



COCAINE'DRUG OF CHOICE'

The "drug of choice" for America's young people is cocaine, according to Rolling Stone magazine, the most popular publication for members of the youth culture.

For the second year in a row, Rolling Stone has named cocaine the "Drug of the Year" in its annual awards annals.

Coming in a close second in the popularity race is alcohol, which is generally preferred when mixed into Tequila Sunrises, Margaritas, and Harvey Wallbangers. Other popular mixed drinks include White Russians, Skip and Go Nakeds, and Honolulu Coolers.

PATTY HEARST RING?

It has been over a year since newspaper heiress Patty Hearst was kidnapped from her Berkeley apartment which has led the FBI in baffling circles. Now, a former FBI agent involved in the early stages of the investigation, is writing a book detailing the true story of the Hearst kidnapping and FBI investigation.

Former agent Bruce Wayne claims that the kidnapping was intentionally staged just before the FBI was ready to crackdown on an illegal term-paper ring that was headquartered in Ms. Hearst's apartment. Wayne feels the kidnapping was done to draw attention away from the FBI's investigation into the term paper racket.

"The Bureau had 150 men looking into the term paper ring and after the kidnapping that number had to be cut back by 10 men," Wayne said during an interview last week. "The ten men we had to put on that damn red-herring of a kidnapping just destroyed our investigation into the selling of illegal term papers."

Wayne claims further that everytime the FBI got close to breaking up the ring, the SLA and Hearst would stage something dramatic to draw attention away from the term paper investigation.

"The bank robbing took place a day before we were ready to move on the paper racket," Wayne claimed. "The shoot out in Los Angeles came two days before we were ready to make arrests of the racketeers."

Wayne also claims there is solid evidence to prove the fire in the L.A. shootout was actually started by little kids playing with Red

The former agent feels that Patty Hearst has taken a number of disguises while hiding out, including a two week stint as a four guide at Disneyland in Anaheim, California.

Wayne, who was an insurance claims adjuster in Pleasant Valley, California before joining the FBI, closes his book with irrefutable evidence as to the whereabouts of Patty.

A team of scientists from the University of Deleware is looking into the possibility of the first known case of human asexual reproduction.

GERMAN FOOD CONTROL

German housefraus are famous for their quality cuisine, dished out in copious quantities for hardworking hubbies. But legislation recently introduced in the Bundestag may change all that. Crusading lawmaker Hans von de Pokket, in an effort to protect the future of the race, wants to restrict the production of consumption products, that is to say food, to government-inspected and controlled facilites.

The mental health and bodily stamina of the populace may be endangered by disease derived form improperly prepared potatoes," von de Pokkett recently declared before a congress of hofbrau and hotel keepers. UNSTICKING THE SANTA BARBARA MONEY PROBLEM

The University of California at Santa Barbara has hit upon a way to use surplus monies that other colleges and universities may find useful. UC Santa Barbara, debating on how to best spend an extra \$6 billion in registration fees paid by student, received a proposal from the Campus Committee Beautification.

The Committee recently suggested that the surplus money be spent to beautify UCen road, a large walkway that runs in front of the student union and continues in front of the concert hall. The road, suggests the Committee, should be modified to resemble Hollywood Blvd., complete with the stars on the sidewalk and the cement impressions similar to those in front of the Chinese Theatre.

Although the logistics have not as yet been worked out, the proposal is being seriously considered. The Committee has not specified whether any additional building is necessary, such as head shops, adult book stores, or X-rated movie houses. The initial construction would be the sidewalk stars and the concrete impressions.

The tradition in Hollywood is to honor famous actors, playwrights, directors and musicians by placing a star with their names engraved on

Hollywood Blvd. A select few of these celebrities are asked to leave a hand or footprint in the cement area in front of the Chinese Theatre.

One UCSB celebrity, comedian Vernon I. Cheadle, was the first to encourage such a proposal, and offered his services. In a trial run to place foot prints in front of the Administration building, Cheadle's size 14's sunk too deeply into the cement and he found himself permanently stuck.

University officials promptly placed a blue sticker on his forehead identifying the stranded man as university property, and for the past few weeks students have used him to lock their bikes to.

The UC Santa Barbara Campus Committee for Beautification suggests that "celebrities" on campus be similarly honored with stars on UCen Road. They also propose to honor those who have rendered service to the local community and to students in general.

The major honors will be presented by allowing "celebrities" to leave an imprint in the cement area in front of the UCen. This area will be reserved for campus superstars who have gained prominence while at UC Santa Barbara.

Other awards are still to be proposed, but the Committee prefers to limit the number of students honored until they can be allocated more than the mere \$6 million that is available.

ARABS WANT TO BUY OUT **WEST POINT**

According to unconfirmed reports from the Pentagon, representatives from the Palestinian Liberation Organization and the Egyptian government have been attempting to buy West Point Academy.


The academy, which has been used the past few years as a National Sanitarium for the deaf and the blind, reportedly harbors all of the facilities the Arabs would wish to use for the training, maintenance, and education of their Mideast army.

The Pentagon reports that Palestinian Yassir commando Arafat has held secret summit conferences for the past two weeks with Army Chief of Staff George Brown, who is acting as the negotiator for the U.S. Government. Arafat has reportedly offered 10.5 million dollars for the facility, far less than its actual worth in terms of dollars and cents.

Brown, however, has been anxious to sell the property to the Arabs because he fears if it remains on the open market it will be snapped up "by subversive Jewish bankers who would use it for their own greedy purposes."

Brown reportedly told one Jewish banker, who wished to purchase the building as a home for his mother, "Jesus Christ, we gave you Israel. Better you should send your mother there."

Arafat is so confident that the Academy will be sold to the Palestinians, that he has already begun to train Arab militants elsewhere in New York. According

community twenty miles outside of Oklahoma City Gene McGee is somewhat of a hero. He killed Karen Silkwood, the environmental

In a small riverside activist who desperately tried to expose the nuclear hazards posed by the unsafe working conditions at McGee's plutonium processing plant.

Local residents known for some time that it was McGee who killed Silkwood, but a massive coverup attempt by Riverdale's three-man police force kept the local press from finding out.

According to workers at Kerr-McGee's plutonium plant, Silkwood had become contaminated when another worker's "plutonium rod" exploded in the same room Silkwood where working. Plutonium rods are the main product of the company and are used to generate electrical reaction in physical plants.

The other worker died of a heart attack; Silkwood survived.

But she became contaminated. Doctors all over the state proclaimed that her case was hopeless. She had contracted a terminal case of plutonitis. They gave her a year.

Anguished, Karen turned to drugs and sex. According to the town psychiatrist and

school nurse, Sarah Bellam, she developed a perverted sense of hatred toward the plant, and desperately tried to ruin Mr. McGee.

over town contaminating everybody," says Jeremiah Cleaver, who along with his wife and three teenage sons operate the town's hardware store. 

Numbers Instead of Names?

A recent study has shown that a university student at a major college could attend school for the usual four years without ever using his full name. A survey group found that a number of students, who had taken primarily broad introductory courses throughout college, had never once used their real name. They were required to submit papers and exams with only their Alpha numbers or Social Security numbers for identifications.

One student, Ralph Snurd (also known as 78), told us that he was always asked to submit his Alpha number (39887278) instead of his name. He used the number so often that eventually he preferred to called by his nickname, 78.

Another student noted that he too had continuously used number rather than his name. He took courses such as Introductory Sociology, Chemistry, Economics, and Anthropology, and always sat at the rear of the lecture hall. In fact, when this student(who prefers remain unidentified) was shown mug shots of his former professors, he was unable to accurately identify any of them.

The study suggested that major reforms be undertaken in the field of undergraduate introductory courses. They suggested that students wear large name tags on their heads, and that each professor be issued a pair of binoculars for large lecture rooms. They also proposed that students be able to rent time on strategically located telescopes, at the rate of 10 cents a minute.

Of course, these reforms are only the beginning of a reorganization program that is being formulated. Other proposals include: lowering class size to a number where a professor could remember the names of each student (perhaps 2-3); elimination of all Alpha numbers, so that students could be treated as names, not numerals; and a more complex suggestion which would have many professors teaching a class as a team. Each professor would be responsible for remembering the names of those students on his side of the room, and the lectures would be recited in unison, simultaneously by each teacher. This would require seating charts and assigned places which would be enforced by law.



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

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
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a salad that smells farty

Healthful and bountiful, salads can fill the gap in a budget tightened by inflation, unemployment, and welfare cuts. Our Spring Salad costs next to nothing and can be prepared in a jiffy.

Most of the ingredients can be found growing near your home; others can be obtained easily from local sources. Leftovers make a great soup when added to hamster or rabbit broth.

A little oil and vinegar is all the dressing you need for this spicy treat.

spring salad

2 cups ivy 2 cups long grass

2 cups iceplant with flowers ½ cup eucalyptus bark 3 dozen eucalyptus acorns 36 frames exposed 35 mm. film 6 pencils 6 Bic pens

½ cup fine ground sand

Rinse ground covers in cold water. Chop bark into inch-long pieces. Cut film into four-frame lengths. Arrange ivy and grass in six salad bowls. Add iceplant, taking care to place the flowers attractively. Top with bark, acorns, and film. Sprinkle with sand and garnish each salad with a pen and pencil. Serve cold accompanied by Pagan Pink wine and Saltines. Makes six servings.

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California's Brown

"You name it we got," Luce said. "There's blacks, Chicanos women, anything you can image. This is supposed to be a fulfilling administration."

One of the legislators Brown has primed in Sacramento is Assemblyman Willie Brown (no relation). Last month, a few weeks after Brown took office, the Assemblyman pushed through a bill making all sex acts between consenting adults legal under California law. In California, an adult is defined as being eighteen years of age unless found by the courts to be mentally incompetent.

Brown, warmly referred to in Capitol circles as "junior" said he had reservations about such laws because of the insistence of the state to get involved in an individual's personal affairs. "But if individuals wish to get involved in the affairs of state, now that's a different question," he said. "L'Etat, c'est moi!"

But despite Brown's image of liberalism in recruiting minorities for top administrative posts, he has to most Californians evolved as a true public servant.

Former Assembly Speaker Bob Moretti asserts that Brown is the best man in the state to ramrod important legislators in Sacramento. "Jerry's a hep-cat," says Moretti. "He's cool as he glides around the capitol, hands in pocket. He's a manipulator too. He knows where to grease legislature when he wants something pushed through."

Brown's private however, has carefully been kept from the public view. Instead of taking residence in the huge Governor's mansion Sacramento, Brown has opted to live in a two story apartment located above Sacramento's Pussycat theatre.

In his usual nonchalant style, the governor slips in and out of the back door in the mornings and evenings.

Numerous reporters have asked Brown if he will ever get married. Political spectators generally assume that if Brown wished to ascend to the presidency, should he choose to climb that pillar, that voters would not elect him if he weren't married.
