TO OUR NEW FRIENDS WE SUGGEST----

For new students who are not familiar with Santa Barbara, El Gauchito offers some suggestions about local restaurants and entertainment spots.

For light snacks and after-date coffee we suggest the Oasis, on upper State Street; Broome's at 109 E. Anapamu; and Pete's on upper State Street. Kerry's, also on upper State Street, is perhaps the favorite Gaucho meeting-place and has the additional advantage of offering re-fills on coffee. Those who prefer drive-ins will find good food at reasonably low prices at the Twinburger, 2731 Hollister Avenue or at any of the three Blue Onion drive-ins.

Kerry's also serves dinners in the coffee-shop and, for more special occasions, in the dining-room. For Italian dinners we suggest Mon's Italian Village at 421 East Cota Street, and Arnoldi's Cafe at 600 Olive Street. The Golden Dragon Steak House serves both Chinese and American food in a Chinese atmosphere. The last three are also good places for evening entertainment, especially Mom's which provides dance music, both canned and live.

East Beach is a popular afternoon resort for students, and for those who prefer to do their swimming in a plunge, the Municipal Pool is located at West Beach. The local pub, the Spigot, is located at 2611 De la Vina Street and offers a refuge from the summer heat both in the afternoon and in the evening.

For informal dates, Santa Barbara provides the obiquitous bowling alley, at 14 Hast Figueroa Street and the Roller Rink at 325 Motor Way. Santa Barbara also boasts of the usual number of movie houses. Special attractions, however,

are the Goleta drive-in, located in Goleta right next to the airport, and the California Theatre at 20 West Canon Perdido. The California bills older pictures, but good ones, and the price of admission is just about half of that of the other shows. The Lobero Theatre presents drama on the stage rather than on the screen. Some of the productions feature strictly local talent, but the majority feature prominent professional troupes.

The Harbor Restaurant, at the end of Stearne's Wharf, is one of the more plush Santa Barbara dining places, and El Cielito, on middle State Street, also offers good food in a sophisticated atmosphere. The El Cortijo Chuck Wagon, 915 Coast Highway, provides all you can eat for \$1.75 per plate.

The Flamingo Room, also on the highway, is a favorite rendevous for those who like loud music in a small room. The orchestra features jazz, and welcomes the participation of any patrons who can bring along an instrument. Some rather weird effects are produced in the club by the periodical use of florescent lighting. Another popular night club is the Pink Cricket, located just across the highway from the El Cortijo.

The El Gauchito has not attempted a full coverage of all Santa Barbara attractions, but has morely listed a few suggestions.

CAFETERIA BEGINS SERVICE TODAY

The Cafeteria opens its doors today for the Summer Session with a different type service than during the Spring Sem.

During the Summer the Cafeteria will be open only from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and will serve only a snack bar lunch. The Snack Shack, however, will be open from 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

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LIBRARY BEGINS NEW FINE SYSTEM; FINE DELINQUENCY TO GET PENALTY

There will be a change in business office procedures in regard to payment of bills beginning June 18, it has been announced by the Library Department.

Failure to pay library fines within 15 days of the time they are sent will be penalized by an additional one dollar fee, instead of the previous penalty of five cents per day. The date by which the bill must be paid will be stamped clearly on the bill. Bills are paid at the Cashier's Office in Building E, not in the library.

Fine scales range from 25 cents an hour for overdue reserved books to 25cts. for the first three days overdue for most books in the main library. The full fine scale is posted on the circulation desk in the main library.

EXTENSION HOLDS NATURE INSTITUTE

Recreation and study will be combined and held in the mountains, coastal plains and seashore, at the Institute of Nature Study and Conservation to be held in Santa Barbara July 30 thru August 11.

Four morning classes are offered. They are in the fields of seashore life, elementary science methods, native birds, and western trees. Afternoon sessions will include a comprehensive survey of conservation problems.

The Institute is being held by University Extension in cooperation with the Museum of Natural History and the Botanic Gardon.

Any interested individual may attend the Institute, but holders of a Bacheler's Degree or a teaching credential may obtain three units of upper division elective credit.
