## **Desires of Associated Farmers Doubtful**

Associated Farmers and this organization's increasing attacks on the labor movement among migratory workers, fair minded Californians are beginning to see outline of a well organized drive against everything that smacks of liberalism in the San Joaquin valley.

As the daily press carries more and more news of this group's activities, the public is beginning to wonder what lies behind the Associated Farmers.

In the words of a Daily Californian editorial: "The result of strikes in 1938 among agricultural workers for increased wages and better conditions was the organization of the Associated Farmers, the organization designed to stop organization among farm workers and combat 'alien agitators'."

Small Owning Group California is peculiarly situated in that three per cent of the farmers own sixty per cent of the land. Another oddity is that farming in the Golden state has become industrialized to an extent that has not been matched in any other section of the country. As a result, migrant workers, such as those pictured in Steinbeck's novel, have been forced to live under conditions comparable to those of the factory workers during the Industrial Revolution.

In this characteristic is found the reason for the existence for the Associated Farmers. It is the side. same old story of union smashing and red baiting, so aptly used by employers at the beginning of this century to curtail any move to sing to California today.

In this particular case years of experience in the art are being coordinated to make this drive as complete and devastating as any anti-unionist ever visioned. tion." While paid propagandists hired by "the three per cent" cry loudly in this general vein, the public sits back content to believe because it is in print-never bothering to investigate, to seek facts instead of phrases. The farming bigwigs, including such soil-wallowers as Robert N. Wilson of the State Chamber of Commerce and A. P. Giannini of the Bank of America, profit from this tendency by freely misrepresenting the facts, such as using interchangeably the terms "red" and 'liberal" and other small but important tricks of the

## **Author Excels** 1st Biography

"Rain Upon Godshill", by J. B. Priestley; Harper and Brothers, 308 pages.

As rain falls over Godshill on the Isle of Wight one cold fall morning, the noted author begins his sequel to "Midnight on the Desert" (1937). From the quiet of his study atop his island home, Mr. Priestley travels amiably over two continents on paper, retracing his literary and some personl activities since the publication of his 1937 autobiography. He weaves together a charming collection of impressions made during the pre-

ceding two years. Of all America, Mr. Priestley is seemingly most fond of and most happy in the state of Arizona with its flat expanse of earth, color and peace. Some of his best descriptive pages are devoted to a rainbowhued picturization of the unequal-ed landscape of cliff and sand, colored by the centuries.

New York Strange He is least comfortable, strangely enough, in the "concrete chasms of New York, although he

admits appreciation of its individual type of beauty. He comments frequently and candidly on the American scene with the insight of a native, which is remarkable, in that he is a British subject. His dissertation, however, is not confined solely to the United States and landmarks, but is a potpourri of theater and literary life of both

In any case, the readjustment from a two week loaf to the scurry and bustle of academic and extra-curricular activity is too rapid. With final examinations

so close at hand, the readjustment becomes increasingly difficult, even though many of us have spent our holidays working on academic theses. Or have we?

Our envy this past vacation was directed at friends of ours who attend the major universities in the northern part of California who receive an extra-long vacation with no finals to look forward to when they return, as the quarter is over at those institutions. The quarter system seems admirable to us, not that it provides for a longer vacation period,



but because it takes care of the old bogey man, final exams, without having him pop up to mar an otherwise happy holiday season. With the admirable vacation facilities of southern California, it seems a pity to spend two weeks on term papers, etc. Of course, many of us couldn't take advantage of these facilities, anyway, and the vacation period is the only time we have to spend on actual academic work, but, charitable as we feel at this time of overlapping Christmas cheer, we are thinking of the average collegian who does his work at the right time.

On our return to the Channel city, we found many and mighty developments. First, at least to us, is the announcement of four new majors, two in the science field and two in that of social sciences. This development is a sure indication that this college is reaching for the top, and is getting away from the old idea of teachers colleges which taught educational procedure and nothing else. More and more we are inclined to think that the new college buildings on Leadbetter Mesa should be made to house as many students as possible in the shortest possible time. The state universities, so we hear, are becoming increasingly overcrowded, and officials at these schools are sending many students who desire instruction in educational work to the state colleges. With pardonable pride, we point to Santa Barbara's fine facilities and standing as a State college and with all due respect to the other institutions in this class, we can easily see why students looking for a place to matriculate, would pick Gaucholand.

Speaking of the Leadbetter project, we understand that there is some controversy over the style of architecture to be used, with the officials in charge having decided on functional style and the townspeople and many others concerned, advocating the Spanish type. Personally, we lean toward the Spanish, for as its backers point out, all of Santa Barbara is Spanish, its tradtion is essentially Spanish and the spirit of Manana is still the prevailing force. Little as we know of architecture, the functional style has always represented too much formality, although the building interiors may make for the best use. We won't argue the point with anyone, but the exteriors of functional buildings appear to have the primary function of looking like an institution for the criminal. The buildings just don't have that old college look, the ivy doesn't creep for a number of years and the blank gray walls show no individuality. Efficient they may be, but esthetically beautiful, no. The word, functional itself, has an evil connotation for us, as we remember a college newspaper once, that was considered the finest of its type in the nation until it adopted a policy of functionalism, whatever that meant, and which rapidly deteriorated, in the opinion of critics, readers and alumni. Just a philosophical quirk, if you will, but that's our opinion of the functional side. Typical of this school's method of doing things is the proposed Alumni-Varsity game. While we write, we have heard of three different dates, with the latest, having the game scheduled for Wednesday. For the life of us, we can't see why the game was scheduled in the first place. The fracas certainly hasn't received adequate publicity, the date has been changed so many times, the coaches aren't even sure of when it will take place and many of the football laddies, or so we would imagine, are tired of playing after a long, hard season. Too, the grid sport left the limelight after the post-season Bowl games and basketball is rapidly moving in. Of course, we wouldn't miss the tilt for any amount of money, if only someone will tell us when it takes place.-S.C.
