Registration Procedure Set by Registrar

1. Secure application and pre-registration card at the table in the main foyer of the administration building. Miss Wilhelmina Menken is in charge.

2. Pay fees and leave pre-registration card, signed by Wilma Lowsley, financial secretary; and by Fred Allred, controller.

3. Have pre-registration card signed by Dean.

4. Present pre-registration card with application and transcript (if any) at registrar's window No. 1 for signature. Register and present registration card at window No 2 where you will be given 3 daily program cards and a double record card. The double record card must be signed by your instructor giving the course. When the card is completed, have same signed by the head of the department in which you are doing major work. This card **MUST BE** filed, with three daily program cards in the registrar's office on or before Friday, June 30, 1933. The small part of the double card will be returned to you with your summer session grades at the close of the session.

5. A fine of \$1.00 will be charged for all cards not filed in the registrar's office by June 30.

Note: The Garden Club Summer School of Santa Barbara will offer a two unit course in Nature Study, August 7 to August 10. If you are taking the three unit Nature Study course under Mr. Wells this summer, you may sign for the additional two units on the registration card. There is no additional fee for those students registering

Courses Given Will Raise New Points of View

A look at the offering in the Education Department this summer will readily show an effort to give the teachers in service and the prospective teachers a progressive point of view with respect to education.

Some of the courses which appear to be traditional are just as valuable for this progressive point of view as those which are obviously directed toward the new point of view.

The course in "The History of Education" to be given by President Phelps should attract at least all students who have not had such a course. President Phelps' continuous interest in the history of education and all forms of history should assure a most interesting and valuable series of lectures and discussions.

The courses given by the writer are also to be traditional and yet they too are designed to assist the teacher in getting a new prospective on her work. Among the courses, "Educational Periodicals" is one which could well be taken by the active or prospective teacher. It is designed to make the student acquainted with current educational literature and to assist in the perfection of a technique which would enable him to read rapidly and evaluate critically current attitudes and opinions with respect to education.

The courses given by Miss Pond and Miss Leonard speak for themselves; likewise the course by Mrs. Price entitled "New Procedure in Reading." Of the two especially new courses, the one offered by Mrs. Price entitled "The Activity Program of Education" is designed to give the student an acquaintance

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with the nature and purpose of this program.

Especially to be recommended for all students is the course entitled "Creative Education" offered by Mr. Chenoweth. It should be noted that Mr. Chenoweth is the Superintendent of Schools in Bakersfield. Prior to that time he was County Superintendent of the Kern County District Schools and was one of the members of the first State Boards of Education in this state. Together with this, it should be noted that he has been, since its inauguration, and still is, a member of the California Curriculum Commission. All this is mentioned to indicate the background which Mr. Chenoweth has had as a foundation for the course in "Creative Education." The writer suggested this course to him when he became acquainted with Mr. Chenoweth's interest in creative education and the activity in this field which has been carried out in the schools under his supervision for the past few years. No student should fail to register for this course who can fit it into his program. In connection with his course, Mr. Chenoweth is bringing from Bakersfield a large collection of display material designed to illustrate his lectures. This material will be found on the walls and on tables in room 42. All students, whether they are taking his course or not, should be sure to visit this display as often as possible and copy for practical use such material as could be used.

Book Reviews

FROM A SUNSET GARDEN

By Sydney B. Mitchell

California amateur gardeners will find Dr. Sydney Bancroft Mitchell's "From a Sunset Garden" a delightful source of authentic information on floriculture. The author, director of the University of California School of Librarianship, is also a nationally recognized authority on gardening.

In his "Essays for Any Adventurous Gardener," as he subtitles his book, Dr. Mitchell presents a one-year plan, suggesting that the beginner arrange his garden fare so that his place is persistently pleasant, rather than beautiful only during one of the seasons. If one raises something distinctive for spring, summer, fall and winter, Dr. Mitchell says, the "flower diet" will be brighter, perhaps, at one time than another, but never dull.

The ten-year garden plan gives the owner a chance to experiment. The landscaping may become a reflection of the personality of the planner, rather than an extension of the house.

"From a Sunset Garden" reveals wide acquaintance with the problems peculiar to the growing of green things in the West. Photographs from Dr. Mitchell's own garden add an interest to the book, for they show the results of this gardener's enthusiasm and skill.
