DR. TURNER DISCUSSES SUDAN TODAY

FOURTH OF JULY PICNIC PLANNED THURSDAY AFTERNOON AT BEACH

A Fourth of July picnic, complete with games, lunch and fireworks is on tap for the Independence Day holiday. Tickets for the 2 - 6 p.m. event are available at the graduate manager's office until 10 a.m. tomorrow.

The agenda for the picnic includes a schedule of games, featuring a tug o' war, a 5 p.m. dinner of hamburger, soft drinks, potato salad, baked beans and ice cream, and a trip to La Playa Field for fireworks.

Picnickers will leave for La Playa at 6:30 p.m., with transportation provided. Those who do not attend the fireworks display will enjoy a folk sing beside a bonfire.

Admission to the picnic, including the supper, is \$1 per person.

JAPANESE FILM WILL PLAY IN SUMMER FILM SERIES SUNDAY

"Ugetsu," a Japanese film which explores the psychological, physiological and esthetic ways of life, is the feature film in the weekly summer series at 7:30 p.m. Sunday in Campbell Hall.

Admission to the film showing is 25 cents for students, faculty and staff members.

The story of "Ugetsu" comes from a Japanese tale which concerns the desperate fortunes of two poor families in a small village. The hazards they face in the 16th Century feudal territory are terrifying, not only for themselves, but for their abandoned wives.

According to critics, the genius of the film rests in the cameraman and the director who adapt the camera to completely opposite types of narrative.

Dr. Henry A. Turner, professor of political science at UCSB, will present a first-hand account of "Sudan: A Case Study of an Emerging Nation" when he speaks in South Hall Lecture Room at 4 p.m. today. The lecture is open to the public without charge.

Recently returned from an 11-month stay in the South African nation, Professor Turner has observed the political and governmental, social and economic problems of Sudan, and these problems, along with the country's historical background, will be prominent in his discussion.

Dr. Turner is the author of two books, "Politics in the United States: Readings in Political Parties and Pressure Groups" and "The Government and Politics of California," which he wrote with John A. Vieg. He has written numerous articles for professional and popular journals and taught at colleges and universities in Missouri, Iowa and Nebraska before coming to UCSB.

A graduate of Northwest Missouri State College, Dr. Turner holds an M.A. degree from the University of Missouri and the Ph.D. from the University of Chicago.
