


### Quick Start Helps Gauchos Beat Heat, Cougars

AZUSA — From the moment the UCSB football team stepped off the bus, it knew its worst fears had been realized.

From the temperature that hovered around triple digits the entire afternoon, to the smog that made breathing a chore, to the overflow homecoming crowd, the Gauchos had stepped out of Isla Vista and into Azusa Pacific's little version of hell. The only way out? Go for the throat, fast and early.

Which Santa Barbara (4-2) promptly did, scoring its first touchdown less than a minute and a half into the game and another in each of its next two possessions, on the way to a 28-7 win over the Cougars (2-4) that was over almost before it began.

The Gauchos set the tone for the game on their first play, as quarterback Jon Barnes found a wide-open Amahl Thomas down the sideline for a 56-yard gain after APU's safety missed the coverage. Following a holding penalty against UCSB, Barnes went up top once again, hitting freshman Shawn Wallace for a 37-yard TD and a 7-0 lead at the 10:44 mark of the first quarter.

"Our safety just broke the coverage," Azusa Pacific Head Coach Jim Milhon said. "We wanted a sack on the first play and we tried to have things ready for the play, but it didn't work out. They're a very good team, extremely well-coached and they have outstanding receivers. Thomas is their guy who goes long and

we didn't stop that out of the gate."

The Cougars didn't stop anything out of the gate, which was as important as any play to the Gauchos Saturday. The temperature was officially 95 degrees, but that was the figure for people who didn't have to wear pads and run around for three hours. And the heat, according to many of the players, wasn't the worst of it. The smog blanketed the surrounding San Gabriel Mountains to the point of invisibility, as Head Coach Rick Candaele compared it to "smoking a pack of cigarettes through the entire game while playing." The Gauchos knew all week that they would have to come out firing and behind the arm of Barnes, they were able to do just that.

### Road Woes Continue for Men's Soccer in 3-0 Loss at Irvine

The UCSB men's soccer team split a pair of games this weekend, beating Brigham Young University at home on Friday before being beaten down south Sunday to conference rival UC Irvine.

The 2-1 victory over BYU was the fourth and final game of a homestand in which the Gauchos were unbeaten, picking up three wins and a tie. Scoring Friday night for UCSB were forwards Matt Brauch and Sean Redmond. For

Redmond, the goal was his seventh of the year

and third in a span of just two games. In Sunday's game at Irvine, the Gauchos and Anteaters held each other scoreless until Irvine notched a goal with approximately 12 minutes left to play. After attacking more aggressively in an attempt to even the score, UCSB was victimized by a pair of breakaway goals that brought Irvine a 3-0 victory.

"We knew it would be close," UCSB Head Coach Cliff Draeger said of Sunday's game with Irvine, a team the Gauchos defeated in Santa Barbara, 1-0, on Oct. 11.

Also lost in Sunday's game was Redmond,

who departed the contest early in the first half after suffering an injury. According to Draeger, the absence of the junior forward severely weakened the Gauchos' offense.

"When he got injured, it hurt us," Draeger said of Redmond, the team's top scorer. The coach added that the team "didn't have too many scoring chances" after losing its biggest offensive weapon. Draeger said that Redmond will probably return to the lineup on Friday.

The weekend's games move the Gauchos' record on the season to 4-10-1 and its Big West

### #5 Hawaii Visits SB for Huge Matches

After taking a brief break from the most grueling stretch of its 1991 schedule, the UCSB women's volleyball team begins what may be its toughest week of the season tonight as the Lady Gauchos host fifth-ranked Hawaii in the first of two matches with the Rainbow-Wahines at the Events Center (7:30, KCSB 91.9-FM). UH and UCSB will meet again tomorrow night as

Ninth-ranked Santa Barbara (13-4, 8-1) got a break from recent stiff competition in its last match on Wednesday, when UCSB swept lowly Cal State Fullerton in three games at Titan Gym. Before that, the Gauchos notched victories over nationally ranked Fresno State and Pacific, and this week's competition figures to be even more of a task, with the two matches with Hawaii and then a contest at second-ranked Long Beach State on Friday night.

The fact that the Gauchos and Hawaii are battling for first place in the Big West Conference may be a bit of a surprise, because Santa Barbara was rated a notch below the elite teams in the league at the beginning of the season. But even more of a surprise may be that UCSB is the team in first place, with the Rainbows at-





Candaele was as happy with his team as he was tired after the game.

"For a young team, this was a great effort," said the worn coach. "Our defense was very strong today. We wanted to hold them under 14 points, and we almost tackles.

### Women Get Fast Results at SLO Invite

Competing against a field of 12 teams in the San Luis Obispo Invitational on Saturday, the UCSB women's cross country team was looking to build confidence for the Big West Championships. Not only did the Gauchos find confidence, but they placed eighth overall and beat out all but two conference opponents.

Finishing with 227 points, Santa Barbara placed behind Big West rivals Fresno State and UC Irvine, and ahead of some quality teams like Cal State Fullerton and

Sophomore Laura Hodnett, one of the Lady Gauchos' top five runners, was unable to compete because of an illness. However, the rest of the team pulled

together to bring UCSB close to UC Irvine. 'Since Laura wasn't able to finish, we had to compensate and run twice as hard," freshman Beckie Levy said. "We beat Fullerton. Now that we accomplished that goal, we'll go after Fresno."

"It was a great race," sophomore Julie Thomas said.
"It was really neat that we were invited to run in the Invitational. It was a good experience. The team came together again, and when we lost (Hodnett) the other

Thomas happily returned to the SLO course, where

she had her best time (19:11) last season. This year, however, Thomas took the team's number-one position, 36th overall, and finished with another personal best of

"I am very happy with the way I ran. This was my best time," Thomas said. "I felt good through the race. Kara and I stayed together the whole time. Without her help and her support it would have been hard to run (under

Freshman Kara Bradbury followed Thomas, placing 37th overall and finishing with a time of 18:41. Levy (19:07), freshman Eva Mattson (19:10) and sophomore Kristen von Teuber (19:12) placed 50th, 51st and 53rd,

"We ran awesome and did exactly what (Head Coach Jim Triplett) said," Levy commented. "Kara and Julie worked together and Eva, Kristen, and I worked together. I think I ran well. I just pushed with Kristen and Eva. It was really hot and there were times when I just wanted to give up, but with Eva and Kristen pushing

me, and me pushing them, it worked really well."
"That was the most painful race I ever ran," Mattson said. "It was really hot and dusty, but it was a good course, really fast.

"I have more confidence that I can follow my race plan at Big West (Championships) because Kara will be there," Thomas said. "I think we'll be strong and ready to take on the conference."

HAWAII: Rough Week Lies Ahead for Spikers

After being riddled with injuries all season long, the UCSB men's cross country team will have a chance to start an entirely healthy squad today in the NCAA Preview at Arizona.

All-Big West Conference runners Tim Corbin, Bryan MacMillan and Sean Nyhan, all seniors, have been injured most of the year and haven't competed together yet this season. But for the Arizona meet, Corbin is listed as probable, Nyhan's chances of running are 50/50 and MacMillan is a definite.

Junior Mike Brown, bothered by knee tendinitis all year, opted to redshirt this season and instead will focus on remaining healthy for next year. This marks the first meet this season when there could technically be no Gauchos on the injured list, even if the starting team isn't 100 percent healthy.



#### SOCCER NOTES

The morning after giving up 10 goals to the U.S. National Team, the Gauchos faced Cal State Hayward. But the defense looked strong, and UCSB won, 4-0, to run its record to 10-5-0. Defender Linda Dorn scored twice and midfielder Julie Bushman added three assists as Santa Barbara scored three times on corner kicks.

The Gauchos' next opponent is Cal-Berkeley, Saturday night at Harder Stadium. It will be the first test of the team's "new attitude," which was needed after a string of road losses and began with a 5-0 victory over Westmont one week ago.

Gaucho midfielder Kiersten Taub, who sat out all of last season with an injury, suffered a lightly sprained ankle Saturday night against the National Team, but was able to play against Hayward. She injured the same ankle, though, midway through the second half and is questionable for the match against Cal.

Another example of the power behind the U.S. Team's kicks occurred with seven minutes remaining in Saturday's match. Michelle Akers-Stahl took a shot, but UCSB sweeper Kris Bassler stopped the ball with her foot and came up limping. "They just shoot so hard!" Bassler said. "It just took my foot back."

Former UCSB standout Carin Jennings made the most of her return to the Santa Barbara area, on the field and off. In the five days that the team was in town, Jennings had a chance to show her teammates around Isla
