

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Frosh Score 'Moral Win' **Over Cadets**

Gauchitos on Defensive in First Half But Turn Tables in Second

Black Foxe Coach, Ab Young, Stops Frosh Winning Play in Closing Minutes

With a "moral" victory to their credit, Coach "Doc" Kelliher's Fighting Frosh of '40 went down to defeat, 13-8, at the hands of the highly-touted Black Foxe Military academy, Armistice Day on the Ventura J.C. field.

The first score of the game came in the first quarter, when Banta of the Militarists went over for a touchdown on a lateral from Gerber. Intercepting a pass on his own 10 yard line, Jack McArthur of the Frosh kept the opponents from scoring in the same period.

The third quarter found the freshmen playing a much improved brand of ball with Bill McArthur, a future varsity headliner, leading the parade. Near the end of the third session Jack McArthur puntinging beautifully throughout the game sent one of his spirally boots out on the much heavier and larger Black Foxe three-yard line. At this point the military lads attempted to kick out of danger but the ever-alert frosh guard, Valos, broke through and blocked it to score first blood for the Staters with a sefety. Score, 6-2 in favor of Black Foxe.

Not to be stopped Coach Kelliher sent in "Little-Stan" Wilson, a passing demon, to start the fireworks again. Wilson no sooner got his hands on the ball when he flipped a pass to B. McArthur who in turn took it to the opponents 12 yard line. Again Wilson with the ball tossed another to McArthur who this time planted the ball in the end zone to put the Gauchitos out in front 8-6.

Determined not to have their undefeated record blemished the Foxers scored a fluky touchdown on a pass after it had been more than batted to death. The score now favored the city-boys 13-8 with only three minutes of play remain-
