Pressure's Mounting for Pimm

The UCSB men's basketball team has produced more excitement off the court than it has on it over the past three weeks.

The Gauchos made news across the nation when they didn't attend a scheduled Dec. 15 practice and instead held an internal, players-only meeting in which they expressed dissatisfaction with 15thyear Head Coach Jerry Pimm.

KEYT-TV reported that the players held a vote in which they decided to ask for Pimm's resignation. Pimm met with the players that same evening in an attempt to right the ship. Apparently it worked, because Pimm is still in command and the players are back on the court.

"The players met with Coach Pimm, and it was a long meeting with Coach Pimm," UCSB Athletic Director Gary Cunningham said. "Out of it came a dedication that they would all work together."

The meeting came two days after an 88-73 home loss to Santa Clara, in which Santa Barbara was down 21-2 after the first seven minutes and trailed by 30 points with 13 minutes to play.

"It was a culmination of a number of factors," Cunningham said of the players' dissatisfaction. "It's no fun to lose and they were looking for solutions."

Gaucho Volleyball Makes Final Eight Crawford, Gehlke All-Americans

The UCSB women's volleyball team went where it had never been before — the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championships. But it was there that the Gauchos met the team that owns the national tournament.

Santa Barbara had a good run at the Final Four, but ran into a Stanford squad that simply couldn't be stopped. The Cardinal de-feated UCSB 15-12, 15-12, 15-3 on Dec. 13 in Maples Pavilion, and nine days later went on to win its third national championship in the past four years.

The Gauchos managed to put a good scare into the Stanford juggernaut, pulling within a point at 13-12 in games one and two. The sec-

Women's Basketball Earns Votes in National USA Today Poll

So many wins, so little space to recap them in.

The UCSB women's basketball team posted a 6-2 record during the past month, including two road wins over top-30 programs, to finish its nonconference schedule. The Gauchos (9-4 overall) have been rewarded for their solid play, garner-ing 16 votes in the latest USA Today college basketball poll.

"We're very pleased at this point to be 9-4," Santa Barbara Head Coach Mark French said. "Being such a young team and with the schedule we played, anything above .500 is outstanding."

At least a small portion of UCSB's success can be attributed to luck, which the squad was graced with in an 82-79 win at San Diego State on Dec. 15. With two seconds remaining and the score deadlocked at 79-79, Santa Barbara sophomore point guard Stacy Clinesmith took an inbounds pass and let fly a shot as time expired that somehow found the basket - a mere 65 feet away.

"I was a little far out, but time was running out so I thought I'd better shoot it," said Clinesmith, who paced the team with 17 points. "I've never done that before in a game. It was pretty neat."

UCSB then got a breather, easily defeating McNeese State (La.) 95-75 in a game that saw every Gaucho tally at least one point.

Men's Hoops Falters to 3-7 Mark

It's obvious that the team has talent. What's not so clear is just why they can't seem to win a game.

The UCSB men's basketball team has struggled through a 3-7 preseason, winning only one game against a Division I opponent in those 10 contests. The latest casualty, a 69-66 loss to Pepperdine on Saturday in the Thunderdome, was typical of the Gauchos' woeful season.

Santa Barbara had an eight-point lead at halftime but saw it quickly deteriorate thanks to an abundance of

turnovers to begin the second half. The Gauchos looked confused on offense, especially when the Waves went to a zone defense a few minutes into the period, and could only get their leading scorer Raymond Tutt two shots in the second half.

Maybe it is clear why they've only won three games.

Senior forward Dwayne Williams, who responded to regaining his spot in the starting lineup by scoring a team-high 15 points, is just as curious as Gaucho fans are as to why Santa Barbara can't play 40 minutes of good basketball.

"I don't know. I wish I

had an answer," Williams said of his team's collapse early in the second half. "That first five minutes of the second half really killed us. I think we'd have won the game if we came out to play the first part of the second half ... We always have a good first half. We just have to put 40 minutes together."

Santa Barbara had a chance at a win down the stretch when Tutt took his first shot of the second half and drained a three from the wing to pull his team to within three points. But that was as close as it would get, as UCSB missed its remain-

In the final game of the tournament Santa Barbara ran into a brick wall: host school University of Hawai'i. The Rainbow Wahine raced out to a 17-0 lead and then put the game in cruise control, blowing out UCSB 91-66.

After a well-deserved break for Christmas, the squad went looking for redemption on a two-game swing through Colorado.

On Dec. 28, the Gauchos engaged in an old-fashioned shoot-out with #27 Colorado State, rallying from 12 points down in the second half to pull out a 105-98 victory. Freshman guard Erin Buescher had a monster game, scoring 24 points to go along with 13 boards in her first collegiate start.

Santa Barbara's good fortunes continued two days later against #21 University of Colorado, as the squad never trailed en route to an 83-77 upset in Boulder. The wellbalanced Gauchos were led in scoring this time by sophomore forward Kristi Rohr, who poured in 26.

Last Friday UCSB was dealt a scare by Loyola Marymount University, trailing the lightly-regarded Lions well into the second half before taking care of the task at hand 99-84.

"This match has to go as one of the best because it's under pressure in the NCAA tournament," Gregory said. "We knew that Texas was a great physical team. I would say it's the best team effort and I think offensively it was one of our best performances."


