank-like power. Garrett was a letterman for coach Roy Engle back in 1951, and the 24-year-old vet will be pushed in turn for his position by Walt Napier and Sam Almehal.

Another ex-serviceman, Phil Johnson, former Air Force man who played at East Los Angeles Junior College, has been battling out a starting left half position with Gaucho vets Bucky Baird and Jerry Humringhouse.

Fullback spot is another free-for-all with Bob Jones, Bruce Varner and Norm Stelle from last year's team contending for it along with newcomers Dick Juliana, from Chaffey Junior College, and Jerry Sconce. Juliana is a 20-year-old 185-pounder who was All-Conference fullback last year at Chaffey.

The hefty Gaucho forward wall which averaged over 200 pounds last season was bolstered by a few more sharp looking big boys. Dick O'Day, a tackle from Stockton J. C. tips the scale at 285 pounds and is the squads heaviest man. Vets Tom Cox and Russ Young are being pressed for a right tackle position by Leonard McCabe, from Hawaii via Pasadena City College, who weighs in at 235. Also in the battle is Will Stensland, 1954 Gaucho tackle.

At right guard, Chuck Williams, Alva Ray Jones and Bob Cosserek are competing for dominance, and at the left side, Bernie Pullman, Jim Silvia and Rod Reihl will fight it out.

Leading the parade for the end positions are left end Bud Ashbrook, last year's leading pass catcher and Dick Orr from Compton Junior College. Orr, who stands 6-3 and weighs 210, is also a fine kicker and could be the team's top man in the punting department this year. Two other men out for end are Al Southworth, shifty ex-halfback and Ed Bowen, Gaucho baseballer who has been looking very good.

All in all the Gaucho pigskin picture looks very bright, and it would be very nice to believe the story in Street and Smith's 1955 Football Yearbook, which says that the Gauchos are loaded and are favored to win every game this season, including the game with Cal Poly at San Luis Obispo.

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## Track Coach Carter Back, Finds Prospects Look Good

The 1955 Santa Barbara College track team was the finest at the school since the 1951 undefeated squad and with most of the squad returning, prospects are even brighter for the next year.

Only three of the 15 returning lettermen from last year's squad graduated, leaving Gaucho coach Nick Carter, back from a year of sabbatical leave, a fine nucleus with which to work.

Giving an even brighter hue to the future is the fact that most of last year's squad was composed of freshmen and sophomores, which should insure strong squads for at least the next two years.

Leading the cindermen into action next spring will be the terrific one-two running punch of sprinter Ed Scott and distance runner Gordon McClenathen. Scott became the first double winner in a CCAA meet in the history of the school as he captured both the 100 and 220 yard dashes last spring. McClenathen rewrote part of the Gaucho record book as he set records of 4:20.4 in the mile and 9:44 in the two-mile.

The Gauchos should be strong

in virtually all the running events with special emphasis on the 100 and 220 yard dashes where they will have Scott, John Morris, and Earle Carter all lettermen, returning. The latter two were freshmen last year and have three years of varsity eligibility left.

Other returning lettermen will be Ed Austin and Dave Kay in the high jump; pole vaulters Roscoe Morris and Jack O'Cain; 440 yard sprinter Larry Smith; shot putter John Coutts; and discus thrower John Anderson. The crack mile-relay team of Scott Smith, Louis Kummerow, and John Morris will return intact.

Just as was the case last year, the hurdles at present shape up as the weakest event for the Blue and Gold thinclads. Bob Jones, who came out last spring, is the only Gaucho hope in the low hurdles and unless they come up with some junior college help, there will be no one running the high hurdles.

The javelin, one of the strongest events for the Gauchos last year, will be weak as both Ashby and Carlson, one-two in this event, graduated.

## All-L.A. City Guard New Addition To Gaucho Squad

The Santa Barbara College football team acquired a valuable addition to its forward wall hopefuls when Chuck Williams, outstanding guard from Valley Junior College decided to enroll at UCSBC this fall.

Williams, a 5-9, 205 pounder, was a first string guard on the Valley team last year, and is considered a fine prospect. Williams lettered for three years at San Fernando High School, and in his senior year in 1953 was chosen on both the All-Valley first team and the Los Angeles All-City first team. He capped off this tremendous year by being chosen to play in the Brietbard Athletic Foundation All Star game in San Diego.

Williams, who was born in Springfield, Mo., has had all of his football experience in the "T" formation which the Gauchos will use this fall, and will have three years of eligibility remaining.

"I am very happy to be going to Santa Barbara College," Williams stated, "and I hope that I will be able to help out the team. I was very impressed with the campus, and I know that I will enjoy attending such a fine institution."

Gaucho head coach Stan Williamson was naturally very pleased with Williams' decision to come to Santa Barbara College. "He should fit right into our system," he said, "and we are hoping for great things from the boy. He is very strong, and moves very quickly for a player his size. Williams will be a valuable addition to our squad."

Not only was Williams an outstanding athlete at San Fernando High School, but he was also one of the most popular students on the campus. His popularity is shown by the fact that his schoolmates elected him student body president for his senior year.

## UCSBC Returns To CCAA Fold

Santa Barbara College is back in the ranks of the California Collegiate Athletic Association this year despite two adverse student votes in the last two years, and a formal letter of withdrawal last winter.

Gaucho representatives voted to rescind the school's withdrawal action at the spring meeting held in June here.

One student vote indicated the Gauchos should enter the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, but the Gauchos never received a formal invitation to enter the SCIAAC.

## Provost Nationally Known as Educator

From coast to coast, Provost Clark G. Kuebler has added to the fame of Santa Barbara College through his oratory and his participation in nationally important educational meetings and conventions.

The much-traveled college administrator also added much to the community's interest in the college by frequent appearances before civic organizations and service clubs in the Santa Barbara and Goleta area.

## MacArthur Dinner

Dr. Kuebler's most publicized outside public appearance during the past year was his speech honoring Gen. Douglas MacArthur, given in January at the 60th annual convention luncheon of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles. Another important invitation accepted by Dr. Kuebler took him to Cincinnati to address the Sigma Chi Centennial.

The provost's speaking engagements mounted in the graduation month of June when, in addition

to Santa Barbara College graduates, students receiving degrees from Ventura and Bakersfield Junior Colleges and from the Webb, Bishop and Katherine Branson preparatory schools heard his challenge to "determine today that you are going to keep on learning. You cannot be free unless you are free intellectually and spiritually."

## Orator, Linguist

Among the many public appearances of the new provost in Santa Barbara were the occasions of his speeches before the Channel City Club, at the annual YMCA dinner and at the recent Ahepa banquet of Santa Barbara's Greek community. As a classicist, Dr. Kuebler was able to address the latter gathering in both ancient and modern Greek.

Last May Dr. Kuebler combined a visit to several important universities in the East with attendance of a meeting of the national committee of the Ford Foundation for the Advancement of Education, of which he is a member.
