

Mojo Coffee



Mojo is the newest in our wild bunch of coffee corrals. It's clean and pleasant. The art on the walls is interesting, but not insistent. The location, next to Rite Aid and Albertson's, puts it in the right place for a quick coffee after grocery shopping. And if you're hun-

gry, they've got a sandwich bar, pastries and Stanton's bagels. But the highlight is their full selection of Ben and Jerry's pints. I asked them what flavors they had; they told me, "everything." Ice cream and coffee? Umm, yeah.

Espresso Roma

The coffee bar offers the usual fare, with a few notable specialty drinks including "the Snickers," a personal favorite. Though the vintage magazines, poster art and action figures provide eye candy for kids of all ages, the main attraction is the 6-by-8-foot projection screen and Dolby surround system which plays a feature film every weekday at 6 p.m. and on weekends at 8 p.m.

The DVD library of over 80 films includes classic ranging from in's "Modern titles Chaplin's Times" to "American Beauty." In addition to the movies, employee Tym Straw has taken off the apron and taken up the mantle as booking agent for musical acts, to be featured the second and fourth Friday of every month. Starbucks

Santa Barbara Roasting Company

Location: 321 Motor Way

Hours of Operation: Mon-Sun. 6:30 a.m. to 11 p.m.

Gestalt: The Pablo Escobar of the local caffeine cartel.

If you live in this county, chances are you have had Santa Barbara Roasting Company coffee. Providing a wide selection of fine coffees to many local eateries and coffee shops, Ro. Co. roasts its coffee on the premises, adding another dimension of sensory experience to buying a cup of coffee. Prices are in the mid to high range. One drawback — if you want to light up, you're going to have to take a step back; they don't let smokers on the sidewalk.
