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No More Complimentary Tickets Given

Undoubtedly some members of the student body will feel that they are being mistreated when they fail to receive the usual number of passes that have previously been given to them at football games. In the past, it has been the practice of the athletic department to issue two passes to each football player on the team and one to each member of the band and glee club.

Because of the arrangements made by the Southern Conference, Santa Barbara State college, like other conference teams, must reimburse the opposing team for every free pass it issues in excess of the number given out by the visiting team. At the game with Whittier last Friday, the Roadrunners were compelled to pay approximately fifty dollars to the Whittier team for the complimentary tickets it distributed. This may seem unfair to some students, but it must be remembered that this same arrangement will apply to State college team when it meets other conference teams on their own field.

Probably this change would not have been necessary if the staging of the games had been more equally distributed over the conference. Nor would it have been brought about if the games were financially successful. According to the returns from the past four games, the income has failed to offset the expense. The deficit for the four games has amounted to approximately three hundred and seventy dollars, according to the athletic budget report.

In face of these facts, we can hardly take a stand against the move that is being made by the athletic officials. However, there is some justification in any opposition brought about by those affected by the change. The solution seems to rest in the question: must we be compensated for upholding our school spirit and doing our part in making a success of the activity of our choice or shall we allow our loyalty to State college and our desire to do our part compensate for our efforts?

Roadrunner to Furnish Stickers

In an effort to make it more convenient for State college students to do their part in patronizing Roadrunner advertisers, the Roadrunner will distribute among the merchants who carry advertisements in its columns small signs printed from the masthead appearing at the top of the editorial columns.

The signs will be in the form of stickers printed in green ink and will contain a line over the masthead reading: We Advertise in the "STATE COLLEGE ROADRUNNER." The signs will be placed in the windows of the advertisers and will help in directing students to the stores that patronize their college paper. Instead of having to make a list of the stores from their newspaper, students will be able to make their selections of stores while making their purchases in town.

ty matches it for elementary school and doubles it for secondary. To provide these state funds the property owners have paid 31 cents more per \$100 valuation than the public utilities corporations. Thus the tax rate is lower in counties where public utilities have their properties, the speaker said.

"If the state sales tax is repealed provision must be made to provide some other source of revenue for the 220 school districts in California," stated Mr. Travers.

This address came as a climax to a full day's program consisting of a tour of the Ventura oil fields and a three-hour inspection of the casing-head gas manufacturing plant of the Standard Gasoline company. Following the pot luck dinner at Foster park the delegates went to the Ventura Junior High school for the remainder of the program.

Art Musings . . .

A good show is on exhibit at the Faulkner Art gallery this month. Paintings, drawing, and lithographs by two Mexican artists provide a variety of subject matter. Alfredo Ramos Martinez, who is associated with establishing an open air art school for children in Mexico City and who is now living in Los Angeles, has set forth in his painting new and unusual methods of expression in art. Maxine Albro, who deals in sketching and pencil drawing, depicts Mexican life in detail.

The Martinez paintings, although striking and dynamic at first sight, grow more and more realistic with time. The character of Mexican thought and life is illustrated through the individual conceptions of this artist. Although he was not primarily forming designs the artist has attained an architectural design throughout all the pictures which adds strength, power, and atmosphere to each.

Mexican art has not been long out of the reins of the church, and it has only been recently that Mexican artists have been allowed to express themselves individually. It has grown directly from the sim-

ple life of the natives; little academic skill or training has been brought over from Europe, true Mexican artists emanate qualities of native life which makes their expression simple, direct, and sincere. Two interesting works of Martinez are "Yellow Roses" which is clever in the treatment of the background and "The Revolucionare" done in browns, grays, and black.

Maxine Albro shows originality in the use of her pencil. The effects of her strokes are indicative

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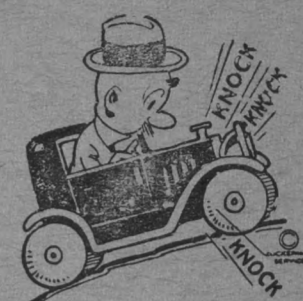

ROADRUNNERS LOSE HARD FOUGHT BATTLE TO STRONG POET VARSITY BY 18-0 SCORE IN LOCAL CONTEST

Arrambide and Jackson, Poet Backs, Keep Roadrunners Busy Halting Determined Attack

Fighting against heavy odds the local varsity went down to a 18-0 defeat against the Whittier Poets last Friday night in Pershing park. Whittier's known as the strongest team in the Southern California conference and the smaller Santa Barbara team put up a much better fight than was predicted.

Nothing spectacular occurred during the game. Whittier constantly clicking off yards, the locals stopping each play after considerable yardage had been gained. Arrambide, left half for the Poets, made made matters tough for Santa Barbara by gaining the greatest yardage of the evening. Jackson, another Whittier man, gained many yards.

With determination that was lacking a week before, the Roadrunners tried in vain to halt the powerful Whittier team. Using off tackle plays and end runs Whittier gained their first touchdown with Arrambide carrying the ball. The invaders pushed the ball down to the 20-yard line where the Roadrunners held and pushed them back on two downs for a considerable loss. However, the deadly Poet machine began working, and a touchdown was made in quick order. An attempt at placement went wide. Whittier did not convert a single point after a touchdown during the game.

Off Tackle Thrusts Off tackle plays, a beautiful pass, and end runs were responsible for Whittier's second touchdown near the end of the second half; Rupard, right half, being responsible for the 6 markers. The score at the end of the half was 12-0.

The only score during the last half of the game was due to a run made by Jackson from the 25-yard line to the five yard line. Whittier had moved the ball up to the five-yard line. Whittier had moved the ball up to the 10 yard line where they were penalized 15 yards for holding. This placed the ball on the 25-yard marker when Jackson made his run. Brock added six more points to the Whittier total by taking the ball over for a touchdown.

When the figures of the game are compared, Santa Barbara seems to have had the worst of the fray in the respect. Whittier made 317 yards from running plays and 40 yards on passes. State made 54 yards on ball carrying and four yards from a pass. Eighteen first downs were made by the Poets, the Olive and White men only three, two of which were not made until the last quarter. Three out of six passes were completed by Whittier; State made one good out of three.

All of the Staters filled their positions well and fought against men that outweighed them tremendously. The entire Whittier team outweighed the locals by better than 27 pounds per man. George Shultz, playing his first game this season, made a strong showing. "Tuffy" Treloar is his initial appearance of the year, was a defensive star of the game. George Harper's work at right tackle was outstanding.

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OLIVE AND GOLD VARSITY JOURNEY TO REDLANDS THIS FRIDAY NIGHT TO TACKLE STRONG BULLDOG TEAM

Redland's Bulldogs Hope to Defeat State To Keep High Conference Position, Local May Upset Dope

The Roadrunner varsity will journey to Redlands on Friday night, October 20, to tackle the University of Redlands in the third conference game for both teams.

The Bulldogs are under a new head coach this year, Cecil Cushman, but the system is not new, as Cushman served under last year's mentor, John Gough, for several years.

To date Redlands has won two out of three games played. They are tied for the conference lead with two wins, their defeat having been administered in a non-conference game with Arizona State.

Last year the Redlands outfit ended the season in a tie for second place with five victories and two defeats. They lost several valuable men by graduation, but reserves and transfers have given them a team equally as potent as last year's crew.

This game will be a battle of the top and the bottom of the standings. Santa Barbara is at present in last place, but even so has a good, in fact an excellent chance, of upsetting the dope and dropping the strong Bulldogs for the count.

Al Scott Back The entire team came through the Whittier game in fine shape, and after holding the powerful Poets to such a low score, should feel equal to any other team in the conference. Al Scott is back in practice and will be on hand to fill his

halfback position on Friday. Al will be forced to show a lot of stuff because Nelson "Tuffy" Treloar played a bang-up game at that position against Whittier and will be hard to force to the side lines. The line is showing improvement in every game and should soon hit its peak form, and then watch the State backs get their chance to perform.

While Redlands will be a slight favorite in the coming game, it is by no means a cinch, and a State victory will not be too much of a surprise.

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
