

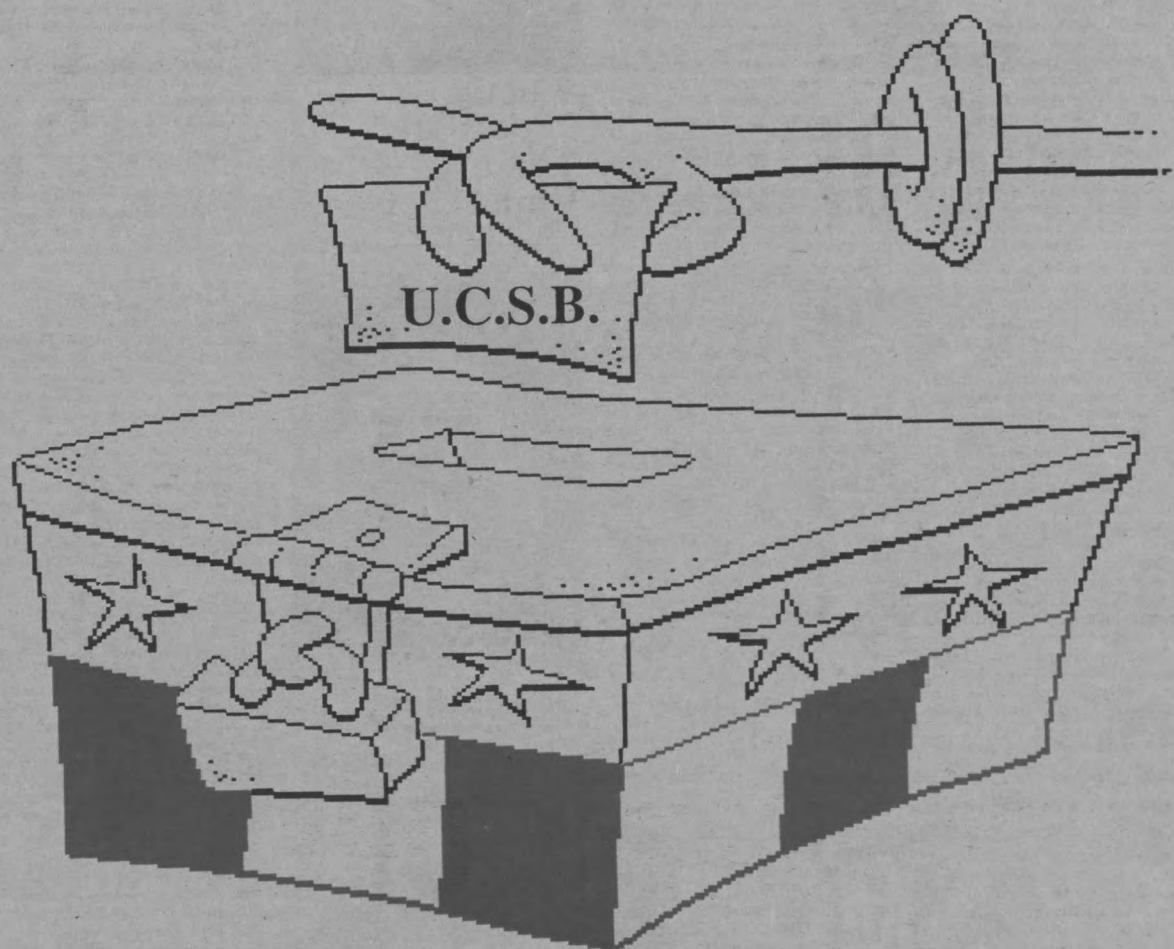

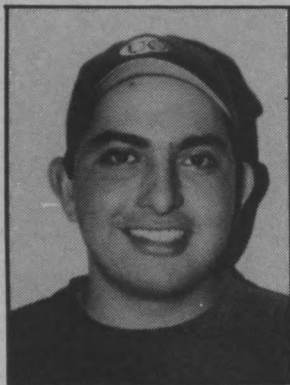

Council member and as your current Internal Vice President. With your vote, I will continue to fight for what we believe as your A.S. President

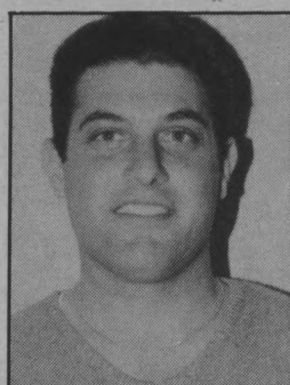

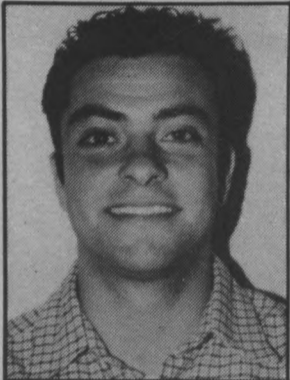
to ensure the students equal rights within the campus.

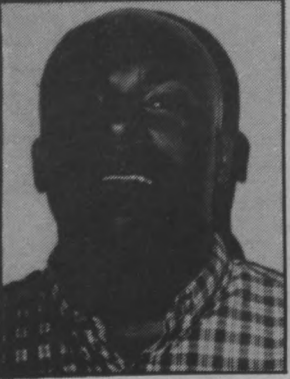
I have worked over 20 hours each week listening and legislating, working to realize the goals of the UCSB student body. This has been an extremely re-

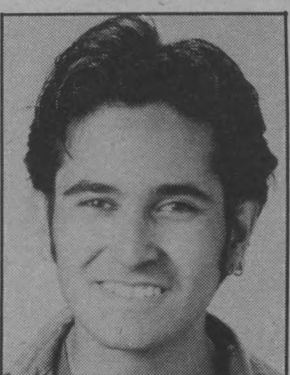

I have witnessed the slum conditions in I.V., which of course, vary to a degree. The disappearance of the Ride-Board in the UCen is another loss that many have been affected by.

My decision to run has been motivated, in part, by a desire to see real im-

provements in the university. Improvements like re-establishing the Ride-Board, which allowed students to travel home on weekends with other students, opening talks with the county supervisors to get more street lights in I.V., increasing the recycling programs around our student community, and helping promote student interest in local issues.

If I were to get elected to Vice President I would try to make changes that are both realizable, and beneficial. As a current member of another student organization, I can understand and appreciate the necessity of teamwork that the entire Student Council would have to follow in order to get things accomplished. Keeping an organization afloat can be a big responsibility, and cooperation is the only way to accomplish such a task. Here are some of the ways that I will better UCSB, and YOU:

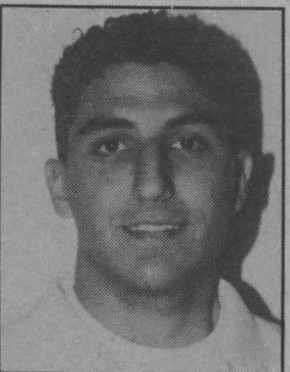

As you can see, most of my organizing and community efforts have been dedicated to environmental causes. I realize, however, that the social environment is just as important as the natural

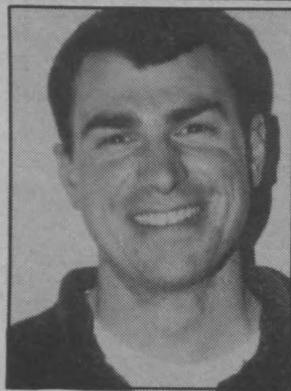
environment. I will like to have the opportunity to share my leadership abilities in all areas of our environment and our community. This is why I am running for A.S. External V.P. for Local Affairs.

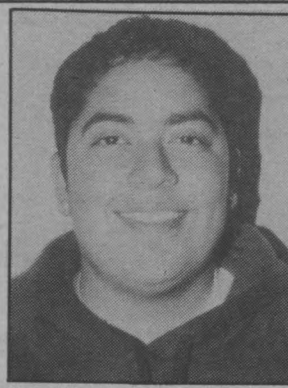


Colin McCarthy

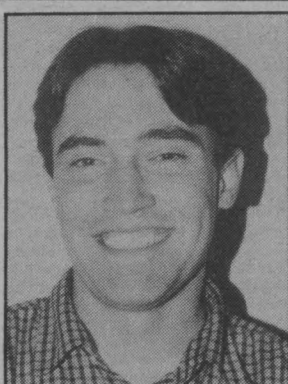
Although students definitely know how to have fun here at UCSB, our party school image is beginning to change. Students are becoming more

A.S. LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL PLEBISCITE QUESTION

This measure is a Plebiscite for Informational purposes. It is not a funding request.

Would you support the establishment of a Division I level UCSB Gaucho Football Team, even if it meant paying a minimum of \$75.00 per student, per quarter?

(This does not mean that the UCSB Gaucho Football Team will be coming back in the immediate future.)

Football Team -- Con Statement

The UCSB football team is not feasible financially or legally. Title IX of the Educational Amendments of the Civil Rights act requires UCSB to have as many female athletes on scholarship as male. A football team would further upset the current imbalance. To add a football team, we must add numerous female scholarships in addition to the male football scholarships. This would cost us a bundle. Furthermore, you already spend \$162 per year on Athletics. This is too much already. Vote NO on Gaucho Football. Send a message to our student leaders to spend their time on real issues and stop wasting their time with football.

Football Team -- Con Statement by UCSB's Title IX Coordinator

It is important for all students to know that the possible addition of football as a UCSB intercollegiate sport would raise serious issues of gender equity in our athletic program. An educated vote requires an understanding of the possible consequences for the existing intercollegiate teams if football were to be added. These "consequences", and the legal basis for the concept of "gender equality" are explained below. Title IX is the Federal Law that mandates gender equity in all programs, services and facilities in higher education institutions that receive federal funding. This law is best known for its applicability to intercollegiate athletics, and it delineates certain requirements related to participation rates and the funding of men's and women's intercollegiate sports. One of the requirements (often called "proportionality") is that the proportion of male and female students athletes must be relatively equivalent to the proportion of enrolled undergraduate men and women. So, hypothetically, if a school had a 50-50 enrollment of male and female undergraduates, it would also need to have close to a 50-50 ratio of male and female student athletes; and likewise, if a school had an undergraduate enrollment which was 62% female and 38% male, those proportions would need to be reflected in its intercollegiate athletic participation rates, if possible.

In order to be in compliance with Title IX, a school's male/female athletic participation percentages must be within 5 percentage points of the undergraduate enrollment numbers.

Another requirement of Title IX is equivalent funding of men's and women's sports. This is a very difficult goal for institutions to accomplish, particularly, in light of historically greater funding for men's teams and current diminished resources, but it is the most difficult for institutions with football as one of their sports.

All voters should know that it would be ILLEGAL for UCSB to add football to its roster of intercollegiate sports, unless a comparable number of male students athletes were deleted from our existing 11 sports, or a comparable number of female student athletes were added. Given the number of athletes that are typically involved in a football program, this balancing (or achieving of "proportionality") could not be done without cutting some of our existing men's sports or adding some additional women's sports to offset the increase in the number of male students athletes that adding football would cause.

Also, there is the funding matter which is a central Title IX issue. Any increase in funding to men's sports (which adding football would entail) requires a concomitant increase to women's sports. Thus, any "football fee" which would be assessed to students would have to include enough money to fund the additional women's sports that would be necessary to be in compliance with Title IX.

CAMPUSWIDE FEE INITIATIVE RECREATIONAL SPORTS FEE

This initiative will appear on a red sheet placed inside your ballot

Recreational Sports Fee: Do you approve a \$7.00 per student per quarter mandatory fee, which would replace the current \$3.00 Sport Clubs fee, to continue to fund Sport Clubs and to help fund other Recreational Sports Programs, which includes the Adventure, Intramural, and Open Recreational Programs? Collections will begin Fall Quarter 1997 and will not be collected during any summer session. The fee will be subject to reaffirmation by ballot voting every five years.

*Note: The current \$3.00 Sport Clubs fee will expire at the end of Spring Quarter 1997 regardless of the outcome of this election.

Recreational Sports Fee Initiative -- Pro Statement

UCSB Recreational Sports is asking for your support. Undergraduate and graduate students alike, we need your help to keep one of the largest student services alive. Recreational Sports consists of four student service programs: Intramurals, Sports Clubs, Open Recreation, and Adventure Programs. Each year, these programs employ approximately 400 students who are the foundation of the services that are participated in by 80% of UCSB students.

Recreational Sports Currently serves over 600 athletes on 17 Sport Club teams, 890 Intramural teams participating in 14 sports per quarter, 300 participants involved in over 200 Adventure Program trips, and thousands of students through Open Recreation. Sport Club teams achieved 31 national titles in the last 10 years, while being open to any student regardless of experience level. These programs are open to all. Interest, not skill, is the only prerequisite for participating in Recreational Sports.

Rising costs and the expiration of the funding source for Sport Clubs brings Recreational Sports to ask you, the students, for assistance. The Recreational Sports Fee Initiative on the Spring Ballot is asking for \$7.00 per student per quarter to support all four programs. The money will be spent to lower the cost of trips provided by Adventure Programs, replace worn out equipment used by students for Intramural and Open Recreation, and fund the 17 Sport Club teams. How the money is used is determined by student groups such as the Sports Clubs Council, made up of representatives from each team, which approves the allocation of funding to the Sports Club teams. Without this support, Sport Clubs will have no funding at all and participation fees for the other programs will most likely increase in order to cover rising costs. Just \$7.00 per quarter can keep every program in Recreational Sports affordable for all students.

Every UCSB student, undergraduate and graduate, has the opportunity to get involved. You can be an Adventure Programs' trip leader, sport club athlete, Rec Sports staff member, or a participant in any or all four of the programs offered. The professional and personal development opportunities (not to mention the fun!) are endless. Without the fee initiative, however, many of these opportunities will disappear or become difficult to take advantage of.

Support the programs you participate in. Recreational Sports is open to everyone. There is no experience necessary. Over 18,000 people participate in Recreational Sports each year. Help ensure the future of the largest student service on campus by voting YES on the Recreational Sports Fee Initiative.

We accomplish our mission by maintaining information on community and campus volunteer opportunities through our easy-to-use databases. In addition, we create sponsor community service projects to increase awareness on compelling social issues, provide students with non-profit management training, and supply seed monies to student groups with innovative community service projects. These efforts are all made possible by the CAB Lock-In Fee.

Anyone is welcomed into CAB and is encouraged to volunteer and/or create a service project. The friendly students and staff at CAB love to help you find exactly what you are looking for. We also work closely with other student groups to help them through the planning process of organizing a service project and

assist them with any administrative and financial resources, as well and volunteer power. In conjunction CAB maintains a healthy relationship with over 400 Non-Profit community service agencies in Santa Barbara.

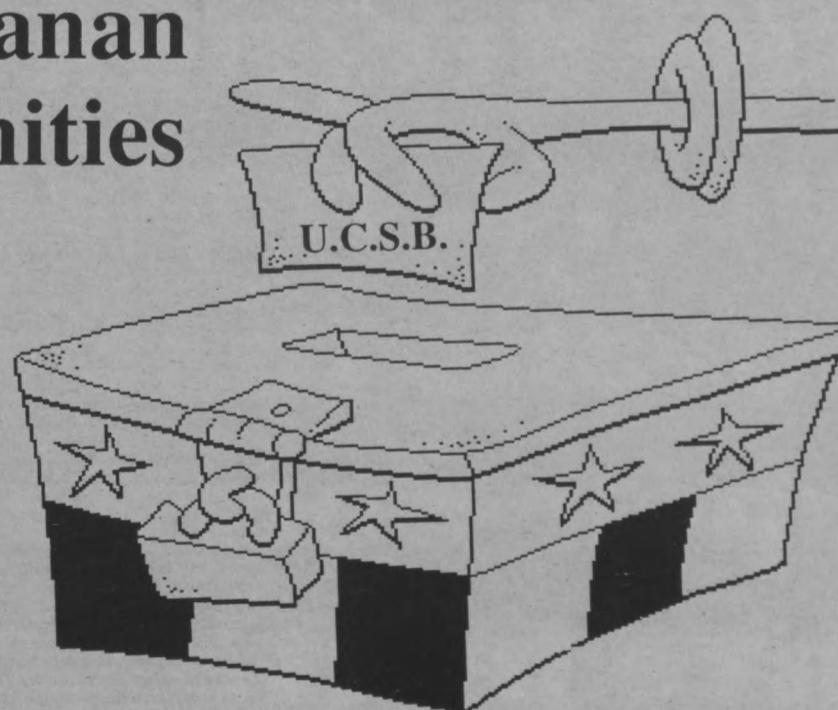

MultiCultural Center Lock-In Fee Pro Statement

This year the MultiCultural Center is on the AS ballot for a lock-in fee of only 75 cents per student. By voting YES for this mere 75-cent fee, the entire campus community can benefit from the variety of programs that the MCC offers. For those of you who may not be aware of the great services that the MCC provides, let me tell you.

The MultiCultural Center was established in 1987 by students of color who felt alienated and discriminated against on this campus. They demanded the creation of a safe and hospitable space for their use (to do programming, hold meetings, have socials, etc.). Thus, the MultiCultural Center was created to provide a welcome space for everyone -- all UCSB students, staff, faculty and community members, regardless of creed, color or sexual orientation.

Today this mission is realized in part

through educational programming, which promotes changes in attitudes and behavior throughout our campus community. These programs include music, dance, and dramatic performances, films and videos, and lectures presented by students as well as by the MCC. They are generally free and are open to the public.

The MCC also provides a space for students to study, hold meetings, check their e-mail on NetStations, make fliers, or host student art exhibits. In addition, the MCC is affiliated with various student organizations that have been historically underrepresented on this campus, including students of color, international students and gay/lesbian/bisexual students.

I want to emphasize that the creation of the MCC is not just something that only students of color pushed for. The entire campus community came together to support the MCC (as evident in past elections when the campus voted

to give the MCC the larger space that it now has in the New UCen next to Associated Students). With this widespread support, it is obvious that the campus community feels the need for organizations such as the MCC to continue to exist on this campus.

Thus the lock-in fee of only 75 cents -- the cost of a candy bar -- will help the MCC continue to offer a welcoming space and excellent programs to all students as well as the entire UCSB community. With the demographics of UCSB being approximately 70 percent Caucasian, programs and organizations like the MCC are a crucial part in diversifying campus.

If you value diversity programs and organizations, such as the MultiCultural Center, as an important part of the university, I encourage all of you to VOTE YES on the MultiCultural Center lock-in fee!

It is not too hard to find a lot of red tape on this University, especially when it comes to planning events on campus. After jumping through hurdles for months, rushing to meet deadlines, balancing a full load of classes, and going to countless planning meetings, the last thing a student coordinator needs to worry about is that elusive funding

source that would ensure the event goes off as scheduled, without a hitch.

This Lock-In is intended to help student groups with great ideas that would benefit the campus and student community, from having to worry about that one last funding source that is always necessary. Throughout the past year, groups have been desperately searching for extra dollars, only to be denied one too many times. Constantly

groups are forced to cancel their events due to the lack of funding sources available on this campus.

Approving this Lock-In will help alleviate this problem. Not only will this measure provide more money to groups desperately in search of necessary funds, the measure also provides more opportunity for a diversity of student groups to organize and plan events.

Intercollegiate Athletics:

Intercollegiate Athletics: Do you agree to establish an A.S. Constitutional Lock-In of six dollars (\$6.00) per student/per quarter effective Fall 1997 and raised to nine dollars (\$9.00) per student/per quarter effective Fall 1998 for the support of UCSB (NCAA) Intercollegiate Athletics athletes?

Intercollegiate Athletics Lock-In -- Con Statement

The Intercollegiate Athletics Lock-In is nothing more than a general fee increase. Because the Athletic department is funded through registration fees, their budget is determined by the University. Your \$21 a year will indeed go to athletics and spreading that money wherever it likes. In essence, voting for this initiative is the equivalent of handing the chancellor approximately

\$400,000 and saying "do whatever you like with it."

In 1992-93 the campus approved a similar lock-in for intramurals. Soon after, the university severely cut the funding for IM's. Today, intramurals are almost completely funded by the Lock-in. The money taken from intramurals in 1993 ended up in numerous other programs on campus.

Don't get fooled again. This is a fee increase with no mechanism to protect the

current funding of Athletics. The athletes campaigning for this initiative may be great people, they may be your trusted friends, but they do not understand the issue and have been duped by the University. If you want to increase the \$162 per quarter you current spend on Athletics, this is not the way to do it.

Vote NO on the Intercollegiate Athletics Lock-In!

Intercollegiate Athletic Initiative Pro Statement

A "yes" vote on the Intercollegiate Athletic Initiative would do many positive things for this university. This money goes 100% to additional scholarships, the bylaws for this bill will enforce the allocation of money to scholarships and not allow for the administration to take money away from the current ICA budget. By the end of the two year phase in, these funds will create over 45 additional scholarships for the athletic program here at UCSB.

These scholarships will be distributed evenly between all of the 21 intercollegiate teams unless they are already fully funded, that is all underfunded sports teams will benefit from the passage of this initiative equally. An oversight committee will oversee the allocation of these funds, comprised of the new athletic director, a faculty representative and student athletes. With these new grants we will be able to recruit better athletes, who in return will perform at higher levels. With better performances the community interest in UCSB will

increase not only in athletics but as a university on a general basis, something that this university is in desperate need of to get away from the party reputation that surrounds us. In addition with higher conference finishes UCSB alumni will be more apt to donate additional funds. With the passage of this initiative we can increase community support, alumni interest in the school and increase freshman recruitment and interest in athletics and academics here at UCSB.

Increase the fee by three dollars (\$3.00) for a total of fifteen dollars (\$15.00) per student/per quarter?

Increase the fee by eight dollars (\$8.00) for a total of twenty dollars (\$20.00) per student/per quarter?

(Note: The option which receives the most votes will be implemented for all students.)

Student Health Lock-In Fee Reaffirmation and Increase -- Pro Statement

A "YES" vote to both reaffirm the current Student Health Lock-In Fee and to increase it by \$8 per quarter is a wise use of your money.

Since 1987 ongoing budget cuts, building maintenance and inflation have created financial crises at the Student Health Service. If only the current \$12 fee is voted in, the Student Health Service will need to institute an additional \$20 PER VISIT FEE to continue service.

If the fee is increased by \$3 to \$15, there would still have to be a \$16 per visit fee.

The only way to maintain the current low fee structure is to VOTE FOR THE \$8 INCREASE

If we only maintain the current \$12 fee, the money that we spend each quarter at Student Health will increase. Instead of paying \$20 once, at our first visit, we'll have to pay \$20 EACH TIME we visit Student Health. This will have a dramatic impact on a large number of students. During the 1995/96 school year, 9,684 different undergraduate students used the Student Health Services. Without the \$8 increase, any illness requiring two or more visits to the Student Health Service in one quarter would result in costs exceeding the entire lock-in fee.

For those of us on financial aid, these additional per visit fees would mean a large expense that is not covered on our financial aid package. The Lock-In Fee would be factored into the financial aid package, thus, minimizing our future health care expenses.

The cost of health care at the Student Health Service remains well below community rates so it is convenient and accessible to all students.

VOTE TO REAFFIRM AND INCREASE THE STUDENT HEALTH LOCK-IN FEE BY \$8.
