Health Service Difficulties

Fund Is Operated Under the **Faculty-Student Health Cottage Committee**

Specialists and Out - Side **Physicians Are Not Provided For**

Due to recurring misunderstandings of the medical service offered free through payment of student body fees, many difficulties have arisen this year. In consideration of this payment, each student is entitled to certain privileges in the line of hospital care and physician's services, according to Dr. Elizabeth Bishop, chairman of the health cottage committee.

The health service fund is operated through a faculty-student health committee, on the basis of a contract drawn up by the student body. Under it, students are entitled to the services of the college physician, Dr. E. L. Markthaler, during his office hours on the campus, or at his town oficfe, or when necessary, at the student's private residence. This consultation service does not include such special expenses as basal metabolism tests. ultra-violet light treatments or other special expense services.

Doctor Authorizes Services

When expedient, Dr. Markthaler, will authorize the services of a specialist such as an oculist, or a bone specialist. The student body cannot, however, pay any specialist's or physician's bills unless they are authorized and countersigned by either Dr. Markthaler, or by the health coordinator, Dr. Elizabeth Bishop. In an emergency, if neither of these people can be located, the college nurse, Mrs. Elizabeth Shepperd should be called or the patient be taken to St. Francis Hospital. Any emergency must be reported as soon as possible to the health office or to Dr. Bishop.

Absolutely no physician other than the college physician is now authorized to take patients from this college student body. Students who go to other physicians without the authorization, must bear their own expenses. This ruling has been found imperative in order to conserve the resources of this fund for service to the en-



Graduates of former years, it is with a great deal of enthusiasm that we welcome you back to our campus and yours! For the past weeks the campus has been busy in pleasant anticipation of your returning, making plans so that you may have every opportunity to enjoy your short sojourn here as well as to renew friendships with members of the faculty and former classmates. AMERICAN SCHOOL of the AIR "The American School of the Air," incorporating several new features in its regular plan of broadcast instruction, will resume its course in geography, history, literature, elementary science, music, vocational guidance and current events, when it opens its sessions over the coastto-coast Columbia network this week from 11:30 to 12 noon.

The plan of education by radio was started as an experiment in 1930. Designed to stimulate and vitalize education and encourage enterprise and individual initiative on the part of pupils, the courses met with such hearty approval of school principals, teachers and students throughout the country that the schedule has been gradually increased to include new features.

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM COMPETITION

According to an article published in "Radio News Magazine" of November, 1935, John F. Royal, N.B.C., vice-president in charge of programs, recently returned from an extensive trip through Europe, during which he made arangements for a great interchange of programs between N. B. C. and the various broadcasting groups of Europe. Included in his plans are tentative arrangements for broadcasts from the African zone of war between Italy and Ethiopia. His plans go so far as anticipating a broadcast direct from the battlefield, if there should be one.

Royal predicted that within the next eighteen months there will be the greatest international program competition in the history of entertainment. "By that time," he added. "All the European countries will be equipped for shortwave sending and receiving and, with the further improvement of long and short wave receiving sets, every radio listener will have the world in his living room.'



Theodore "Spud" Harder, genial Gaucho coach began his career on March 7, 1906, in Williams, California., He entered the Kern County high school in Bakersfield at the age of fifteen and graduated in 1924, and was a four year letterman in baseball and football. During his fourth season in football, Harder suffered a broken leg, terminating his sports' activities for a short time.

"Spud" first registered at Stanford University in 1925, with history and political science as his academic interests. He played varsity football under "Pop" Warner and Andy Kerr three years for Stanford, receiving wide acclaim for his performance at the left end position. He also suffered a broken jaw as a result of his athletic endeavors.

Graduating in 1928, Coach Harder went to Bakersfield Junior College where he filled the position of athletic instructor and coach for five years. After establishing a fine record at the institution, he was persuaded to come to Santa Barbara State to change the sick Roadrunners into a fighting Gaucho.

"Spud" Harder was married four years ago at Stanford and is now the father of a daughter, Dianna. He still prefers historical reading. and is quoted as saying that he
