





Tiny, windowless and dark, it was located near an ATM in a supermarket that never closed; when closing time came, you merely had to run over to Albertson's to pick up more alcohol before 2 a.m. While the Bak Dor is not in such prime real estate (it's nestled behind the Sizzler on Hollister), it boasts several of the qualities that made the Hideout so great. Nick, the bartender, is a kind older man, and within an hour of being there, I was already receiving great encouragement from him about my plans for the future and life. The Falls





You'll probably see someone you know, because about 75 percent of its employees are from UCSB.

Trader Joe's is unique from its competitors because, "Our prices are as low as can be," Nancy, the Calle Real store manager, said. "We won't carry an item we can't be competitive on. Nationally known brands will contract with us under the Trader Joe's name, and we will put these products under our standards."

These standards mean its products are preservative free, organic whenever possible and the highest quality. "We have fresh milk and cheeses — which are hormone free. We own our own dairy," she said. All of the store's dairy, produce and bread are delivered fresh daily. (Try the sourdough loaf.)

Tracey said the store makes an effort to cater to what its customers want. The frozen section of Trader Joe's should be especially tantalizing to students looking for easy, cheap, high-quality meals.

Other deals include a huge selection of pasta for the steal of 69 cents a bag. Currently, there is also a special with very drinkable wine for \$1.99 and \$2.99. Check out its great deals on beer and liquor as well.


