## Play Review . . .

### 'All My Sons'

Some three hundred people have seen "All My Sons" by now, and after next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, that number will have been doubled. The opinions of many of these people on the subject of the production could probably be boiled down to the three words, "It was good."

It is good. The play, the casting, and the direction are good. The acting is more than good. It is hard to single out any particular member of the cast for special praise. Perhaps it would be easiest to sum it up by saying that the leads, played by Ken Kellogg as Joe Kellar, Beverly Benedict as his wife Kate, Fred Goerner as Chris Kellar, and Claire Maher as Ann Deever, were extremely well done. The parts portrayed are ones involving intense and almost constant emotion.

### Students Allowed Reduced Rate Ducats To Trepel Concert

Students will be offered the opportunity of hearing Freda Trepel, the young, accomplished Canadian pianist, Thursday night, April 5, at the Lobe Theatre, when students may obtain \$2.40 seats for only 50 cents, the luxury tax on the ticket price.

Miss Trepel has already achieved an international reputation. Following her Chicago debut and Town Hall recital in New York, she became known as a brilliant young pianist for her performances everywhere as recitalist or soloist with orchestras such as those of Minneapolis and Toronto.

#### Extensive

Returning from an extensive European tour, Miss Trepel prepared for the present one which is taking her throughout the United States and Canada.

At 16, Freda obtained an Oliver Dickson scholarship and studied at the Chicago Musical College with the famous Rudolph Ganz, to whom she still looks for guidance.

#### "Magnificent"

Said Dmitri Mitropoulos after asking her to play with him and the Minneapolis Symphony orchestra, "She is a magnificent artist." In the spring of 1950 the attractive, energetic and disciplined young woman toured Europe. Like American artists touring the continent, she realized the importance of being heard in Europe where so much good music is played and enjoyed.

Freda Trepel, sponsored by the American-Canadian Concerts and Artists, has had very favorable reviews. The *New York Times* reported "She had emotion of an intense, dramatic sort. She had the technique to get over all the notes." The *Boston Post* said, "Freda Trepel has the goods — there is something almost orchestral both in depth of tone and its variety . . ."

George Deever and John Robey as Frank Luby were especially good. The rest, Mary Jane Mistretta as Lydia Luby, Nancy Chmilkowski as Sue Bayliss, and Dick Weston as Dr. Jim Bayliss were good enough not to detract from the performance, but they seemed to lack conviction.

The play itself is extremely interesting. It deals with the tragic results of a father's distorted idea of the importance of money and his efforts to rationalize the sabotage he could have prevented by using his duty to his family as an excuse. Under the impact of the realization of what he has done, he commits suicide.

#### Intense Emotion

So well are the intensely emotional second and third acts handled, that when four of the principals are together on the stage, all sobbing or speaking in voices choked with tears, the situation does not seem ludicrous, but very real.

Not to be overlooked is the factor of central staging. The audience is seated on three sides of the stage, facing out into the auditorium which is hidden from view by the backdrop. The action takes place in the cleared space before them. There is no curtain and the stage is blacked out at the beginning and close of each act, during which time the members of the cast place themselves on stage or exit as the case may be. This infrequently seen manner of staging is in itself a sufficient drawing card to the production.

All in all, congratulations to everyone. Lucky are the six hundred who see "All My Sons."

### New AWS Prexy Attends Intercollegiate Confab At Purdue University

Margaret Mueller, newly elected AWS president, left last Wednesday night by plane from Los Angeles to attend the biennial convention of Intercollegiate Association of Women Students at Purdue University. The convention was from March 29 to April 1.

Two hundred delegates representing 70 colleges will attend the convention. The purpose of the confab is to discuss and exchange common problems and ideas and the relationships between the AWS and students.

Maggie will attend two workshops on "Women in the Present Emergency" and "Activities Outside the Classroom."

Every year eastern and western regions meet simultaneously and then get together for the national convention every other year. Next year the national convention will be at UC at Berkeley.

The Presidents' Council of the Inter-Fraternity Council voted at a meeting last Wednesday night to shorten Sigma Alpha Epsilon's period of social probation from one semester to about two and a half months, according to Desmond Kincaid, IFC secretary.

After a lengthy discussion, the Council voted that the penalty of social probation being meted out to SAE for violation of the rush contract would continue in effect until May 15, at which time it would be lifted automatically.

However, as the SAE formal scheduled for May 5 would be

eliminated by both the previous and present rulings of the Council, and since there were no other free dates on the school calendar, the ruling was amended to read that on May 5 the restriction would be lifted to permit SAE to have their formal as scheduled.

This action by the Council to shorten the period of social probation, imposed on SAE as punishment for violation of the IFC rush contract by holding a rush party after the bids were turned in, was taken after the fraternity was given the right by IFC to appeal its case to the Presidents' Council.

SAE was found guilty of the violation by the IFC Judicial Committee in February, and the punishment imposed upon them by the Presidents' Council on March 6 was social probation for the present semester, except for participation in all-college activities.

This most recent decision was based on information given in a letter from San Diego State IFC, which was read at the meeting. This letter carried some weight, as parts of the local rush contract were directly adapted from the San Diego State rush contract.

In the inauguration of any new

system there are bound to be misunderstandings and mistakes made thru negligence and failure to communicate to everybody, said the letter. In comparable cases which the letter cited as examples the penalties imposed on erring groups appeared to be lighter than the one recently imposed by the UCSBC Council.

On the basis of information contained in that letter the Council decided that perhaps it had been too strict with the new system, so it then voted to shorten the period of social probation.

### Election Sign-Up Deadline Extended Until 4 PM Today

Because of the inadequate number of students who have expressed a desire to run for student offices, the sign-up deadline has been extended to 4 pm today, Tuesday, April 3. This will be the absolute deadline, announced Elaine Strobel, chairman of the Elections Committee.

At 5 pm today, all those running for offices will be required to take a constitution test. It will be held in Ridge Hall 101. Petitions will be issued at this time. They must be signed and turned into the Graduate Manager's Office by 4 pm April 6.

Elections will take place April 17 and 18, with run-off elections on April 20. All student body offices, including AS president, vice-president, secretary, three men and three women representatives-at-large. Other positions open are those of head yell leader and Mesa representative, as well as class officers for the Seniors, Juniors and Sophomores.

Publicity will be the responsibility of the candidates and they will be required to follow the rules set down as approved by the Publicity Committee. Major office candidates may have three posters, one banner and two pictures for the display case.

Minor office candidates will be allowed two posters and two pictures only. All those running can distribute lapel cards and use auto banners, but no other off campus advertising. All publicity is to be turned in to the Student Body Office by April 6.

A campaign assembly will introduce the candidates to the student body on April 16. There will be no stunt day.

### SUPERSTITION IS THEME OF ANNUAL DANCE CONCERT ON APRIL 13-14

The thirteenth annual Dance Concert, which is to be given on Friday and Saturday, April 13 and 14, is to be centered about superstition. This is in keeping with the date, Friday the 13th.

One of the featured dances is based on an actual Aztec ritual. This ritual is about the sacrifice of a maiden to the god, Tezcatlipoca. A captive maiden, selected for her bravery, physical perfection and musical accomplishments, was chosen a year in advance to impersonate Tezcatlipoca.

#### PROVOST'S LECTURE TOMORROW AT FOUR

Dr. Edgar Johnson Goodspeed, considered one of the nation's greatest scholars of the Bible, will give a lecture, free to the public, in the Riviera Auditorium at 4 pm Wednesday.

With the rank of professor emeritus at the University of Chicago, Dr. Goodspeed is the author of many works in the field of religion, including the recent volume, *A Life of Jesus*, which has been accorded wide ecclesiastic and literary acclaim.

The lecture, one in the All-College series sponsored by University of California Extension and the Committee on Drama, Lectures and Music, has been designated as the Provost's Lecture.

Dr. Goodspeed is the son of the Rev. Thomas Wakefield Goodspeed, one of the small group who founded the University of Chicago in the 1890's. After taking graduate study at Yale, he specialized in New Testament Greek at the University of Chicago Divinity School, studied abroad and then became head of the University of Chicago's New Testament Department in 1923. He retired in 1937.

*The New Testament, an American Translation*, was published in 1923 and is Dr. Goodspeed's most widely known book. He now resides near UCLA and serves as visiting lecturer at Summer sessions.

wreathed with flowers she lived in regal splendor at the temple of the god, with four priests and four warrior attendants. Enjoying the freedom of the city, she wandered as she wished, while people everywhere prostrated themselves before her, showered her with flowers and offered incense and sacrifices. Even the king bowed before this incarnation of the god.

For 20 days her handmaidens ministered to her every desire, the great lords vied in giving feasts and dances in her honor, and every joy of life was placed at her disposal. On the morning of the twentieth day, she boarded a canoe, bade farewell to friends and was rowed across Lake Tezcucoco. Accompanied only by her attendants, she followed a desert trail to a small ruined temple.

#### Ascendance

Stripped of her costly raiment and jewels and clad only in a necklace of flutes, she slowly ascended the pyramid breaking a flute at each step. Exactly at midnight, as her successor was being chosen and acclaimed in Tenochtitlan, her heart was wrenched out and offered to Tezcatlipoca.

The costumes, based on authentic Aztec clothing, have been designed by Roger de Cloutier. The young maidens are to be clad in white chemises trimmed with green. The priest is dressed in the traditional loincloth and black cape, while the sacrificial victim will wear the traditionally decorated loincloth.

#### Native Manner

The accompaniment is all done in the native manner, using percussion instruments and employing unusual rhythms in complex meters.

The choreography is being done by Joyce MacQueen, Irene Johnson and Nancy Chmilkowski.

Other numbers to be included in the program are a suite based on everyday superstitions. This is a group dance, danced and created by the dance theory class. In keeping with the superstition theme there is to be a dance centered about all kinds, spritely ones, evil and macabre ones. Also included in this suite is a number showing the mysterious force of hypnotism.

The over-all costuming is supervised by Marian March, programs are being handled by Rhoda Wentsch, publicity by Nancy Chmilkowski, backstage by Barbara Hunter, props by Ceal Gargin, courtesy by Phylliss Alden, and tickets by Bonnie Allison.

## UCLANS TAKE TRIANGULAR MEET; GAUCHOS PLACE LOW SECOND

The Gaucho-UCLA-Cal Poly triangular track meet held last Saturday at Westwood was won by UCLA with 104 points to SB's 33 and Cal Poly's 25.

Disappointing in some ways and showing marked improvement in others, yet not enough to beat our mighty brothers to the south, Santa Barbara went down before what might well be the Bruin's best-rounded spike team in history.

Disappointing in the way the UCLANS swept many events, such as their three spots in the 100 and four in the 220, and the fact that Delf Pickarts, a sure winner, had to withdraw from the javelin due to his elbow injury, yet showing improvement and an indication of

better things to come in such men as Triulzi, who, although still favoring a sore foot and nervousness from bad publicity put in the creditable time of 14.7 in the high hurdles to win the event and tally a new meet record, and the old veteran Willie Dancer who came through with a 6'2 1/4" first place in the high jump. Otey Scruggs, apparently caught in the pack at the beginning, pushed Jack Sage to a 49.9 440 and was but 3 yards back and moving up.

Against schools our own size we shall do much better than 33 points so watch for the mid-season form and better showings in the future.

### Exams Announced For Jobs, Awards

Two examinations have been announced by the United States Civil Service Commission, and an examination has been announced by the California State Personnel Board. The James D. Phelan Awards in Literature and Art competition is open to interested applicants.

An annual salary of \$3,100 is offered to successful applicants for elementary teacher in the Indian Service. To qualify, they must show successful completion of a full four-year course leading to a degree from a four-year college, and must have 24 semester hours in education. No written examination is given. Apply U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington 25, D.C.

### Dietetic Intern

The Civil Service Commission also announces an examination for Dietetic Intern, from which internships will be filled in Veteran Administration hospitals in California, New York, Illinois and Tennessee. Salary for these jobs begins at \$1,470 a year.

Social science graduates interested in training for a professional career in delinquent prevention must file applications for the examination with the State Personnel Board, Sacramento, before April 7, 1951.

### Advancement

After satisfactorily completing one year's training, Youth Authority trainees may advance by examination to a position as Group Supervisor or an administrative job on a comparable level. Only a nominal salary is paid during the training year, but at the end of the year satisfactory employees will receive a salary starting at \$310 monthly.

The James D. Phelan Awards in Literature and Art officers have announced that first prize will be \$300 and second prize \$100. Competition is open to artists doing etchings, engravings, lithographs and blockprints.

Persons competing are required to submit two entries. Work chosen from these will be exhibited at the San Francisco Museum of Art through the month of May.

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
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
