

SCHOOL CONCERT MONDAY

Fifty-nine students representing 26 Southern California High Schools will meet in Santa Barbara tomorrow to form the All Southern California High School Orchestra, which will present a concert at Lobero Theater Monday, May 7, at 8:30 p.m. Added to the high school musicians will be 29 college students making a total of 88 in the orchestra.

Vladimir Bakaleinikoff, internationally prominent musician, will conduct. Mr. Bakaleinikoff, who is assistant conductor of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, has been connected with the national youth music camp at Interlochen, Michigan, for the past eight years. Robert Haag, thirteen-year-old pianist from Bakersfield, winner of the annual contest to select the orchestra's soloist, will be featured.

The program will be as follows: Overture to "Die Fledermous" — Johann Strauss; Piano Concerto in A minor, first movement — Grieg; "American Salute"—Morton Gould; Little Fugue in G minor—Bach; Symphony no. 5, first movement—Tschai-kowsky; "Pavanne"—Gould; "Russian Sailor's Dance" — Reinhold Gliere.

Miss Helen E. Sweet is in charge of social activities being planned for the visiting musicians. Included in the agenda will be a Complimentary Dance Saturday preceding the first rehearsal and a tea Sunday in the quad from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m., arranged by Phi Lambda Mu, honorary music sorority.

The concert is to begin at 8:30 p.m. Following the performance refreshments will be served backstage by Las Espuelas.

Provost Clarence Phelps and Dean Charles Jacobs are working in coordination with Jones on the organization of the group, as is C. E. Woodhouse, Dean of Men.

President Tito Gorrindo announced this week that all students should watch the bulletin boards for posting of the new constitution which will be voted upon on May 16 and 17 during student body elections.

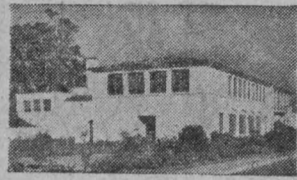
Copies will also be available in Harold Martin's office for those who wish to read the document more carefully before voting.

Then Ethel O'Bannon and Willie Wigger spoke extemporaneously. Tanya Kasper and Willie Wigger read orations, and the competition for interpretations was between Noni Williams' "The White Cliffs of Dover" and Dr. Stockton's speech from Ibsen's "Enemy of the People," given by Bob Casier.

An exciting conclusion to the ceremonies came when Ed Grabis rose to auction off a masterpiece of doodling by Dean Ashworth. The doodle-sketch was finally sold for \$1.25.

The judges, Mrs. Grace Forsythe, Miss Ocea MacMurray, and William Buckley decided unanimously upon the top contestants. They determined as winner Ethel O'Bannon, extemporaneous; Noni Williams, after-dinner and interpretation; and Willie Wigger, oratory.

Mather Coordinator Of Curriculum

Dr. Irving Mather was recently appointed Curriculum Coordinator of Santa Barbara college on recommendation of the Advisory Administrative Board and Provost Clarence Phelps.

Dr. Mather will help to organize student work that falls outside of major concentrations or departments.

This program is intended to insure a basic understanding in several fields of college endeavor. Thus beyond the maximum number of credits devoted to an area of concentration all but about 20 units of the credits necessary for graduation are to be distributed in the other five departments of the university. These will be called "controlled electives"; the units remaining will be known as "free electives."

The six divisions of study to which this program is applicable are applied arts, home economics, industrial education, art, music and physical education, social science, English, natural science, philosophy, and psychology. When one of these is chosen as a major, the others become areas of distribution.

The constitution examination will be given by President Tito Gorrindo for all student body office candidates in room 90 at 4 p.m. on May 8.

All candidates must pass this test before they can run for an office.

EDITORIAL

With the purpose of laying plans to build and enforce a permanent and just peace for the world, the representatives of 46 nations assembled in San Francisco's red and gold opera house on Wednesday, April 25.

The plan formed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference will be placed before all the United Nations here. The important resolutions of the plan include an assembly of all nations, an international court, and an eleven-member security council to prevent aggression by force. While there may be many alterations in the outline, undoubtedly these main provisions will remain unchanged.

The eyes of all the people of the world are focused upon this scene. Everywhere, survivors of war-torn countries and servicemen, who have seen death and destruction, are placing the hopes for rebuilding their lives on this meeting. This San Francisco Conference will decide whether or not there will be another devastating World War in twenty years.

The delegates have stated that just as important as the building of a secure global peace is the formation of world prosperity. There must be an end to so-called "have" and "have-not" nations; and, instead, a condition where every person—whether he be Swede, Frenchman, Yank or German—can earn a decent living. Democracy cannot exist among poverty and squalor. The social and economic conditions that led to the birth of totalitarianism must not be tolerated again in ANY country!

A survey by the American Institute of Public Opinion, between April 6 and 15, a "Gallup Poll" showed that only a third of the people who had heard of the San Francisco Conference had a reasonably correct concept of its aims.

I wonder what such a survey at Santa Barbara college would reveal? Could even a third of our student body discuss this important meeting intelligently? Remember that this is no idealistic group of tourists, assembled to view the hustle of the Golden Gate city. These men have come with purpose and determination, to plan machinery for a peace that will be everlasting. It is our duty, as freedom-loving Americans, to follow this conference, and to be reasonably well-informed on all the developments that are fast shaping the future world.

Ours is the generation which will soon take the leadership. In "taking over" it won't be our nation alone that we must consider, but every nation. We must have vivid interest in world affairs, and raise our voices for international cooperation, if we desire an end to war. The men who should be in our college classrooms today are far away, because others failed before to make a lasting peace. There must NOT be another failure at world organization!

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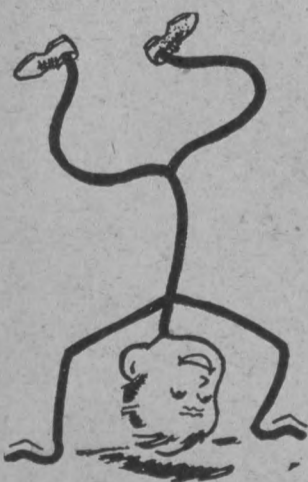


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
