FAULKNER ANNOUNCES MUSIC COLONY PLANS

Climaxing the most successful All Southern California High School orchestra concert in the four year history of the event, Maurice Faulkner, chairman, announced that three scholarships would be awarded to members of the orchestra and that plans for a summer music colony are being developed.

The two-week summer session will be held in August, with approximately 75 students participating. They will study and practice about four hours a day under the leadership of outstanding teachers. The remainder of their time will be devoted to recreation and other activities.

A tentative program calls for three concerts to be given in the outdoor bowl, the first at the end of the first week, the second on the following Wednesday, and the third at the end of the second week. According to Mr. Faulkner's budget, about \$2,000 worth of tickets must be sold in advance.

This plan was worked out by Faulkner and Harold Martin, student body manager, last summer. Since

that time, the symphony committee has been working on the project in order to present the proposed program to the students participating in the high school concert.

Clarence Phelps, president of the college, has approved the idea, and all of the instructors attending the concert were very enthusiastic about the proposal. Peter Meremblum, conductor, believes the plan is "excellent."

Faulkner hopes to start the music colony this summer. As soon as all of the problems have been solved, he will send applications to Southern California high school students.

The concert this year was a huge success. More than 200 students applied for membership in the orchestra, and a record-breaking total of 155 were accepted.

The scholarships are to be awarded to outstanding members of the orchestra for a year's study at the college. One was donated by the Rotary Club and the other two by the Associated Students. The winners will be announced as soon as possible.

Students Sign Matriculation Book

To understand more clearly the significance of Matriculation day, which was last Friday, February 25, a quotation follows taken from the college catalog. "Beginning freshmen are accepted on a tentative basis during their first semester. At the end of their first semester, their record is checked. Those who have made a "C" or better on a program of not less than 12 units of work are matriculated in regular standing." This is one way the College takes of putting the stamp of approval on a student's work; the student has now proven that he is truly college material.

Matriculating students are now invited to sign their names along with other successful candidates, in the Matriculation Book in the office of the Dean of the Lower Division. This may be done at their earliest convenience. Consult the lists on the Bulletin Board as to which students have matriculated.

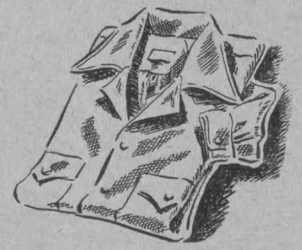

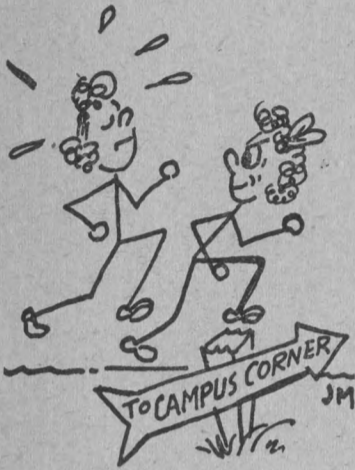

Captain Fuller spoke of how the Air Wacs would take the place of ground crews here in the United States and enable the men here to be sent to the areas of battle to replace the men who have been there at the front for in some instances three years.
