Students To Vote On Constitutional Change

The following proposed changes in the athletic constitution for men which originated in the council and were read before the Student Body at its last meeting will be voted upon at the next meeting:

Article IV of the athletic constitution for men be changed to read:

I. That the managers and captains of sports in season shall be elected for the following season, at the close of each sport season.

II. That the athletic council shall consist, throughout the school year of the following members: Athletic Manager, managers of sports, captains of sports, president of Block "S" Society, physical education director.

III. That the words "prior to the official contest" be stricken out of Article V, Section 2 and Article V, Section 3.

While he was ripping a small piece of wood, the middle and left fingers of his left hand with which he was guiding the wood were caught in the saw and were badly mutilated although no bones were broken. Glee Club Wins Fourth In Eisteddford Contest

The Men's Glee Club under the direction of Mrs. Barnett placed fourth in the glee club concert at Bovard Auditorium at U. S. C. last Friday evening. Pomona College won the contest with a score of 95 per cent, Redlands was second with 88 per cent, Bible Institute was third with 85 per cent, and Santa Barbara was fourth with 82 per cent. Pomona College was unanimously awarded first prize of a cup and a medallion because their singing was practically unsurpassable. There was quite a difference of opinion between the other three contestants; hence the close rating.

Pomona College and Bible Institute had the largest clubs of the contest, 40 men in each. Santa Barbara was smallest with 21 members. Four women's glee clubs competed in the contest as well as the four men's clubs. The U. S. C. Women's Glee Club won the women's competition with a score of 85 per cent.

The glee club rendered "The Lost Chord" accompanied, "Keep A Goin'" unaccompanied, and "Jolly Fellows" as an extra number. To close the entertainment, Mrs. Barnett directed the entire assembly in singing "The Star Spangled Banner."
