University Takes Over Custody of Goleta Campus

Pending completion of negotiations between the War Assets Administration and the University of California for transfer of the property, the University has accepted temporary protective custody of the mesa area of the former Marine Corps Air Station at Goleta, J. A. D. Muncy, business manager for Santa Barbara College, announced.

"This does not represent possession in any sense of the word," Muncy said, "but is simply action taken with the approval of university authorities to protect the buildings and equipment in the area which the University hopes to take over soon for development as the new campus site for Santa Barbara College.

A 24-hour armed patrol will be assigned to the area, but there will be no activity within the area in building or grounds."

Muncy explained that this move was occasioned by the fact that the War Assets Administration, which up till now has had protective custody of the land, has been forced to withdraw its personnel because of a reduction in force for economy reasons.

Proficiency Make-up Set for Oct. 16; No New Examinees

Proficiency tests will be given Saturday on October 16 in Ridge Hall, Room 101, from 9 to 12 am, for those students who have failed any part of these examinations; however, no new examinees will be admitted for the tests.

Certain rules of procedure must be observed in taking the tests. Students deficient in any section of any division of the test must take the entire division, and will be held responsible for any part taken, whether passed formerly or not. No appointment is necessary in advance—appear at the time scheduled below for the necessary make-up division. Each student must see his department chairman or adviser and present evidence, in the blank provided for that purpose, of having prepared for this particular make-up division. This statement, signed by the department chairman or adviser, must be presented for admission to the tests.

Doors will be opened at the beginning of the administering of each of the divisions at the following times: Reading Comprehension—9:00; Reading Vocabulary—9:30; Arithmetic Fundamentals—9:55; Arithmetic Problems—10:40; English—11:25; Spelling and Handwriting—12:00.

SPORTS REPORT CORRECTED

The regularly scheduled Student Council meeting did not take place on Tuesday because of Sorority Open House and Fraternity Pledge Week both of which were deemed more important than student government by office holding Greeks.

A discussion took place instead of a regular meeting because of a lack of a quorum.

Mr. Chuck Metz informed the El Gaucho representative that the facts published in the paper were erroneous and the actual minutes read as follows:

"Dr. Severy moved, Metz seconded that a check should be made by the Director of Athletics and the head of the Faculty Athletic Committee with the Admissions Committee head on the possibility of any error having been made in the status of the four players who have been declared ineligible. The decision of this group is to be communicated to the football team in expectation that they will accept it and fulfill their schedule. The motion carried.

"Callert moved, Dr. Severy seconded that a committee be appointed to determine the advisability of requesting President Sproul, through Provost Williams, to modify his decision in reference to Santa Barbara college following Pacific Coast Conference rules, and by such a decision enabling the school to adopt a plan similar to that used at Davis in the past. Motion Carried.

"The committee set-up according to the above motion consists of: Dr. Dearborn, Metz and Conlon.

Caldwell mover, Callart seconded, that the Board of Athletic Control recommend that the Student Council consider scheduling basketball games normally outside our conference as exhibition games. The cost of these games is suggested to be 75c for students and \$1.50 for general admission. Motion Carried.

"The meeting was Adjourned at 9:30.

The first session in the series will be conducted by Dr. George Hand, who will read selections from the poems of T. S. Eliot. On the following Tuesday, Dr. Lawrence Willson will read from the poetry of E. E. Cummings. Further selections will be announced by the English Department at a later date.

The series of readings will last for five consecutive Tuesdays. All interested students are urged to attend.

Last Tuesday the first meeting of students interested in forensics was held. Plans for the year, which will schedule nation-wide tournaments, were organized by Dr. Kenneson and the group.

Polls will be open all day Wednesday and all men students, with student body cards, are eligible to vote. Announcement of the winner and the presentation of the Queen and the two runners-up who will be her court and accompany her to all functions will be made Friday night at The Galloping Gaucho Review.

Saturday afternoon the Royal Court will ride in the Homecoming Parade which will follow a route down State Street. In the evening they will preside over the game between the Santa Barbara Gauchos and the Occidental Tigers. The Queen and her two attendants will ride around the track waving to their loyal subjects.

The after-game dance for all Gauchos and visiting Oxyites at the Naval Armory will also be graced with the presence of Her Majesty, where she will be presented to the guests. She will also receive a cup for her services to the students.

Harvey Hubler is in charge of the election which is sponsored by the AMS. Hubler urges all organizations to turn in their favorite candidates and tells all men students that this is their chance to have a voice in campus affairs.

Mud Slinging Tests Supremacy At La Playa

Frosh-Soph rivalry will reach its peak this Friday, October 8, when the two classes vie for supremacy at the Frosh-Soph Mud Brawl. This mud slinging event, designed to return better school spirit to the UCSBC campus, will take place near La Playa Field at 3:00 pm.

The program slated for the brawl will consist of four main events: tug of war, wheel barrow race, sack race, and team competition. Of these four events, the Frosh must take four to be declared winners.

Referees for the mud brawl will be members of Knights, Junior men's service organization, whose decision will be final. If the Frosh fail to defeat the Sophomores they will continue to wear their beanies until the San Diego game.

Professors Work On Russ Journals

Indicative of the growing importance attached to Russian scientific journals is a new translation project sponsored by the United States Navy in which two Santa Barbara College faculty members are participating.

Dr. J. L. Brenner and D. L. F. Walton, both of the mathematics department, are working on the translation from Russian into English of an article on "Solvable Lie Algebras." This is one of the many scientific research articles published in Russian journals which the current Navy project is undertaking to translate.

"The activity of a large corps of able scientists in Russian universities is reflected in the great volume of material published in Russian scientific journals," Dr. Brenner pointed out. Some of the printed material is considered important enough to warrant careful translation. This is being done under the sponsorship of the Office of Naval Research, in co-operation with American research journal *Mathematical Review*, published with the support of research societies and educational institutions in this country.

The Santa Barbara professors said their collaboration in the project was made possible by Dr. Walton's knowledge of Russian and the fact that both researchers are interested mainly in the same fields of study.

Astronomy Films

Dr. J. L. Brenner has announced that sound films will supplement his course, General Astronomy, Mathematics 15, in Pine Hall 101 at 2 pm.

The first film to be shown will be *Earth in Motion* on October 13.

SPROUL STRESSES CLOSE FACULTY-STUDENT TIE TO AID ACADEMIC PURSUITS

Speaking of Santa Barbara College and of the University of California as a "school made great by great teachers," Robert Gordon Sproul, President of the University, welcomed the new students to the college and offered them advice for the successful completion of their college careers at the annual University meeting Thursday.

The president spoke of the purposes of college education, of the essential requirements for the successful completion of a college course and of the background of the university which makes it such an admirable setting for academic pursuits.

He described the growth of the university from a small college into the largest school of its kind in the United States. He suggested that students take advantage of the opportunity offered them in this small college of the great university to establish close contact with their professors.

Following his speech, Sproul presented Student Body President John Caldwell. Caldwell spoke of the University President as the "number one man" on the campus in a speech which was followed by the presentation to Sproul of Student Body Card number one.

Next speaker on the program was Dr. Paul Perigord, most distinguished member of the local faculty and favorite of all students. The last speaker on the program was Dr. J. Harold Williams, acting provost of Santa Barbara College.

Homecoming Dance Set for Armory After Grid Game

One of the highlights of the Homecoming Weekend, Oct. 8-9, will be the open dance for all members of the student body at the Armory on East Canon Perdido. The dance will be held Saturday night after the Gaucho-Occidental football game from 10:30 to 1:00.

The Stardusters are slated to play for the event, according to the Student Body Social Committee. There will be no admission charge for this affair.

Faculty sponsors for the evening will be Dr. and Mrs. Walter Buchanan, Dr. and Mrs. Brenner.

HOME TICKETS ADVANCE SALE

Student tickets to all home athletic events may be purchased in the Graduate Manager's Office, Ebbett's Hall, it was revealed today by Bill Russell, Graduate Manager. Students are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to purchase tickets in advance and avoid box office lines at the stadium.

Prices for the football games have been set at \$1.75 reserved; \$1.25 general admission; 75c reduced rate for high school students; 50c for children under 12; and a special reduced rate of 25c for Associated Student members upon presentation of ASB card.

Russell pointed out that from five to six thousand people will attend the Pomona game tonight. Students who purchase their tickets in advance will avoid the box office rush.

About 1900 seats have been set aside at La Playa Stadium for the college rooting section. The rooting section includes rows 1 to 25 in Sections F, G, H, and J. Rally Committee Chairman Jerry Rose requests students to wear college colors to the games and to use megaphones which will be distributed at the beginning of the games and collected when they are over.

Light for La Playa

Graduate Manager Bill Russell has announced that the lighting at La Playa Stadium has been increased by some fifteen per cent for this season. Russell said that the old light bulbs have been replaced by ones of stronger wattage, and the lights have been refocused to eliminate former "blind" spots. This increase in illumination will be beneficial to both players and spectators.

Freddy Martin's latest offering will be of interest to you if you like your music smooth and unassuming. *Solitude* (Victor) rolls along with liberal dashes of Barkley Allen's piano and makes a very good record for those of you that like this sort of thing.

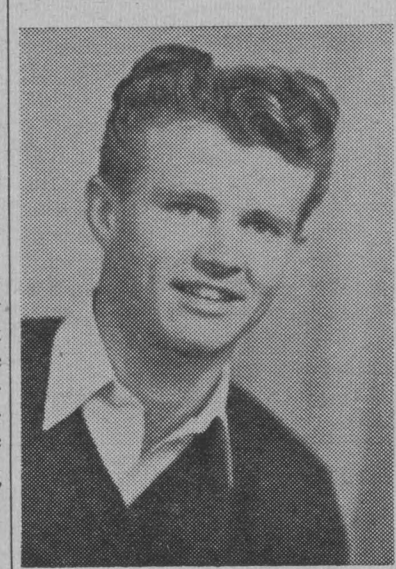

SAGEHENS GIVE GAUCHOS HARD FIGHT

As 7500 fans watched, King Football was given a royal welcome to Santa Barbara last Friday night at La Playa Stadium when the Golden Gaucho football team rolled to a hard-won 32 to 14 victory over Pomona College. The Sagehens held the Gauchos at bay for the first half, but superior reserve strength pulled the home team on to glory.

The Sagehens scored first, making a sustained 67 yard drive in 15 plays. Not to be outdone, the Blue and Gold men tallied on ten plays after covering 50 yards. Sam Cathcart, on what Assistant Coach John Daniels called a perfectly executed play, cracked his own right end for the marker. Mel Patton kicked the extra point, and the game was tied, 7 all.

Jim Taylor, Gaucho defensive whiz, intercepted a Sagehen pass just two plays later. Sam Cathcart took the hand-off from Dick Gorrie and pulled the same play as before, adding another six points. Royal Cathcart's conversion was blocked.

Early in the second period Pomona scored again, and went ahead, 13-14 on the perfect conversion. They were later held for two downs by the Gauchos within the home ten yard stripe—held until the gun went off for the half.

Twelve plays after the kickoff of the second half, Earl Engman ripped his way for three yards over the Pomona goal after he had almost single-handedly advanced the pigskin into scoring position. Patton's conversion was wide. Gauchos 19, Pomona 14.

Held for downs, the Sagehen team punted soon after the kickoff. Sam Dimas tallied from the 20 on a power play after Royal Cathcart's smooth smash and two Mullaney-to-Lloyd passes had set it up. Patton's conversion was again perfect, and the Gauchos held a 26 to 14 edge.

In the final canto, Jim Taylor intercepted a Pomona pass on his own eight after the Gauchos had

made a three-down goal line stand, and raced to the Sagehen 34. Sam Cathcart advanced it to the 2 on two fine runs. The Gauchos then lost to the 11, and on fourth down with the goal eleven yards away, Earl Engman took the ball on a naked reverse and sped the distance for the last Gaucho points.

Taylor and Engman were magnificent on defense, as was Tom Kelly. Kelly also made some fine offensive efforts. Although he didn't see much action, Jack Nelson looked good on defense at the fullback spot. Despite being hampered by injuries, Bob Baker did some fine punting for the Gauchos, getting off one boot that went 60 yards in the air. Brick Reed made some good tackles, as did Max Pickert and Bob Wooldridge. Joe Rossi played an alert game, gathering in one of the Pomona fumbles.

In the end slots both Bernie Paulson and Al Katich played sharp defensive games, while Fred Lloyd was gathering in Mullaney's passes on offense.

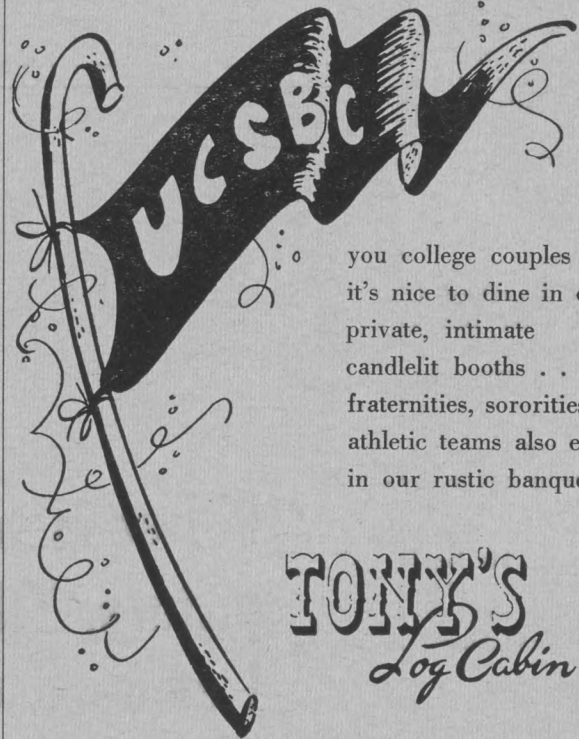

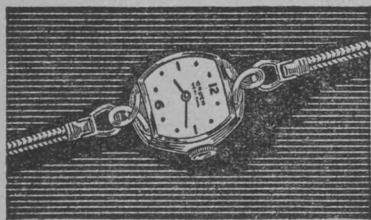


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Reserve Thru Dean
