A REVIEW:

"Circle of Chalk" Is Colorful Experiment in Unusual Drama

Last night, the Speech Department presented the first performance of "Circle of Chalk," a Chinese drama, on the Riviera stage. The play will be performed again tonight.

Realized in a presentational form, the play was stylized in the manner of the Chinese drama with the imagination of the audience playing an all-important role.

To fully enjoy the performance, it was necessary for one to cast out all previous notions about plays gained from the conventional style to which we are accustomed and to recognize the fact that the entire play was an experiment in a different form of drama. "Circle of Chalk" must be judged on that basis.

Unfortunately, the *El Gaucho* deadline necessitated the reviewing of the play at one of the dress rehearsals. Because of this, it was impossible to determine the success or failure of the opening night audience to adapt themselves to the presentation.

Brilliant Color

The most striking feature of "Circle of Chalk" is the brilliant color of the production. The large, specially constructed pagoda setting and the projected apron of the theatre bring the actors outside the proscenium arch and right down into the audience.

The setting by Wally Jonason, costumes by Roger deCloutier and Ann Jackson, and the headdresses and make-up by George Stuart are perhaps the most spectacular and colorful ever seen on the Riviera stage.

Of the actors, Marie Willett and Eleanor Eby in the major roles of villainess and heroine perform with skill the various vocal and physical gymnastics required by the play. Several other players, notably Ken Kellogg, Wally Jonason and Bob McCole, as well as the leading ladies, have been able to successfully create a characterization within the limits of the play itself.

Minor Characters

The same is unfortunately not so of many of the minor characters. Apparently the direction neglected sufficient coaching of the small parts for they are in general portrayed with considerably less skill than could be reasonably expected. This phase of the performance gives an unevenness to the production as a whole and detracts from the smoothness and proficiency of the leading players.

Finally, as to the play itself, it is not what we normally consider a drama, but merely an elaborately told story of primitive passions—lust, greed, fear and love. The translation from the Chinese is not particularly successful since the close proximity of phrases such as "departed to the celestial rice fields" and "hey, waiter" leaves one with an uneasy feeling.

As a whole, "Circle of Chalk" scores as an interesting experiment in presentational drama, one which will appeal to those whose taste runs to the colorful and unusual.

Assembly Monday On Loyalty Oath; Faculty Speakers

A panel will be on the platform to answer any questions. It will consist of the members of the special faculty on the problem. They are Dr. George Hand, chairman, Dr. Stephen Goodspeed, Dr. Paul Wienpahl, Dr. Lewis Walton, Dr. Richard Kaywood, and Drs. Walters and Girvetz.

According to Dr. Walton this is purely an informational meeting. "We are not suggesting action on the part of the students and want to avoid the suggestion that we are trying to stir up opposition to the oath. We do feel that students should be well informed on this subject, which concerns their future education," he stated.

Two candidates, Frank Goodall and Don Mills, are running for the office of President of the Associated Students for next year. In voting next Monday and Tuesday, April 17 and 18, one will be elected.

DON MILLS

There's a lot to be done to make UCSBC a progressive, integrated, financially stable, well-rounded campus.

1. The freshmen, the backbone of any college, need to be oriented, not just with our "traditions," but also in the way of our student life and activities. Specifically, we need to set up an Orientation Committee to show them the ropes, and to publish a booklet containing all the facts about campus and student activities.

Further, the plans in the architects' office forecast a brilliant future at Goleta. Now is the time to lay the groundwork for efficient (less red tape and streamlined organization) and PROGRESSIVE student government.

2. We need an equally represented, non-partisan Legislative Council and Cabinet, interested in the welfare of students as a whole. We must instill a feeling of cooperation and understanding through proper publicity and proper planning of events to obtain an INTEGRATED campus.

3. We need money. The Star Program is a necessity for the success of our student body, and our athletic supremacy is likewise dependent on it. Other possible plans, such as a student-controlled and operated bookstore and cafeteria, should be seriously considered in order to make our student government more FINANCIALLY STABLE.

4. We need to maintain our high standard of social events and activities, but we also need to plan more for the student who feels "left out," because of marital status or lack of time or interest, by including more varied and wider-appealing activities, and to limit these events to our capacity to enjoy them.

To balance activities, we need an inquiry of the grading system, in order to obtain a clearer picture of grading practices and arrive at more harmonious relations with the faculty and administration—resulting ultimately in a WELL-ROUNDED campus.

There's a lot to be done; I will give my best.

VOTE ON PROPOSED AMENDMENT . . .

Monday's ballot for the Associated Students general elections will carry a proposed amendment for enlargement of the Legislative Council. If passed it will change the size of the Council from eleven to fifteen voting members, by adding three more representatives at large.

Points cited in favor of the amendment are than an enlarged legislative group would give the students more direct representation by people elected by the entire student body, and that more members of the group would be able to make a better distribution of the heavy load of work which falls on the Legislative Council. However, we must also remember that a smaller body is more efficient and that the constitution was amended last Spring to promote this efficiency. Perhaps some of the jobs now allotted to busy Council members could be delegated elsewhere than in the group.

There are points in favor of and against the amendment for enlarging Student Council. Students should weigh them carefully before voting on it, but they should be sure to vote. Last year we had a record election—almost 1200 voters turned out. Let's see if we can top the record this year.

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Proposed Amendments

ARTICLE III, SECTION 6. The elective officers of this organization shall be the following: President of the Associated Students, Vice-President of the Associated Students, the four Class Presidents, Secretary, Yell Leader, and three Student Representatives elected at large.

The proposed amendment is as follows:

The elective officers of this organization shall be the following: President of the Associated Students, Vice-President of the Associated Students, the four Class Presidents, Secretary, Yell Leader, three women Representatives elected at large, and three men Representatives elected at large.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE V, Section 8. The votes for the posts of Representative-at-Large shall be counted as follows: if any candidate or candidates receive 31 per cent or more of all votes cast for the Representative-at-Large in the preliminary balloting, they shall be declared elected; if one candidate receives 31 per cent of all votes cast, then the three highest shall be declared elected. In the event that no candidate receives 31 per cent of all the ballots cast, the five candidates receiving the largest number of votes cast in the preliminary elections shall be considered candidates in the final balloting, at which election the three candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be considered elected.

The proposed amendment is as follows:

The votes for the posts of Representative-at-Large shall be counted as follows: if any candidate or candidates receive 34 per cent or more than 34 per cent of all ballots cast for the Representative-at-Large in the elections, they shall be declared elected; except in the event that more than 3 candidates receive the required amount, then the three highest shall be declared elected. If one candidate receives the requisite number of votes for election, the three candidates receiving the next largest number of votes shall be considered candidates in the run-off elections and the two receiving the largest number of votes cast, shall at that time be declared elected. In the event that no candidate receives 34 per cent of all the ballots cast, the five candidates receiving the largest number of votes cast in the preliminary elections shall be considered candidates in the final balloting at which election the three candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be considered elected.

ARTICLE V, Section 14, Paragraph C. Special elections shall involve the same procedures as regular elections.

The proposed amendment is as follows:

Special elections shall involve the same procedures as regular elections except in the case of special elections to fill vacancies among the Representatives-at-Large, in which case officers shall be elected by a majority vote.

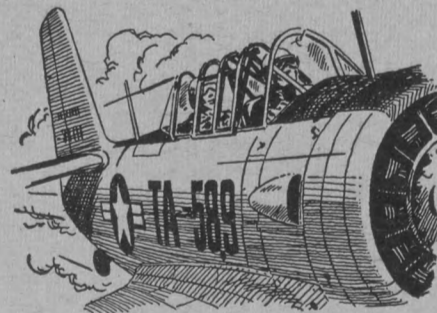
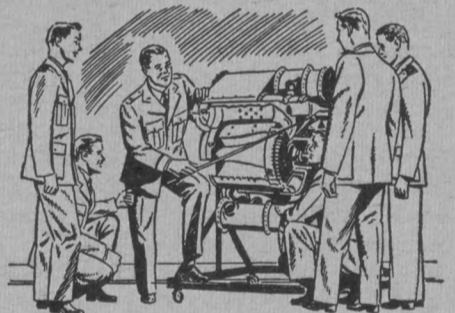
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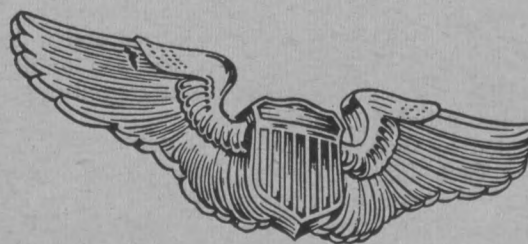
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MURAL MUSINGS

GAUCHOS TANGLE WITH USC

CINDERMEN FACE SAN DIEGO AZTECS

An outmanned Santa Barbara College track team travels to San Diego tomorrow for a dual meet with the star-studded San Diego State Aztecs, one of the best cinder squads in the state.

Coach Nick Carter's team, victors over the Montezumans only once in seven meets, will be out to erase at least two Gauchos-Aztec meet records.

One of the feature performances at Aztec Oval should be the high jump competition between Santa Barbara's Willie Dancer and Jack Razzeto of San Diego. Both men should best the meet record of 6 feet, 6 1/8 inches set by Dancer last year. Dancer and Razzeto were scheduled to meet last Saturday at the Santa Barbara Easter Relays but steady rains forced cancellation of the event. Razzeto cleared 6 feet 8 1/4 inches at the Texas relays, one of the best marks in the nation last year.

Santa Barbara's Delf Pickarts, who got off to a slow start this year due to an ankle injury, is fully recovered and should easily best the meet javelin record of 208 feet 7 inches which he set last year. Pickarts, who threw 218 feet 6 inches in his last outing against UCLA, will be competing in his third meet of the season.

GaUCHO Gridmen Put Thru Spring Drills

Some thirty men or more have turned out for the initial drills of the 1950 spring practice session.

Conditioning has been the keynote for the first periods. The boys will don full uniform this week for the first contact work.

Doc Kelliher is again assisting head coach Roy Engle to get the squad in shape for the heavy drills which are anticipated.

Quarterbacks

A good sized section of the men out are quarterbacks. Many of these have been impressive in passing drills and will push Dick Gorie hard for the starting berth.

One of the most impressive of the new QB's is Glenn Vanderline. Glenn was field general for the 1948 Gauchos freshmen. After a year of seasoning as top quarterback for San Diego JC, Vandy returns to us from one of the nations best Junior College teams.

Andy Logan called signals last year as a reserve on Compton College's Far Western States Conference championship team. Augy Ramirez, up from the JV team, has proven himself an eye catcher in passing drills. Augy played formerly at Chaffey College.

New Linemen

Of the linemen out, two newcomers have shown a lot of ability. Corky Johnson from UCLA and Compton shows up as a top prospect for this year. Corky is now spending his afternoons on the baseball field and Engle will have to wait to get a better look at this prospect. Grant Gauce from Pasadena CC will share some of the tackle duties with Corky. Grant played a lot of defense on a fine Bulldog club. Both men are in the beefy class with Johnson around 225 and Gauce some 15 pounds lighter.

Locals Face Trojans Twice at Laguna Park

Coach Sam Berry will bring his Coast Champion USC Trojans to town this weekend for a two game series with the potent Gauchos nine. Encouraged by two straight wins over CIBA teams the Santa Barbara team will be out to fatten their average in intercollegiate competition.

The games will be played tonight and tomorrow night at Laguna Park. The Saturday game will finish out a doubleheader with Santa Barbara High facing San Bernardino at 6:00 pm. The Dons will defend an unbeaten record in their drive toward the CIF finals.

Johnston Pitches

Bob Johnston, who beat UCLA and shut out Stanford, will take the hill tonight. Corky Johnson will throw tomorrow and will be backed up by Paddy Hill and Thad Picketts.

A bad outbreak of infield errors has cost the Gauchos many runs this year. Heavy hitting has saved the day on several occasions. The sharp USC squad will be capable of capitalizing on any miscue with several tough sluggers in the lineup. The Trojan power has earned a 14 and 12 won and lost record this year against the toughest collegiate and professional clubs available.

Tough Fight

Coach Spud Harder's team has given the Trojans some bitter upsets in past seasons. In 1948, the year SC won the NCAA championship, and in 1947 the Gauchos gave the Trojans their first defeat of each season. The locals lost a 10 to 2 decision to SC earlier this year.

Al Lamont, Trojan first baseman, is a local man. A product of Santa Barbara High School, he also starred for the Trojans on the Hardwoods.
