A.S. Positions Up for Grabs

■ Sixty Students Contend for Top Leg Council Positions

In addition to present officeholders running for positions for the 1997-98 school year, the Associated Students candidacy call brought forth a multitude of new spring election hopefuls.

The candidacy declaration period, which ended Thursday afternoon, brought forth 11 students to run for A.S. president; five for internal vice president; five for external vice president for local affairs; two for external vice president for statewide affairs; and 37 candidates for the various Leg Council representative positions, which

include on-campus rep, off-campus rep, university-owned housing rep and rep-at-large.

Students run for office with a desire to make changes on campus and to make a



difference in students' lives, said A.S. Elections Committee Co-Chair Summer Doherty.

New Regent Stresses Diversity, UC Costs

Addressing her goals for the coming year, the incoming student representative of the University of California's governing body met constituents at a social event Thursday.

Student regent-designate Kathryn McClymond was introduced to a small group of 15 undergraduate and graduate students in an open reception organized by the Graduate Student Association. Currently a religious studies graduate student, McClymond is set to begin a yearlong term on the UC Board of Regents July 1.

During the evening, McClymond expressed her commitment to the maintenance of diversity throughout the UC system.

"I think that diversity on the UC campuses strengthens the campuses, quite apart from whether or not we represent the state," she said. "Whether the student population is like the population of the state ... is important to me. But, what's just as important to me is that the UC campuses be a top-ranked university. ... Every single top-ranked university in the country values diversity."

McClymond also spoke of her concern for the ever-increasing cost of University education, an issue that came to her attention while teaching last summer.

"Most of my students were taking three courses and working at least 10 hours a week," she said. "I was just [horrified] that anyone has to juggle that and they just said that was the only way for them to get through college in four years."

Despite the brevity of the one-year position in comparison to the 12-year term served by governor-appointed regents, McClymond feels she will have a fair opportunity to interact with the other board members.

"I have not felt that they want to ignore me," she

Officials Appointed to UCLA, Berkeley

The UC Board of Regents approved new chancellors to lead the University's two flagship campuses Thursday.

After reviewing over 200 applicants per campus, President Richard Atkinson and the board of regents decided to appoint Harvard Provost Albert Carnesale and University of Texas, Austin, President Robert Berdahl to the positions at UCLA and UC Berkeley, respectively, during a special meeting.

Although neither of the new chancellors are from within the UC system, the men are qualified and will do respectable work, Atkinson said in a teleconference with the press following the announcement.

"There was no intention to go inside or outside the UC system. There are obviously some wonderful inside candidates, but the two outstanding chancellors are from outside the universities," he said.

Berdahl feels he is ready for and looking forward to the challenge of being the successor to outgoing Berkeley Chancellor Chang-Lin Tien.

"I think following someone as successful as Tien has proven to be a big challenge. He is an inspiration to all of us. I am a different person with a different stamp, so the best thing I can do as chancellor is be myself to see that the university is a premiere campus," he said.

Although the transition from Austin to Berkeley may be difficult, Berdahl said he is excited about the change but will maintain close relations with UTA.

"What excites me about Berkeley is the quality of the institution and the people there. It is an institution of internal consequence and the opportunity to try to improve that and leave my mark there is an exciting challenge," he said.

Berdahl hopes to see his new campus thrive

National Magazine Report Bestows Honor

An academic department has recently been awarded national recognition due to its high ranking in a study conducted by a national publication.

U.S. News and World Report declared in its annual report that the UCSB graduate engineering program placed 24th among the top-25 engineering schools in the nation. This honor was bestowed upon the department due to improvements made over the last few years, said College of Engineering Dean Venky Narayanamurti.

"I think it is nice in the following sense: When I first came here, *U.S. News and World Report* was ranking us the best up-and-coming school. So now that it has ac-

tually happened, that was nice," he said.

Chancellor Henry T. Yang congratulated the work of the engineering faculty.

"Under Dean Venky's able leadership and with the efforts of our outstanding faculty, the college is moving in the right direction," he said.

The program has made strong improvements in part due to the impressive strides made by the staff and the higher graduate turnout of the department, Narayanamurti said.

"A lot of it is our faculty qualities. When I came in '92, we had three members from the National Academy of Engineering, now we have 12. We have been generating very high [amounts of] research dollars. The number of doctorate students has increased. We have far more



Donation Microscope Points at Assistant



WASHINGTON (AP) — Bombarded with questions about Hillary Rodham Clinton's top aide accepting a \$50,000 political contribution at the White House, a spokesperson said bluntly, "There was nothing noteworthy about this."

Except that the episode skirted close to the edge, if not past the line, of laws banning political fund raising in government buildings — and ran counter to a 1995 memo by the White House counsel warning against receiving political contributions at the White House.

With each unseemly disclosure about its fund-raising practices, the Clinton White House has employed the same strategy: Blame a political system that requires astronomical amounts of money to stay competitive, defend its practices as within the boundaries of campaign laws and accuse Republicans of doing much the same.

To many, the White House's lawyerly defense

of its activities borders on arrogance, and betrays Clinton's promise to lead the most ethical administration in history.

On Thursday, for example, White House press secretary Mike McCurry read from campaign-finance law as he made the case that it was not illegal for Maggie Williams, the

Chung provided the check to Williams at a time he was seeking access to the president and first lady, and had previously spoken to Williams about contributing to the Clintons.

Given that, "She has a huge problem," said Benjamin Ginsberg, a Republican attorney who specializes in campaign law. "That is not somebody innocently opening an en-

velope and finding a check in there." A Democratic campaign-finance attorney agreed with Ginsberg but thought prosecuting such a case would be unlikely.

Vice President Al Gore also took the lawyerly approach in defending his making 1996 campaign fund-raising calls from his government office. Gore said he had been advised by legal counsel that his actions were not illegal.

Attorney General Janet Reno said the "significant phrase" in that law is the legal definition of a contribution, which requires the intent "of influencing any election for federal office."

Technically, the political parties are not allowed to spend "soft money" to directly advocate the election or defeat of a candidate for federal office. Yet the vast majority of the DNC's soft money was spent to help Clinton.

Yet Gore said he would not do it again.

"It is so ironic that these people cut their political teeth in the Watergate era, when this same defense was used to rather poor reviews by the liberal cognoscenti," said Ginsberg.

Also, the Clinton Justice Dept. suggested Thursday that the large "soft money" contributions like those made by Chung might not be covered by the law that bars solicitation or receipt of contributions in federal buildings.

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Dornan Allegations Prompt Registration Drive



SANTA ANA (AP) — An embattled immigrant rights group collected 10,000 blank enrollment forms at Orange County offices Thursday and said it would fight claims of voter registration fraud with its most promising tactic — more voter registration.

The counteroffensive by Hermandad Mexicana Nacional, embroiled in a dispute over the election that upset nine-term Rep. Robert K. Dornan, was joined by two other Hispanic groups and two labor unions, said Nativo Lopez, executive director of Hermandad.

Dornan, who lost Nov. 5 to Democratic newcomer Loretta Sanchez by 984 votes, has contested the election in the House of Representatives, the final arbiter.

Armed with subpoena power, Dornan has demanded documents from government agencies as well as parties, campaigns and Hermandad.

"We won't be intimidated by Dornan's strategy," Lopez said Thursday outside the county registrar's office, where he and aides loaded 10 cardboard boxes full of voter registration slips into the back of a pickup.

Volunteers will target the immigrant neighborhoods of central Orange County, where thousands of Spanish-speakers have either become citizens recently or soon will, Lopez said.

The group has a goal of 10,000 new voters this year and 10,000 next year, he said. The effort isn't aimed at a specific election, but is aimed at signing up people year-round and weeding out anyone on the rolls illegally, Lopez said.

Investigators from state, local and federal governments are looking into allegations that immigrants who took citizenship classes at Hermandad registered or voted Nov. 5 before being sworn in as citizens.

Several dozen alumni have told newspapers they did just that, not knowing it was illegal.

Not enough Hermandad registrants voted to make a difference for Dornan anyway, the organization said.

"Even if every vote associated with Hermandad were thrown out, Dornan still loses by over 400 votes. Why hasn't this very important point been brought out?" said a press release issued Thursday.

Hermandad last year also offered a car as a raffle prize in a registration drive, but officials said the promotion was called off after they were advised it would break campaign laws.

In the election Sanchez became the only Democrat to hold a major public office in Orange County and the only woman in its congressional delegation.

She has repeatedly denied any links between her campaign and Hermandad, and has accused Dornan of being a sore loser.

The Republican-majority task force that is hearing Dornan's complaint plans hearings here April 19, a proceeding that could draw attention to the broader question of federal assistance for immigrants.

Dornan's former colleagues in the House have challenged the Immigration and Naturalization Service to justify its role in helping newcomers become U.S. citizens and asked why it subcontracts services like citizenship classes to non-profit companies like Hermandad.

Increased Protection Status Sought for Alaskan Sea Lions



WASHINGTON (AP) — Environmentalists criticized the Clinton administration Thursday for dragging its feet on an overdue decision to declare Steller sea lions endangered in parts of the North Pacific Ocean.

They urged a ban on factory trawler fishing near Alaska by the year 2000 in order to rebuild fish stocks that they say the marine mammals will need to bring them back from the brink of extinction.

"It is time for the National Marine Fisheries Service to do what it should have done eight years ago. They are going to study this animal to death," said Gerry Leape, an organizer for Greenpeace.

The fisheries service is expected this month to change the status of the sea lions from threatened to endangered in the Bering Sea and western Gulf of Alaska, along the Aleutian Islands.

However, agency officials say they can't pinpoint the cause of the population drop and therefore are unlikely to order any specific additional protection for the Stellers even if they are declared endangered.

"Greenpeace has a kind of simplistic view of marine biology on this issue," said Brian Gorman, a spokesperson for NMFS in Seattle.

"The best marine biologists in the business are looking into this and they still don't know what is causing the population declines," he said. He said the listing decision should come within a week or so, acknowledging it is overdue.

"Often in dealing with the Endangered Species Act we have to make a choice between doing it right or doing it on time. We opt all the time for doing it right even if we're in violation of the rules," Gorman said.

Greenpeace and other environmental groups petitioned the agency in 1989 to protect the Steller sea lions under the Endangered Species Act.

Student Health Services Bill Passes Uncontested

In addition to voting down a campaign spending bill Wednesday, members of the Associated Students Legislative Council approved measures to place two proposed lock-in fee increases and two new lock-ins on the upcoming A.S. election ballot.

The controversial Student Health Services increase bill, which gives students an opportunity to choose between a \$2 and \$3 lock-in fee increase, passed unanimously. The bill came in response to a request by SHS to place a \$17 increase on the ballot due to budget cuts from registration fees that will occur next year. After careful consideration of the SHS budget and other documents, bill author Rep-at-Large Trinity Eyre felt a smaller increase was more realistic and would adequately solve the problem.

"We thought the amount was somewhat excessive to some extent in some instances," she said. "We think that the \$2-\$3 increase is fair and more accurate of what they will lose."

However, SHS student advocate Jennifer McDonnell, who came to the meeting supporting raising the lock-in by \$17, was upset with Leg Council's decision to support only a \$2-\$3 increase.

"You may think you are doing UCSB students a favor by supporting a cheaper initiative to vote on but, in reality, you are screwing us over because each visit is going to cost anywhere from \$30-\$40," she said.

But any increase above the \$12 SHS already receives is unwarranted, said Off-Campus Rep Greg Prill.

"To be blunt, I would like to see this not funded by a student fee. I would like to see this funded by a university fee because it is not a student-run organization," he said. "The SHS is trying to provide a service that it fiscally can't. Fees are going to continue to go up as long as SHS continues to operate under its current paradigm."

The council also passed a bill to place a \$4 recreational sports lock-in increase on the ballot with a vote of 15 in favor, one opposed and one abstention. Many students were present to show support for the bill.

The increase is the only way to continue the sports club program at its current capacity in the face of budget cuts from registration fees, said sports club student director James Lucus.

"This is a quality program. We are producing national champions. It's open to everyone. We don't cut and we have a huge number of participants: 600 in sports clubs, 3,000 in the adventure programs. There's 890 intramural teams per quarter," he said.

The council also voted unanimously and with little de-

bate to place a 75-cent MultiCultural Center lock-in fee on the ballot.

Queer Student Union Co-Chair Erin O'Brien spoke in support of the measure.

"MCC is one of the few spaces on campus that is a truly safe place for queer students. We need to maintain that space," she said.

The lock-in was also supported by Irish Club member Seth Nyu.

"As a new club, MCC provides [us] facilities at a reasonable rate. Because of the limited funding for new clubs, it has been very instrumental in helping us," he said.

A proposal for a \$1 A.S. Program Board lock-in fee for special-events funding was also placed on the ballot with 15 council members in favor, one opposed and one abstaining. The number of groups the board had to turn down for special-event funding due to limited resources this year showed sufficient grounds for the creation of the bill, said bill second On-Campus Rep Amy Mitchell.

"The reason this is created is so student groups who want to put on a small event, or a large one, who don't have the money and don't know how to do it can go to [the] program board," she said.

In other business, the council passed a position paper supporting campaign finance reform but voted down a bill that would create a bylaw limiting campaign spending with eight in favor, eight opposed and one abstention.

The campaign spending bill was a direct result of last year's A.S. elections, said student sponsor David Fortson.

"On all sides of the political spectrum, there's these needs to raise money because of last year's election," he said. "We want to get quality folks in there, not the folks with the most connections."

The bylaw change was the best way to keep A.S. elections fair and accessible to all students, said bill author and Rep-at-Large Aaron Cohen.

"A.S. elections should be based on the most qualified candidates, not the most affluent candidates," he said.

Despite support for the ideals of the bill, concern over legal issues raised opposition to the proposal. The 1976 U.S. Supreme Court case *Buckly vs. Valejo* established campaign spending limits as unconstitutional because they limit freedom of speech, Prill said.

"We can't knowingly support something that is illegal," he said.

IVRPD Development Depends on Prop 218

In addition to retrofitting play equipment, major work plans for several Isla Vista parks were discussed at a meeting of the Isla Vista Recreation and Park District Board of Directors Thursday.

The board discussed the reconstruction of drip irrigation systems, planting of new trees and improvement of children's play equipment for various parks in hopes that a special tax will pass in the June election. Without the tax, the district could face serious revenue loss due to the effects of Proposition 218, which would allow land owners to determine the fate of the IVRPD's benefit-assessment district.

Although board members felt park improvements were necessary, IVRPD director Diane Conn was skeptical of planning too far ahead without the safety net of an approved special tax.

"I'm not willing to support an irrigation system or new equipment unless the special tax passes," she said. "We should revisit these items after June 3."

Part of park reconstruction includes installation of new play equipment, which is needed to conform with current safety standards, said IVRPD

General Manager Derek Johnson.

"The play equipment at Children's Park is important and heavily used," he said. "If we don't have money for replacement, it would have a profound impact."

The board motioned to remove and rejuvenate the equipment at Children's and Trigo-Pasado Parks, with only Conn abstaining.

The board also discussed a Del Playa Seawall Owners Association proposal to form a Geological Hazard Abatement Assessment District in order to construct a seawall along Del Playa Drive. The district opposes the seawall, does not want to be included in the GHAAD's formation, and decided to appoint IVRPD Chair Peegen Soutar as a district representative against the proposal.

"Because of unknown costs and conditions, the district does not want to be included in any aspect in the application of a seawall," Soutar said.

The district also discussed the approval of a license and mutual release agreement to allow a chicken coop on Kid's Trail Park. Absentee landlord Jim Freeberg maintains a chicken coop on the park through an agreement with the district.

Goleta Cityhood Plans Forwarded

With support from Associated Students, proponents of incorporating the Goleta region into cityhood are planning to ask the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors to forward its proposal to the next level of project analysis.

The Committee for Goleta Beach, comprised of several area residents from different community sectors, will approach the supervisors within the next few weeks, requesting the board to forward its cityhood proposal to the county's Local Agency Formation Commission.

LAFCO must perform a comprehensive fiscal analysis and approve the CGB plan before the cityhood movement can go to a public ballot, which will decide Goleta's potential municipality.

At Wednesday's A.S. Legislative Council meeting, a position paper advocating that the supervisors forward the CGB proposal was overwhelmingly approved, adding fuel to the proponents' cityhood-seeking machine, said bill author Off-Campus Rep Jackie Jackson.

"[The bill is] not an endorsement of cityhood, it's just a recommendation that they look into the analysis of Isla Vista

and Goleta cityhood," she said. "The entire Isla Vista community would have better representation in a city government."

However, the municipality proponents are requesting the supervisors forward their proposal because they are reluctant to solicit signatures to obtain LAFCO's consideration, said I.V. Property Owners Association Executive Committee Chair and cityhood opponent Charles Eckert. The CGB has the option of collecting the signatures of one-fourth of the proposed city population — approximately 13,000 names — to reach LAFCO.

"They don't have sufficient will, sufficient dedication, [or] sufficient interest ... to go out and get the signatures," he said. "These guys want to go this way, and the reason is that it's the lazy man's way."

But prior to formulating an opinion regarding the cityhood proposal, area residents need a complete overview of the plan's merits, said CGB member Pegeen Soutar.

The recommendation of A.S. is a boon to the municipality movement and displays growing area advocacy for the plan, Soutar added.

"I think it's wonderful that Leg Council is taking an interest in this," she said.

A.S. Computerizes Book Exchange

A campus organization has recently set up an Internet site where students can display ads to buy and sell used books.

Currently, the World Wide Web site consists of a list of classified ads, but site monitor Associated Students Business Services Chair Veronica Moon would like to make the site more accessible.

"We're putting up a box on the page which will search for [the] book you want," she said.

Moon said she created the website to replace the inefficient book exchange ASBS provided in previous years.

"There used to be a book exchange where we'd set up tables and chairs outside the UCen. The problem was that it wasn't at a set time, and it was harder for students to come to school with their books," she said.

The new exchange program is designed to increase accessibility for students, Moon said.

"The ads show you the best deal, and then you e-mail that person," she

said. ASBS feels the book exchange allows students to challenge the set prices of local textbook outlets, said Leg Council liaison to ASBS and Rep-at-Large Trinity Eyre.

"It's putting a check on the UCSB and I.V. bookstores. We don't feel that their buy-back [policies

give] students a high enough percentage [of the original purchase price]," Eyre said. "The students can set their own terms and so that's what's good about it."

At no cost to A.S., Moon created the site with the help of Darryl Lee, systems administrator of the Network Computer Devices company and former

UCSB student.

"The job of Associated Student [Business] Services is to let students know about A.S. [Business] Services, and then oversee and help them," she said. "This new idea does both at once."

Students are pleased with the creation of the new website.

Undeclared freshman Cindy Stricklen believes it will be helpful to students for a number of reasons.

"I think it'd be useful because you'd be able to find out before your classes which books that you needed and which books you could actually get," she said.

Senior Spanish major Roselle Lagunza is enthusiastic about the efficiency of the new program.

"I'm a graduating senior and I can finally get rid of all my accumulated books without waiting in line," she said.

Ph.D.s coming out of the college," he said.

U.S. News and World Report Director of Research Robert Morse agreed that the campus was, statistically speaking, quite impressive.

"You have one of the highest numbers of members from the National Academy of Engineering. You had strong numbers compared to the other schools," Morse said.

However, the campus lost points in other areas, Morse said.

"The reputation ranks would have to get better," he added.

This element overshadowed the better aspects of the college, Narayanamurti said.

"Obviously we want to keep improving [the university's overall reputation], and the perception of our colleagues. I believe our ranking should be somewhat higher, in the top ... 15 or 20," he said.

Also detracting from the ranking of the engineering department was the size of the program in relation to other universities, according to Narayanamurti.

"A lot of schools on the list are very large. We are a small, medium-size school. We're not a big engineering school. The small schools ... it's very hard for them to go beyond [10th] or [15th]," he said.

However, this honor brings increased opportunity for job networking to members of the engineering program.

"I think what will help is that we will keep attracting better and better students, and it will also help in job networking, obviously," Narayanamurti said.

said. "I think they want the student regent to be a contributing member of the board because it looks good for them if they're working with the student regent. So the trick is to be the kind of person who can work with the regents without forgetting the students in particular."

McClymond believes that hearing the concerns of the student population is an integral part of her duties as student regent.

"I think she is quite friendly and willing to accept all sorts of input," he said.

GSA External President Anastasia Telesky expressed enthusiasm for McClymond and her upcoming term.

"I think it's fantastic that we have a student regent coming from UCSB for the first time in 22 years," she said.

"You have people who are always sitting around not getting things done, and I think some people would like to take it upon themselves to get involved instead of complaining about stuff not getting done," she said.

Rep-at-large candidate and junior political science major Elizabeth Briceno believes her own experiences as a student can make her a contributing member of A.S.

"Just this year I've become more involved. I've been affected by more issues. ... I want to make a difference," she said.

Off-Campus Rep Zack Stillings, who is vying for the internal vice presidency, hopes to make more progress with his present endeavors by being elected for the

coming school year.

"The projects I'm working on right now probably aren't going to be finished by the end of the year," he said. "I'd like to see those carried on and I think I'd be the most effective person to carry those on."

The A.S. Elections Committee will have its hands full with the upcoming elections, Doherty said.

"Our job is to make sure that we run a smooth and fair campuswide election," she said. "Our main goal is to get people to vote. We need 20 percent to vote and we actually have a pretty hard time getting that. We want [students] to realize that A.S. isn't just an elite group. This is everyone's school. This is everyone's situation."

Foot Patrol insisted that she issue a statement and identify the suspect, she assumed this was enough to place him into custody.

A.S. Rep Explains Lock-in Politics

I am addressing this message to the entire student body. However, I feel the need to address one group in particular: those of whom I have worked closely with on the Student Health Advisory Committee. Your burning questions to me, as well as the rest of your Legislative Council, must be: **What happened? and Why?**

Before I answer these questions, allow me to bring the rest of this campus up to date on the issue. Currently every undergraduate student pays a \$12 lock-in fee to Student Health Services. SHS also receives funding from other student sources, such as registration fees and a \$20 per-quarter first-visit fee.

Yet despite all this student money coming in, SHS told Associated Students Legislative Council that this money was not enough. It was for this reason that SHS wished to put a lock-in fee increase ranging from \$8-\$17 on this year's A.S. election ballot.

It then became the daunting responsibility of this year's Leg Council to examine the facts and find a reason for allowing a 140 percent lock-in fee increase to appear on the ballot. In asking my constituents how they felt on the matter, I gave them the facts as clearly as I could. I informed them that if they approved the \$17 measure, the first-visit fee of \$20 would be eliminated.

I received a great deal of feedback both for and against the fee increase. It is for this reason that I originally felt that Legislative Council should leave it up to the students to decide whether they wanted either increase of \$8 or \$17.


There were many representatives, including some of our executive officers, who damned the increase outright from the beginning without even looking at a budget.

Nonetheless, those of us who acted on the matter scheduled a meeting this past Monday with Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs Michael Young and two chief staff members at SHS.

The SHAC, including myself, had neglected to objectively examine the SHS

their records. To my disappointment, the questions we asked were not answered to my satisfaction. On several occasions, the SHS administration admitted that the records they had submitted to Associated Students were not accurate.

At Wednesday night's Leg Council meeting, we approved unanimously (18-0-0) that a \$2 or \$3 lock-in increase for SHS will appear on the spring election ballot. Although this is not what SHS initially requested, we feel that this is much more reasonable.

budget up to this point. To prepare for Monday's meeting, Rep-At-Large Trinity Eyre, On-Campus Rep Amy Mitchell, Off-Campus Rep Zack Stillings and myself all met Sunday night to share student feedback and various opinions and to thoroughly analyze SHS's budget. I began Sunday's meeting believing that it was in the best interest of the student body that Leg Council approve SHS's request. All four of us had already reviewed the budget and compared notes. We talked nonstop for nearly five hours at Java Jones, contemplating many issues and often arguing.

I went into the Monday meeting in the vice chancellor's office believing that the Student Health Service staff would be able to respond favorably to our questions pertaining to matters such as individual staff salaries, future lock-in fees, co-payments and the accuracy of

Dissecting and evaluating SHS's budget was part of our elected responsibility. Students rely on us to accomplish this task and we did our duty to the utmost extent. I urge all the students who work on SHAC, as well as other students who may be upset by our decision, to seek us out. We want to talk to you and explain in greater detail why we did what we did. We work in the Associated Students office — the phone number there is 893-2566.

In conclusion, I understand from experience that the staff at Student Health are some of the kindest, most professional medical staff that one will find. However, the fact remains that because the budget presented to us was not one we agreed with, we could not allow Student Health Services to request such a large increase.



Bring It All Back Home

I.V. Credit Union Offers Leg Council Alternative to Investing in Mitsubishi

Last week, A.S. Legislative Council passed a bill that officially pitted our student government against Mitsubishi Corporation.

A.S. joined the Rainforest Action Network in a nationwide boycott of Mitsubishi, the largest corporate destroyer of rain forests, according to bill author and Rep-at-Large Dan Schneider.

Yet leggies received a most unwelcome surprise at last Wednesday's meeting — one that throws a sizeable wrench into leggies' good intentions in the Mitsubishi boycott. During the weekly financial report, it was revealed that A.S. investments include Janus mutual funds, Janus being a subsidiary organization of — alas! — leggies' supposed enemy, Mitsubishi. In effect, leggies have morally condemned the corporation, but they financially support it.

This announcement could not have come at a worse time — on the agenda was a follow-up bill to the first boycott bill that would advise against investing in or purchasing the products of Mitsubishi. Ouch. Adding salt to the already stinging wound, it turns out the Janus investment has proven to be a safe and profitable option with healthy returns to A.S. finances — demonstrating that the company could not be more appropriately named as the mythological two-headed boogeyman on Leg Council's Mount Olympus.

The only action leggies can now take to avoid hypocrisy in their anti-Mitsubishi stance is to pull their money out of Janus. Of course, this isn't a simple proposition, but it is the only one that works. They may have to take a hit in the profits offered by Janus' interest rates as well as encounter difficulty in finding a mutual fund without links to a multinational

company like Mitsubishi.

That said, A.S. should still explore its options for funnelling funds elsewhere. Leg Council's credibility rests on standing behind its word and keeping its promises. Backtracking on the boycott would make A.S. seem like all talk and no action.

How A.S. goes about redirecting its money is its prerogative — whether it means changing the bylaws that force A.S. to invest 30 percent of its coffers into mutual funds or researching into environmentally conscious financial institutions that watch what sorts of projects investment money goes to. We, however, do have a very viable suggestion that will benefit A.S. as well as the student community at large.

The Isla Vista Credit Union, born in the ashes of the Bank of America burning in 1970, was founded on the belief that other financial institutions lacked a social conscience — sounds good so far. It is run by its members, who meet once a year to decide where the federally insured credit union's money should go. Moreover, their funds find their way back into our community with loans to students.

Unfortunately, the credit union has been facing severe financial straits due to lack of membership. A.S. could give the financial institution the shot of monetary medicine it needs, and A.S. could get what it needs — a clean conscience.

Perhaps A.S. representatives can also learn a valuable lesson about what they commit to. We put our trust in them to act collectively in ways that we cannot, and this trust should never be compromised by empty rhetoric and superficial position papers. Do the right thing, A.S. — make good on your promises and follow through with the boycott.





What happens to the people who can't pay? Community service — they're compelled to join softcore



"I told the team that I already had enough gray hair and they didn't need to add to it," French said. "We have been working hard on our end-game situations and the team told me that they wanted to have a little more practice."

The practice appeared to pay off as Santa Barbara never lost composure, later responding with its own 10-point run to give the Gauchos a 68-54 lead with 2:45 left to play.

"I couldn't believe it when I looked at the score-

board," Rohr said. "There was nothing else we could have done differently to play better."

Santa Barbara closed the game out at the free throw line, where the team shot 80 percent. UCSB made eight of its final 10 shots from the line in the game's last three minutes. Idaho did not enjoy as much success from the charity stripe, shooting a dismal 38.9 percent.

Smith led the Gauchos with 25 points—the sixth consecutive game in which she scored more than 20. Alexander broke out of her slump in the second half to finish with 15 points.

Tolton (8-5) threw eight strong innings, giving up two earned runs while striking out eight.

Coming off a win against the top-ranked team in the nation, Brontsema warned his players not to let their intensity wane against #29 Cal Poly.

"We've played all these great teams and then when we saw Santa Clara we said, 'This is where we can take a breath,'" Brontsema said. "The point is we have to respect everyone we play."

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UCSB Sloppy in Win Over Idaho, One Victory Away From Big Dance

■ Gauchos to Battle UCI on Saturday

RENO, Nev. — Not only is Boise State University's Trisha Stevens one of the best up-and-coming coaches in the league, she is also a pretty decent fortune teller.


After the UCSB women's basketball team defeated BSU in the first round of the Big West Conference Tournament Wednesday, Stevens told the press that the Gauchos are so deep they could win without the help of senior stars Erin Alexander and Amy Smith. Santa Barbara responded by doing just that — at least for the first nine minutes of the game.

Although UCSB did not receive a point from either Alexander or Smith until midway through the first half, it disposed of the University of Idaho (14-14), 76-57 in the semifinals of the conference tournament. The win gives the Gauchos (22-5) a berth in Saturday's championship game against UC Irvine, the only squad to defeat Santa Barbara in Big West play this season.

Alexander, the Big West Player of the Year, missed her first nine shots from the floor and only had four points at halftime. Smith, who had a team-high 26 points Wednesday, did not score until the 11:15 mark, but finished the half with 13 points.

The game opened as one of the sloppiest contests the Gauchos have played all season. Senior Michelle Duckworth scored a layup 15 seconds into the game for the squad's lone field goal in the first four minutes. After scoring eight points against BSU, Duckworth capped her best back-to-back effort of the year with nine points and four rebounds in the first half.

"Coach is always telling me to find 'the zone,'" Duckworth said. "I guess that I was in it tonight. I was just finding shots and taking them."

The Vandals built a quick lead behind a three-pointer by senior forward Michelle Greenwood and two free throws by Big West Freshman of the Year Alli Nieman before Santa Barbara was able to seize the momentum of the game. Layups by freshman forward Kristi Rohr and Duckworth gave UCSB its first lead before Smith went on a run to stretch the lead to 35-19 at halftime.

Two buckets by Rohr and a three-pointer by Alexander

gave the Gauchos a 20-point lead that appeared to be safe. Idaho, however, was not dead. The Vandals, who trailed 49-28 with 15:23 left, began eating away at the large deficit. Baskets by five different players, including two three-pointers by Nieman, pulled Idaho within five, 49-44. The 18-0 run took only four minutes and raised concern for UCSB Head Coach Mark French.

Gauchos Poised for Big West Tourney Play

RENO, Nev. — It sure doesn't feel like it, but the UCSB men's basketball team will start *post-season* play today in the first round of the Big West Conference Tournament.

Despite a slow conference start and a 1-11 road record, the Gauchos (12-14 overall, 7-9 in the Big West) will show up at the Lawlor Event Center seeded third in the Western Division. After winning five of its last eight games, Santa Barbara will take on Utah State University (19-8 overall, 12-4 in the Big West) in the opening round at 2:30 p.m.

Although the team has never won in this arena, going 0-4, UCSB is optimistic about its chances this time around.

"This year I really do think that everyone has a shot at it," UCSB Head Coach Jerry Pimm said. "I think you gotta give the edge to the home team [Nevada] and the top-four seeds [Pacific, Utah State, Nevada and Long Beach State] but everyone else can win this thing."

In order for the Gauchos to be successful, junior guard Raymond Tutt will need to step up. Tutt, who led the conference in scoring with a 24.1 points per game average, was denied the Big West Player of the Year honor Wednesday. He was, however, named to the first team all-conference squad.

"Come playoffs, we need a total effort from everybody," Tutt said. "At Reno, we might have more of an advantage this time [against Utah State] because we're on a neutral court."

Tutt is also approaching a milestone. He will need only 18 points to pass Lucius Davis on the Santa Barbara all-time single-season scoring list. Tutt currently has 627 points, while Davis scored 644 in the 1991-92 season.

"I really think Raymond has done a miraculous job of scoring with so few shots," Pimm said. "As a whole, we can't stand around and watch Raymond play. We have to play as a team. The ball will just migrate to your scorers."

And then, if all goes well, into the basket. All did not go well for UCSB in its first meeting with USU — one that the Gauchos lost 71-63 in Logan, Utah, on Feb. 1.

The Aggies are the best rebounding team in the Big West, pulling down an average of 11 more rebounds per game than their opponents.

"Our focus is going to be on the boards," senior guard Bakir Allen said. "If we can do that and play good defense we'll be OK. Our team is one of those that does well under pressure. I like our chances playing under these conditions."

If Santa Barbara can pull out a victory today, then Saturday it will play the winner of the University of the Pacific and Boise State University game.

Harris Makes a Killing in Gaucho Victory Over Lewis

With one point to be scored and one kill to be had, the UCSB men's volleyball team and senior outside hitter Donny Harris got the job done in one fell swoop Thursday night.

Ending the game, Harris recorded his 52nd kill in the fourth game of the contest against Lewis University, and in doing so tied the Big West Conference record for most kills in a match — a mark set last year against the Gauchos by Bruin Paul Nihipali.

With the win (14-16, 15-10, 17-15, 15-7), #8 Santa Barbara improved its record to 8-6 overall, while #11 Lewis fell to 14-5.

Harris' 52 kills came after being awarded last week's American Volleyball Coaches' Player of the Week honor. The effort not only tied the conference record, but broke his own school record of 50 kills that he set last year.

"If he can continue doing this, we'll be all right," said Head Coach Ken Preston.

For Harris, the accomplishment is just another notch in his belt.

"It's good to put on my résumé," Harris said. "It's like getting an A in a class, except maybe this will eventually mean a couple of thousand dollars in the pros."

The record-setting kill total came from 78 attempts, 50 more than any other player on the UCSB side. Still, Harris hit with a .564 clip.

"He's outstanding," Lewis

Head Coach David Deuser said. "We knew what kind of load he carried for them coming into the match. It's a big advantage to have a guy like that on your team."

To be sure, the Gaucho attack was multidimensional last night. Senior outside hitter Jason Crone had 14 kills with a .393 hitting percentage, and senior middle blocker Robert Treahy recorded 13 kills with a .409 clip. Junior outside hitter Mitch McCoy finished with a career-high 17 kills at a .500 hitting percentage.

Santa Barbara needed all the help it could get against the Flyers, who had five players record double digits in kills. Lewis' Victor Rivera led the team with 32 kills at a .418 clip, but the team's overall hitting percentage of .320 paled in comparison to the Gauchos' overwhelming .459 clip.

With Lewis and UCSB tied at a game apiece in the third match, the Gauchos trailed at one point by a 13-10 deficit. But in a match bombarded with 50 sideouts, Santa Barbara managed to pull through and coast the rest of the match to victory.

"I knew going into it that the third game was going emotional," Deuser said. "Whoever won that one was going to be up with a huge advantage — and that's what happened."

"It took a lot of wind out of their sails when we won that game," Preston said. "But I give those guys a lot of credit. They fought hard."

Softball Splits Pair, Nearly Sweeps

Sluggers Open Conference Play at Cal Poly, Look for Another Upset

The UCSB baseball team starts conference play today at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo in the first of a three-game series.

The Gauchos (10-9) were more than slightly rejuvenated by their 9-6 romp over #1 UCLA on Tuesday. The win faded the memory of last weekend's three-game sweep by Santa Clara at home — just what Head Coach Bob Brontsema wanted heading into Big West action.

"I think the biggest plus in beating UCLA is that now we're going into conference play with a win instead of a four-game losing streak," Brontsema said.

"The fact that UCLA is #1 in the nation is nice, but just winning and beating a big team is the biggest factor."

Cal Poly is no slouch either: The Mustangs are ranked 29th in the nation with a 17-2 record heading into conference play (their first year in the Big West) and are riding a seven-game winning streak into this weekend's action.

Cal Poly's bats, led by second baseman Scott Kidd's .513 batting average, have come alive of late. The Mustangs scored 40 runs in a three-game sweep over Portland State University last weekend, racking up 52 hits in the process.
