Pay Raise Announced for Advanced ROTC

The Military Science Department announced recently that the pay to students taking the Advanced Course ROTC has been increased to 90 cents a day for total not to exceed 570 days during the two years' course. This amounts to about \$27.00 a month and, for veterans, is in addition to subsistence from the Bill. The pay for summer camp, which is required between the 1st and 2nd years of the Advanced Course, remains the same—\$75.00 a month for six weeks' camp and transportation to and from camp computed at the rate of 5 cents a day.

Uniforms Furnished

Uniforms, texts, and manuals are still furnished by the government and, in addition, students receive four units' credit a semester from the College and 3 units' credit for their camp work. Students who have completed the basic course or who are veterans and have two academic credits to complete before graduation may be eligible for Advanced Course ROTC.

Finance Committee Prepares Budget

This year, Finance Committee will prepare the budget in accordance with the provisions of the ASB constitution, on the following basis:

1. Each board or department of student activity should submit to Finance Committee a request for the total appropriation which the board or department believes is necessary for the conduct of its functions for the 1949-50 fiscal year. This figure must be submitted to the Finance Committee by April 4.

2. Finance Committee will then examine the totals in the light of estimated student body fee income for the forthcoming fiscal year, and will prepare an allocation of the student body fee income between the various boards and types of student activity.

3. The allocation of student body fee income between the various activities will then be submitted to Student Council, the appropriation total, allocated to each different activity will have become definite and binding, except for possible later changes by the Budget Assembly of the Student Body.

4. When the allocation of student body fee income between the various activities has been established in accordance with the above procedure, the board or committee in charge of each activity will be requested to submit an itemized budget, but it must not call for any appropriation larger than the appropriation total which has been allocated to it. Finance Committee will positively not consider any budget which requires a larger appropriation than amount allocated to that activity. This is definite and final. The itemized budget must be submitted by May 4th.

5. Finance Committee will examine the itemized budgets to be certain that income estimates (other than student body appropriation) are in line with probabilities, and to check expense allowances to be sure that they conform to student body policies. Any changes made by Finance Committee will only be effected after consultation with the board or committee involved. After final approval of the budget by Finance Committee, the budget will then go to Pre-Audit Committee for their investigation and approval, and then to Student Council for final approval, after which the only remaining step will be the student body budget assembly.

Thrilling Game Promised When Horsehidiers Meet Northerners in Laguna Park

Coach Joe Lantagne's Gauche baseballers, fresh from their 9-2 victory over Port Hueneme Friday, run up against Stanford's mighty Indians at Laguna Park tomorrow night in what should prove to be one of the season's best non-conference battles. The Big Red squad, coached by Harry Wolter and captained by third baseman Bill Arce, is scheduled to arrive on the Daylight tomorrow afternoon. The team will bed down overnight at the Barbara Hotel before leaving for a week-end double-header at UCLA.

Stanford had won two and dropped one as of March 19, but results of recent games with San Jose and Cal Poly are not as yet available. Pitcher Dave Dahle, last year's ace and the only south-paw on the mound corps, has received credit for both victories to date, yielding only six hits and three runs. The Indians thumped the Frisco Fire Dept., 14-3 and blanked the University of San Francisco, 5-0. Team batting average is a fair .208 and team fielding also a fair .952, although the infielders have pulled off five double plays in three games.

No rain is in the offing and Lantagne is praying that the weatherman doesn't cross him any more this year. Weather permitting, then, this first night game of the season is expected to get underway at 8 p. m. Student body card holders will be admitted for 25 cents.

We are very disgusted with the high prices and lack of variety on the menu at our cafeteria. Prices are actually as much if not higher than prices downtown. For Better or for Worse

Californians, it may be possible, in the near future, to get a divorce in Nevada without facing a judge or paying lawyer's fees. But, instead of dishing out to a jurist, the person seeking liberty will have to shovel in to a mechanical shyster. In other words, he will still pay for his divorce!

An assemblyman in Nevada has just introduced a bill to the legislature of that state whereby a person seeking a divorce may get his 'freedom' papers by dropping several coin (205 dollars worth) into a slot machine. With the divorce decree, he will also hear the first two lines of "America" from the juke box attachment to the one-armed bandit. Two hundred and five dollars for a piece of paper and two lines of music!

The proposal is utterly fantastic. Who ever heard of the average man paying 205 green Washingtons just to shake off a wife when it probably did not cost more than 50 dollars to marry her. It would be cheaper to lock her in the basement until she starved.

A better proposition must be forthcoming if we are to keep the divorce rate at its present peak.
