Fire Sweeps Through I.V. Apartments; 100 Homeless

Almost 100 Isla Vista residents lost their homes Thursday when an early morning fire engulfed the top floor of an Abrego Road apartment building, causing an estimated \$1 million in

Residents, mostly UCSB students, escaped injury and fled to the street as smoke and flames billowed through the roof of the three-story complex. About 14 apartments were destroyed and another 30-40 left uninhabitable from water damage.

Salvage efforts prevented destruction of much of the tenants' personal property, but County Fire Department Captain Charlie Johnson said it was likely more water damage would appear.

"I heard someone outside yelling

fire, I went out and saw all this smoke just billowing out from the roof. I ran on the deck banging on doors and windows yelling fire. Other people were on the roof, they had no hoses, no fire extinguishers. There was nothing we could have

done," said Tim Pearson, a resident and a former UCSB student.

Firefighters battled flames for nearly three hours before extinguishing the blaze. As units arrived at 8:35 a.m., the roof and attic of the Penthouse Apartments at 6621 Abrego Rd. were already in flames, said Keith Cullom, fire department public service officer.

'People were panicking hysterically; I saw a woman run out of her apartment screaming. Her arms were full of stuff and she was just crying. The fire department came right away. The flames were maybe five feet high before they started spraying the roof, then more smoke came billowing through and the roof became a torch," Pearson

Santa Barbara County Supervisor Bill Wallace, who has lived in I.V. since 1970, said he has not seen such a large fire in I.V. "since the bank (of America) burned."

Although investigations are expected to finish today, fire officials believe the fire was accidental, Johnson said. They speculate the blaze may have begun in the building's heating system.

"I heard crackling stuff coming under the heater and caught pieces of the charcoal (burning debris)," said Freddy Amaya, who was Everything was black and wet,"

"I realized what was happening

and ran around and told everyone there was a fire ... then we punched in the hose and started putting water on the fire," Amaya said.

Firefighters initially thought an overload of electrical appliances or an electrical wiring short may have caused the fire. "When it's cold like this, everyone cranks up their heaters," fireman Brad Stevens

Stevens added that, "a lot of people don't clean their furnaces,' which could also cause a fire to break out.

Sara Deckett, a junior communication studies major, lost more than \$1,000 worth of valuables. "I heard someone yell 'fire,' and I panicked. I didn't know what to take. I just grabbed some stuff and ran. I didn't know how much time I had, there was so much smoke," she said.

"At 11:30 the fire department took us up in groups to look through the apartments. I went into my room through the heater ducts. I put a pan and it was really light because there was no ceiling. The floor was solid wet ashes and it was kind of spongy. visiting a friend when the fire broke apartment resident Doug Yates said.

Red Cross and University Offer Assistance to Victims of Blaze

UCSB graduate student Daniel Huyto stood on the Abrego Road sidewalk Thursday watching the Penthouse apartment building burn, thinking, "oh god, not me please.

Later, after the fire was out, Huyto walked up to the nira moor to find his apartment completely destroyed, although his belongings were surprisingly intact.

Thursday afternoon, Huyto went to the temporary Red Cross headquarters at the University Religious Center to obtain official confirmation of what he had seen. Hutyo's apartment was one of 14 units demolished during the blaze.

"I'll be staying with friends in I.V. for a while. I'll move into another apartment if I have to. If my apartment's still liveable I will go back," Huyto said at

In the wake of the fire, which left 100 residents homeless, tenants are seeking both temporary and permanent housing as work to repair the 61-unit

Most Penthouse tenants will be able to return to their apartments within two weeks, others will have to wait as long as two months.

Idalia Valero, a Mexico City native, was in Mexico s capital at the time September's devastating earthquake. She now lives in Penthouse apartment 52 with her brother, Jorge, a UCSB student, his two daughters, and her son.

Valero had no knowledge of the fire until she (See SHELTER, p.4)

KCSB Strives to Settle Programming Conflicts

KCSB's Program Review Board currently delegates close to 70 percent of its airtime to non-students, creating tension between students and community members and raising questions about the station's purpose.

While students attend UCSB for four years, community members generally remain here longer, often holding on to shows indefinitely. Theoretically, the station's airtime could be entirely consumed by non-students, Malcolm Gault-Williams, KCSB general manager, said.

"Community members don't leave; in effect, they have tenure. That's exactly the problem," said student News Director Jon Kaplan, who chairs the station's Executive

KCSB's original bylaws give a two-fold statement of purpose. As an Associated Students group, the station should act as a training ground for students interested in radio broadcasting. The second goal says the station is to provide programming that serves the public interest.

According to Gault-Williams, the emphasis placed on each

goal changes yearly. "Lately, there's been a move to stress training for students. Before, the accent was on serving the community with programming," he said.

"People said this isn't a college, but a community station; I think the two goals can work together," Kaplan said.

Most of the slots held by students are not during prime-time hours. Upon achieving eligibility for FM programming, students are typically assigned shows from 2-6 a.m.

"It's not fair that community members hold onto their spots," said Production Director Chris Hopkins. "They claim that students come and go. How can they say that students don't come through? A student worked on Christmas morning and they're doing the 2-6 a.m. shows.'

"Other stations cut you off when you graduate or give you weird hours," agreed Public Relations Coordinator Angela Dunn, a former student.

"I don't think we should get rid of community members, we need them to work with the students," said Kaplan. "Because the students provide the funds, I think the non-students should provide something such as their expertise to legitimize their

According to Program Director Ken Hinton, the UC Regents own the station license and A.S. provides funding, but the Federal Communications Commission defines it as a public service organization.

Because of this, Hinton said the station is obligated to the community to provide the programming done by a majority of non-students — as determined by community interest reports.

However, this year's report is not yet complete, although Community Ascertainment Director Yolanda Marquez is working on it.

Hinton said Program Review is working to eliminate unpopular prime-time shows and bring students into these spots. "But we can't throw them in, we've got to work them in," he

When airtime opened in January, Hinton said his board was able to schedule five new student shows.

Although an administrative ad hoc committee - now investigating the ratio problems — is expected to recommend changes for the station in the next several weeks, ExCom is working to solve the problems internally. To this end, Kaplan, Chief Engineer Steve Sellman and Associated Manager Lauren Warner have drafted 12 programming policy changes.

If passed, these proposals would provide more airtime for students and require community members to help train

Philippines President Marcos Takes Lead in Election Tabulations



MANILA, PHILIPPINES — President Ferdinand E. Marcos was well ahead Thursday in the official vote count by the National Assembly, which his party controls. Corazon Aquino, who claims she won the election, said he must resign to prevent violence.

Aquino's aides reported that another of her campaign workers was killed Thursday, bringing the total since the Feb. 7 presidential election to more than 20.

After seven hours of tabulating tally sheets from the archipelago's 74 provinces and more than 60 cities, the assembly had Marcos ahead with 6,403,785 votes to 5,584,581 for Aquino. That gave Marcos an edge of about 53 percent to

Aquino's 46 percent with about 46 percent of the votes tallied. The assembly's count determines the outcome under Philippine law.

The National Movement for Free Elections, an independent poll-watchers' group called Namfrel, had Aquino ahead in its unofficial count. It gave her 7,158,679 votes to 6,532,362 for Marcos, based on 64 percent of more than 86,000 precincts reporting.

Aquino claims the elections were fraudulent and the National Assembly's canvass is rigged.

The tally sheet delivered to the National Assembly from the president's home province of Ilocos Norte said the votes came from 761 precincts. The province has 624 registered precincts.

"Where they got the other precincts, God knows," opposition assemblyman Marcelo Fernan said, bringing laughter from both the floor and the galleries.

Marcos, who has governed the Philippines for 20 years, appeared on government television and pledged to "honor, without reservations, the people's verdict at the polls."

Cuban Communist Party Program Supports Beliefs of Churchgoers

HAVANA, CUBA - In a fresh signal of Cuba's newly conciliatory attitude toward the Roman Catholic Church, a draft of the Communist Party program for the next five years encourages Cubans to respect the beliefs of churchgoers

The draft calls on Cubans to honor "the moral integrity of believers" and to avoid any practice that could "wound religious sentiments.'

The 187-page document, which has not been made public, will receive final approval at a special party Congress in December after debate at the grassroots level. However, no significant changes are expected from the debate

The draft was prepared by the party hierarchy for a Communist conclave last week.

The proposed policy is consistent with what appears to be a studied efort by the government to improve relations with the long-suffering Catholic community, whose members until recently have considered themselves to be outside the Cuban

Justice Official Says Nazi Officer May Face Prison or Firing Squad

BELGRADE, YUGOSLAVIA - Andrija Artukovic, who was extradited from the United States to stand trial for Nazi war crimes, faces a prison sentence of at least five years and ossibly death by firing squad if he is convicted, a justice official said Thursday.

Yugoslavia accuses the 86-year-old Artukovic of presiding over the deaths of hundreds of thousands of Jews, gypsies, intellectuals and other people when he was interior minister of Croatia, which is part of Yugoslavia. Artukovic's extradition from the United States had been sought for nearly

Artukovic was arrested Nov. 14, 1984, at his home in Seal Beach, California. He had fled Yugoslavia May 5, 1945, and arrived in the United States with a false passport. Yugoslavia declared him a war criminal in 1946.

Lee lacocca Blasts Interior Secretary's **Decision to Fire Him**



HIGHLAND PARK, MICHIGAN - Lee Iacocca said Thursday his ouster as head of the government advisory commission on the Statue of Liberty "borders on being un-American," and said he was fired because he fought commercialization of the project.

Iacocca said he was not certain why Interior Secretary Donald Hodel fired him Wednesday night from the job he has held for four years. But he said he believed it was related to a National Park Service endorsement of a luxury hotel and conference center for Ellis Island, which also is being restored.

He said the plan by the park service, a unit of the Interior Department, would denigrate the historic nature of the island, where immigrants were processed after they arrived in the United States.

The hotel project would be "financed by tax shelters for the rich." Iacocca said. "That's not part of the deal we made with the American people.'

Hodel's action "borders on being un-American," Iacocca said. "A lot of people have worked hard for four years on behalf of this project and so have I, and I don't appreciate being disenfranchised on somebody's whim.'

Iacocca remains head of the private foundation that has raised \$233 million for the project.

"The suddenness of this episode shocked me," Iacocca said, adding that he had been unable to reach President

Drug Enforcement Administrator's Comments Upset Justice Officials

WASHINGTON — Justice Department officials were aghast Thursday over statements by the head of the Drug Enforcement Administration which led to exposure of an undercover investigation into alleged cocaine smuggling by Eastern Airline baggage handlers in Miami, sources said.

A federal grand jury in Miami is receiving evidence in the case and the investigation is continuing, said several law enforcement sources here, who spoke on condition they not

DEA Administrator John C. Lann disclosed the existence of the probe Tuesday following a speech in San Jose, California, after answering a question from the audience concerning cooperation with major airlines in fighting drug

Several Justice Department officials said they were dismayed that Lann would have revealed so much about an ongoing and sensitive undercover operation.

Japan's Extension of Auto Export **Quotas May Increase Car Prices**

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration responded with mixed signals Thursday to Japan's one-year extension of its voluntary auto-export quotas, while the chairman of a House trade subcommittee said the decision could lead to higher prices for both domestic cars and imports.

'Japan will make up the difference by bringing in higher priced cars," said Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Florida. "U.S. manufacturers will jack up their prices. And the U.S. consumer will get shafted."

sident Reagan's special trade representative. Clayton K. Yeutter, denounced Japan's decision to extend the selfimposed quotas through March 31, 1987, saying "export restraints are not the answer" toward easing this nation's \$47.6 billion trade deficit with Japan.

"The United States did not ask Japan (to take the action). This was their decision alone," Yeutter added. "The only real answer is for Japan to open its market further to U.S. products."

But President Reagan's spokesman, Larry Speakes, refused to make any comment on the Japanese move, claiming it was strictly an internal Japanese decision.

Robert Kennedy Aide **Questions Handling of Assassination Papers**



LOS ANGELES - A Robert Kennedy aide who was wounded when the senator was assassinated in 1968 accused the Police Commission of obstructing release of files on the case, drawing an apology but a denial of any coverup.

"You have been using every legal means to obstruct us in getting them. I have grave concerns about the intent of the commission," Paul Schrade told the panel Wednesday

Schrade, a political campaign adviser to Kennedy, was wounded in the head when Sirhan B. Sirhan shot Kennedy after a victory speech at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles the night Kennedy won the 1968 California Democratic presidential primary.

Schrade and others have requested about 50,000 pages of documents related to the assassination. The commission agreed last year to release an edited version of the 1,500-page investigative summary and consider the release of remaining files. Nothing has been released yet.

"This is on its way to becoming a national disgrace in terms of public disclosure," said Philip Melanson, a director of the Robert Kennedy Assassination Archive at Southeastern Massachusetts University

'We have been too slow but I would like to assure you that to the best of my knowledge there has been no coverup; there has been no coverup," said Barbara L. Schlei, the com-

Questions that Schrade and others want answered include whether there is a possibility that more than one assassin shot Kennedy as he walked through the kitchen of the Ambassador Hotel on June 5, 1968. Schrade told the commission that the police account of the shooting doesn't match the ballistics simulation.

Jury Selection Begins in Second Espionage Trial of FBI Agent

LOS ANGELES - Richard W. Miller, the only FBI agent ever charged with espionage, faced a pool of 216 perspective jurors Thursday as the search began for the panel which will judge him in a second trial.

Miller, 49, whose slipshod record with the FBI and losing battle with obesity became issues in his first trial, appeared to have gained considerable weight since his last court appearance.

His first jury deadlocked last November after a four-month trial which focused on Miller's sexual relationship with a confessed Soviet spy, Svetlana Ogorodnikov.

Miller is charged with passing classified documents to Ogorodnikov for the Soviet Union in exchange for a promise of \$65,000 in cash and gold.

The fired agent insists he's innocent and swears his involvement with the woman was part of a maverick plan to infiltrate the Soviet KGB and prove himself a hero to the FBI. Miller was arrested in October 1984 and has been in custody

The prospective jurors spent Thursday answering a 28page questionnaire. It asked about their religious affiliation. particularly if they were members of the Mormon Church, from which Miller was excommunicated.

A.S. to Provide Funds for Refugee Safe House

Associated Students Legislative Council voted Wednesday night to give \$360 to support Central American refugees living in a Los Angeles "safe" house.

According to Eduardo Vorsales, a refugee from El Salvador, the money will help him and two other families to continue living in the house.

Vorsales, speaking through a translator, related his experiences in the Latin American nation. "In 1981, when martial law was imposed in El Salvador ... two men came in

my house and assassinated my brother," he said. "I never have been able to find out the reason for "I have felt discrimination, but I am his murder."

Although some council members had questioned the legality of A.S. funding the safe house, members of the campus Sanctuary movement voiced their support for its funding.

tuary movement voiced their support for its funding.

"It's the U.S. that's breaking international law," Sanctuary movement leader Julie Shayne said, referring to Geneva Convention decisions on U.S. interference with other nations' political instability.

Others spoke of past cases of justified civil disobedience. "(The civil rights movement) with Martin Luther King — they did what was right, rather than what was in the law. If they had kept within the legal system, they wouldn't have gone anywhere," activist Ron Conners said.

Internal Vice President Todd Smith recommended the money be drawn from A.S. representatives' special project funds, which council members use to complete a required project, instead of Finance Board accounts, as originally planned. Smith asked for volunteers from Leg Council to donate their funds to the safe house.

Council members Susan Potter and Claudia Vlasak each agreed to take \$180 out of the account in their names. Vlasak, who has not yet completed her project, must now find alternative sources of funding.

In other business, council passed a by-law change requiring

most of the 29 A.S. board and committee chairs to report at two non-consecutive Leg Council meetings per month. A maximum of eight chairs could report to council at each meeting.

Council member Robert Skripko, author of the bill, explained its need. "All these committees have the potential to be profitable to the students ... if we don't expect responsibility on the part of the chairpersons (to report to council), all we can expect ... is irresponsibility," Skripko said.

Other A.S. officials felt the bill should be passed. "I really like this, because it tells those committee chairs that the party's over," ex-officio member Tom Thurlow said.

"It's important that we know what's going on," council member Jeff Fowler said.

Some student legislators opposed the bill because they felt the reports would slow down council meetings. "I can't handle sitting through five reports per meeting," representative Heidi Peyrefitte said.

Program Board Commissioner Hillary Selesnick thought there should be no limit to the number of chair reports allowed. "By limiting it to only eight people, you're discouraging people from coming, and I don't think that's the purpose

(of the bill)," she said.

Council also overturned a decision by the Committee on Travel and Entertainment which denied External Vice President Rich Laine the necessary funds to attend a UC Students Association meeting at UC Riverside. Council voted to give the funds to council member Cheri Rice, who will substitute for Laine at the meeting.

According to CTE chair Molly Dunbar, Laine did not turn in the appropriate requisition by the day of the meeting, making him ineligible for the funds. Several A.S. officials spoke out against Laine's "lack of responsibility" in not turning in the forms.

"I've been subjected to Rich's irresponsibility two or three times," Skripko said. "Rich is ignoring (CTE regulations) ... he's illegitimatizing the process."

"The students have had more success at filling out the forms than Rich has," Finance Board chair Rick Berry said.

Rice defended Laine's request. "Let's not penalize the Associated Students for some problem that we have in procedure this week," she said.

"It really is much more important that we have a representative there (at the meeting)," council member Kim Alexander said.

Laine said that he did not have time to fill out the forms

because he was away on A.S. business over the past week, but that in the future he will make an effort to get the requisitions to CTE ahead of time.

The UC systemwide office will reimburse A.S. for travel and most food expenditures, he said. The only direct cost to A.S. will be two dinners at the per diem rates.

In Other Business...

Activist Planning Committee position — Council tabled a position paper calling for the disbandment of Dean of Students Leslie Lawson's Activist Planning Committee.

Budget Update — A.S. President Ken Greenstein presented council with a budget breakdown for all extra revenues received Fall Quarter, including funds gained from overenrollment registration fees. Among other things, the breakdown calls for a reimbursement of A.S. honoraria, which were cut due to budgetary deficit problems.


Married Student Housing bus service — A position paper calling for the reinstatement of MTD Line Nine, serving Married Student Housing and the Santa Ynez apartments, was tabled.

Retroactive Honorarium for Jim Hickman — Council tabled a motion which would award Hickman his honorarium for Fall Quarter 1985.

Underwrite Committee minutes overturned — Council overturned an Underwrite Committee decision not to sponsor an Isla Vista Municipal Advisory Committee presentation of Dead Ahead at the I.V. Theatre. Underwrite Chair Dave Plag felt the underwrite was "a reckless use of their authority ... (if Leg Council is to handle these matters), why don't they just disband Underwrite Committee?" he said.

Appointments — Council approved the appointment of Tom Jevins to CTE, but tabled a motion to appoint Bob Marks to the committee.

Coalition Against Apartheid petition — A position paper supporting the efforts of the Coalition Against Apartheid was tabled as per A.S. procedure.



"I was really worried about my apartment," she recalled, speaking broken English. "I think this is best - not to worry. It isn't too bad ... it could have been worse."

"When I was in Mexico City, many people were crazy, running around and doing all kinds of things and it was bad. They always told us to be calm.... I am going to do the same because I don't want to frighten (the children)," Valero said, relaxing in the URC while awaiting her brother's arrival.

"Now I have experience and know you have to wait and be calm.... Maybe that situation (in Mexico) helps me now.'

"(Students) are human, so I feel bad - the same feeling I had in Mexico," Valero said.

She compared Penthouse tenants to Mexican earthquake victims. "I know they live far from their homes and they don't have a lot of money. That makes it harder," she said.

But the Red Cross and the university are working to ease that burden for victims of the fire. And according to Louise Peterson, director of disaster services for the Santa Barbara County chapter of the Red Cross, assistance for displaced tenants is easily obtained.

"It's not that hard to get assistance," she said. "If their apartment was severely water damaged or destroyed by the fire. chances are they're eligible for the aid."

"If the tenants are students, the university will provide housing, both temporary and permanent. Nonstudent tenants will receive clothing, food, and money to pay their rent if needed," Peterson said.

The Red Cross issued several assitance checks Thursday to Penthouse tenants.

'We want to provide a decent living for a few days so students can sort out their lives. Nobody will be out in the cold and unfed," said Everett Kirkelie, director of UCSB housing and residential services.

Thirty-two beds were made available in the lounges of San Miguel Hall, and eight Penthouse tenants took advantage of free meels offered them at campus dining

However, as of 8 p.m. Thursday, none of the fire victims had signed up to spend the night at the dormitory or at the URC. Almost all the Penthouse tenants opted to stay with friends or go home early for the Presidents' Day holiday.

Kirkelie and Red Cross officials expect more Penthouse tenants especially those who had their apartments severely damaged — to seek their services once the victims analyze their long-term housing options.

Seniors Salli Underwood and Leonie Meina said they were going to stay with Meina's aunt in Santa Barbara until they can move back into their water-damaged apartment on the second floor.

"We were lucky. At least our stuff didn't get burned," Underwood said. "The water came through the ceiling. The fire department came in and covered everything up, but by the time they did all that the damage was already done.

"Everybody was really friendly. People came up to us and asked if we needed a place to stay or if we

wanted a Coke or something. Everybody was really keeping a sense of humor," she said.

"What can you do when there's nothing that can be done?" Meina

Kirkelie said he was not disappointed that relatively so few people used the services offered by the university and the Red Cross. He agreed with Red Cross workers that they had provided a necessary

"We thought this morning that people would have their problems covered, but we wanted to be here if they needed us," Kirkelie said.

"We felt like we did a lot. I had some real good hugs, and they mean a lot.... If we can help just one person then it's worth it," said Red Cross volunteer Jean Riley.

"I lost about \$1,000 in clothing and my bedding is all gone. They are supposed to put us up in some kind of housing. It's just now realistically hitting me that I'm never going back there again. It's weird to see all your stuff fucked up," Yates said.

"I'm laughing about it now, but in two days I'll be screaming my head off," said Peggy Abel-Quintero, a graduate student in Spanish-Portugese literature.

The fire was so intense that after initial responding units assessed the blaze, officials called a "second alarm" and three more trucks arrived.

All units from the South Coast were on the scene, according to Battalion Chief Don Oaks. "It put a little strain on the resources ... we had to call on the city to put out a second alarm."

Snorkle apparatus from the Santa Barbara City Fire Department responded as well as 16 county firefighter trainees. "Just when you need good, fresh young trainees, we had them," Oaks said.

All county fire units with about 40 firefighters were at the blaze except one engine company "protecting the backside of the county," he added.

'This was an exceptionally dogged fire to put out, mainly

because it is in the walls ... that means a lot of work," Oaks said.

"Portions of the second floor may have to be completely gutted out because the inside of the walls are burned," Cullom said.

Officials believe the fire may have been in the walls for some time before residents called the department. "This was a delayed alarm, it got a start in the bearing wall and the partitions were full of fire," Oaks said.

"I heard crackling in the wall, I went over to feel it and it was really hot," student Emiko Maki said.

Due to the intricacies of the salvage operation, firefighters had to "go from the first floor, which is relatively undamaged and work our way up.... We have a lot to write off in the first half of the building,' Oaks said.

Gas and electricity were immediately shut off to prevent the fire from spreading to nearby dwellings.

Kalvin Nathan, resident manager and son of the building's owners, said insurance will cover building and property loss.

"Allstate insurance is apparently handling the claim, so, we'll find out if they are really the good hands people," Yates said.



Penthouse tenants and intrigued onlookers near Abrego Road as firefighters battle blaze.


and see who does have a problem," he said.

Capps' Group Travels to D.C. Memorial

While people across the country pay tribute to their loved ones and to two of the nation's great leaders, a group of students, faculty, community members and Vietnam veterans will make a different sort of show of thanks this holiday weekend.

Feb. 14-17 marks the second "pilgrimage" to the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial in Washington, D.C. generated by Walter Capps' Religious Studies 155 class, Religion and the Impact of Vietnam.

Dedicated in 1982, the memorial is a v-shaped black wall that chronologically lists the more than 56,000 Americans who died or are believed missing in action in

John Simmons, head teaching assistant for the course, called the memorial "a center of healing and reconciliation. It's not just a symbol of healing. It happens

Those who participate in the trip "are going to see something very rare, which is a sacred center in action," Simmons said.

Last year, a similar group made the same excursion on the occasion of the 10th anniversary of the Vietnam War's conclusion. "It was so successful, so moving, that we wanted to do it again," Simmons said.

Veteran Wilson Hubbell, who first visited the wall on last year's trip, said the students provided him with "a historical perspective."

"It's somehow easier to deal with my feelings about the wall when there is somebody there to talk with who might be able to learn from it," Hubbell said.

Both men said astounding things happen at the memorial. Hubbell described a veteran who was injured in action and then transported to Japan. He was searching for names of those who had fought with him that day to find out their fate, and encountered another man there for the same purpose. "They were looking for each other's names on the wall and they found each other instead," Hubbell said.

Jan Scruggs, John Wheeler and Sandie Fauriole, who head the Project on the Vietnam Generation and were responsible for the dedication of the memorial, will speak to the group on Saturday. The rest of the weekend will provide an opportunity for personal reflection at the



potential student FM programmers. Approved proposals include a limit on public affairs programming to non-prime-time hours, and giving students first priority when airtime

"The proposals are not designed to hurt anyone, rather to eliminate dead weight, by which I mean any non-students who want merely to hear their voice on the air and care little about helping students," Kaplan said.

According to Gault-Williams, some of the community members believe program changes are directed at them, when in fact they are attempts to alleviate some of the existing problems which A.S. is investigating.

'The older people get, the less open they are to change; by-andlarge most of the opposition to the change is coming from the older non-students," he explained.

"Major changes in the schedule won't hurt the flow, because the flow is hurting already," said Dunn. "I can't see students listening to some of the shows we have on now.

Removing Public Affairs and alternative music shows may not be an option since the bylaws state that the station is firmly committed to public information pertinent to the community.

ExCom meetings, however, have been hampered by the struggles and personality conflicts that have plagued the station this year. Most of the debate focuses on the ratio of students and community members who currently have shows.

One dilemma involves an "unwritten policy" where anyone who has a slot cannot be removed unless the Program Review Board decides the show is unworthy or the programmer violates his contract or an FCC regulation.

Proposal Number 12, tabled until next Wednesday, requires all nonstudent programmers to train an assigned student in advanced broadcasting and programming techniques for one quarter. Failure of non-students to comply with the apprenticeship program would result in removal from their program slot.

"The changes are relinquishing some people's power and they feel threatened ... the non-student members must help train and impart their knowledge to the students. The people who want to do that are concerned. They're the backbone of this station, they'll be around," said

Music Director Mark Keenan, a senior, has been involved with the station for four years. He pointed out that the station is capable of reaching people in an hour radius, due to the power increase the station was granted a few years ago.

"After my second year, going through all aspects, I did realize our audience was the entire community." he said. "Everybody (students) wants to play all the Oingo Boingo songs that KTYD doesn't. There's no room for that."

Because the students generally want to play rock shows, the competition is high in those areas. Keenan said students who provided something unavailable elsewhere would move up quicker.

"This station was set up as a training ground for students," said Kaplan. "I was told by one nonstudent ExCom member that students could be trained without being put on the air. That's like saying kids can learn to read without

Unless the problem can be handled internally, recommendations from the chancellor's committee could mandate those changes externally. The committee is expected to make its recommendations to the chancellor in the next few weeks.



I do not believe that closing the bike path past the Arbor will solve the pedestrian-bicycle problem there. Father Of Negro History

First In Black Achievement

William Cooper Nell, William Still, William Wells Brown, George Washington Williams and W.E.B. DuBois wrote books on the various aspects of the history of the Negro. Despite their pioneering efforts, however, systematic treatment of Negro history was not begun until 1915 when Carter G. Woodson, an ex-coalminer and schoolteacher, organized the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. Over the years the still-thriving Association has published many important volumes in this field. Today most educational institutions are conscious of the Negro's past. Many of them are developing study programs to fill this neglected gap in the education of most Americans.

Woodson himself set the pace for research in this area. Among his books are The Education of the Negro Prior to 1861, A Century of Negro Migration, The Story of the Negro Retold, Negro Orators and Their Orations, and The History of

In the year 1916, Dr. Woodson started the Journal of

Negro History, a scholarly repository of research which is used by students throughout the world. He initiated the observance of Negro History Week in 1926. Eleven years later the Association began the publication of The Negro History Bulletin, a more popular vehicle for disseminating the findings of scholars and researchers.

Woodson was born in Canton, VA in 1875. He grew up working in a coal mine. He obtained his college education from the University of Chicago and terminated his formal studies with a Doctor of Philosophy degree from Harvard in 1912. Three years later he organized the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History. Dr. Woodson firmly believed that "the achievements of the Negro properly set forth will crown him as a factor in early human progress and a maker of modern civilization." His life and work are eloquent testimony to that belief.

In celebration of Black History Month each Friday Alpha Phi Alpha will be presenting a profile on a famous black who championed the power and importance of education in the Negro struggle.

Overenrollment: Who Benefits?

Who benefits from UCSB over-enrollment? Is it you, the student? Is it your professor? Is it your neighbor next door who works for a living? Maybe it's the local administration, or your landlord.

Everyday, you can see the impact of current overenrollment at UCSB. Have you ever been late for lecture? see it when you get to lecture and there is no place to sit. You see over-enrollment when you ride on the bicycle lanes on campus. You put your life in jeopardy every day that you ride on the crowded bicycle lanes, originally designed to handle much less than the 17,000 students enrolled at UCSB. You see over-enrollment when you go to the library to study but there isn't any empty study space. You see it when you wait in line 15 minutes in the UCen for service. I'm sure the faculty doesn't see it as a benefit having to lecture to classes filled with hundreds of students. Students don't benefit from having to make an appointment a week in advance to see their professor.

In the adjacent community of Isla Vista you see the impact of over-enrollment in your roach and flea infested, dripping-faucet fire trap apartment. You see it in the annual rent increase right along with the jump in enrollment in Fall quarter. You see the impact in the trash that clutters your street and neighborhood parks. If you weren't aware of it, most people who work in industry in Goleta, commute to work from outside locations, because of the housing struggle created by current campus

In his infinite wisdom, the Chancellor (Capt. Bob), decided that our campus can handle 22,000 students by 1990. He decided that our campus shouldn't cap

enrollment like the UCLA and Berkeley campuses, and redirect incoming new applications for admission to campuses with declining enrollment. He doesn't expect any significant impacts from this increase in campus enrollment. This is demonstrated by his refusal to prepare an Environmental Impact Report on his ammendment to the UCSB Long Range Development Plan which will allow this new influx of students. Imagine the impact that 5,000 more students will have on the quality of your education at UCSB, and the quality of your life in the community


I thought to myself, what the hell is going on here! Why would Capt. Bob want all the headaches that have resulted from his push for campus expansion (ie, lawsuits, nasty letters from local elected officials, etc.?) There has got to be something in this for Capt. Bob. Then it occurred to me that the developers, you know ... the guys with the bulldozers, they will benefit from increasing enrollment. It turns out that Michael Towbes, of Towbes Construction and Development Inc., is on the Board of Directors of the Bank of Montecito. This is the bank with an instant teller in the UCen. Guess who else is on the Board of Directors of Bank of Montecito? You guessed it, Capt. Bob. If you don't believe me call the bank yourself, at 963-7511, and ask who is on the board. On the issue of whether or not we should allow enrollment to jump again next year, decide for yourself the facts as you see them. If you're "mad as hell" like me, send a card or letter to the California Coastal Commission, c/o Peter M. Douglas, Executive Director, 631 Howard St., San Francisco 94105. Let the Commission know what you think of Capt. Bob's plan to increase enrollment by 5,000 students.



Plot Same, Outcome Different as Gauchos Win

The plot looked strikingly familiar. Gauchos lead at half, Gauchos lose lead in second half, opposition forces turnover in final second, gets last shot and ...

Just two weeks ago, Fresno State's Jos Kuipers buried a three-pointer to beat the Gauchos in the closing seconds. Thursday night, San Jose State's Ricky Berry launched a three-pointer, just as Kuipers had done from the left side, with:03 seconds left.

"I was thinking 'Oh no, not overtime," Gaucho Head Coach Jerry Pimm said afterwards.

But a moment's worry quickly changed to extended jubilation, as Berry's attempt hit the back rim at the buzzer, giving Gauchos a dramatic 66-63 victory before an Events Center crowd of 1,713.

The Gauchos upped their PCAA record to 5-8, 10-12 overall, while San Jose State fell to 7-7 in conference play, 14-9 overall.

"We had our opportunities and just didn't take advantage of them," Spartan Head Coach Bill Berry said. "We missed some good shots."

Although the Spartans did miss some high-percentage attempts, 12 second-half Spartan fouls resulted in 17 of the highest percentage shots, free throws. UCSB canned all but one of them.

"That was the key to the win, making our free throws," Pimm explained. Undoubtedly the most critical charity shots came with eight seconds left, by a Gaucho who had earlier in the season compared the feeling of a basketball to that of a beach ball, when shooting free throws with the game on the line.

But Bruce Hannan, a recent crowd favorite who has hovered around 50 percent from the line all season, hit only net on his two attempts, setting up Berry's missed attempt at the

other end.
So did it feel like a beach ball?

"No, it felt good that time," Hannan said. "I've been practicing my free throws, and it paid off. I just took my time and made it."

George Puou set up Hannan's heroics by fouling him with eight seconds left. Seconds earlier, Hannan had grabbed a loose ball after Berry, who was setting up the Spartan offense for the winning shot,

misfired on a pass.

"I put Hannan in for defensive purposes, and lo and behold, he gets fouled and makes the shots," Pimm said.

another clutch performance from Conner Henry, who had his worst shooting night of the season (three of 15 from the floor, 12 points). Henry canned both ends of a one-and-one with 51 seconds remaining, giving the Gauchos a 64-60 lead.

Berry promptly buried a threepointer over a Gaucho zone, cutting the margin to one with 33 seconds remaining. UCSB's Richard Townsend attempted to inbound the ball to Henry, but Reggie Owens deflected it, dished off to Puou, whose shot off a drive to the hoop was swatted out of bounds by Khris Fortson.

Gauchos Play Host to Bears in Weekend Series

According to baseball Coach Al Ferrer, "two of the hottest teams in the country" will square off in a three game series this weekend at Campus Diamond. However, those hot teams may be cooled off by an unfriendly storm.

Although today's game has already been cancelled, the eighthranked UC Berkeley Golden Bears (6-0) are still scheduled for three games. Weather permitting, a double header will be played Saturday or Sunday to make up the lost game.

The Gauchos (5-1) will have their hands full with the Bears, who are coming off an impressive threegame sweep of PCAA power Fresno State in Berkeley. The Bears beat the Bulldogs, 7-4, 16-5, and 11-3.

"I don't see anything but a lot of trouble from them," Ferrer said. "They're a great team; they destoyed one of the best teams in our conference."

The Gauchos were successful in their encounter up north last weekend as well, taking two-of-three from Stanford, the fifth-place finisher at the 1985 College World Series. The Cardinal's pitching staff, regarded as one of the best in the nation, was no match for the Gaucho bats, especially in the last game. On Sunday, UCSB hammered out six home runs, tying the school record, en route to an 11-6 victory.

Ferrer feels that Berkeley's rotation is just as strong, or stronger, than Stanford's. In six games, the Bears have a combined ERA of 2.52. Scott Farmer, expected to pitch this weekend, is 2-0 with a 0.90 ERA. Mark Sampson (2-0, 2.08) and Joe Buckley (1-0, 3.24) are also expected to see action.

As a team, the Bears are hitting .327, as opposed to the .220 mark of their opponents. Designated hitter/first baseman Jerry Goff is hitting .563, while catcher Mike Knapp is at .429. Third baseman Mike Baer has three homers with a .400 average.

Gaucho Notes: The last time these two teams met, the Gauchos swept a three-game series in Berkeley in 1984 ... The Gauchos are 9-21 against Cal, while Ferrer is 41 ... In seven years at Campus Diamond, Ferrer is 114-46-6 ... Against Pac 10 opponents, Ferrer is 26-23 ... The Gauchos are 73-118 against Pac 10 foes ... In six games, the Gauchos have hit 13 home runs ... The Bears have hit eight in six games.

Northridge, USC Battle Spikers This Weekend

Hoping to get back on the winning track, the UCSB men's volleyball takes on a pair of conference rivals this weekend.

The Gauchos (7-4, 0-3 in CIVA play) host the Matadors of Cal State Northridge tonight in Rob Gym at 8 p.m., and then travel to USC for a Saturday night clash with the Trojans.

"This is an extremely important game for us," said Gaucho Head Coach Ken Preston. "We have to beat Northridge, though, before we can even start thinking about USC."

The Matadors have given the Gauchos a lot to think about recently. Northridge took UCSB to the limit at the Michelob Light Tournament, before falling, 14-16, 18-16, and 15-13. Northridge stunned the Gauchos last season with a four-game win over the Gauchos in CIVA play. UCSB sports a 13-1 lifetime record against the Matadors.

Northridge is led by a pair of superb setters, Mike Bird and Mark Stein. Middle blockers Scott Juhl and John Buffington should give the Gauchos trouble at the net.

The Matadors are 1-2 in CIVA play, with losses to Long Beach State and Stanford, plus a victory over St. Mary's.

The Gauchos travel to USC (2-0) Saturday night to take on the third-ranked Trojans. USC, winners of two national championships, finished second in the nation last year to Pepperdine.

Although powerful hitter Bill Yardley has graduated, the Trojans still have designs on a national championship this season. Middle blocker Chao Ying Zhang, and outside hitters Adam Johnson and Dave Yoder are superb players both offensively and defensively. Rudy Dvorak gives the Trojans three years of experience at the setter spot.



Supervisor Candidate Cites Personal Experience, Ability

Attorney Ben Bycel, candidate for the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors District Two seat, would like to end political "rhetoric" and focus his campaign on experience and ability.

Bycel believes the county will face 'tough issues' in the coming years. "Who would you rather have sitting across the table negotiating? The answer is someone with experience," he said.

"I've always devoted my life to public service. There's a job that needs to be done. I'm ready to make those decisions.

According to Bycel, all candidates for public office use the same campaign rhetoric. "Candidates" rhetoric and comments is not what is important, but the ability to deal with the issues independently."

Incumbent Michael Stoker was appointed to the board Jan. 15 by Gov. George Deukmejian to fill former Supervisor Robert

Kallman's spot. Bycel is opposed to the gubernatorial appointment. "It is a slap in the face to all Santa Barbarans," he said. "Governors shouldn't appoint local positions."

In a statement announcing his candidacy, Bycel said that he would like to keep the Board of Supervisors non-partisan. "The challenges that face Santa Barbara will not be answered with partisan solutions," he said. "We can only deal with ... problems head-on with a nonpartisan, experienced and independent leader."

Bycel considers a supervisor's seat "very much like a blue-collar job.... (Supervisors) have to deal with the issues people face every

The Santa Barbara attorney does not see a political career beyond the supervisorial seat. "The most important issues are decided on the county level. There's no more important post than the Board of Supervisors," he said.

The county needs "sensible, comprehensible planning," Bycel said. Although "not categorically opposed" to UCSB expansion, Bycel said the university must show him the "need to expand. They're going to have to prove it."

"I'd have to be shown how they are going to mitigate (any negative impacts), especially housing.... I'm going to need to know where the kids are going to live and where the water is going to come from," he

Bycel is against piping water from Northern California to the southern half of Santa Barbara County. Although, he supports state water for North County, contingent upon the residents' desires. "People in South County can't dictate how people in North County live their

Bycel describes the county's water shortage similar to a milkshake. We all have our straws in the same milkshake, he said. Bycel calls for a comprehensive plan to 'deal with water in South County."

Bycel wants to be reassured that the county does not become "another L.A."

"We have gone from a small, almost rural county to one facing industrialization from offshore oil development and a tremendous growth in population," he said in his statement.

'The county needs a supervisor who can listen to the needs of the people and then translate those needs into action.'

State Assemblyman Jack O'Connell, D-Santa Barbara, is endorsing Bycel. Bycel managed O'Connell's two assembly campaigns. "Ben is a long-time personal friend," O'Connell said.

Kris Kallman, attorney and son of the former supervisor, is also endorsing Bycel. "I'm cutting across party lines... He (Kallman) knows what kind of a job I've done as a lawyer and an organizer," Bycel

Bycel has already began to walk the district and talk to constituents. He plans to "run a positive campaign on the issues and experience."

Along with Bycel and Stoker, Santa Barbara City Councilman Tom Rogers is also seeking the supervisor board seat.
