BUI, MIP, IVFP, UCPD-Are You Ready for UCSB, Freshman?

Many students may enter UCSB with visions of kegs and burning couches dancing in their heads. However, while Isla Vista is far from parties at mom and dad's, there are still a few basic guidelines to follow in order to avoid a confrontation with I.V.'s police force, the Isla Vista Foot Patrol.

Public intoxication, minor in possession, urinating in public and disturbing the peace were the most common citations given last year by IVFP officers. "Trying to light a couch on fire will only get you a night at the county jail," I.V. resident Dane Marin, a Santa Stay composed when encountering I.V. law enforcestudent, said.

"The community of I.V. accounts for almost 57 percent of all alcoholrelated crimes in all of the county of Santa Barbara," according to IVFP's Lt. Butch Arnoldi. Last year, between Sept. 1, 1999, and June 30, 2000, the IVFP made 741 public intoxication arrests and wrote 971 tickets for disturbing the peace.

Arnoldi said the IVFP would enforce a zero-tolerance policy during the first few months of school, beginning Sept. 8, as they have in years past. "Last year we had about 22 officers per shift each night. This year during the fall education, we'd like to increase it to about 27 or 28," he said. "You have to understand that we don't see people who are intoxicated as suspects, we view them as potential victims.'

According to Lt. Arnoldi, students should be aware of the diversity within I.V.'s 20,000 residents. "This is a community not solely made up of students, it's only 50 percent students," he said. "We have to look out for the well being of the entire community. I caution new students when they're inviting buddies from home ... if they know they

have a propensity towards violence, don't invite them here."

While the list of I.V. dos and don'ts is mostly common sense, a few are unique to the town, such as a citation for biking under the influence, or a BUI.

"Have fun, but be careful, hold your cup upside down, don't ever drive down [Del Playa Drive] at night," three-year I.V. resident Amaya Wilcox said. "And be careful as women. There's a lot of dumb shits out there."

According to Arnoldi, the Foot Patrol is happy to give warnings if the suspects are cooperative. "Treat us with respect and we'll treat you with respect," he said.

The History of the WEP

the Isla Vista Foot Patrol has weathered the test of time to become an I.V. institution.

The Isla Vista Foot Patrol was founded 30 years ago, after riots was limited to one heat from the Santa Barbara Sheriff's Dept. Carmen Lodise, author of Isla Vista: A Citizen's History said, protests stemmed from "students' unhappiness with everything versity, ... the war in Vietnam."



Going Bipedal in SoCal's **Obsessive Car Culture**

Southern California has an almost pathological fetish for the automobile. Two-thirds of L.A. is covered in streets, freeways, parking lots - and the disease is

Two hours north at UCSB, the air is cleaner and Highway 101 is less congested, but symptoms of the disease are on the rise.

Years of poor zoning enforcement in nearby Isla Vista have left residents' autos parked three-deep in some driveways. Many students don't have off-street parking, and cars line up bumper to bumper along the curb's during the school year.

UCSB Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Coordinator James Wagner helps victims of the car culture get out of their cars and into carpool, rideshare and other less traffic-intensive modes of trans-

Wagner and TAP's latest efforts include a voucher good for six free days of parking on campus, as well as other benefits for drivers using alternative transportation like

buses, carpools and bicycles. Wagner encourages drivers to be "multimodal."

"Use the bus when you can, use your bike when you can, take advantage of other ways to commute. It's better for your health, and better for the environ-

UCSB's Parking Services actively discourages driving for on-campus and nearby residents. Those living within a two-mile radius of campus (I.V., Tropicana, Francisco

Torres) are not allowed to purchase yearly parking permits. Also, drivers living on-campus must enter a lottery for parking spots.

According to UCSB Parking Services data, there have been no freshmen losers in past lotteries, but yearly permits range from \$252-\$315. The permits are also restricted to the lots furthest away from most dorms.

Wagner said the price of owning and maintaining an auto, in addition to permit costs and high local gas prices, can dissuade most new students from bringing their cars. A national survey, compiled yearly by the Automotive Association of America, puts the cost of owning a vehi-


cle at 48 cents per mile - including registration, insurance, maintenance, gas, etc ...

But the AAA study also averaged the yearly price of gas at \$1.26 per gallon. Gas prices in Santa Barbara hover around \$1.80, and have been known to shoot past \$2.00 per gallon during shortages.

UCSB's 6,000-plus supply of parking spaces will be unable to meet projected demands in the 2000-2001 year, and the trend of more cars than space is not expected to stop in the coming years. Fees are also expected to rise with the smaller supply.

Despite an increasingly bleak future of traffic and congestion, over 73 percent of people answering a recent traffic survey said they drive alone to work. The survey was conducted by the Santa Barbara County Association of Governments, in cooperation with employers throughout the South Coast. In contrast, only 10 percent of the 12,000 respondents said they biked, walked



UCSB Attracts a Few Good Freshmen

The record number of applicants that swamped UCSB's admissions office last fall has been pared down to the 3,598 students who agreed to attend, making this group one of the smallest entering classes in years - and also one of the most qualified.

UCSB granted Fall 2000 admission to 14,692 of the 31,232 students who applied last November. While the number of students accepted was higher than the number in 1998 (14,452) or 1999 (14,384), the number of students returning Statements of Intent to Register dropped from 4,038 last year. The number of freshmen who actually enroll will

be about 3,350, former Admissions Director Bill Villa said in June.

The average number of campuses applied to by UCSB applicants jumped from 3.8 last year to 4.1 this year, which may explain the decrease in SIRs, Chancellor Henry Yang said.

Although their numbers are smaller than in the past two years, the entering class continued a six-year trend of increased GPA and test scores. The mean high school GPA is a 3.72 this year, up from 3.69 in 1999 and 3.67 in 1998. The average SAT increased to 1187, from 1179 in 1999 and 1163 in 1998.

"Due to the rapid rise in the national and international recognition of UCSB as a premier research university, we are



Involvement With A.S. Provides Opportunites for New Gauchos

How much government are you buying for 47 bucks a quarter?

Roughly 17,000 undergraduates pay Associated Students \$46.75 every quarter and the organization works with a budget of over \$2,700,000. A.S. monies pay for a range of services, such as coastal cleanup, concerts and childcare. A.S. also provides partial funding for student organizations like Habitat for Humanity and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

Although every UCSB student is a member of A.S., only about 200 are actively involved in student government. These students occupy A.S.'s four executive posts and 23 internal committees, and in the course of the school year, collectively receive \$66,000 in honoraria (payment for services ren-

dered). The A.S. president, internal vice president, external VP for local affairs and EVP for statewide affairs all receive free tuition to UCSB while in office. Executive

officers have discretionary campus involvement. budgets of \$1,000-\$17,000. Within A.S. the most powerful committee the 21-member Legislative Council, which has final say over all nonjudicial matters.

A.S. Acting Executive Director Paige Anderson said the organization exists for students to protect and serve themselves.

"It is student government and student services. Student government helps protect student interests at the university. Through the system of government, students have a voice in how UCSB functions and affects their lives," Anderson said. "Student services directly give back to the students through things like the bike shop, lecture notes and the Community Affairs Board."

President Mahader Tesfai said A.S. is a way for students to reach out to the world around them.

"It's a great way to get involved. There are a lot of organizations, cultural and social, you can get into," Tesfai said. "Like this fall, you could help people register to vote."

EVPLA Alejandro Juarez said what A.S. accomplishes depends on

"What A.S. does depends on what students do. We have a say in all student matters at the university and in Isla Vista," he said. "We're the students' voice."

Anderson said A.S. is also a place for students to

"What is really important about A.S. is that it provides opportunities leadership opportunities, growth opportunities and learning opportunities. It is an opportunity to be a part of something special and unlike anything else on this campus. It's an opportunity for incredible diversity. People here have a wide range of backgrounds and views," he said. "When you leave A.S. you can look back and know you were a part of something larger than yourself."

Tesfai said students interested in A.S. should visit the office, which is located on the east wing of the UCen.



Science Institute, built in 1966, keeps the lagoon full by pumping seawater into the pond. The area also collects rainwater and runoff, so the water becomes fresher in the winter rainy season. One drain services the area, dumping overflow into the ocean at Depressions Beach.

The characteristic odor, particularly bad in the summer and fall, is the smell of death and

Try Not To Believe Everything You Hear, Read

Every flock of sheep needs a shepherd to direct them, and likewise, every UCSB freshman needs the *Daily Nexus* to point out the bumps and falsehoods in the collegiate road.

When beginning the four- to six-year college experience, most waste their first year trying to acclimate to the culture and beliefs of their new home. So, as a sign of good faith, the *Daily Nexus* has produced a partial list of what should be known to have a successful college career.

UCSB is a world-renowned university and the research department is among the best in the nation, but perhaps more importantly, each year our small college town swallows up 1 percent of the alcohol produced annually in the United States. Permitted to build five miles offshore on sites previously used as oil rigs, California became the first state in the U.S. to approve offshore gaming. The casinos are still present today, can be seen from the cliffs of Del Playa and are highly popular among the 18- to 20-year-old college

Yet, despite the unique culture and rich history that our small seaside hamlet possesses, it is the gullibility of each class of incoming freshmen that best defines I.V.'s student population. And for the truly naïve, the *Nexus* shall spell it out for you—The above information is only a compilation of I.V. folklore, part of a rich tradition of snowing each incoming class.

Now that the slate has been wiped clean, the *Daily Nexus* would like to offer the newly incoming class good luck and the following list of truths in order to combat the folklore that many are ready to spring on you.

New Convocation Ceremony Planned to Greet Freshmen

Before the first day of class begins, new Gauchos will have a chance to meet their professors at the first-ever UCSB convocation, a ceremony to welcome incoming freshmen and transfer students.

The afternoon ceremony will be held Monday, Sept. 18, from 4 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. on the Faculty Club Green. Convocation will also include faculty/student meetings from 7-8 p.m. in all the on- and off-campus residence halls.

According to Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs Michael Young, convocation "is not a new idea." Many campuses already have an official welcoming ceremony for the incoming students. Office of Student Life Special Project Coordinator Barbra Ortiz said she felt the event is "long overdue."

The event will have about 80 staff members in full academic garb as well as a speech by author and motivational speaker Dr. Bertice Barry. According to Debbie Fleming, the Associate Dean of Students and one of convocation's founders, the event is meant to officially welcome new students to UCSB as a campus and a community.

Fleming said she hopes convocation will "help faculty and staff make a personal connection with students." Young strongly urged new students to attend the cer-

emony and the following meetings.

"Students have a myriad of obligations to the faculty [and] to each other," he said. Young added that the administration has an obligation "to share with the students what those responsibilities and expectations are."

Ortiz also spoke of significance in the ceremonial aspect of the convocation.

"[Students] need to develop a sense of being a part of something, to find out what UCSB is all about — to find out what being a Gaucho is all about," she said.

Although the event is aimed at incoming freshmen, all students, faculty and members of the community are welcome to attend.

Transfer students living in the residence halls will be able to attend a meeting in the State Street Room of the University Center, or in the Jameson Center at Santa Ynez Apartments. The ceremony will also be broadcast online at www.bookstore.ucsh.edu.

Fraternities and Sororities Set to Rush in Fall Quarter 2000







increasingly becoming a campus of choice," Yang said. "Consequently, the measures of quality of each successive freshman class have been increasing and are expected to continue to increase."

The numbers place UCSB fourth among University of California schools in average GPA and SAT score, behind Berkeley, Los Angeles and San Diego, according to Villa.

"More and more people are putting Santa Barbara down as a place they want to consider coming to," he said. "When you have that kind of demand, you obviously are going to get a better class."

"We were able to admit only 45 percent of the applicant pool," he added. "When you're in an environment like that, the quality tends to go up."

The incoming class is also slightly

more diverse than that of 1999. Thirty-eight percent of the applicants who returned SIRs are minorities, up three percent from last year. The class is 62 percent Caucasian, 14 percent Asian, Pacific Islander, East Indian and Pakistani, 12 percent Chicano, 5 percent Latino, 3 percent African-American, 3 percent Filipino and 1 percent American Indian.

"UCSB has made an institutional effort to the recruitment and retention of minority students," Yang said. "We have also increased our programmatic activities in the school-centered and student-centered outreach efforts."

The percentage of minority students enrolled has increased every year since 1994, climbing from 15.2 percent (2,497 students) in 1994 to 18.2 percent (3,244 students) in 1999. The numbers for 2000 will not be available until the final enrollment numbers are recorded.


Hepatitis, Small Waves, Tar Define I. V. Surfing

By the time I first arrived at UCSB as a freshman in 1997, I had surfed once in my life ... and never stood up. But that didn't stop me. I bought a used Hobie for \$250 in downtown Santa Barbara my first week in Isla Vista and took to the sea without hesitation.

That was the year of El Niño, and I'd be a liar to say surfing was easy to pick up. I vividly remember what seemed like 10foot winter waves crashing me into the rocks at Sands Beach. I thought for sure that would be the day that I died, but persistence can do much for one's fortune. And now, over three years later, I.V. swells seem tame.

Four I.V. beaches — Sands, Devereux, Depressions and Campus Point — usually have surfable waves every season except summer, but of minimal sizes. Small waves

Excercise Made Easy With a Variety of Activities, Good Campus Facilities

Legend has it that in a college student's first year, they will gain 15 pounds. Welcome to UCSB; here's your schedule, perm number, books, independence and love handles. You can blame it on over-consuming dorm food, alcohol and decreased physical activity, or you can quit pointing the finger and do something about it.

A healthy exercise program generally consists of three to five workouts per week at 65 to 85 percent of your potential for a duration of at least 20 minutes (at least that's what I've repeatedly read and what my sports psychology instructor taught). Another tidbit I learned in sports psychology is that at each level of athletic competition, only 1 percent of athletes advance. That means from high school, only about 1 percent of athletes go on to play in college, and from college, only 1 percent make it to the professional level. The 99 percent of high school athletes that no longer have team workouts need to find a substitute for the motivation of a coach. Fortunately, there are plenty of opportunities to exercise locally.

Consider taking a physical activities class. Knowing you'll receive a grade may help ensure that you'll work out. Whether your preferred sport is traditional like basketball, volleyball, soccer or swimming, or a little less common like badminton, synchronized swimming or squash, it is probably offered through the physical activities department for credit. You can even take advantage of courses that few colleges in the nation can offer — like boating and sailing.

The Recreation Center also offers classes. Theses classes, listed in the quarterly Leisure Review catalogue (available at the RecCen), are usually offered for a fee and won't end up on your transcript.

If you want to get your exercise away from campus, pick up a copy of The City of Santa Barbara's Parks & Recreation Guide. Like the RecCen, the city offers numerous classes to help you stay active. They offer tennis, aquatics, softball, golf, and many dance and fitness classes for a fee.

Each of these options will keep you fit, create an exercise routine, and allow you to meet new people. Studies show that people who work out with a partner or group are more likely to maintain an exercise program. However, if you're more of a solitary athlete, your options are still numerous.

The UCSB campus is an ideal location for runners. Take a jog around the lagoon and out toward Isla Vista and the Devereux slough, or head down to the Goleta Pier. For a longer run or bike workout you can follow the bike path past Goleta Beach and out to Hollister, which you can take to Fairview before looping back toward campus by way of the airport.

If you're going to be working out after dark it may be safer to stay indoors. The RecCen facilities include treadmills, stationary bikes, stair steppers and other cardiovascular machines that allow you to get an aerobic workout while staying in one place, and possibly squeezing in some reading for class. A couple of the on-campus residence halls have their own small gyms. Ask your RA about using these facilities if you want to eliminate the travel time to the RecCen from your workout.

With so many options for exercise, the hard part isn't finding a way to work out — it's sticking to it. Research shows that 50 percent of people who begin an exercise program drop out within the first six months. Here are some tips to help create an exercise program that will

1.) Exercise in the morning. Afternoon or evening exercise plans are much more likely to be interrupted by other activities. If you exercise in the morning you won't be tired out from the day, yet, you get it out of the way and you start the day feeling alive.

2.) Write down your goals. You can even sign a contract with yourself. Make it a commitment.

3.) Create goals that have to do with time, not distance. Studies show this works better. Who am I to argue with science?

beaches from many of Southern California's other beaches, but what truly makes local beaches special is a far less appreciated trait: the tar. Devereux and Sands beaches are located on either side of what is known as Coal Oil Point - a natural oil reserve. While the oil-leaks from underwater pipelines have been known to blacken the water, natural seepage occurs regardless. Any seasoned I.V. surfer keeps a bottle of baby oil at home.

Campus Point and Devereux are recommended for those eager to paddle out for the first time, since both usually have relatively small waves and slower-breaking waves, which give a novice more time to stand up. Both spots are point-break rights and typically have a lower tar content than their beach-break alternatives.

Fall and spring waves usually range from one to four feet tall. The Channel Islands are the reason for this - Santa Cruz Island in particular — since they shield I.V. and Santa Barbara beaches from ocean swells.

Although the islands block many swells, winter waves can often surge overhead. Winter runoff from streams and the

Campus Lagoon can also affect local surfing by contaminating the water and even leading to sporadic cases of hepatitis.

For incomers with an extensive surfing background, local beaches may not supply enough of a boarder's daily dose of thrills. Santa Barbara City College student Mitch Boydston, a 10-year surfing veteran, said the islands are a main reason he and friends venture an hour north to Jalama looking for waves.

"People who are trying to learn how, go to Campus Point or Devereux because there is a safety net since they are point breaks," he said. "If you're a lazy pothead like me, then you'll be surfing Depressions ... that could also mean you

just don't have a car."

During those seasons, the Lagoon's algae multiply forth, using up much of the oxygen in the water and causing the death of other material. The algae, called enteromorpha "what most people call pond scum," University of California Natural Reserve Co-Director Kevin Lafferty said blankets the surface of the lagoon. This other material decomposes and sinks, until wind - common in the late afternoon blows through and turns over the water column, exposing the decaying material to the surface.

"[The smell] is not a sign of anything bad ecologically," Lafferty said.

Deeper than six feet in some parts, the bottom of the lagoon is a mixture of mud and chunks of rock. Lafferty, who works out of Science Marine

Institute, claimed to have stood in the water up to his neck - both for research purposes and to retrieve errant Frisbees.

While Lafferty has braved the waters, the lagoon is not the place to try out new water wings. "It's not appropriate for swimming," he said. "You don't want to ingest a lot of lagoon water. It's not fatal, but it's a rich system, so it's got a lot of bacteria."

Lafferty also cautioned against swimming in the ocean near the drain, due to the bacteria in the lagoon water. "Surfing over at Depressions in the winter, when the runoff is high, might pose a health risk," he said.

The bacteria are part of a diverse ecological habitat, which helps the lagoon serve a purpose as a testing ground for researchers and a classroom for biology students.

There are four common fish in the lagoon, none of which are longer than five inches, Lafferty said. These include: top smelt, killi fish, mosquito fish and mudsuckers. In the past, leopard sharks and striped bass have made a home in the pool, but such occurrences are too rare to encourage prospective

"There's no prohibition on sport fishing," Lafferty added. "But, there's no sport fish."

In addition to fish, the lagoon is home to a variety of marine invertebrates such as horn snails, which patrol the outer edges.

The lagoon also hosts an assortment of birds. "It's an incredibly rich habitat for ducks, gulls, terns, pelicans and shorebirds, and also herons and egrets," Lafferty said. "Most people who try to search for some sort of ecological value find it very easily in the number and diversity of bird species that use the habi-


