

# Deukmejian Reigns Victorious Over Bradley

Governor George Deukmejian was re-elected to a second term yesterday in a landslide victory over democratic Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley. With 48 percent of the precincts counted, the republican incumbent garnered 61 percent to Bradley's 37 percent.

Deukmejian had received 2,074,296 votes to Bradley's 1,235,912. Bradley conceded defeat shortly after the polls closed.

All three of the California State Supreme Court justices targeted for defeat by conservative groups appear to have failed in their reconfirmation bids with 33 percent of the vote counted. Chief Justice Rose Elizabeth Bird was voted down by 67 percent of those voting. Justice Cruz Reynoso was voted against by 61 percent of the electorate, while 58

percent voted against reconfirmation of Justice Joseph Grodin.

Justices Stanley Mosk, Malcolm Lucas and Edward Panelli, all of whom had no organized opposition, easily obtained reconfirmation. Lucas and Panelli both received 78 percent of the votes for reconfirmation, while Mosk received 72 percent.

In other statewide elections, incumbent democratic State Senator Gary Hart defeated republican Santa Barbara County Supervisor DeWayne Holmdahl by a large margin to win his second term. With 95 percent of the vote counted, Hart received 65 percent, compared to the 33.8 percent received by Holmdahl.

Two-term democratic Assemblyman Jack O'Connell defeated republican Mark Urdahl and libertarian Robert Bakhaus to win re-election in the 35th State Assembly District. O'Connell took 66.4 percent of the vote to Urdahl's 32 percent.

Democratic Lt. Governor Leo McCarthy was re-elected in a tight race over republican Mike Curb. McCarthy

received 54 percent of the vote, compared to the 43 percent Curb garnered.


Democratic Attorney General John Van De Kamp defeated all opponents and will once again serve as the state's highest law enforcement agent. He captured 65 percent of the vote while his republican opponent Bruce Gleason received 31 percent.

Democratic Secretary of State March Fong Eu appeared headed for re-election with 31 percent of the vote counted. 69 percent of the voters were for Eu, while republican Bruce Nestande received only 26 percent.

Democrat Jesse M. Unruh was re-elected state treasurer, receiving a 31 percent support of the electorate in an unopposed race.

With 31 percent of the vote counted, democratic State Assemblyman Gray Davis led republican California State Senator Bill Campbell in the election for controller. Davis led with 51 percent of the vote to Campbell's 45 percent.


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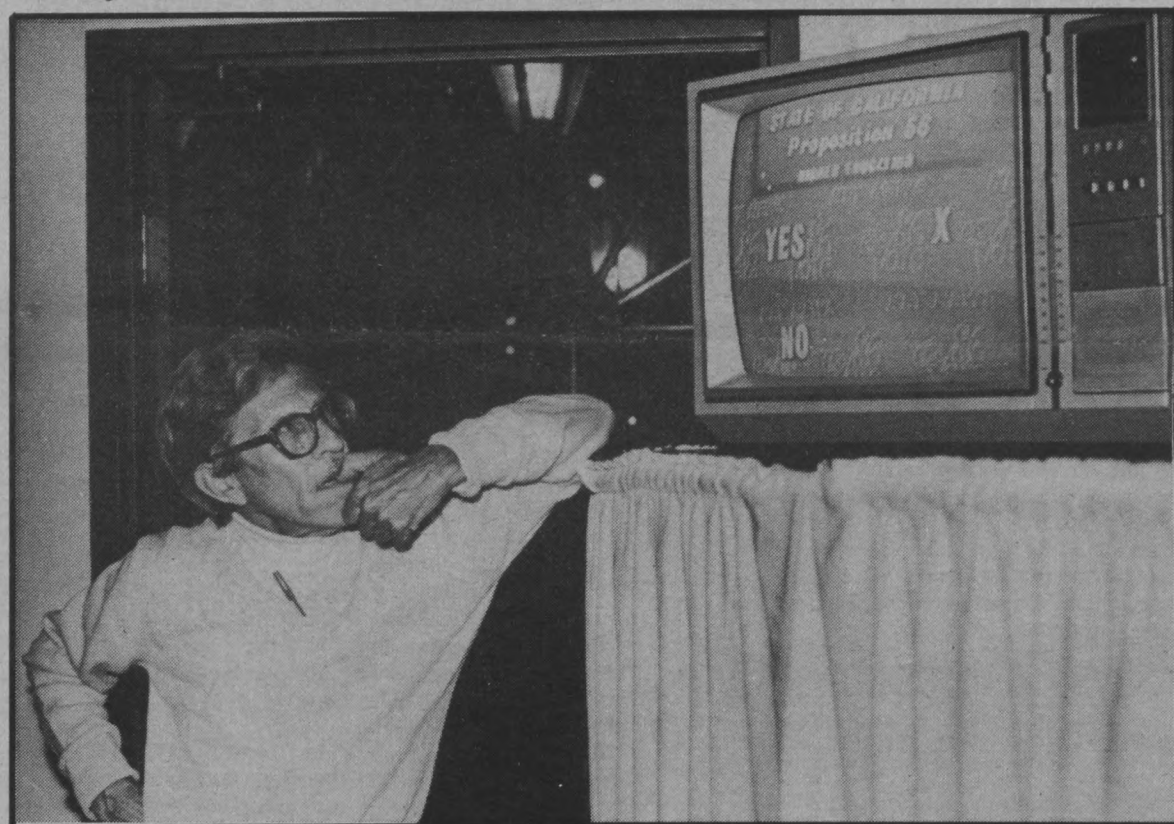

## Rogers Winner in Supervisor Race; High I.V. Turnout

Two-term Santa Barbara City Councilman Tom Rogers defeated Second District County Supervisor Mike Stoker in what was one of the tightest races in yesterday's election.

Rogers garnered approximately 58.9 percent of the votes cast, while Stoker received 40.8 percent.

Over 1,500 people voted in Isla Vista Community Council elections at polling precincts throughout I.V. and on campus. Seven candidates were elected to seats on the council. Mike Boyd led the race for at-large representative, with 130 more votes than the nearest challenger. Linda Akyuz won the second seat, while the third at-large seat went to Dee Heckman.

The second district seat was won by Javier La Fianza, while Eric Kittay will represent the third

district. Christene Hilkene won in the fourth district and Zenyasha Ivanivsky took the sixth district seat unopposed.

Two plebiscites appeared on the ballot, which were designed to give the new council members a better understanding of the community's stand on specific issues. 75 percent of those who voted were against an open container law, while 25 percent were for it. The proposed county ordinance would ban open alcoholic beverage containers from I.V.'s streets and sidewalks.

62 percent were against possible annexation of I.V. into Goleta, while 38 percent were for incorporation.

Voters passed three of the five measures on yesterday's ballot. Measure A, the county appropriations limit bill, was passed. 70.1 percent of the voters were in favor of the measure while 29.9 percent voted against. Santa Barbara County will now be able to raise the amount of money it

## Water, English Propositions Win; AIDS, Gann Initiatives Defeated

The English-only initiative was overwhelmingly approved by voters and the Safe Drinking Water measure was also passed by a comfortable margin, while the AIDS initiative was soundly defeated in yesterday's election.

Proposition 61, the controversial "Gann initiative" that would have limited state employees' salaries, was defeated with 64 percent of the voters opposing it.

Proposition 63 will amend the state constitution to declare that English is the official language of California and requires that legislators take steps to preserve English as the primary language.

With 42 percent of the vote counted statewide, the proposal won by 74 percent, with 26 percent opposing it.

Californians defeated Proposition 64, the AIDS initiative, by a resounding 70 percent. The initiative was backed by supporters of political extremist Lyndon LaRouche. It would have mandated the identification of individuals carrying the AIDS virus and could have lead to the quarantine of known carriers.

The Safe Drinking Water Initiative, Proposition 65, was winning by a comfortable 64 percent margin as

of press-time. The proposition requires businesses to warn individuals of possible exposure to chemicals known to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity. The governor is required to produce a list of all chemicals falling into the toxic category. Government agencies and businesses with 10 or less employees are exempt from the measure.

Voters authorized the sale of bond issues totaling \$1.8 billion with the passage of four bond acts. Propositions 53 and 56 will provide a total of \$1.2 billion for construction and improvement of public schools and statewide higher education systems, including the University of California.

Proposition 53 allocates \$100 million for improvements to domestic water systems. The New Prison Construction Act, Proposition 54, provides \$500 million for the acquisition and construction of new prison facilities.

Proposition 62 was also approved by voters. Sponsored by Howard Jarvis of Proposition 13 fame, the new law requires voters to approve city taxes for special purposes by a two-thirds majority.

Voters approved three legislative constitutional amendments, Propositions 57, 58 and 60. As of press-time, the results of the Proposition 59 race, which decides if district attorneys must be elected by local popular vote, was not available.

## Cranston Holds Small Lead Over Zschau as Precincts Are Tallied

Although democratic United States Senator Alan Cranston was defeated locally, he apparently gained enough votes statewide to retain his seat in the Senate where the Democrats have gained a 52-48 majority nationwide over the Republicans.

As of press-time at 4 a.m. today, Cranston led republican opponent Congressman Ed Zschau 49 to 48 percent, Cranston collecting 1,640,683 votes to Zschau's 1,613,411, with 48 percent of the precincts tallied.

The senator fought a long and bitter battle against Zschau, who polls showed as dead even with Cranston the day of the election. The two candidates combined spent over \$20 million in campaign funds, making it the most expensive Senate race ever.

Zschau received 51.2 percent of the vote locally, while Cranston garnered 46.2 percent, with 90 percent of the precincts tallied.

Locally, republican Congressman Robert Lagomarsino will serve his eighth term representing the 19th Congressional District after easily defeating democratic opponent Wayne Norris. Lagomarsino received 72 percent of the votes, while Norris gleaned 26.6 percent and Libertarian candidate George Hasara received less than 2 percent, with 94 percent of the precincts reported.

County election officials estimate that approximately 52 percent of registered voters participated in the election.

### U.S. May Resume Arms Sales to Iran, Reagan Won't Talk



ABOARD AIR FORCE ONE — President Reagan's chief spokesperson refused to say Tuesday whether the United States had ended its longstanding policy of not selling arms or spare weapons parts to Iran, and cautioned reporters to "be a little careful on reporting. I don't think it serves the interest of the hostages" held by pro-Iranian elements in Lebanon.

And the president, boarding Air Force One in Los Angeles for the flight to Washington, refused to comment on published reports that his former aide, Robert McFarlane, had traveled to Iran as an administration emissary and had been arrested and jailed there for five days before being deported.

Asked what McFarlane had been doing in Iran, Reagan said only, "No comment."

Later, Spokesman Larry Speakes told reporters, "You should not take a 'no comment' as a positive or negative on this story."

Asked repeatedly about any change in the arms-sale policy toward Iran, Speakes refused to comment, telling reporters, "We're not commenting, but I think you ought to be a little careful" in reporting the story.

Asked if U.S. policy on an arms sale ban in the Iran-Iraq war has changed, the spokesman again said, "We're just not going to comment.... You should be a little careful on reporting. I don't think it serves the interests of the hostages."

He reiterated, however, that the U.S. policy of "no negotiation, no concessions, no encouraging third countries to make concessions" remains in effect.

As for the McFarlane report, Speakes said, "We're going to generally not comment on stories of that kind from the Middle East" because of the delicacy of the hostage situation.

### Waite Says Strong Suggestions that Americans Will be Freed

WIESBADEN, WEST GERMANY — Anglican Church envoy Terry Waite said Tuesday "reasonably strong suggestions" have emerged that two Americans will be the next hostages released in Lebanon. He said he expected a message from their captors within 24 hours.

Waite addressed a news conference in Wiesbaden near the U.S. Air Force Hospital, where newly freed American hostage David Jacobsen was undergoing medical examinations.

Waite, the emissary of the archbishop of Canterbury, was asked if there had been indications that Associated Press correspondent Terry Anderson, 39, and educator Thomas Sunderland, 55, would be the next American hostages freed.

He replied, "Those have been strong. Yes, I would say reasonably strong suggestions."

"At the moment, the two people specifically in my sights are Terry Anderson and Thomas Sunderland," Waite added. "That is where our best contacts lie at the moment."

### Hasenfus Asks for Mercy from Sandinista People's Tribunal

MANAGUA, NICARAGUA — Eugene Hasenfus expects to be convicted by the Nicaraguan People's Tribunal trying him for "terrorism," conspiracy and violating public security but hopes his plea for mercy will lighten his sentence, his lawyer said Tuesday.

Hasenfus will make a "mitigated statement" and "has thrown himself on the mercy of the court," said Griffin Bell, the former U.S. attorney general who is assisting with the captured American mercenary's defense.

"We hope the statement will cause the Sandinistas, the Nicaraguan government, to be more merciful," he told a news conference.

Hasenfus, 45, of Masinette, Wis., was the only survivor of a C-123 cargo plane shot down Oct. 3 in southern Nicaragua while ferrying supplies to U.S. funded and armed rebels fighting the government. The three other crewmen were killed in the crash, including the American pilot and copilot.

### Shultz Goes for Talks with Shevardnadze to Limit Nuclear Arms



WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz headed for Vienna on Tuesday with a team of U.S. arms control specialists to test Soviet attitudes on nuclear weapons cuts, human rights and "terrorism" after the Iceland summit.

U.S. officials steered clear of predicting how Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze would respond to Shultz' agenda. But they said Shultz was prepared to set up negotiating committees to tackle the details of the latest U.S. proposals, which include a 50 percent reduction in long-range nuclear missiles by 1991.

The setting for the Shultz-Shevardnadze talks Wednesday and Thursday is a 35-nation review of the 1975 Helsinki agreement. Its promise of a freer exchange of people and ideas across the icy East-West divide will serve as a backdrop for an expected U.S. appeal to the Soviets to improve conditions in their country.

On "terrorism," Shultz is hoping for support in a mounting campaign against Syria, in which the Soviets have strong military ties. Shultz accused Syria in a speech Monday night in Philadelphia of direct involvement in a thwarted plot to blow up an Israeli jetliner at London Heathrow airport last April.

It is not clear how much influence the Soviets have on President Hafez Assad's government, or whether they intend to use it. Publicly, the Soviets have condemned acts of "terrorism" and have sometimes been targets.

### Newspaper Reports Pakistan Near Having Nuclear Weapons

WASHINGTON — Pakistan has recently made dramatic progress toward production of a nuclear weapon, including the detonation last month of a high explosive device, according to a published report.

The Washington Post, citing a classified Defense Intelligence Report, reported in Tuesday's editions that Pakistan detonated the device between Sept. 18 and Sept. 21. The newspaper, quoting unidentified sources, said the test was part of Pakistan's continuing efforts to build an implosion-type nuclear weapon.

The test was Pakistan's second this year, according to the sources, who said the Pakistanis have been conducting the tests for years in an attempt to perfect a nuclear weapons triggering package.

Intelligence reports also indicated that Pakistan has enriched uranium to 93.5 percent at its atomic plant in Kamuta, the newspaper said. A 90 percent level is normally needed to make a bomb.

In 1984, President Reagan told Pakistani President Mohammed Zia ul-Haq in a top-secret letter that the United States would accept an enrichment level no higher than five percent, the newspaper said.

### Shultz Says Congressional Cuts Will Batter U.S. Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz says congressional budget trimmers are playing "Russian roulette" with national security by slashing funds for foreign aid and "anti-terrorist" programs.

And a campaign against Syria, which he said has been caught "red-handed" in "terrorism", is an example of the kind of program that cost-cutters could be hurting, the secretary said.

"Our hearts are in the right place; but where are our resources?," Shultz said Monday night in Philadelphia.

"After years of educating our own citizens and our allies, after years of building a consensus, America's hands seem financially tied," he said. "The probable effect of congressional action on our foreign affairs budget will be to slow substantially our proposed diplomatic security program."

"In effect, we are being asked to play Russian roulette with our international interests and our national security," he said.

### Air Force One Shows Warning Light While Flying Reagan Home



LOS ANGELES — Air Force One, carrying President Reagan home Tuesday from a week-long campaign trip, on takeoff displayed a warning light in the cockpit that indicated that one of the landing gear brakes was hot, a White House spokesperson said.

Mark Weinberg, assistant press secretary, said that to cope with the problem the plane's pilot left the landing gear in the plane's nose down in flight briefly to cool it off. It was retracted after a few minutes, Weinberg said.

"There's no problem, and Air Force One is on its way back to Washington," he added.

White House spokesperson Larry Speakes said Colonel Robert Ruddick, pilot of Air Force One, left the gear down for a short time after takeoff as part of what he called "a standard procedure to cool the brakes down."

"Ruddick says there is nothing wrong with the aircraft," Speakes said.

### Court Rejects Appeal on Behalf of Convicted Nazi War Criminal

LOS ANGELES — The son of a man convicted of Nazi war crimes in Yugoslavia said Tuesday there will be no appeal for clemency following a decision by the Yugoslav Federal Court upholding a death sentence for his father.

Radoslav Artukovic said he expects all remaining appeals to be exhausted within 30 to 60 days. He said his 87-year-old father, Andrija Artukovic, may be executed before Christmas.

"That is the only step we're not going to take," Artukovic said of his appeal for clemency. "If he knew what was going on, my Dad would not ask for clemency, and I am not going to do so in his name."

The Yugoslav TANJUG news agency said Monday that the Federal Court had rejected the extraordinary appeal by Artukovic's lawyers, Zeljko Olujic and Silvije Degen, who said Artukovic's health had grown seriously worse since his trial ended in May.

But the Federal Court, after reviewing a hospital report, ruled that Artukovic's health had not grown worse to the point that it would require changing the sentence, TANJUG said.

Artukovic was extradited to the United States last Feb. 12. He had lived in Seal Beach, CA, since shortly after entering the United States in 1948 on a false passport. Yugoslavia says he was an interior minister and security chief of the Nazi puppet state of Croatia during World War II.

Zagreb District Court sentenced him to death after Artukovic was found guilty on May 14 of war crimes and crimes against humanity. He was held responsible for implementing policies which killed 700,000 Gypsies, Serbs and Jews in Nazi concentration camps.

Rad Artukovic has said his father was convicted by a court that would not permit any defense material against a prosecution witness who claimed he saw the older Artukovic commit atrocities.

Artukovic said he believes the U.S. Department of Justice's Office of Special Investigations gave credence to the witness at his father's extradition hearing, and blocked introduction of contradictory evidence against the witness.

# Confusion About Where to Vote After Sample Ballots Unreceived

Many registered student voters did not know where to vote in yesterday's election, although the county clerk's office claimed that it did mail sample ballots with information on poll locations.

"It's very irresponsible that we didn't get sample ballots. It deters voting," sophomore Laura Korbelak said.

"I didn't realize a number of people didn't get to vote," senior Jill Henry said, who also did not get her sample ballot. "I thought it was kind of confusing because I didn't know where to go."

"I'm kind of bummed, but I can sympathize with the county because they have all of these people in I.V. that are moving all the time. I've moved four times in the last four elections," senior Richard Rifkin said.

"There is a fairly reliable rumor going around that maybe a lot of

sample ballots weren't delivered," county elections supervisor Carol Acquistapace explained.

County officials are uncertain why the ballots were not delivered, with elections department clerk Elisa Moran explaining that \$20,000 was spent in postage alone.

According to Acquistapace, the county will look into the problem because "we've spent a lot of money and I want to make sure the job was done."

A portion of the mail might not have been delivered directly to residents of large apartment complexes or residence halls with a high concentration of students, Moran said. "In large areas the postman sometimes leaves them in a tray," she said.

Students were able to receive the needed information at a booth set up at the UCen by Assemblyman Jack O'Connell, D-Santa Barbara, who was up for re-election. The booth received an "incredible response," said Steve Barkan, a UCSB alumnus staffing the booth.

"There's a lot of people who don't know where to vote," Barkan said as he helped two students find their polling place.

The booth was nonpartisan, O'Connell said, calling it part of his campaign to get out the vote. Until yesterday, O'Connell was unaware that many students had not received their sample ballots. "Several people mentioned that to me today," he said.

Despite the problems with sample ballots, Acquistapace said the elections were running smoothly yesterday evening. The elections department received a number of phone inquiries about where residents could vote, "but that's common in every major election," she said.

"It's smooth but heavy," Acquistapace said of the phone calls. "The phones are real busy; a majority of the calls are questions of where people go to vote, but that's better than negative comments. For a major election this is usual."

# Woman Shot During Halloween in I.V.; Discovers Bullet Monday

A female UCSB student who thought she had been hit by flying rocks went three days with a bullet in her chest before discovering she had been shot, sheriff's officials said Tuesday.

As the woman walked across the street near 6689 El Colegio at approximately 9:30 p.m. Halloween night, she felt a sharp pain in the center of her chest, according to sheriff's spokesman Sam Gross. Although her wound was bleeding, she walked to her apartment and assumed her injury was the result of rocks thrown up by the tires of passing automobiles, he said.

The woman, whose age and residence were unavailable Tuesday, sought care at the UCSB Student Health Center on Monday when the gunshot wound was discovered. The incident was then reported to sheriff's deputies, Gross said.

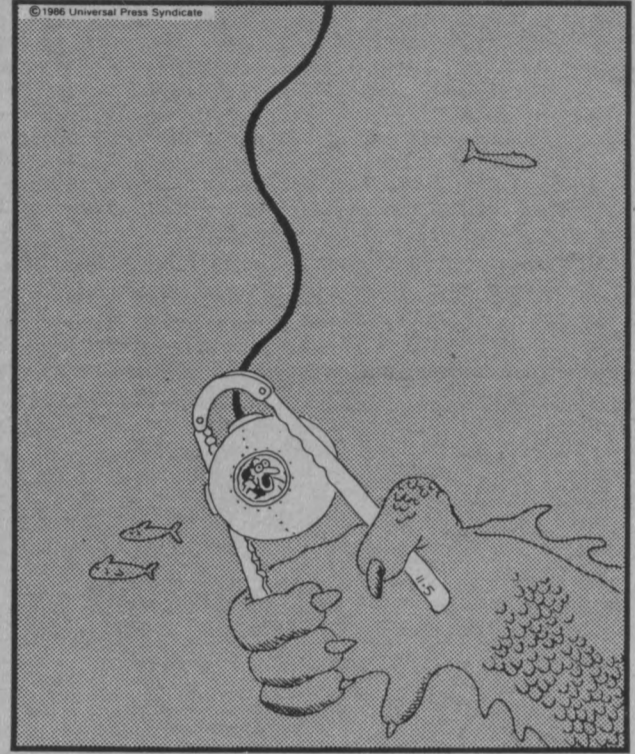
The woman was scheduled for surgery late Monday to remove the object from her chest, he added.

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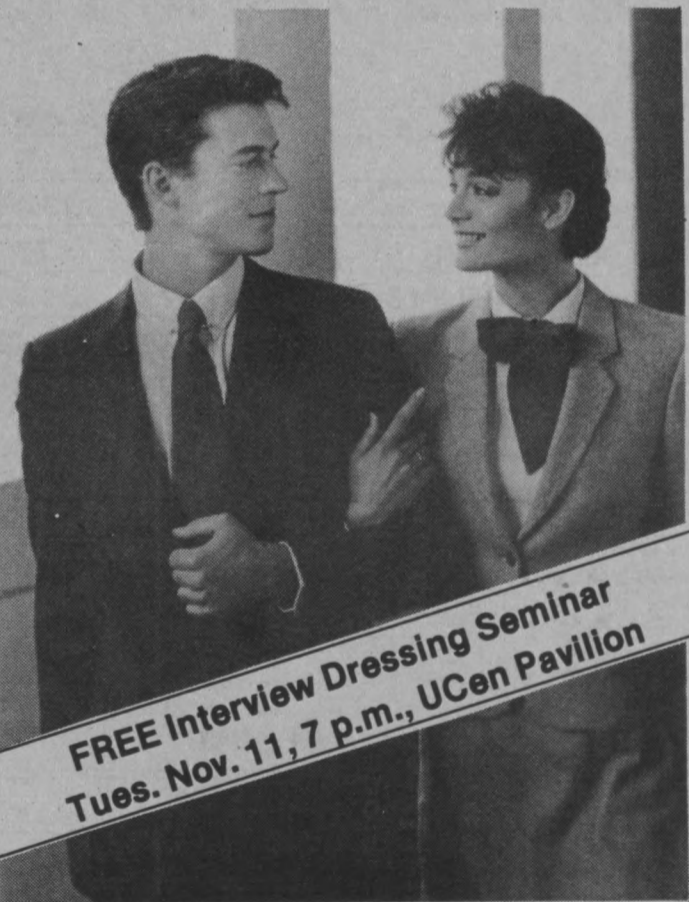
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# A.S. Prepares Final Details for Friday's 'Ur-Ine' Protest

An Associated Students subcommittee ironed out the final details yesterday for a planned "Ur-ine" on Friday to protest mandatory drug testing by the Reagan administration.

Originally scheduled to take place on Thursday, the non-conventional protest was postponed when the bottles that the A.S. Legislative Council purchased to hold the urine samples failed to arrive on time.

Though some people expressed concern that sending up to 500 bottles of human urine to the White Houses might be illegal, Leg Council member Brad Loel, the event's organizer, dispelled their fears.

"I called the Post Office and they said it was legal as long as the bottles are sterile and sealed," he said.

The bottles are going to be sent with a personal letter to President Reagan expressing council members' views on mandatory drug testing. "This (the mandatory drug testing) is saying you're guilty until you can pee in a jar and prove you're innocent," Loel said.

Council member Marc Evans agreed. "Reagan ran on a platform to get out of people's lives and now look what he's doing. It's (the testing) a crime against privacy ... you can lose your job from personal recreation," he said.

According to Loel, Leg Council members will set up a table Friday in front of the UCen "sometime around eleven in the morning," and will encourage students to urinate in protest until late in the afternoon.

The "Ur-ine" will be held simultaneously with a planned Peace Fest in Storke Plaza. Leg Council is expected to pass a bill at its meeting tonight which would make it co-sponsor the festival.

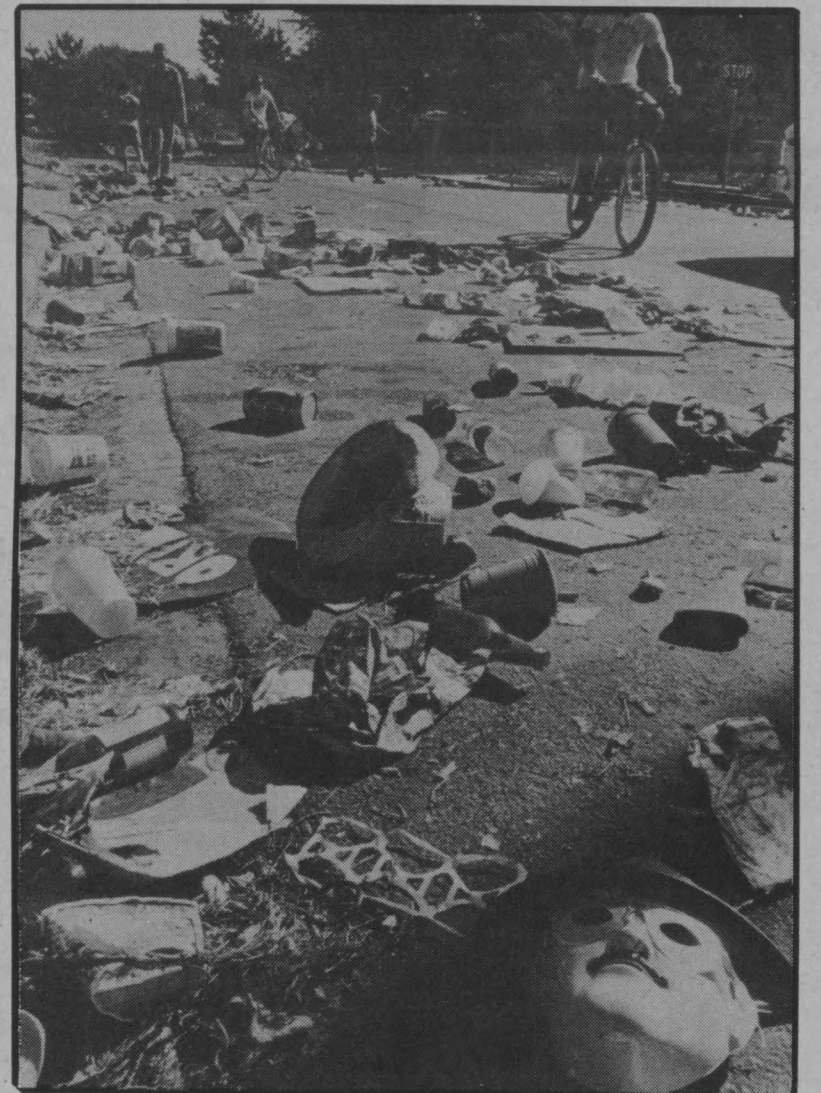
Although the two activities are occurring on the same day, Leg Council is not planning to make it one single event. "We don't want this to be a piss-fest," Loel said.

Council will also discuss a bill which would request the elimination of student funding for the Isla Vista Foot Patrol. Currently, each student pays \$12.75 a year, adding up to approximately \$240,000 in Foot Patrol funds.

Evans, the bill's author, does not believe students should be required to provide these funds. "I don't feel that funding police should be a condition for education," he said.

The Student Fee Advisory Committee, which is in charge of the funding, said at its meeting yesterday that further discussion is necessary before a decision can be reached.

According to Evans, his opposition to the funding is not necessarily a reflection on the Foot Patrol's performance. "I feel that since the I.V. Foot Patrol serves Isla Vista, Isla Vista should be taxed," he said.

**The Party's Over** — More than 30,000 people converged on Isla Vista last weekend, leaving a few tons of trash in their wake. The question now is who's going to clean up?

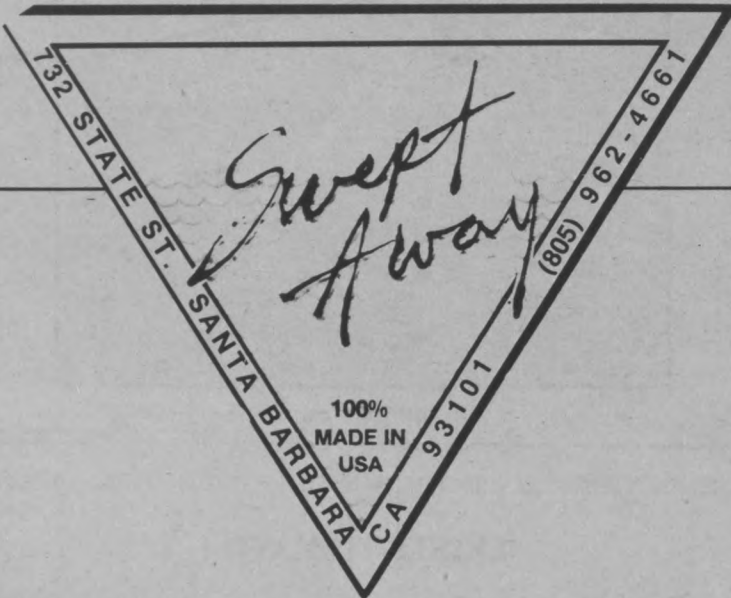
A street-sweeping machine from the Isla Vista Sanitary District swept through the streets of I.V. yesterday, as it does every other Monday, but the Sanitary District does not plan any additional clean-up.

Most streets in I.V., including Del Playa, hardly benefit from street sweeping because of the high density of parked cars.

At many complexes, either the residents or hired workers have cleaned up the lawns and driveways, but other complexes and streets remain covered in debris because no one has bothered to pick the trash up.

Workers from the Isla Vista Recreation and Park District expect to clean up three to four tons of trash from their parks. Approximately one-and-a-half tons of debris was left in Anisq' Oyo' park alone, I.V.RPD employee Tai Anderson said.

## SPAIN:

Spain is a country which conjures up a million images.

The great empire. Gold and silver. Glory and power. The New World belonged to Queen Isabel ... and Don Quixote, the tormentor of ferocious windmills. Idealism and romance. The characters of Ernest Hemmingway whose tragic stories often unfold in the cafes, bullrings and plazas of this sunny land. A civil war made international by the fervor and valor of liberals and intellectuals from a score of nations. Four decades spent under the fascist dictatorship of General Francisco Franco. The phenomenal art of Picasso and Dali.

Bittersweet is Spain's past — and its present is no different. There are things to celebrate and others to lament. To most there would seem to be only good things in Spain's horizon considering it has maintained, in the 11 years since Franco's death, a fairly stable democracy.

In 1936 Europe was dominated and terrified by the fascist regimes of Hitler in Germany and Mussolini in Italy. On July 17 of that year the Nationalists led by Francisco Franco rose up against the democratic and constitutional government (loyalists) then in power in Spain. Franco was aided by the fascists in Germany and Italy and the loyalists were left to fend for themselves by their democratic allies (Great Britain, France and the United States). By 1939 Franco had overthrown the government and was prepared to establish the totalitarian regime which would not end until his death in 1975.

It was then that the democratic process in Spain was brought back to life. Only once in 1981 was

there any threat to democracy when an attempt was made by military factions to take over the house of Congress and establish another military government. After holding the bulk of the nation's political leadership hostage for hours, the insurgents were convinced by King Juan Carlos to end their attempted coup.

Several democratic governments followed between 1975 and 1982, when socialist Felipe Gonzalez took over the country's leadership. At that time Spain entered an ambitious era characterized by the desire to become competitive with other European nations and change any image of an isolated nation it may have acquired during the Franco years. Gonzalez' aim was to

modernize and one of his reasons for this was to prepare Spain for entrance into the European Common Market which it did on Jan. 1, 1986. This modernization and membership in the common market has given Spaniards a new feeling of pride as they begin to feel more a part of Europe, and shed, year by year, the legacy of Franco's regime.

A stagnant economy was not the only remnant of that era. Franco's repression of the Basque region of northern Spain has left a scar on those people, which has become a violent quest for Basque secession from the rest of the country. The Basque country is the area where the Iberian peninsula's first inhabitants settled. This as well as the usage of a unique language

called Euskera are the source of immense Basque pride.

Things have changed drastically since the Franco years when usage of the language was prohibited, but even under the new freedoms given by a democratic government, Basques feel they do not have complete home rule. The Spanish government refuses to withdraw the large number of national police from the Basque country. Simply by their presence the police are a major source of conflict.

The fight for the realization of Basque independence was taken on by a terrorist group named ETA (Basque Homeland and Liberty) long before the return to democracy. The violence has, in

20 years, claimed more than 500 lives and has in the past months seen a large increase. As a result Madrid has lost some of its willingness to approach the negotiating table with Basque political groups that it considers tied to ETA.

Despite the struggles with the Basque country there has been one encouraging show of cooperation between regions of the country and the national government in the joint effort by the government and Barcelona (in the region of Catalonia) to make Barcelona the site of the 1992 Olympics. They were successful in their quest and this has greatly pleased Barcelona as well as the rest of Spain.

## Basque Terrorist Bombing Claims Three More Lives

In the last two decades much of the violence in Spain has been caused by the Basque separatist group called ETA. After the repression suffered by the entire nation, ETA's violent methods of conquering political ends were at least accepted and at times nearly cheered by the Spanish people. In the Basque country especially they had some financial, and a good deal of moral, support. In recent years, however, ETA's methods have become marked by violence for violence's sake and many innocent people have died. As a consequence, most people now feel ETA has gone too far, although it can be said they still receive sympathy and shelter from Basque citizens.

From *EL PAIS*, published in Madrid, Spain, Oct. 26, 1986.

Brigadeer General Rafael Garrido Gil, military governor of Guipuzcoa, died yesterday along with his wife and one son in a bomb attempt committed in downtown San Sebastian. Fourteen others were injured. Police blamed the commando Guipuzcoa of the ETA military of terrorist

actions. The organization itself took responsibility a few hours later for the assassination.

It was also yesterday that two demonstrations took place in the Basque country. One was held in Vitoria where PNV (Basque Nationalist Party) and other political factions demanded the freeing of the industrialist Lucio Aguinalde, now held by ETA. At that same time Herri Batasuna (a political party) and its supporters demonstrated in the streets of Bilbao, demanding negotiation between the government and ETA.

The triple assassination in San Sebastian was committed by two individuals who, from a high cylinder motorcycle, placed a bomb on the hood of the vehicle in which rode Gil, 59, his wife Daniela Velasco de Vidaurrieta, 57, and the youngest of their sons, Daniel, 16. All three died. The fourth occupant of the car, the driver Norberto Jesus Ferrer Lozano, suffered serious wounds. Thirteen other people in the immediate vicinity were also injured and taken to several hospitals in San Sebastian.

Excerpts from an *EL PAIS* editorial Oct. 26, 1986.

This editorial criticizes Herri Batasuna and PNV, the two major Basque parties, for their continued pressuring of the government for negotiation while at the same time failing to criticize ETA's actions. Herri Batasuna is considered the political arm of ETA, and Prime Minister Felipe Gonzalez refuses to talk with the political groups until they end their ties to terrorism.

Yesterday's occurrences further show complete rhetoric — that is, assassinating in the morning and in the afternoon participating in demonstrations to demand negotiations which will end the spiral of terror and repugnance which today symbolize political life in the Basque country. Those who play this double game — killing and supposed political debate — have a sinister capacity for pretense. Peaceful cohabitation is constructed through deeds, and the deeds of ETA and its killers only pursue death. The group united around *Herri Batasuna* can have some political ideas to share with Spanish

society, but silence in reference to yesterday's assassinations leads us to believe they are no different from the people who plant bombs, fire shots and practice blackmail. Basque society deserves some explanation for this contradictory behavior.



## Barcelona Chosen as Site for 1992 Olympic Summer Games

Barcelona was chosen by a large majority to be the site of the 25th annual summer Olympic Games by the International Olympic Committee which met in Lausanne, Switzerland. The games will take place between July 25 and Aug. 9, 1992. This will be the first time a Spanish city hosts the largest sporting event in the world. No sooner had he heard the news, Pasqual Maragall, mayor of Madrid phoned the king who offered encouragement in urging Maragall onto a second victory by ensuring the perfect organization of the Summer Games. All of the political and social organizations of Barcelona congratulated themselves on the success of Bar-

celona's candidacy and thousands of citizens poured onto the streets to celebrate the triumph.

Spanish government President Felipe Gonzalez repeated, in a televised message, the commitment of the government in assuring the financial backing and overall security of the games.

International Olympic Committee President Juan Antonio Samaranch announced the verdict at 11:28 p.m. to 500 million who watched the live announcement. In a comment issued to this newspaper he affirmed yesterday, after the vote, that "he knew Barcelona's candidacy was going well but I did not want to nor did I intervene" (*Samaranch is from Barcelona.*)

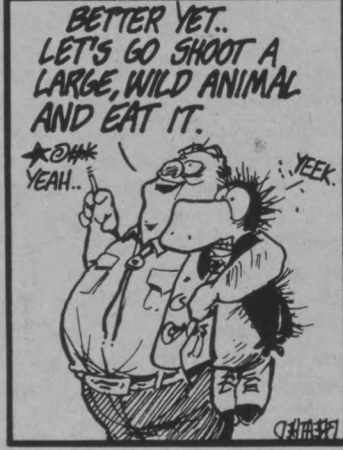

*Blue Velvet* was a disturbing movie. One of the most disturbing things about it to me was that it was not rated X. That it was not labelled pornographic, not by the critics, not by many viewers, not by the woman who starred in it.

That woman, Isabella Rossellini, said in a *Los Angeles Times* interview that she dismissed those who thought the film propagated a harmful image of women, because she's been a feminist for years. If some people thought it was masogyny, she said, she wasn't going to worry about it.

Perhaps we have all become so numb to the habitual abuse and sexual assault of women in film

One guy came up to my friend, put his arm around her neck and slurred, "Hey baby, are you going to be my date tonight?" No big deal right? that we no longer consider it pornographic, we consider it an artistic device.

What do we expect from art, or more specifically film as art? Should it disturb us? Help us to recognize our humanness? Help us to recognize the good, the bad, to reach for what is beautiful about our soul?

If art is to be worthwhile, it should help us answer the questions we have about society. It should be a part of an ongoing dialogue between viewers and artists, in which both are asking one another what can be done to improve interaction and communication between people.

*Blue Velvet* was provocative, but it didn't provide the viewer with a context or a frame of reference. It left people feeling disconcerted, but it didn't point them in any particular direction. It was pseudo-deep. It took the easy way out by using a (unfortunately) conventional means of shocking people — violence.

In the film, Rossellini is raped and beaten by Dennis Hopper's character. Another major character, played by Kyle MacLachlan, breaks into her apartment, and when trapped there watches her undress through the

slats of her closet door. Once discovered by her, he is asked to undress and then she gives him a blow job. When Hopper comes to the apartment, and rapes Rossellini, again, MacLachlan watches through the closet door doing nothing.

Viewers who liked the film have excused the violent abuse of Rossellini, the voyeurism of Kyle MacLachlan's character, and the twisted sadism of Dennis Hopper as a "technique" used by Director David Lynch to demonstrate to audiences that America isn't as rosy as Ronald Reagan makes it out to be.

Let's consider the audience. *Blue Velvet* wasn't a mainstream film. It was an artsy-fartsy-love-to-consider-things-deeply film. This audience needs to be told that we aren't living on the set of *Happy Days* or *Ozzie and Harriet*?

Others have excused the film's violence because it "makes them think," or because of the "unique" cinematography (much of which, incidentally, is done through a wide angle lens, and distorts and uglifies the human beings it portrays). Still others like the closure, the symbolism. The list goes on.

Film critics today are not willing to consider things deeply enough. They are willing to tell us that a film is disturbing, but they weren't willing to tell us why.

They were willing to tell us the film was explicit, but they weren't willing to tell us it was pornographic.

The film was not erotic. Erotica is a celebration of human sexuality and sensuality. It expresses humanness and character. It is difficult to make and it is difficult to find, because it takes talent — it's art.

Pornography is degrading, it involves objectification, dehumanization, and a perpetuation of negative sexual behavior. It contributes to a dangerous view: that people enjoy or should enjoy inflicting or sustaining pain, rape, and humiliation. It sometimes has a dangerous result — some people do.

The difference between the two is the difference between presenting pictures of bodies and capturing the character of people. It means portraying people making love rather than having sex.

Until we push for a dialogue in the mass media about the differences between pornography and erotica, and the education of those who write for us, we will continue to laud movies like this one. And until we stop praising violence and craving it in the movies we watch, we will continue to be insensitive to violence. It will remain an everyday occurrence, which none of us do anything to prevent.

English words meaning "sound" and is related to "heal," "hale" and "whole." But we lack models for what wholeness or spiritual health looks like. Heroes like Rambo or Schwarzenegger are certainly not pictures of spiritual health, so how will we know it when we see it?

I suggest that there are half a dozen criteria which sketch a healthy approach to life—an approach by which you can grasp life, instead of being squeezed by what happens and society's pressures. These six aspects of spiritual health have occurred to me through reflecting on the movements of Christian worship, but I think they can be applied to life in a general way whatever your religion or philosophy.

First, a spiritually healthy person has a sense of self-respect. You could think of this sense of self-worth as the palm of the hand which can grasp life. People who feel they are worthless cannot be inwardly healthy.

A sense of gratitude or gratefulness for life and for this world is the next criterion. This is the first finger of the hand—in spite of the negativities which come to everyone, life is basically good. A person who is embittered and feels this is a rotten world will not be spiritually whole.

Also necessary is the ability to step back and see yourself from a larger perspective. It is being able to be more objective about the way things really are in your life and then to receive and to give forgiveness and make

a fresh start. People who are so stuck in their subjective view of things that they can't say, "I'm sorry," and "It's O.K." are really stuck!

Another finger of the hand which is able to grasp life is the ability to care about others, or to use an overworked word, to love. The one who is unable to care about others is truly unhealthy. And along with caring is the ability to listen. Spiritually healthy persons are able to be open and to listen, not only to other persons but also to what life itself is saying to them. The person who already knows it all, has a closed mind and insists on doing all the talking, is like a stagnant lagoon.

The fifth finger of the hand which can handle life successfully is having a sense of purpose. When your energy and your aims are directed toward achieving something which is really worthwhile and which helps others, it gives zest and meaning to your life. Those who find life drab and meaningless have no calling to serve a higher cause.

So here is a model of what it means to be "healthy" and by which we can recognize spiritual wholeness: self respect, gratefulness, objectivity, caring, openness, and purpose found in dedication to a great and good cause. This is the hand by which you can grasp life and live wholly.

A woman can be walking down a street, or sitting on a couch at a party; she can be alone, or with other people; it doesn't really matter that much. The thing is, she's a woman and somewhere in the crowd around her there's a man who thinks it would be fun to hurt her.

And I mean really hurt her. A pinch on the butt might not scar her for life, but watch the guy slide his hand up her dress, watch as he grabs her and pulls her into a dark room, under a stairway, behind a bush, into his car. 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## Parking Situation Prompts New Regulations and Fee Increase

Efforts to remedy UCSB's congested parking situation in the past five months have resulted in both stricter limitations on who can park in campus lots and a 100 percent increase in the daily parking fee.

While an ordinance prohibiting students who live within one mile of UCSB from parking on campus has been in existence for 10 years, increased enforcement is now being applied to the ordinance in hopes of decreasing the number of cars on campus, administrators said.

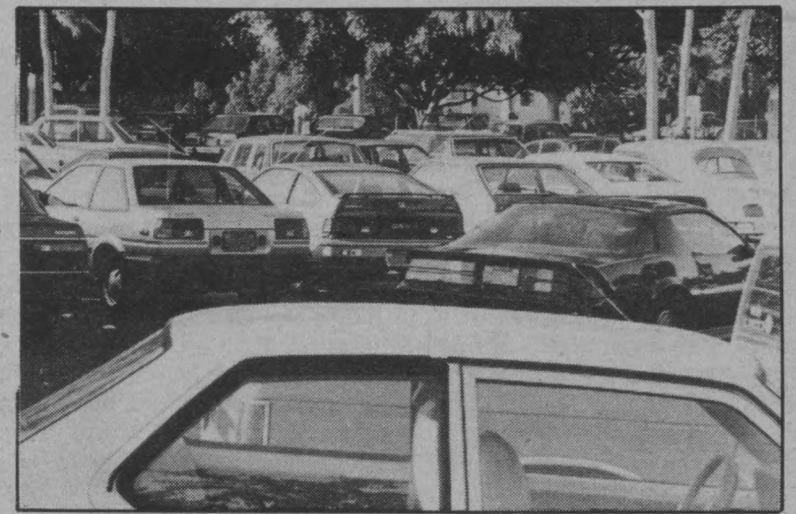
"The one-mile policy is nothing new," Acting Parking Services Manager Merrie Blackmar explained. "The policy of not allowing students living within one mile of UCSB to park on campus has been in effect since the early 70's."

Because of the difficulty in enforcing the one-mile limit, the regulation has been overlooked when selling daily permits in previous years, Business Services Manager Trenna Hunter said. However, a new window sticker given to those living outside the limit has allowed parking employees to enforce the rule more efficiently, she added.

Daily parking fees have also been raised from \$1 to \$2 to discourage students from parking on campus. Money raised by the parking fee increase "will be used to create a reserve fund for the new parking structure and pay for the increasing costs of parking maintenance, staff and repairs," Hunter said.

State law mandates that construction, operation and maintenance of parking facilities be funded solely by fees charged to the users, she explained.

According to campus planner Tye Simpson, the proposed parking structure would be located between the bioscience and engineering buildings. Planners

are currently advertising for an architect to design the structure and, if plans go as expected, construction of the facility should begin sometime next summer.

"It's in the proposal and approval stage. First of all, we have to gain the funding," Blackmar said.

The new campus parking regulations have received mixed reactions from staff and students.

Daily Nexus Graphic Composer Marshall LaCombe, who has commuted to UCSB for three years, started a petition drive to protest the inflated rates. "It just costs too much money to park here. I was never talked to about the increase, but I was supposedly represented by the staff council. I never had a problem finding a parking space, and the alternative transportation (the bus) is very inconvenient and inefficient," LaCombe said.

"Everything falls on the lowest denominator. People who can least afford it have to take the brunt of the raise," he said. So far LaCombe has collected approximately 200 signatures, and petitions are still being circulated.

"I live on the outer edges of I.V. and find it extremely screwed to live my life around a bus

schedule," UCSB sophomore Brian Bell said.

Dave Williams, another sophomore living in I.V., finds overcrowded bike paths a parking-related problem. "With none of the I.V. students driving, the bike path is a bitch. Even when I finally fight my way to class, I can hardly find a place to park my bike," Williams said.

However, some students believe that the new regulations will help alleviate campus parking problems.

"On rainy days and more popular days, finding a parking space was really hard. With the amount of people driving now it's very easy to find a space," said commuting senior Mark Walker.

John Rice, another commuting senior, also likes the changes. "I like the idea of the sticker, and the fee raise is a good deterrent to keep the people with alternative transportation from driving," Rice said.

According to UCSB Parking Services Manager Mari Tyrrell-Simpson, the new parking situation is working out well. "There was initially more work for the officers with giving out information, but tickets seem to be down with less people driving," she said.

## Torero Booters Host Gaucho Men Tonight

Today's matchup between the UCSB men's soccer team and the University of San Diego team shapes up as a battle between a team that hasn't lived up to its potential and a team that has exceeded its potential. Unfortunately, UCSB represents the former and USD the latter.

The Gauchos are currently 7-10-3 on the season, but with a few more lucky bounces and a lot less defensive mistakes, their three ties could have been wins and three or four losses could have been ties. The Gauchos have completely dominated games only to end up losing. It's been that kind of season.

On the other hand, no coaches on the west coast figured USD would be 15-2-0 as of last week, but that's exactly what they are. The Toreros, ranked fourth in the west, have been making a habit of beating teams with similar and even better talent than they possess.

Although this smattering of statistics favors host USD, it would be unwise to count the Gauchos out. UCSB is sporting a modest one-game winning streak after their impressive 3-0 whitewash of

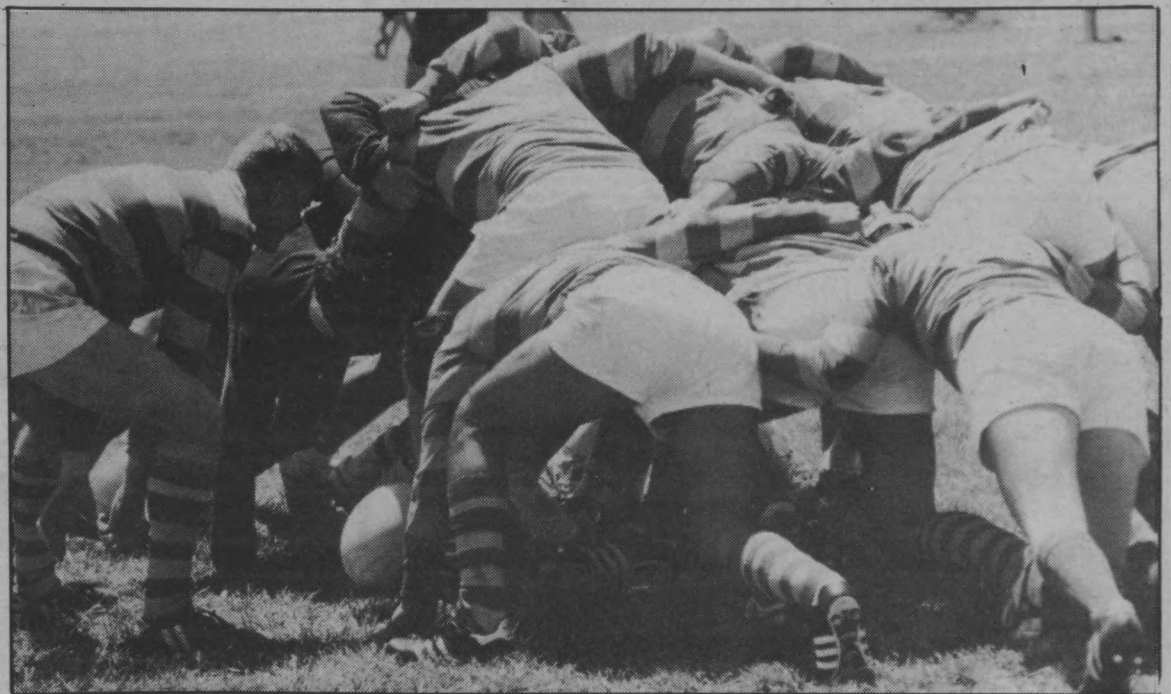
UC Irvine, but more impressively, the Gauchos have won the last six meetings between the two teams. The Gauchos have also played better on the road, with a 5-4-0 record in games away from Harder Stadium.

However, these statistics are not the reason for Coach Andy Kuenzli's calm, yet confident attitude. "They're an extremely good team this year, but ... we play with great determination against them," he said. "If we can build on what happened against Irvine, we can beat them. But we can't have any mistakes."

USD doesn't present any unusual problems for the Gauchos. "They have strong forwards, and we have to stop them," Kuenzli said. "Their defense is nothing special." In other words, Kuenzli is less concerned with the opponent than he is with his own team.

"Offensively and talent-wise, we can play with anyone in the west. The key is defensive mistakes," he added.

One way to predict the outcome of today's game is to look at UCSB's most recent result. In the second half against Irvine, the defense was flawless as goalie Tim Tipping had to make only two saves. A similar performance today could mean victory.

## UCSB Ruggers Dethroned at Tri-County Tournament, Defeat New Zealanders

UCSB rugby was back in action this weekend, playing three matches at Storke Field. On Saturday, the Gauchos defeated Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, 20-4 and lost to San Fernando, 8-0. On Sunday, UCSB beat Kia Toa, New Zealand, 16-3.

A lackluster performance cost the Gauchos their first match against a vigorous San Fernando side.

This loss disqualified UCSB from recapturing the Tri-County crown which they have won the last two years in a row. To compensate for their first loss, the Gauchos came back to rout Cal Poly SLO in a game that epitomized UCSB rugby: fast ball

movement with everybody touching the ball.

"When we play unselfishly and together, we are virtually unstoppable," Captain Brian Paie said of the team's performance. "In rugby, you have to rely on the collective unit. We didn't do that against San Fernando and did do it against Cal Poly; that explains the results."

On Sunday, in a very physical game, a combined UCSB and Santa Barbara Grunion side won an inspiring victory over a skilled Kia Toa touring side from New Zealand. The Grunions, who were the victors on Saturday in the Tri-County tournament, featured strong performances by players

such as Frank Rizzo and Kurt Frankenberg, while UCSB stars Tom Constantine and John Russell also gave outstanding performances.

"Americans are beginning to show rugby savvy that you wouldn't have seen two or three years ago," Russell noted. "That is why we are beginning to win matches and show strong performances against foreign sides."

On a sad note, All-American Bill Leverage suffered five broken vertebrae while scoring a try in the second half and will not be able to play until league play commences in January.

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

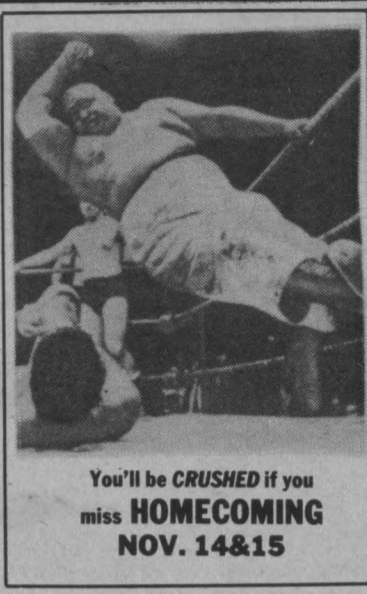

allocates for county programs by 9 percent over each of the next four years.

Santa Barbara city residents voted against Measure B, the rent control measure which would have set maximum rents at November 1985 levels, limited rent increases to 75 percent of the consumer price index and made tenant eviction much more difficult. It was voted against by 58.6 percent of the voters, while only 41.4 percent of the voters were in favor of it.

The mayor and city council members will receive salary raises due to passage of Measure C. 56.3 percent of the voters were for the measure, while 43.7 percent voted against it.

In passing Measure D, Santa Barbara citizens approved a plan for city funding of renovations to the Santa Barbara County Bowl. Votes in favor of the renovations tallied 80.2 percent, while 19.8 were against it.

Voters in the Goleta Water

District voted Measure E down, so the Goleta Water Board will not be able to increase the amount of water it will receive from state entitlements. The measure would have increased local water supplied from state resources by 550 or 2500 acre-feet of water per year, if either proposal had passed.

21.8 percent of the electorate voted for raising the entitlement by 550 acre-feet per year, while 27.7 percent voted against this plan. 21.7 percent voted to increase entitlement by 2500 acre-feet per year, while 28.8 percent were against this option. The measure failed because neither proposition won approval.

Measure F, also relating to the Goleta Water Board, passed. It will limit campaign contributions to candidates running for seats on the Goleta Water Board to \$500, if made by a group, but sets no limit on individual contributions. 66.2 percent voted for the measure, while 33.8 voted against it.
