Applications Due Monday For Homecoming Queen

"All luscious-looking women on campus are hereby notified to apply to be Homecoming Queen candidates right away," says a special release from the Special Events committee.

The applications, together with a petition signed by ten students and a \$2 entry fee, must be turned into the Student Body office, Building "D," no later than 4 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 1, according to an SEC edict.

The queen candidates will meet with Joyce Fenstad chairman of the Queen contest, on Oct. 3 to draw for photographers. Other important announcements will be made at the meeting, said Joyce.

Judging

This year for the first time in UCSBC history the Homecoming Queen will be judged by an impartial group of townspeople. In former years she was elected by the men students. Judging will take place at 12 noon Thursday, Oct. 18, in the Riviera Quad. The choice will be made by beauty contest standards, and the applause of the students will be given some consideration, according to the SEC.

Revue

That sensational show known commercially as the Galloping Gaucho Revue will officially open the 1951 Homecoming festivities in just three weeks! Thursday night, October 18 will usher in the first performance, highlighted by the coronation of the Queen and her court, according to Ed Monreal, show director.

SEC co-chairmen Ted Troy and Pat Welsh stated that applications and entry fees for all Homecoming events must be turned into the Student Body office the week of October 1 to 5, as announced in the brochure. Absolutely no blanks can be accepted after 4 p.m. Friday, October 5, said Pat and Ted.

House Decorations

House decorations will be judged on Friday afternoon, October 19 by an impartial committee from the faculty and administrative offices. The Homecoming theme, "C Shore Hit Parade" or a theme similar to "Let's Push the Poets" should be followed for the decorations in order to receive consideration by the judging committee.

Bob Grate, parade marshal, announced the details on the big parade today and said that all float chairmen must meet in North Hall 101 at 4 p.m. on October 10 to draw position numbers. This year the parade will proceed down State Street from Micheltorena to Haley, and Grate's assistants, Bill Kindel and Wayne Kluth are busily working on the details.

Rally

Everyone should be at the game by 7:45 p.m. for the pre-game bonfire rally, according to Shirley Stockton, rally committee chairman. The game is against the Whittier Poets and kickoff time is 8 p.m. sharp.

Homecoming will officially close after the game with two spectacular dances being held at the Montecito Country Club Annex for students and the University Club for alumni, it was announced by Jack Mertz, social committee chairman.

AWS elections will be held for Secretary, not Vice President, as was erroneously announced in the last issue of *El Gaucho*.

TESTS REQUIRED OF CANDIDATES

Constitution tests will be given to all students wishing to run for offices in the coming election, Bob Christofferson, ASB prexy, announced. They will be given in the Student Body Conference room on October 1, at 4 p.m. Associated Students Constitutions can be obtained from the Graduate Manager's office at any time.

Directly after the tests, two petition blanks are to be circulated for each candidate until 4 p.m. on October 5. At that time they must be returned to the Graduate Manager's office.

Offices for which there are vacancies are all freshman class offices, sophomore class vice-president, junior class vice-president, senior class president, AMS historian, and women's representative to the AWS board. New transfers are not eligible for offices because all candidates, except for freshman offices, must have completed one semester and twelve units with a C average before becoming eligible for an office.

At the required frosh meeting on October 3, at 7:30 p.m., all freshman candidates will be introduced and may give their qualifications or have someone else speak for them.

ASB CHAIRMANSHIPS FILLED; MANY JOBS STILL AVAILABLE

Two chairmanships of Associated Student committees have already been filled and one has been vacated, according to Bob Christofferson, ASB president.

Representative-at-large Sally Carter has been appointed Job Placement committee chairman, and Ed McCann, Student Union committee chairman. Ed held this same position last year. The Publicity committee chairmanship is now open because of the resignation of Marc Wallace.

Because Job Placement and Student Union are not standing committees, the chairmen can be appointed by the student body president with out ratification by the Legislative Council. Other appointments will be made at the council meeting October 2. Applications are being taken up to that time. Interested students with any experience in the fields mentioned are urged to apply.

The following chairmanships are still available: Awards committee, Artist Series board, Rally committee, World Student Service Fund committee, Roadrunner Revue director and Publicity committee.

Graduate Manager's Office Now Selling Football Tickets

Football tickets for all home games may be purchased in the Graduate Manager's office, it was announced by Russ Ericson, manager.

Student tickets are 25 cents, and students are urged to buy their tickets at school any time during the week before each game. This will help prevent congestion at the stadium ticket booths. Students have been reminded that they must present their student body cards when buying tickets, and also when entering the stadium. This year they may enter from any gate.

Special tickets may be purchased for husbands and wives of students. They will be sold only at the graduate manager's office for fifty cents.

At out of town games all students may enter free upon presentation of their student body cards, with the exception of the All-Cal weekend game in Los Angeles. Ticket prices for this game will be announced at a later date.

General admission, reserved seat, and season tickets can all be bought at the Graduate Manager's office and also at Pelch and Son, All American Sporting Goods, Roy E. Gammill, and Ott Hardware. Season tickets are being mailed out this week, and can be purchased until October 1.

GAUCHOS HEAD SOUTH TO YEAR'S FIRST GAME AT POMONA TOMORROW

At 8:00 p.m. tomorrow night, under the lights of Pomona-C Claremont College, Coach Roy Engle unveils the 1951 edition of the Santa Barbara College Gaucho football machine.

Facing the Gauchos in their initial effort, Pomona fields a relatively inexperienced squad. Sagehen Coach "Fuzz" Merritt features a contrasting team including 15 returning lettermen and 30 freshmen.

Single Wing for Pomona

This season the Sagehens will operate from the single wing, sparked by backs Mike Bagnall and Larry Wedel, a couple of 175-lb. speedsters, with power provided by Miller Lee, outstanding 200-pound fullback. It is understood, however, that Coach Merritt is making great use of the crying towel over his lack of reserve strength.

Line Light, Fast

P-CC (Pomona-C Claremont College) line shapes up as being light but fast and in pre-season practice sessions Larry Davis, 190-pound left guard, Andy Dunlap, 200-pound left end, and Ernest Rogeer, 200-pound right guard, seem rough and aggressive, and could cause Gaucho backs much trouble.

The Sagehens' passing attack is a completely unknown quantity. Whether the home team will be able to move through the air is a question to be answered tomorrow night. Either way Pomona is going to miss the pass-catching ability of Little All-Coast Roger Reinke, who graduated last year.

Engle Optimistic

Countering the factors in Pomona's favor was Coach Roy Engle's optimism regarding the Gauchos' chances following a week of intensive practice which seems to have welded the Gauchos into a force to be reckoned with. Also adding to Coach Engle's optimism was the fact that 240-pound tackle Chuck Miller is no longer practicing under the cloud of threatened

Rides Needed for Pomona Tomorrow

"All students who would like to go to the Pomona football game or who are going to Pomona for the game tomorrow night are asked to sign up in the Associated Student Body offices," Shirley Stockton, Rally committee chairman stated today.

"With the understanding that riders will help pay for gas, all car owners are urged to take as many students as possible," Shirley said. "We really want to support the Gaucho team in their first game of the season," she added.

With the Pomona game as a start, the Rally committee is organizing a program to boost school spirit that will include booster tags for all home games to be worn by the students, posters on campus and in town, car decoration before games, half-time stunts, Rally committee sweaters, and much more.

Rules have been drawn up to keep the rooting section more organized this year than it was last season. These will be enforced by committee members. They are:

1. No intoxicating beverages in the stands.
2. Rooting section consists of the roped off and guarded area.
3. All people in the rooting section must have rooters caps or pom-poms. There will be no exception.
4. Rooters are asked to cooperate with the yell and song leaders.
5. If people break these rules or conduct themselves in a disorderly manner, the rally committee reserves the right to escort them from the rooting section.

Members are still needed for the Rally committee. Those interested are urged to see Shirley Stockton for information. The committee is divided into six sub-committees and their chairmen: half-time stunts, John Robey; publicity, Nancy Anthony; posters, Margaret Feliz; field decoration, Hal Aarset; All-U Weekend, no chairman; and Galloping Gaucho Revue, Al Monreal.

The Coke Problem . . .

A ten cent Coca Cola machine was recently installed at the side of the Snack Shack which marked the raising of soft drink prices on this campus from five to ten cents. Naturally, this caused much indignation, and many complaints were made. We agreed with the stand taken against the raise, but upon investigation we have found many facts supporting it.

During the past few years the nickel bottle drink containers have been used here more than other types. From the use of these containers the Associated Student soft drink budget has stood a loss of \$410 in a period of two years.

Losses have been a result of the loss of bottles and various tricks used in getting drinks without paying. A great number of empty cases were stolen at night and then sold down town. Marauders were apprehended in an attempt to remove cases in the day time. It was even rumored that one student kept his family in shoes from the money he made on empty bottles. Believe it or not, but some people went so far as to remove the caps from the bottles while they were in the machine and by using a straw, to drink the contents.

The new coke machine, though it uses paper cups, holds the same amount of coke as the bottles. There is a catch to it though in that there is an extra cost for paper cups as well as an increase in the beverage prices. According to Graduate Manager Russ Erickson, the only way that the Associated Students can stay above board on beverage sales is to use this type of machine and raise the price to ten cents. He states also that other campuses all charge a dime in their machines.

The price raise, therefore, has come about because of the lack of cooperation by a few individuals and because of them the group as a whole must suffer.

The only way that five cent machines can be replaced on campus is with constant supervision over them. This isn't available under present conditions, so it looks like the ten cent coke machine is here to stay.

PLANS ARE BEING COMPLETED FOR JOB OPENINGS

Preliminary work on the committee was done last semester by Bill and Frank Goodall. The general idea of the plan is that students register with the committee for full time employment after graduation. The committee in turn sends the names to the UCLA office, where interviews will be arranged with many of the leading companies throughout the country.

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SENIOR MEN POOR IN SCHOLASTIC WORK FACE IMMINENT DRAFT THIS YEAR

Seniors who do not qualify as good students under the present Selective Service System will probably be drafted from the classroom during the next school year, according to information disclosed this week by Dr. Lewis F. Walton, Acting Registrar.

However, due to the critical shortage of engineers and other technicians, those in science courses may be deferred until graduation if they watch their appeal opportunities carefully, Dr. Walton pointed out.

Students deferred to complete their education will remain liable for draft duty until they pass their

35th birthday, if they have not received commissions through ROTC.

Freshmen entering college for the first time this fall are guaranteed by law the right to complete their Freshman year, and should they get draft notices before the end of the school year they can apply for "1-S" classification, which will defer them until June. ROTC students may apply for a 4-year deferment.

Sophomores and juniors have three chances to win a deferment. Students who enrolled in ROTC at the end of last year are safe, while students who took the college aptitude test this summer or who stand in the upper half of their classes may also get a "2-S" classification. The third chance is to apply for the new "1-S" classification, which is an automatic deferment not available to individuals who were deferred last year as students, Dr. Walton announced.

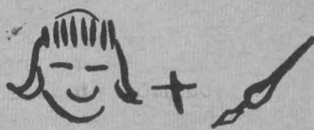

chances for an initial victory is a fast, fast backfield. If the forward wall can open up enough holes, and they won't have to be too large, the Gaucho backs will be through the Sagehen secondary before the defense can collect their wits.

Calling signals will be converted halfback Bill Davis. Bill will also be doing most of the passing chores and his running ability will be well remembered by those who followed the Gauchos last season.

Halves Loaded
The halfback spots are loaded with speedsters such as Ron Ternquist, Doug Gorrie, and newcomer Gary Morris, who has been breaking away from the field in recent scrimmage sessions. The fullback spot will be more than capably held down by tailback Dave Gorrie, who won all-conference honors last season and may be expected to give the Sagehen defenders a really hard time with his powerful plunges.

Coach MacPhail's Gaucho line will greatly outweigh Pomona's forward wall and even though many of the gridders will have to play almost 60 minutes of ball it should give a good account of itself, and if the reserve strength shapes up well it may go a long way. Such stalwart veterans as Adran Adams, Grant Gaunce and Ray Stark will see a lot of action and will be the mainstays of the line.

Reserves Mainly Untried
Much has been said of the Gauchos' lack of reserves. The Gauchos are thinner than last season, but if the as yet untried new men come through the situation is far from disheartening. At the end spots are George Mattias and Al Botts. Mattias is guaranteed to see a lot of action and in practice he has seemed to have glue on his fingers.

Minor Rootes and John Craven will really bolster the tackle positions and they will be farther backed by Dave Kevlin and Bill Peterson. Jerry Caldwell and Bob Leffingwell will hold down the reserve guard spots behind Bill Schaefer as linebacker. Marvin Ashby will also see a lot of ball from the center slot.

George Law and Craig Rice will assist Bill Davis in the signal calling duties and Bob Laskin and Les Harris will start at the halfback spots on defense. Gibby Dear will see lots of service as linebacker.

All in all the Gaucho football future looks pretty bright and with a few good breaks and the absence of the injury jinx the Gauchos could and should go a long way this year.
