

Sheriff Urges Inflating Halloween Crackdown

Supes Ponder Adding Extra Weekend Patrol

As preparations for Halloween 1996 begin, the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors is considering extending the holiday's music ban at the request of law enforcement officials.

The ban currently prohibits live and prerecorded music "at any other place other than in a permanent building or permanent installation which ... has been constructed for the purpose of conducting such activities, to which members of the public are invited or admitted or which otherwise are open to view for a charge or free of cost" from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m. on Oct. 28-31.

Because Oct. 31 falls on a Thursday this year, the Sheriff's Dept. is asking the supervisors to amend the ban to include Nov. 1-2 to help maintain the downward trend in Halloween night crowds and arrests since the zero-tolerance enforcement policy was initiated in 1993. The

board will consider the amendment at their meeting Tuesday.

"It's in the interest of public safety and to keep it a local event," said Lt. Sam Gross of the I.V. Foot Patrol.

The ordinance and increased



police activity were introduced in response to the estimated crowd of 40,000 visitors Isla Vista received on Halloween in 1992, resulting in 1,090 arrests.

Since the inception of zero tolerance, the annual crowds have shrunk dramatically, to under 2,000 in 1995, comprised mostly of I.V. residents, with only 115 arrests recorded last

But some feel the usefulness of the enlarged police presence has come to an end.

Freshmen Face Frightening Fact: Housing Shortage Hurts

Due to a record-breaking number of incoming freshmen, securing a space in the residence halls has become an impossible task for some students.

Incoming freshmen are having an extremely difficult time finding space in both university and privately owned residence halls this year, said Serene Nis-piros, Residence Hall Contract

Office manager.

"We have a big problem," she said. "These people don't have a place to live.

Currently, there are still about 60 incoming freshmen on the waiting list for the universityhalls, Nispiros said.

This year's freshman class looks to be the second largest in UCSB history, said Dr. Dennis Hengstler, director of Institutional Research and Planning.

The largest freshman class at 3,704 - entered the university in 1986, he said.

In the years since, due to a change in the demographics of college applicants, a drop in the number of high school graduates, and increasing student fees, enrollment figures faltered and finally fell below the quota of 3,500, the freshman population the campus is expected to take in each year, Hengstler added.

This year, the quota has been met for the first time since 1986, with a projected incoming freshman class of 3,500, Hengstler

But the large class size may currently has 28 people on its

campus housing construction, said Deborah Fleming, director

of Orientation programs.

Hengstler said he agreed the campus will need more housing in the future.

"We will continue to look at large freshmen classes in the next few years," he said.

But the space problem is not restricted to campus housing. The privately owned off-campus residence halls find themselves in a similar situation, Nispiros

Fontainebleu has been full since July 1, said Resident Manager Sue Tollison. Her staff still receives three calls a day from freshmen looking for a place to live, she added.

In addition. Fontainebleu

mean there is a need for new on-campus housing construction, has already begun filling its winter waiting list.

"We stopped putting anyone on the waiting list after 29. We didn't want to get their hopes

up," she said.

Lack of space has become such a problem that Francisco Torres, another privately owned residence hall, which has a capacity of 1,300, has arranged for some students to share rooms with their resident advisors, Nispiros said.

But some housing officials said that despite the increase in class size, incoming students should still be held responsible for not finding a place to live when they are late sending in their applications.

Hard-Luck I.V. Home Falls Victim to Deviance

An Isla Vista property owner is offering a cash reward for the arrest and conviction of anyone responsible for repeated acts of vandalism on a recently completed Del Playa duplex.

The building, located at 6598 Del Playa, had one upstairs window and three sliding glass doors shot out with a BB gun over three consecutive nights, Aug. 11-13. Police suspect

the guilty party fired the weapon from a passing car, according to Sheriff's Deputy Don Friedli of the I.V. Foot Patrol.

"Possibly somebody was driving by in a vehicle and shot out the windows," he said. "Usually people don't walk down the streets with BB guns or pellet guns."

Approximately \$1,900 worth of damage was sustained in replacing the shattered glass, prompting owner Ed St. George to board up the intact ground floor windows and display

his offer of \$2,000 for information leading to the arrest of the criminal(s). So far there are no leads in the case.

Although St. George owns and manages several other apartment units in I.V., he does not believe the crime was perpetrated by former tenants, but was instead a random act of aggression.

"I've been out in I.V. a long time, and there's a lot of guys who get frustrated and vent it in the wrong direction," he said. "That's how the rents got so high

in the first place, because of the destruction. ... I absolutely suspect students did it."

In an unrelated act of deviance, the same house was the victim of theft when 25-30 sheets of plywood and siding were stolen three weeks prior to the vandalism. The materials were lifted less than a day after they were delivered, St. George said.


"The plywood is a separate incident. ... They actually cut the fence in the back [to get it]. That's why I don't think it's students," he said. "It's pretty much been the nightmare project."

St. George intends to maintain a sign on the property displaying the reward throughout the year, partially due to what he believes is a lack of effort on the part of the local law enforcement.

"It bothers me the way the police handled it. It was like, 'Yeah, whatever, you're building in I.V.," he said. "It happens so of-ten, they can't keep control of it.'

Senior communications major Jamie Nachenberg, who lives in the upstairs unit with several roommates, believes that no additional acts of violence will occur now that the

I.V. Grant Funds Facilitate Repairs for Housing, Sidewalks

Some old and decrepit Isla Vista residences and streets will be getting a much-needed face-lift thanks to a state grant for low-income property

Awarded Aug. 1, the Community Development Block Grant of \$500,000 - plus \$25,000 in matching funds from Santa Barbara County — will provide low-interest loans to small property and home owners for major structural repairs, said Mark Chaconas, aide to 3rd District Supervisor Bill Wallace.

Ten percent of the grant will be used to renovate and create new sidewalks in I.V. and possibly Old Town Goleta, he added.

The loans are earmarked for substantial structural building repairs rather than cosmetic alterations, said Susan Ruby, county affordable housing manager.

"[The money] can be used for most any permanent improvement - for a new roof, appliance, anything structural," she said. "There is a limit to the

amount that can be used have to do it over. We'll try on unsubstantial items. It is controlled to be for things like roof and porch repairs. It can be used for carpets and appliances, but it can't all be used for carpets or to spiffy up stuff - these aren't substantial

improvements." The grant will also help keep local structures in to do a comprehensive

The flexibility of the loan terms will make it easier for non-profit agen-cies or very low-income property owners to obtain loans because SBCHC can vary the interest charged, Chaconas said. Based on the applicant's eligibility, compliance with health the loan can have deferred

and building codes, said interest or be given as a Susan Boehlje, executive grant. director of Santa Barbara Community Housing

"It is primarily for the purpose of fixing up rundown or older areas and keeping up with health and safety problems in units," she said. "Even flooring is a health and safety concern. We'll try to make units so that people don't grant.

"The people who are eligible are the owners of the smaller properties and smaller duplexes up to four units per building. We didn't want to make it available to huge mass building owners," he said. "It was our decision to program, that we wanted

smaller properties. Large property owners would just gobble it up."

Isla Vista competed with 91 other applicants to receive a community deve-

lopment grant, Chaconas said. Demographics and housing statistics of the area, along with the I.V. Housing Strategy Report released in January, helped I.V. claim part of

the money, he added.
According to the report, 80 percent of I.V. housing is over 25 years old, 14 percent was built almost 40 years ago and nearly all of it requires extensive repairs or replacement.

"It's always been Super-visor Wallace's goal to get money into the Isla Vista community to help repair the I.V. housing stock," Chaconas said. "The proposal [to have low-income loans] helped in getting the grant ... and the general income level of I.V. and the surrounding community are low."

Property owners can apply for a maximum of \$30,000 per structure, said make it part of the grant Boehlje. She estimates that about 12 to 15 units to make it available to will benefit from the grant.



Saturday's 12th annual Coastal Cleanup Day,



A memorial fellowship honoring a researcher whose life was claimed by an auto accident on June 15 was established by the Physics Dept. in hopes of aiding firstyear graduate students.

The Hanan Baddar Graduate Fund was founded by friends and colleagues of the 35-year-old physics researcher who was killed while returning home from work in a head-on collision with an alleged drunk driver.

The accident occurred at approximately 2:20 a.m., when Baddar's vehicle collided with an off-duty cab traveling 65 mph in the wrong direction on the southbound 101.

It was later determined that the cab's driver, 48-yearold Santa Barbara resident Kevin Lynn, had a bloodalcohol content of .13, which is 11/2 times the legal limit, according to Matt Olson of the California Highway

Her presence will be missed on campus, especially by those whose lives she touched as both a co-worker and a friend, said physics Professor Guenter Ahlers.

Head Honcho for Parks Hired

After several months of intense search and negotiation, a new general manager for the Isla Vista Recreation and Park District was selected.

Derek Johnson, who had been acting general manager since former General Manager Roger Lagerquist was released from service two months before his contract expired, was unanimously hired by the park board on Sept.

Johnson, a 27-year-old UCSB graduate in environ-mental studies, is pleased with the decision, will start work immediately and looks forward to the year ahead.

"I think it's going to be a good year," he said. "I think what we need to do is get the board to focus on parks and recreation. I think that needs to be a number one

Johnson added he does not plan to hire an assistant general manager to fill his previous position and wants to delegate more authority to various staff members. He does hope to hire a grounds manager to oversee the parks while he takes care of the logistical and financial aspects of the district.

Park Director Brad Hufschmid, although unhappy with the original process of selecting a new general manager, is pleased with the results.

"Derek is a wonderful person and he's one of the most hardworking persons I've ever met," he said. "It's lucky for us to have him on the staff."

Director Pegeen Soutar agrees, and is happy that the decision to hire Johnson was unilateral.

"I'm really glad that it was unanimous ... that he has the full support of the board behind him," she said.

I.V. Vintage, the community's only clothing store, has remodeled and expanded its Pardall location and now features more new apparel than used threads.

Two flower stands have recently popped up within sight of each other also on Pardall: the independent Flowers on the Side, in conjunction with Java Jones, and

Santa Barbara chain Riley's Flowers.
Finally, the Law Offices of B. Brittin Fisher closed its doors on the corner of Embarcadero Del Mar and Pardall. In its place is the Isla Vista Willy Chamberlin for Supervisor headquarters.

New Chicano Studies Chair Appointed


The Chicano Studies Dept. appointed a new chair in July amid concerns raised by some student groups.

The new chair, Francisco Lomelí, came to head the troubled department, which had been without a permanent chair for the past year and has been engulfed in controversy since its inception in June 1970.

Lomelí, who has been a Chicano studies professor for the past 18 years, served as acting chair in 1988. His appointment to the position marks the end of a yearlong search for a full-time replacement for the acting chair, Dean of Social Sciences Don H. Zimmerman, who had held the position since the departure of Yolanda Broyles-González in July 1994.

One of the primary sources of criticism for Lomelí has been the Chicano/Latino student group, El Congreso, which feels their input has been ignored during the selec-

"Congreso has been looking for almost a year for



someone who was unbiased and wanted to work towards the betterment of our people," said José Ramírez, chair of El Congreso. "We felt betrayed when the department didn't even consider our choice for the chairship

The UC regent who led the assault on Affirmative Action a year ago began to question the allocation of University funds to finance alternative graduation celebra-

tions at a regents meeting in July.

According to Regent Ward Connerly, the various commencement ceremonies held by campus ethnic and departmental organizations promote racial segregation and should receive no funding from the University.

"I am concerned with the fact that these events represent self-imposing isolationism," he said. "Every government franchise should be trying to promote racial

Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs Michael Young, who has participated in the Black studies commencement for the past several years, took exception to Connerly's claims.

"The celebrations are multiracial," he said. "There is certainly nothing that promotes racial segregation."

Connerly, who earned headlines last summer as the author of the UC resolutions to abolish preferential hiring and admissions practices within the University, maintained he didn't oppose the celebrations, only how they were funded.

"It's our duty to provide funds for a general cere-mony," he said. "Beyond that, they can do what they want ... but we shouldn't have to pay one penny."

owned portion of the ranch in the UC Natural Reserve System helped make the purchase possible, said Scott Cooper, Natural Reserve System director.

An additional \$900,000 still needs to be raised to pay the mortgage on the property so that it can be relinquished to the University, said Andy Mills, Land Trust Sedgwick committee co-chair.

Land Trust project manager Carolyn Barr cited lack of state or federal money as the main difficulty to overcome in the hunt for funding

Cops Gain Authority to Bust Campus Thrashers

Fourteen ordinances proposed last spring to regulate all forms of skating on campus garnered court approval Wednesday, further limiting the legality of the popular form of locomotion.

The ordinances, which make it illegal for any skater to ride with a willful or wanton disregard for the safety of persons or property, have been the subject of debate since last spring. One of the more specific regulations prohibits any skater from attaching himself or herself to any other vehicle, bicycle or animal.

"A lot of [freshmen] don't clearly understand ... you should register in this county because you'll be here the next four years," he said.

Besides simply getting people registered, the campaign is also intended to inform students of their rights and privileges, said Acting Dean of Students Yonie Harris.

"We believe that part of being educated is learning to be a good citizen," she said. "The only intent is to help students pick up good habits about citizenship."

A portion of the program will target getting out the faculty and staff vote as

well, Provenzano said.

"A lot of times the faculty and staff get overshadowed," he said. "We're going to put registration forms in each department."

Some volunteer support

will come from local partisan campaigns, restricted to clerical tasks such as stapling forms together and stamping mailers, Bartholow said, adding this will not influence the neutrality of the program.

"We're doing everything we can to make it nonpartisan and keep it that way," he said.

A special e-mail address and toll-free number will be established to report voter fraud in response to past complaints about partisan groups tampering with registration materials, Bartholow added.

• Agreement Saves Project From Challenge

A coalition of local groups, headed by the Environmental Defense Center, reached an agreement Sept. 1 with the Molino Energy Co. over concerns about a proposed gas drill-

ing project.
In the settlement, the company agreed to address impacts their project may cause to air quality and native plant species at the proposed site in Gaviota. In exchange, the coalition has removed their appeal to the Santa Barbara County Board of Supervisors.

Molino has agreed to "mitigate" any emissions from the project, resulting in zero impact on air quality, a first for any develop-

ment in the county.

"For the first time, an industrial project will mitigate all their air impacts," said Linda Krop, EDC senior staff attorney. "It sends a great message to other businesses and industries that this is economically feasible."

The company also agreed to increase protection of the Gaviota tarplant, native to the project site and surrounding land. Molino will protect approximately 20 acres of land containing the plant.

The project has been approved by the supervisors and the California Coastal Commission, but a challenge may still be forth-coming from the local group Get Oil Out, Krop



Continued from p.3 has something they want to organize around, we see what we can do to get them out there."

Among the groups the center is involved with, on an advisory level, is the one that organizes the annual Take Back the Night event, which aims to promote safety for women.

Another option the cen-

ter affords students who want to get involved and educate themselves is the Peer Education Group, which meets weekly to discuss issues of the day.

The group subsequently goes out into the community to speak with various organizations, providing an opportunity to benefit the community as well as the individual student, Mosely added.

"Members usually go out in pairs, and speak to groups such as fraternities

and sororities," she said. Rape, one of the concerns constantly tackled by the group, is as big a problem on this campus as any other, according to Mosely.

"It's very difficult to say what goes on, but only 5 percent of sexual assaults get reported," she said.

The center also concerns itself with educating women by offering a wide

spectrum of weekly workshops and support groups, ranging from a lesbian/ bisexual rap session to a support group for survivors of sexual assault.

A new service being offered by the Women's Center is a class that teaches women the inner workings of the Internet, according to Farfalla Borah, coordinator of the Sexual Harassment Prevention Education Program.

This program is extremely important, due to a general lack of participation of women on the Internet, a culture being in-undated with men, she

"A culture won't change itself. It appears to be a men's domain rather than a shared domain," she added.

A series of lectures, discussions and special events are also brought to campus each year by the center, which attempts to reach out to the community and raise awareness to the special concerns of women, particularly mi-

nority women.

This fall, highlights of the series include black poet Nikki Giovanni, who will deliver a reading of her work on Oct. 20.

Members of the center stress their availability to





The purpose of a public review is to provide the public and government agencies an opportunity to comment on the documents.

The Plan is being developed to ensure that the lagoon and its environs are managed in a manner that protects, enhances and restores the area, while continuing to provide coastal access, recreational and educational opportunities. The Plan will be submitted to the Califo mmission as LRDP Amendment 96-1, to UCSB 1990 Long Range Development Plan.



Continued from p.3 foam cups, soda cans and nylon nets, which can all have an adverse effect on the environment.

"When there is too much litter in the ocean, the debris is known to soak up the oxygen in the water and create a hostile environment for the marine life," she said.

Radio station KTYD-

Radio station KTYD-FM, an event sponsor, has been actively involved in promoting environmental awareness since the early '70s, said David Hefferman, director of marketing and promotions.

"Our outlook is that, 'My beach is not half-dirty, but half-clean,' and this is our effort to help out with

the community," he said.

Twenty-five beaches in Santa Barbara County are targeted to be cleaned, from Rincon Beach to Gaviota State Beach, and 400 volunteers are expected to turn out for the event, Wilbarger said.

Mar Borg Industries will be providing dumpster service free of charge for the effort, said owner David Borgatello.

"It is a community project. We should all pitch in, and it is our way we could bring something back to the community," he said.

Wickstrom said he used to trick skate on stairs around campus without causing any structural damage, but the new ordi-nances have made him think twice about these activities. He and some friends were chased by a patrol car throughout campus after two officers saw the group skating on stairs outside the Music Building, Wickstrom said. "They chased us all the way into Isla Vista and it

seemed like they enjoyed the chase more than any-thing. I feel like they are picking on skaters, and it's a shame that they have to punish the whole group for a few," he said.

Alvarez said he wants to encourage cooperation around the new ordinances because he also believes just a few violators are

ruining the reputation of responsible skaters.

CSO coordinator Julie Dixon said she agreed that using these forms of transportation responsibly is not a problem, but trick skating is at times the cause of damage and noise pollution. The newly ap proved ordinances will give the CSO long-awaited enforcement to back their warnings, Dixon said.

"In the past, those who were warned about their behavior knew that they were not going to get a ticket and would just go to another area. It became a cat-and-mouse chase basi-

cally," she said. However, Asian American studies Professor Jachinson Chan said he has not seen skaters causing any real problems. He has noticed them outside his classroom, but they have not disturbed his teaching, Chan said.

"Since the Asian Ameri-
