REGISTRATION SCHEDULE FOR THURSDAY, FRIDAY

Thursday and Friday are registration days for Gaucho students when it is expected that over 1900 will enroll in classes. Late regis-

trations should bring this number over 2000.

Students will be admitted to the gymnasium only upon presentation of (1) a counseling card approved by the faculty adviser, (2) a receipt indicating payment of fees, and (3) a slip indicating completion of physical examinations. Since some continued students are not required to take their physicals this semester, they should check with the list posted at the Student Union and in the Health Service to see what is required of them at this time. All fees are paid at the Cashier's Office, Bldg. 427, at any time.

Students will be issued registration books at or subsequent to, but not prior to, their appointment hour.


