Thora Lindstrom, president of the A.W.S., announced that "Sadie Hawkins Day" will be held Wednesday and will be followed by the Spinster's Hop on Saturday at Rockwood.

"Get your dates Wednesday, girls, for Saturday's big shindig," is the slogan of the A.W.S. for the week, according to Miss Lindstrom, as she stated the rules which are to govern Wednesday's man chase.

Rules Listed

The rules are: 1) No dates for the Spinster's Hop may be made before 9 a.m. Wednesday; 2) Tags will be distributed in the A.W.S. club room beginning at 8 a.m. Wednesday; 3) Rushing and tagging of men will officially begin at 9 a.m.; 4) Man must accept a girl's tag if he has not been tagged before, and if he has no tag to present when she does tag him; and, 5) No tagging will be permitted in classrooms while classes are in session.

"Sadie Hawkins Day" is based on the favorite hill-billy comic strip by Al Capp. On this day Daisy Mae has always tried in vain to catch Lil' Abner, but on the campus Wednesday the girls are positive in their declarations that the men in their lives will not be so fortunate. This idea of "Sadie Hawkins Day" has been adopted successfully by certain eastern cities and by several colleges. I.E. Head Writes Article

An article, written by E. E. Ericson, industrial education department head, recently appeared in the A.V.A. Journal and News Bulletin, official organ of the American Vocational Association, Inc. In it is stressed the need for well trained industrial arts teachers.

He states that more and more, present day curriculum makers are turning to persons established in the industrial arts fields for suggestions and advice, with the reasons for this being the fact, that services that may be rendered by industrial arts teaching are becoming better understood and appreciated; and that a comprehensive outlook on education as a whole, far in excess, in many cases, of persons dealing with other subjects, has been gained by industrial arts teachers and supervisors.

He also states that although there are many requests for assistance, the criteria for judging efficiency of industrial arts in the school system is meagerly developed and inadequate.

Ex-Gaucho Gridder Ted Joham Receives Promotion to Kelly

James E. "Ted" Joham, '38, has completed his basic training in aviation at Randolph Field, Texas, and has been transferred to Kelly Field, Texas, where he is entering the advanced phase of flying instruction.

During this first portion of his flight training, Joham learned the rudiments of flying on a medium powered biplane, with only the bare necessary instruments. This training was completed in a 400 horsepower low wing monoplane, which embodies many of the flying qualities he will later find in the modern day planes now in use throughout the service.

Upon his graduation from Randolph Field, last December 19th, Joham had completed 25 hours of dual flying and 40 hours of solo flying. Night flying occupied only about five hours of the course in the basic stage. An additional six hours of flying time were devoted to instrument flying—during this phase, the flying cadet piloted his plane

College Adds Four New Majors to Curriculum

A.S. Votes on Amendments at Two Meetings

Students Discuss New Award Plan, Athletic Board

State college students will have a personal chance to give an example of "youth and democracy in action" this week, when they meet in two special all-student assemblies to vote on constitutional amendments. The elections were o.k.'d by the legislative council in their weekly meeting last night in Pine Hall.

The first gathering will be during lunch hour Monday in the auditorium. At this collegians will be asked to approve a new "economy move" by the council in regards to athletic awards.

Election Delayed

This election was supposed to have been held before vacation in conjunction with the move to abolish the Board of Athletic Control. However, the latter took up all three special meetings that were called, and the presiding officer, A.S. president Bob Scalapino, had no chance to call for discussion on the award problem.

The other election will be Friday, also at noon in the auditorium. It promises to be a heated affair, with one of the most controversial problems of recent campus politics as its subject—the Board of Athletic Control.

New Board Approved

Acting upon the vote of the students, who balloted to dissolve the board, the council last night approved a new one. It was a surprise—not so much because of the fact it was approved by the council—but because the approval was given with no discussion, and lacked but one vote of being unanimous.

The proposed new board which the students will be asked to discuss is made up of the following: A faculty representative elected by council, chairman of the Faculty Athletic committee, the faculty representative of the president, the president of the Associated Students, chairman of the Finance Committee, a member of the "Block S" society, and a student at large chosen by council.

The alleged advantages of the above new setup are (1) it gives the students a 4-3 majority over the faculty, (2) it will be responsible to the legislative council, and all the minutes of its meetings must be ratified by that political body, (3) it provides that all coaches, the graduate manager and the comptroller be ex officio non-voting members.

Majority Needed

At both the meetings, members of the legislative council will be present to debate and explain the various advantages and drawbacks of both bills. In each case a two-thirds majority of all students present at the all-college special assembly will be required for passage.

At the council's meeting last night, the minutes of the finance committee were read and ratified. This committee, under the leadership of Frank Douglas, has temporarily undertaken the duties of the defunct Board of Athletic Control. It will be impossible to remove the 10 cent charge at basketball games, without additional funds for the sport which are not available.

Parking Lot Accommodates More Cars

Activities Control Board Announces Opening of Space Near Building

Unexpected increase in enrollment at Santa Barbara State college during the current semester has necessitated construction of a parking lot to provide for an additional 80 to 90 student automobiles.

The new parking space, which will simplify, somewhat, the present problem of campus parking, is located directly in front of the administration building with the entrance opening on Alameda Padre Serra. Work on this latest addition to the campus was undertaken and completed during Christmas vacation.

Lot Paved

The lot is paved with an oil mixture and individual parking zones will be marked off as soon as the surface is packed hard enough to facilitate painting.

Students of the college will find the newly-created parking facilities a special boon, in view of the recent parking ordinance passed by the City Council of Santa Barbara, which designates that all parking on Ridge Road, above the college, shall be parallel. Persons parking in any other fashion on Ridge Road will be guilty of an infraction of Santa Barbara traffic regulations and will be subject to prosecution by the City Police department.

This change will create an additional need for space and it is suggested that the new parking lot will meet this demand.

Zones Set

Recently, on the campus, action of the Activities Control Board set aside certain zones surrounding the administration building and part of the adjoining area for faculty parking only. Since that time students have continued to use the restricted zones.

A form of apprehension, whereby these students were served with summons by NYA workers, with the authority of the Board, was inaugurated, and according to Harry Sloan, chairman of the Board will be continued.

offered in the social science department. Both science majors will fit in with a junior high school teaching credential, but neither is a teaching major.

Science Majors

The biology major will include many requirements for such positions as in the Fish and Game Commission, Forestry Service, Pest control work and agriculture. It also is a basis for advanced degrees in biological science and for graduate work leading to the general secondary credential. Upper division courses in entomology (science 155) and embryology (science 163) have been added to the biological science curriculum.

General science major includes the study of both physical and biological sciences, giving a good background for work on any scientific secondary credential. In the physical science division advanced work in geology will be offered to upper division students.

Social Science Field

Expanding the social science to include political science and economics majors necessitates the addition of several courses to the curriculum. Study of Federal government, local government, political theory, and public opinion and propaganda will be offered to political science majors. Statistics, business cycles, social reform movements, economic theory, public finance, and money and credit will be included in the economics major course.

Heretofore the only social science department majors have been in history and in social science, the latter being a group major combined with junior high education work.

Students interested in graduate work or law will be benefited most by the new social science majors.

For further information on the science and social science department majors, students should see Miss Hazel Severy or Dr. William Ellison, heads of the respective departments.

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Gauchos Capture Top Honors At San Jose Basketball Clinic

Steward Leads Local Cagers To Five Wins

Coach Willie Wilton's fast traveling Gaucho cagers continued their sensational spurt as they divided a two game series with the powerful California Aggies 38-45 and 46-35 last night and Wednesday night at the new Armory. The split made it eight victories for the Hilltoppers in the last ten games.

It was all Santa Barbara last night in direct contrast to Wednesday's fracas. The Gauchos piled up an early lead and managed to maintain it to the very end.

Lowell Steward, flashy Negro center, continued on his great scoring spree and tallied 31 points in the two game series, 12 of them in last night's game to be high point man for the Gauchos along with Tommy Guerrero who also tallied 12 points.

Larry Brewster, talkative guard, continued his brilliant defensive record as he shadowed the Aggies chief scoring threat, Steve Chorak, so closely that the latter was only able to cage two field goals during the game.

Gordon Gray, towering 6'5" guard, proved the difference between the play of the local five from Wednesday and last night's play as his height proved a big advantage to the Gauchos in taking the ball off the backboard.

Speedy, blond thatched Bob Forbes proved the big headache to the Wiltonmen. Besides scoring 10 points to aid in the Aggies victory Wednesday night, the blonde speedster tallied 15 more points last night to keep the Blue and Gold aggregation a threat until the last few minutes of play.

The locals were completely baffled by the Aggies fast-breaking offense and as a result fell easy prey in the first game. Chorak, breaking fast from his forward position, tallied 15 points to lead the California five to its win.

The highly touted Guy Leggett, tall center, was not much of a scoring threat, but proved invaluable in the first game because of his retrieving of the ball off the backboard. In the second game it was a different story as he tangled with Gray who took the play away from him and enabled the locals to handle the ball more than on the previous night.

Steward was in sensational form throughout the series and was un-

Local Cagers Split Series With Aggies

Santa Barbara State college's unpredictable Gauchos were in rare form over the Christmas holidays and as a result walked off with top honors at the annual San Jose Basketball clinic held on December 27-28-29.

Besides tying Chico State with five victories and one defeat in the six game round robin, the Hilltoppers won three trophies as Lowell Steward edged out Milky Phelps, San Diego's great scoring ace, for high point honors of the tournament with 42 points in six games, Larry Brewster won the individual defensive trophy by holding his opponents to 10 points in six games, and the Gauchos were adjudged the best offensive team of the tourney.

Chico State won the best defensive team trophy and the best sportsmanship trophy. The Gauchos were runnerup in the defensive team honors.

With Lowell Steward and Tommy Guerrero the spearhead of the attack, the locals downed San Jose 26-20, Fresno State 21-15, Humboldt State 33-25, San Francisco State 22-20, Chico State 26-16, and lost to San Diego State for their only defeat, 21-13.

All the games were 20 minute affairs and the Gauchos in winning the offensive trophy piled up 142 points in the six 20 minute games. Chico State was second with 125 points and San Francisco State followed with 125.

Phelps trailed Steward by one point in the individual offensive records amassing 41 points with Wittmer of Chico State in third place with 39 points. Guerrero was also in the race for the offensive trophy having 33 points to his credit.

The twin victory put the Gauchos at the top of the heap in the league standings as San Diego and San Jose have not as yet played any conference tilts.

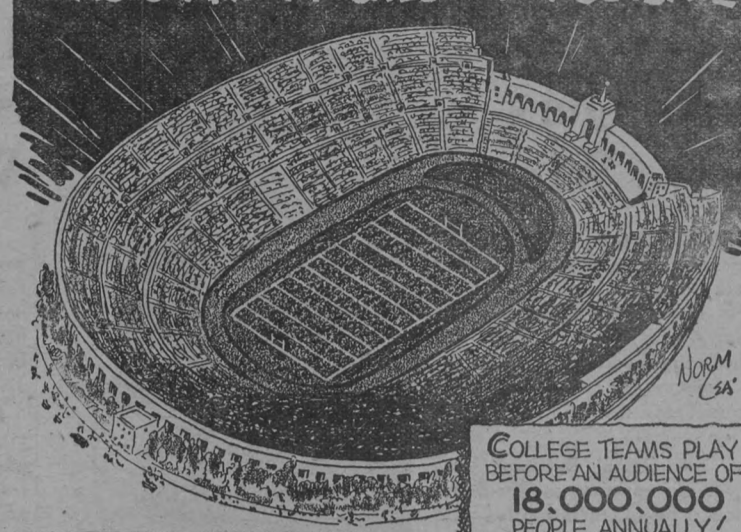

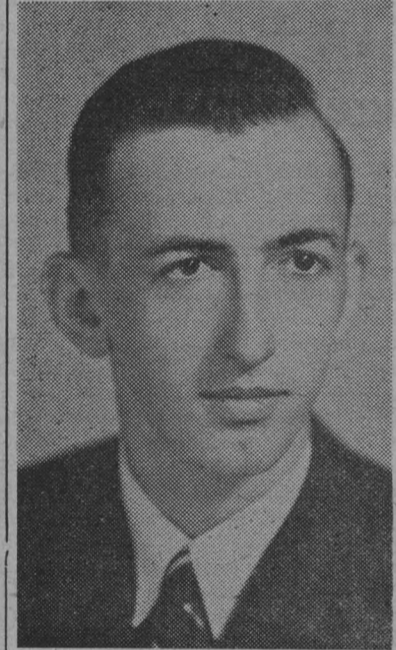
