### Preparations Begin For Barbary Coast

The garb and spirit of the booming Barbary Coast days is due to envelop the campus this next week as Gaucholand concentrates on preparations for the fourth annual Barbary Coast Carnival which will be held on campus next Saturday evening from 7 to 12. Traditionally one of the college's biggest fun fests, the production will follow the carnival theme with booths constructed around the campus Quad.

Up to late yesterday, 20 campus organizations had registered booths in which to exhibit talent and wares of varying types, it was announced by Bob Goulet, executive chairman. Concessions will work on a 50-50 percentage basis, 50 percent going to the Associated Students, 50 percent individual profit. The percentages are 75-25 for concessions handling food.

Lumber for booths will be available on campus for construction of booths next Friday afternoon and organizations will be allowed to begin work at that time. Student committeemen will be on hand at that time to act in an advisory capacity, Goulet announced.

As in previous carnivals, prizes will be awarded for the most original concessions and for the best costumes conforming to the Barbary Coast style in addition to prizes for the organizations earning the most money with their exhibit.

Deadline for applications for booths has been set for 4:30 this afternoon.

All exchanges will be made in printed script, \$1 of which will be sold for 5 cents.

Executive committeemen include Wilf Seaman, chairman of Activities Control Board, John Falxa, Associated Students president, Tom Loeffler, and Harold Martin, graduate manager.

### Subscriptions Selling Fast

### Navy Includes Marine Corps In V-12 Set Up

Four Pacific Coast Colleges Selected for Consideration

Latest news release issued by the American Council on Education in Washington, D.C., pertaining to the opening of the new V-12 schools on July 1, revealed today that in addition to V-1 and V-7 reservists the new program will also absorb men of the Marine Corps and Coast Guard reserves.

The new Navy college training program will be inaugurated about July 1 with the enrollment of students to be selected after tests to be given on April 2 in the college auditorium.

Following the tests, successful candidates will be requested to report to the nearest Office of Naval Officer Procurement at their own expense. In each Office of Naval Procurement final selection will be made by a selection committee after candidates have passed a thorough physical examination. The selection committees, whose decision in choosing students for the program will be final, will consist of an educator, a representative civilian, and a Naval officer.

State College Navy reserve men of both V-1 and V-7 are reminded by Dean of Men C. D. Woodhouse of a special program which will be presented next Sunday afternoon at 2 p.m. in room 80. All reservists must attend.

Successful candidates will be permitted to indicate their preference for assignment to colleges on the list. Already four southland colleges have been placed on the eligibility list for possible use by the Navy in their specialized war program. These include Los Angeles City College, Occidental college, U.C.L.A. and Redlands university.

Other colleges are to be supplemented to the list before April 1 and it is felt by local administration officials that Santa Barbara State college has possibilities of obtaining recognition as a V-12 training center.

PREXY CLARENCE L. PHELPS Clarifies Service Credit

### President Clarifies Rules For Credit

In response to the large numbers of requests by students who face immediate call into service for information regarding college credits, President Clarence L. Phelps yesterday released a statement to apply for all students.

Students who have completed at least one-half of the semester study before being called into active service and have taken their mid-semester examinations will be given full credit for the work or units taken.

"It will be impossible to extend a semester's credit to those students who have not completed at least 10 weeks work, President Phelps declared.

Six units elective credit (military service) may be secured by former Santa Barbara State college students who have served at least 15 weeks in the United States armed forces below the rank of commissioned officers. Men who meet this qualification, in order to receive credit must have an official statement by their commanding officer certifying the length of service.

A maximum of 15 elective units may be secured by students who have gone through a period of training and who have secured a commissioned post.

# Much Ado

Congress has been running off at the mouth lately about absenteeism in the defense plants, but, says my roommate Paul Greenlee, what about the absenteeism in Congress?

There are various excuses offered for the absenteeism in the industries, and many of these are either directly or indirectly caused by Congress itself.

The meat shortage here on the Pacific coast is one of these reasons. The men need their food, and if they can't get that food when they get off work, they get it when they should be at work.

The fact that so many women are now employed in defense work also must enter into the picture, as must the fact that many of these defense workers are not being treated well by management. One national magazine calls part of this absenteeism on the management side "moral absenteeism."

Another factor undoubtedly is alcohol. Many defense workers go on a spree when they have a day off and are not able to report to work the next day. It seems to this corner that the same rules and regulations which apply to the selling of alcoholic beverages to those in armed services should apply to these defense workers. It wouldn't be too hard to enforce. License all those who buy these beverages, and make them show their licenses when they go into bars or liquor stores.

But to get back to Congress and the absenteeism. PM, the New York newspaper which is considered by many journalists to be the fairest in the nation, recently made a survey which shows that at times Congress' absentees total 50 per cent—and that the lowest percentage, which is on major votes comes to 13 per cent. In other words, Congress has an absentee record about seven times as great as industry. This is really a case of the pot calling the kettle black. PM also asserts that New York congress-



men are the worst offenders of this worst offense.

What this boils down to is this: on the average day, 45 out of every 100 congressmen are absent from the house. On days when important issues are at stake, 13 congressmen are absent. But the congressmen don't worry too much about this. After all, their salaries go on whether they are there or not.

Further than this, the average congressional week is 25 hours—of sitting in chairs—not 48 hours of industrial work. And the congressmen get not 2 or three thousand smackers but 10,000 dollars. In other words, Congress has

the temerity to call for more work from labor when approximately 45 out of every 100 members of Congress won't even be present for the discussion, and, if it should come to a vote and be considered a major issue, 13 out of every 100 won't be present.

C'mon, Congress, grow up. You're supposed to be the lawmakers—but you are not acting like it. You are supposed to be the example setters—and the only kind of example you're setting is a bad one.
