UCSB Can't Stop Nygaard, #1 Bruins

UCLA Junior Outside Hitter Gets 30 Kills En Route to Three-Game Victory

Arguably the best allaround player in the nation, UCLA's two-time All-American Jeff Nygaard almost single-handedly dismantled the #10-ranked UCSB men's volleyball team in front of its home crowd on Saturday night at the Events Center.

The junior outside hitter had a match-high 30 kills — hitting for 42.3% efficiency— and nine digs as he led the top-ranked and defending NCAA Champion Bruins (18-1 overall, 14-0 in MPSF) to their 18th straight victory, 15-8, 15-10, 15-11.

"Last time we played them they pretty much shut us down, but this time I think we played them pretty tough. I don't think said sophomore middle blocker Amaury Velasco, who led UCSB with 13 kills (.310), seven digs, and four blocks.

"We sidedout really well and we played really well but we just couldn't score points when we needed them," junior outside hitter Daren Torbet added.

Having spanked UC Irvine on Friday evening, 15-1, 15-3, 15-2, UCSB's overall record stands at 11-11, 7-8 in MPSF. With four games remaining in the season, the Gauchos are in fifth place in the Mountain Division, 1 1/2 games behind their upcoming opponent on Tuesday evening, #8-ranked Pepperdine.

American Jeff Nygaard who looking for the upset. However, after grabbing the first point of the match, UCLA tallied off eight straight. UCSB regained its composure and scored six straight of its own, bringing the score to 8-7. But UCLA was just too strong offensively, outhitting Santa Barbara

In game two, strong Gaucho hitting and poor Bruin passing enabled UCSB to grab a 7-2 lead. However, UCLA bounced right back, hitting .457 in the second frame, as the Bruins broke a 9-9 tie with

a 6-1 run.
"I think we started out

almost every game really well," Velasco explained.
"I thought that we had a really good chance in the second and third games. We had the lead in the second and we were playing really well and they weren't passing that well. I thought we had them, but they came back."

Having lost a mere five games total throughout the entire season, UCLA completed the sweep in game three despite an early 4-2 UCSB lead. The Gauchos did make one final late run, getting to within one at 12-11.

The UCSB women's tennis team is still in the process of laying the foundation for a power-house program.

The #18-ranked Gauchos (12-2 overall, 4-0 Big West) remained

undefeated in Big West competition by beating #40-ranked UNLV, 5-1 (no doubles competition), last Thursday and downing the #28-ranked University of San Diego, 5-4. on Saturday.

The women's team, led by a dominating field of 800-meter runners, placed respectably behind meet winner Long Beach State to tie UC Irvine. Long Beach State accomplished first place in an amazing ten events, clearly sweeping the four-team competition.

Although outdone in total points, the women's team did extremely well in certain areas. Gaucho runner Beckie Levy led the UCSB pack to finish second through fifth in the 800-meter race, edging teammate Shira Duzman.

The jumping team did a terrific job Saturday, winning two and placing in all three events. Liz Bradley of the Gauchos had two second place finishes, one in the long jump and one in the triple jump. Julie Rusher and Kalina Freeman took first and second, respectively, in the high jump.

However, the biggest individual highlight on the day was provided by UCSB jumper Jen Lagle, who achieved a personal best in winning the triple jump event with a distance of 36 feet, 4.75 inches.

The men's team fared just as well, nearly winning the meet even without the services of mainstays Ken Reynolds, Dave Benedetto, and Gus Harper, who were given the

UCSB Baseball Does Well to Take One From #1 Fullerton

Bazzani Powers Offense as Gauchos Contiue to Improve

On their hottest streak of the year, having won nine of ten games, the UCSB baseball team had their winning streak challenged by a trip into the den of the nation's best

When the UCSB baseball team (14-19, 4-2) traveled to Cal State Fullerton (26-6, 5-1) this past weekend to take on the #1 Titans, they were faced with the challenge of playing the nation's best team on their turf. They rose to the occasion in the second game of Saturday's doubleheader, winning 4-2, despite losing the first game, 11-0, and falling on Sunday, 9-4.

"I'm pleased we got a win," UCSB Head Coach Bob Brontsema said. "They're an outstanding club and they're the number one team in the nation. We're not gonna cry about

losing the series.' The first game on Saturday saw the Titans showcasing their All-American pitcher and Player of the Year candidate Mike Parisi (7-1). He pitched a complete game shutout, his third of the season, and threw only 86 pitches. The Gauchos were held to two singles by outfielder Wynter Phoenix. UCSB starter Jared Janke (2-4) took the loss.

"He [Parisi] was dominating," Brontsema said. "It was one of the best games I've ever seen pitched. We were fortunate to get two hits off him. For a pitching staff from top to bottom, there can't

be anyone better."

The second game of the twin billing saw UCSB showcase the form that had driven them to win nine of their last ten games before the series. Gaucho starter Steve Lane (4-3) nearly matched Parisi's performance with a complete game victory of his

"He [Lane] has pitched well against Fullerton for three years," Brontsema said. "He had really good stuff and has pitched well in his last three outings."

Lane scattered six hits and two walks over his nine innings, allowing only one extra-base hit and one earned run. He was backed up by a solid defense that committed only one error.

The Gauchos were led offensively by Matt Bazzani, whose fourth inning two-run homer to center field put UCSB ahead to stay. Janke and Phoenix also had multiple hit games.

"I wasn't comfortable on the mound earlier in the season," Lane said. "Now after pitching a few good games, I'm starting to feel better out there."

Sunday's contest was

characterized by the eight walks allowed by the Gaucho pitching staff. The walks, together with two Santa Barbara errors allowed the Titans to score nine runs on just seven hits. Although UCSB starter Pat Treend (2-5) allowed only six hits and struck out six in 7 2/3 innings of work, he walked six and threw three wild pitches.

Matt Wagner (7-0) earned the win for CSF, and Ted Silva notched his eighth save. Once again, Bazzani provided the bulk of the Gaucho offense, belting a three-run shot in the eighth inning for his eighth home run of the

"Today was the day we beat ourselves," Brontsema said. "They took advantage of all the mistakes we made. We had to play close to perfect to get the win yesterday, and we didn't do that today."



Gauchos Bounce Back From Slow Start at Marriott Invite

Team Wins 2-of-4 Despite Absence of Markovits, Spalinger

Despite some extraneous circumstances and quality competition, the Gaucho men's tennis team managed to spilt four games at the Marriott Invitational Tournament in Irvine, for an 11th place finish. UCSB now heads into the latter stages of their season with a 9-11

UCSB was shorthanded for the tournament due to an ankle injury to Jeff Spalinger and the absence of Laszlo Markovits. who was still overseas after participating on the Hungarian Davis Cup team. However, the team was still competitive.

"It was a solid effort," UCSB Coach Don Lowry said. "I'm happy to be coming back 2-2. It looked a lot grimmer when we left. It would have been easy to go 0-4, but the guys sucked it up."

As they have done in other tournaments, it took UCSB one match to get accustomed to things, and Wisconsin took advantage of a flat performance by the Gauchos to win 5-2

The Gauchos bounced back in their next match to beat Idaho, 5-2, but the third match of the tournament against San Diego State may have been their most difficult loss of the season.

Early in the year, UCSB narrowly lost to the Aztecs in San Diego, 4-3, with a full lineup. On Friday, without Markovits and Spalinger, lightning struck again by the same score.

UCSB's #2 doubles team of Eddie

Weiss and John Bowerbank held six match points before losing their match. Without the doubles point, the Gauchos were forced to win four of the six singles

The bottom half of the ladder, #4 Bowerbank, #5 Weiss and #6 Simon Kurth, all won in straight sets. However, the #1-#3 players, Darren Potkey, Joe Barbarie and Mike Shea all lost tough three-set

"We had some bad luck," Lowry said. "We lost to them the first time with a full team, so this match proves that we are still competing at the same level [without two top players]."

The final match of the weekend ended with a 5-2 Gaucho win over Northeast Louisiana. In that match, Kurth and Shea clinched the victory with tough wins. Shea was down 4-0 in the deciding set before rallying to win in a tiebreaker.

Weiss also won in that match to complete a perfect 4-0 weekend and extend his match winning streak to 13 straight. The freshman's overall record of 15-3 ranks him among the great freshman Gauchos in Santa Barbara history, and has earned him the nickname of "Streak," given to him by his teammates.
Weiss spent the first half of the year in

the #6 slot of the singles rotation, but the injuries as well as his phenomenal play have earned him a spot in the 3-4 range of

"I had no idea this [his freshman year success] would happen," Weiss said. "I really thought it would take a while to adjust."
