

## Milton's Hell Becomes Paradise Compared to Hitler's Version

In his Biography of Mark Twain, Stephen Leacock says of the great humorist, "He did for American Hurnor what Shakespeare did for the English drama, and what Milton did for Hell. He put

After seeing a newsreel showing the famed poet's statue being toppled from its mount into a mass of debris as the result of a Nazi bomb, this writer wonders if even so great an imagination as that which created "Paradise Lost" could have depicted a more intolerable Hell than the one that today has in reality been placed across the entire map of Europe by a 20th century incarnation of Satan.

Leacock was wrong. Mark Twain's humor was real, strong, and eternal, while Milton's Hell was a farce, a pleasant fantasy, and a fad that faded with the passing years.

It is Adolf Hitler, not the poet Milton, who has created the real Hell, and it is his winged hordes who have actually put Hell on the map of Europe. D.J.P.
