Meetings of the Santa Barbara State college alumni are occurring throughout the State of California at the opening of the school year. Santa Barbara's alumni met at a luncheon held recently in the Red Room of El Paseo, with Esther Jannssens Porter, local alumni president, in charge of the meeting. President Clarence L. Phelps gave a short talk, while Jean Krueger, head of the home economic department, spoke on the "Latest Development in Nutrition."

President Clarence Phelps and Mrs. Jane Miller Abraham, president and registrar, respectively, motored to San Diego last Sunday to attend a statewide meeting of superintendents and appointment secretaries. Mrs. Abraham, head of the Santa Barbara alumni association, will attempt to organize a San Diego alumni association.

The Bay section alumni will give a dinner on November 2, at the Berkeley Women's City club, 2315 Durant avenue, at 6:30 p.m. The San Francisco section will hold their annual banquet at the same time as the Santa Barbara-San Francisco State football game, to be played between the two colleges.

The San Joaquin alumni section will hold a get-together sometime in the near future.

The band, dressed in uniform, marched from Santa Barbara Hotel to the post office. The purpose of the parade was to encourage people to vote "yes" on bond issue number five.

In a recent assembly Don Follett, brought up the motion that the student body pay for stickers "Vote yes on proposition number five," and also said stickers were to be distributed by the freshmen class. It was favorably passed upon by a large majority of the student body. The state college will receive the direct benefit of the proposition—namely the lighting of a new athletic field at Laguna Park. Frank Ellings, Harry Sloan, Jimmy Jordano, Gene Chamberlain, and Al Lathim distributed the stickers around the campus.

## New Course Is Planned for I. E. Department

**Certification of Councillors Will Be Possible Under Expected Program**

**E. ERICSON HEADS MOVE**

**Field of Student Personnel Work Offers Two Types of Credentials**

Introduction of a new course in the college may be slated, according to reports brought back by E. E. Ericson of the State college faculty from a meeting of the Committee on Guidance in Los Angeles last Saturday. This course will lead toward certification for student councillors in California elementary and secondary schools.

As now recommended to the State Board for its adoption, there are two different credentials within the field of student personnel work, a general counselling credential and a vocational counselling credential. Each credential will be granted for 12 additional semester hours of work after the applicant already has a valid teaching credential. In each case a credential of two years of teaching experience will be a prerequisite. In order to obtain the vocational guidance credential the applicant must have two years of experience outside of teaching.

**Becchio Eliminates Difficulties Before Last Minute**

"Plans for the detailed work, which is necessary for making the Homecoming bonfire a success have been completed, and the enthusiasm and cooperation expressed at the freshmen rally committee meeting leave no doubt in my mind that this year's bonfire will be the biggest and most successful in the history of the college," states Francis Becchio, bonfire rally chairman.

"The committee members have been assigned to their tasks and all are agreed that the work should start without delay so as not to run into difficulties that usually arise by waiting until the last minute," continued Becchio.

Dan De Reign, rally committee chairman for the freshmen class, who is taking care of all negotiations between the frosh and the school rally committee, reports, "So for the freshmen class has been working exceptionally well together with the rally committee, and outside of working on the bonfire, the freshmen are doing their utmost to make the entire Homecoming Week something for State to look forward to."

Danny D'Alphonso, frosh president, adds, "We of the frosh class are lending our wholehearted support in making a success of Homecoming, and we will give necessary assistance to the committee in staging a huge bonfire rally."

The main feature of these programs, is the outside cover in several colors which portrays a different football action picture each week. These programs are an improvement over last year's and can be ranked with those of larger schools.

The programs are put out in the school print shop under the direction of Ralph Porter, who is assisted by Granzo Meisenbach and Francis Becchio.

Advertisements for the program are composed of 8 pages. Page 3 is made up of football comments by Francis Becchio, Pages 4 to 7 carry the lineups, and officials. The remaining pages contain advertising.

The proceeds from the programs will go to the Athletic Fund.

## Courses Added to Curriculum

Featured in the new fall curriculum of the University of California Extension Division at Los Angeles are courses for nurses, social workers, doctors' and dentists' assistants, and certain courses of interest to laboratory technicians, according to announcement made by Miss Margaret Wotton, executive secretary in charge of the State University's extension division classes in Southern California.

Some of the courses offered are: bacteriology, hematology, bio-chemistry, serology, parasitology, blood cytology, x-ray, elementary public health, and a curriculum for graduate nurses.

At each institute meeting there is to be a definite study of some phase of child development and the child's contact with subject matter. At the end of the year institute leaders will hold a panel discussion of possible procedures in our educational future. Quoting from Saturday's institute Mrs. Price says, "Now we are to reeducate society instead of using education as a means to learn about the past."

## Allred Secures New Machine for Book Work

**Large Council Appropriation From Student Body Fund Used for Purchase**

**NEW SYSTEM IS USED**

**Financial Records of Clubs, Organizations Will Be Kept on File**

Financed by an emergency appropriation of \$350.00 from the surplus fund of the Associated students recently made by the student body council, Fred Allred, controller, has purchased a new Burrough's portable bookkeeping machine with which he is instituting a new system of bookkeeping for the student body.

The machine is particularly valuable for writing statements. It posts ledgers, keeps accounts, draws balances, checks invoices and figures inventory. The machine also handles adding, subtracting, and multiplying.

**Records Available**  
"Financial records of clubs and other campus organizations are kept daily in the financial office, and any person desiring information as to the present status of these, may get it at any time," said Lyman Goldsmith, chairman of the finance committee and member of the council.

The time saving machine makes it possible for the bookkeeping to be done more quickly, easily and clearly. It eliminates the majority of handwriting and types automatically, according to Fred Allred.

Though nothing has definitely been settled concerning the actual acquiring of a fountain, both President Clarence Phelps and Garlyn Basham, president of the Associated Students, think that the possibilities are good. Things concerning the whole affair have come to a stand-still for this week as the college president is away to a meeting of college and university executives at the present time.

The possibilities that can be accomplished with the "Gaucho Club" are innumerable. For instance, it is at the president's suggestion that the room has been offered as a meeting place for committees—now, wouldn't it be nice to discuss student affairs over a hot cup of tea or while you munch on a sandwich.

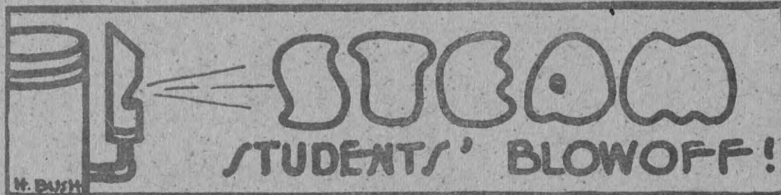
As a reminder to the students to avoid stepping on the new plants, wires have been extended around the quad, and everyone is requested to refrain from "short-cutting" across the lawn.

Coach E. M. Johnson's eleven met the Cumming's men on even terms during the first half. Neither line could be penetrated for any sizeable gains. A brilliant punting duel between the two squads featured the play in this half. Gardenhire outdid his Wildcat opponent by a slight margin.

Again one of Coach Cummings pep talks sank in and the Gauchitos came out for the third quarter with the necessary spark. Following a sustained power drive down the field, Monson, State quarterback, caught the Wildcats off their feet and as the Taft men came in close on the 20 yard line in an effort to stop the frosh running plays, Monson signaled for a pass which he received from Gardenhire for the score.

The Yearlings failed to convert. The remainder of the battle was waged on fairly even terms. The last two minutes saw the Johnson squad open up with a passing attack that brought the pigskin down to the Gauchito 10 yard stripe as the game ended.

Dick Snyder, Taft halfback, turned in an outstanding game for the valley eleven. For the frosh, every man on the squad figured prominently in taming the Wildcats.

Romero, State first string tackle, was taken from the game because of an injury to his shoulder, which had also been hurt earlier in the season. The star tackle is expected to see action in the Cal-Poly game this Saturday afternoon if the shoulder responds to treatment this week.

## Late Season Tilt Planned for Babes

The Los Amigos coach received the 1930 award given to the outstanding all-around athlete at Santa Barbara high school.

## Detroit Tigers Capture Series

In one of the most hectic games in series history the Detroit Tigers were declared baseball champions for 1935 by virtue of their 4-3 victory over the Chicago Cubs on Navin field, Detroit, yesterday afternoon.

The mighty bat of "Goose" Goslin spelled disaster for the Cubs when he singled in the last half of the ninth scoring Manager Mickey Cochrane. The Grimm men got off to a nice start in the ninth when Stanley Hack, former Sacramento bank clerk, tripled, Tommy Bridges, "the skinny curve-ball pitcher from Kentucky" then entered the Cub's lair and subdued them by striking out two men in a row and forcing the third man to pop up.

The victory brought the first world's championship to Detroit after five attempts. In handing out the palms it would be hard to overlook such outstanding horse-hiders as the "four G-men" Gehringer, Goslin, Greenberg and Gordan Cochrane of the champs, and of course Bridges.

## Yardage High in Aztec Fray

The individual yardage rolled up in the Aztec fray by the Gauchos was fairly high considering the tough game played by both squads.

The tabulation of the individual averages includes gains made from running plays, passes, intercepted passes and return of kicks. Only those who carried the ball 2 or more times are listed.

Morelli in 12 tries gained 92 yards for an average of 8 yards per play. Sanderson rolled up 49 yards in 11 plays for a 4-1-2 yard average. In 10 attempts, Yeager made 85 yards to average 8-1-2 yards.

Pollock increased his average over last week with a total of 64 yards gained in 9 plays for an average of 7 per play. Clemons in 5 plays chalked up 17 yards for a 3 yard average. Robinson in 2 tries made 6 yards to average 3.

# Gauchos Held to 7-7 Tie in Tilt with San Diego

"Sandy" Sanderson Intercepts Aztec's Pass and Gallops Over for a Touchdown and Then Converts for the Extra Point; the Half-Time Score Stands 7-0

Upsetting just about every dope sheet in Southern California, the Santa Barbara State Gauchos were held to a 7 to 7 tie by the San Diego Aztecs last Saturday afternoon on the southerners' field.

The game proved to be one of the most colorful frays seen in the Southern Conference in many a year. It had everything from pugilistic encounters to attempted place kicks.

### Try Place Kick

The first quarter went by with neither team doing much damage. The Aztecs tried a place kick from the Gauchito 20 yard line, but to no avail. Valverde did most of the ball toting for the Aztecs in this quarter, with Morelli and Yeager carrying for the Hardermen.

On the first play of the second period, Dave Pollock, Gauchito quarterback broke through the center of the Aztec line for 18 yards. A few plays later, the Diegoans blocked a Gauchito kick, and recovered the ball on the Hardermen 8 yard line. Two cracks into the Gauchito line, an incompleting pass, and a failure at an attempt of a place kick, gave the Barbarenos the ball on their own 20 yard line.

### Sanderson Scores

After a couple of exchanges of punts the ball ended up on the Aztecs 8 yard line. Valverde, speedy Diegoan triple threat man, blindly threw a pass straight into Sanderson's hands who galloped unmolested across the line on to pay dirt. Sanderson also kicked goal for the extra point. The score stood 7-0 at the end of the first half.

### Aztecs Score

Coach Calland, of the Aztecs, must have given some effective fight talk at the half, because in the third quarter the Diegoans drove from their own 45 yard line to a touchdown. Hideo Higashi,

diminutive Japanese halfback, skirted his own left end for the score. Lee's try for the extra point was good, tying up the score.

An intercepted Gauchito pass on the Hardermen's 47 yard line, plus a few large gains by Lee, Aztec fullback, resulted in another try for a place kick by the southerners, which failed.

### Gauchos Threaten

The Hardermen threatened the Aztec goal line late in the last period, when the Diegoans were called for clipping while a punt was in the air, which automatically gave the Gauchos the possession of the ball on the Aztec 12 yard line. Failing at three attempts into the line, the Barbarenos tried a place kick from the 5 yard marker. The kick was blocked.

Those fellows who were outstanding for Santa Barbara were: Morelli, Yeager, Mulock, Oldershaw and Pollock. For the Aztecs, Metzger and Butler stood out.
