The Butterflies' Journey by Rachelle Douglas-Fox, Anna Nichols, and Wili Soto

Every year the Monarch Butterflies fly back to the Eucalyptus over in Ellwood. They come there to mate and stay a few months in nice weather. When they are done mating, they fly over to Morelia, Michoacán in México. Half of them die before they get there, but the babies they left behind start the journey. They start in Canada, go to Ellwood, then to México. After México, they go back to Canada and start it all over again. January and February would be the best times if you want to see them. Monarchs are not the prettiest butterfly, but they are prettier than most. No other butterflies migrate like the monarch. From Ellwood it takes them 700 miles to reach Morelia, Michoacán.

The Indians in México would put designs of the monarch on clothes and other important things because they were so beautiful. Monarchs do not prefer rain but they can take it.

As a caterpillar, it eats a lot and it has to shed its skin every week! When he is out of his old skin he eats it! In two or three weeks it is ready to go into its chrysalis. It attaches to a stick and starts spinning. A week later, you can see the butterfly. In 12 days, the cocoon will split and you have a butterfly. When it comes out it dries off its wings so it can fly. Once its wings are dry and it has been at least a month, they are ready for the long journeys.

A Tribute to Cesar Chávez

CESAR CHAVEZ by Vikki Ellis Ms. Akyuz's Fourth Grade Class

Cesar Chávez lived on a farm in Arizona, with his parents and five brothers and sisters. In 1937, Cesar Chávez was ten years old. One day his parents told him they couldn't stay on the farm because of taxes. If they didn't pay they would lose their home to the state. They did not earn enough money that year for taxes. They went to a priest for help, but the priest had no money to give.

People were worried that they would lose their home and they didn't know what they would to. Then one day men came form Yuma to get people to work on farms in California. They told the people with no money that they could earn great money. The Chávez family talked about it and they decided they wanted to go to Califor-

One hot day they packed up and left with their six children and headed for California. They were not happy to leave their house but they were excited to go to California. Cesar's family knew they could earn money for school and for them to learn English.

Finally, they reached the farm. Their jobs were to pick fruits and vegetables. All the homes were made out of sheet metal and had one room. They didn't

want to live there. They got tired and moved into a shack.

One rainy day they had no money and so they wrote to their family in Arizona and asked for money. The relatives in Arizona sent them money for them to buy gas to get them to Los Angeles. Mrs. Chávez got out of the car and sold the lace to people so they could buy food and gas.

When Cesar finished eighth grade he had been to about three dozen schools because his family had little work and had to move in the winter to find jobs.

Cesar and his father would go around and pick cigarette and bubble gum packages and make it into a ball and then they would sell it. They bought two shirts and a pair of tennis shoes with the money. He would go to owners and ask for more money and better houses.

A little while later World War II had begun so Cesar joined the Navy. Before it had begun Cesar met a girl named Helen.

One day he took Helen out to the movies. The usher told him he was sitting where Anglos sit, and that he had to move. But he and Helen would not move so they kicked him and Helen out to the movie theater. Cesar was very angry. He said he would work day and night to get justice. After World War II ended Cesar and Helen got married.

One day an Anglo came. He wanted to talk to Cesar but Cesar had been cheated by the Anglos. The Anglo's name was Fred Ross. Then when he met Fred he found out that Fred wanted to help Cesar and the workers.

Cesar was very pleased. Cesar said Fred could help him and the workers.

He took a job at C. S. O. (Community Service Organization) and he earned three-hundred-twenty five thousand dollars.

In March 1962, he was thirty five. He and Helen had children then. Helen and Cesar earned one million two hundred dollars. They made an organization called N. F. W. A. (National Farm Workers Association). The next three years he did everything he was supposed to do.

Workers still would have to work hours and hours without giving them time to stop and rest. Cesar wanted to change all of this. He wanted farm workers to get more money and

In 1965, people became very tired of not getting enough money. They demanded \$1.40 per hour and 25¢ per box. Then they went on a strike and wouldn't work until they got better pay. The people still wouldn't pay them. They had the strike for many weeks. Finally the people agreed to give them more money so they went back to work.

On January 1968, fifty people drove in a school bus to New York. Other people went to different cities and they went to those places to ask owners not to sell grapes and people not to buy them. Everyone wanted to help boycott grapes. Truck drivers refused to bring grapes to other states and refused to bring them to stores. In 1968, the boycott of grapes spread throughout the country. Now the farmers have better homes, get rest periods, and their children go to


Camp Food


I think the Little Buddies program is a great idea because the little buddies can get confidence in knowing about basically what's going to happen to them in the future.



Kirsten: I wanted to become a mediator because I want to help the school become a better place and I also thought it would help me improve my person.


Nathan: How many other kids got to be mediators?
