## **Fall Semester Enrollment 798**

Santa Barbara college welcomed to its doors, a total of seven hundred attend classes on the campus this fall, according to Miss Wilhelmina Menken, assistant registrar. Of these, 132 are men, while 619 are women students. The ratio remains nearly six coeds to one man. There are forty-seven students classified as limited, carrying five units of credit or less.

The Office of Veterans Coordinator, headed by Dean of Men, C. D. Woodhouse, has been helping returning veterans to register under the auspices of the G.I. Bill of Rights. Nearly sixty men have enlisted aid so far this semester. Dean Woodhouse welcomed these men Friday, saying, "Santa Barbara college is proud to find so many returnees have chosen to complete their college work here.'

With the end of hostilities, and a large college enrollment again, 'Hello Week' has been resumed as a college activity.



### **TRADITIONS**

Traditions are an important part of campus life anywhere, and even though Santa Barbara is smaller and younger than most colleges, we too, have our traditions. But unfortunately many of them have been ignored or forgotten the last few years.

This is especially true of the custom of no one smoking in the Quad. In fact, probably a large percentage of the men students don't even know that they are not supposed to smoke there. We have no rule about it, but no tradition can be established unless people follow it.

There is a bench in the Quad which is supposed to be reserved for seniors, but no one would ever realize it. One is much more likely to see freshmen, sophomores and juniors there than seniors.

In the romantic days of old, a casual spectator could recognize freshmen by their green ribbons or "dinks". That is no longer true. There is an unfortunate trend of rugged individualism and non-conformity amongst our little newcomers. We are all for personal freedom, of course, but the words, "Kangeroo Court" are not as harmless as they sound, and sophomores are always on the lookout for hapless freshmen to torment in true Gaucho fashion.

But the most important tradition of all is our custom of friend-liness. We are a small college, and there is no reason why everyone should not have at least a nodding acquaintance with everyone else. Maybe freshmen are a little overawed by the lofty upperclassmen, but oddly enough, they are not as bad as they seem. They, too, are favorably impressed by a friendly face. We don't mean that people should go around dishing out sweetness and light with a shovel. That is just too charming for words. However, living in a little world all one's own can be very dull—restricting too. College is an experience that should be enjoyed to the fullest, and people are still more fun than anything. One only gets what he works for, and getting friends is the easiest and most profitable work of all.


The group's first get-together was the purely social A. M. S. picnic held Thursday, Sept. 20 at Anapamu Park.

Four class representatives are needed for the executive council. Positions open are:


