year to close the college, enrollment this semester has not only been maintained, but is actually a little higher than it was last year. This is surprising, in view of the fact that an assessment of \$75 has been levied on all outof-state students.

In order that students living outside of California, who attended the State college last year might not be distressed by ignorance of the new assessment law passed by the state legislature during the summer, President Phelps addressed at least 75 letters to students in various parts of the country. 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


