## Locals Will Compete In Invitational Meet Saturday

### Real Competition Expected; Eight Colleges Invited

The big event of the year, the second annual invitational meet, will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 p. m. at Pershing Park, rain or shine. The track teams of eight colleges have been invited to participate in the meet, so real competition is anticipated.

The teams which are expected to compete in tomorrow's track fest besides the local are San Jose State, Cal. Poly, California Christian, Loyola, La Verne, Redlands, Bakersfield and Santa Maria. Of the above only Cal Poly and Cal Christian have definitely decided to come as this paper goes to press. These schools have sent lists of entrants while as yet the others have neither refused nor accepted.

It is rumored that Cal Poly is capable of walking away with the meet by its prowess in the field events. White, remembered well by the basketball squad, can throw the weights out of the lot.

Medals for the winners are now on display in the office. They will be awarded at the track dance to be held tomorrow evening.

### Medals To Be Awarded At Annual Track Dance

President Phelps will speak in Fresno before the Industrial Arts Club of the San Joaquin Valley, Friday, April 3. He will return to College the following week.

## Sororities and Fraternities Recognized On College Campus This Week

### Six Sororities And Two Fraternities Receive Letters Of Authorization

Six sororities and two fraternities including nearly one hundred students were granted letters of authorization and recognition by the head of the institution this week. The recognition of sororities and fraternities on the campus marks a new departure in the policy of the administration officials and charters have been granted upon compliance with institutional regulations. The following sororities have received recognition: Alpha Theta Chi, Delta Zeta Delta, Phi Chi Alpha, Tau Gamma Sigma, Phi Kappa Gamma, and Delta Sigma. Two fraternities Beta Sigma Chi and Sigma Alpha Kappa, have been granted charters.

All institutional rules regarding sororities and fraternities have been determined except one regarding time of meeting. The eight organizations have complied with the following regulations drawn up by the faculty committee composed of President Phelps, Dean Pyle, and Dean Ashworth.

1. Half year of residence (one semester) during which a program of not less than 14 units has been satisfactorily completed, to be a prerequisite for membership.

2. Scholarship to be at least 3.

3. Groups to be selected from different departments, not more than 60 per cent of the membership to belong to any one department.

4. The number in a group not to exceed 15.

5. Constitutions to be made in conformity with these regulations and presented with a request for charter from the institution. Accompanying the request and the constitution should be a list of proposed members.

6. Each group to elect a faculty associate member.

7. Places and dates of meetings to be approved by the college.

8. A limit of \$20.00 per year is fixed as a maximum amount of expense per member. This amount to include dues, assessments and general expenses other than cost of initiation, pins, etc.

## College Loan Fund Attracts Attention

Mention of the Santa Barbara Educational Loan Fund was made in the March 12 issue of the Christian Science Monitor, in an article explaining the system written by President Phelps. Members of the college are the chief beneficiaries of this fund amounting to several thousand dollars which is held in trust by the First National Bank which administers it without charge. The fund was secured through the efforts of William Wyles, a member of the Board of Directors of the First National Bank and a former member of the Board of Trustees of the Santa Barbara State Teachers College.

Loans may be secured by students according to their needs, up to the amount of three hundred sixty dollars a year at interest rate of four percent. Terms of repayment have usually been made monthly after the student began earning.

In order to obtain a loan the student confers with the head of the institution, states his need for funds and asks for the loan. Plans for repayment are discussed and sometimes a check of the applicant's scholarship is made. If these are satisfactory, the head of the institution writes a letter to the trust

## Council Member To Confer With Cafeteria Head

The value of the fund is indicated by the fact that approximately ten percent of the students of the College secure loans from the fund each year according to President Phelps who states that many loans have been made during the past four years.

## Six Changes Made In S. B. Constitution

Six changes in the Student Body constitution were voted upon at the Student Body meeting yesterday. The proposed measures in question were drawn up by a committee of the council sometime ago.

The following sections are now a part of the new constitution:

### Section 6.

3. If an officer of the Student Body listed above should graduate during the mid-year, both he and his successor shall be eligible for the Student Body Emblem.

4. The Student Body Emblem shall be awarded at the final Student Body Meeting of the year.

Section 7. The Circle English "S" (design to be submitted later) shall be awarded to the members of inter-school debating and oratory teams, upon recommendation of the Oratory, Dramatics and Debating Committee and approval of the Student Body Council.

Section 8. The Megaphone "S" (design to be submitted later) shall be awarded to the Yell Leader, for the capable discharge of his duties, upon recommendation of the Student Body.

Section 9. All letters and emblems and service stars shall be accompanied by a certificate signed by the President of the Student Body and a responsible faculty member.

Section 10. Total costs of all emblems, letters and service stripes awarded under the provisions of Article XIV shall be born by the General Fund of the Student Body.

The following section dealing with the size of the English "S" awarded to women for participation in athletics was adopted:

Article XV. Section 2. The English "S" to be of the following optional sizes. No other sizes may be worn:

- 6 in. by 4 1-2 in. Solid white with 1-8 in. olive green.
- 6 in. by 4 1-2 in. by 1 in. Solid white with 1-8 in. olive green.
- 4 in. by 3 in. by 3-4 in. Solid white with olive green.

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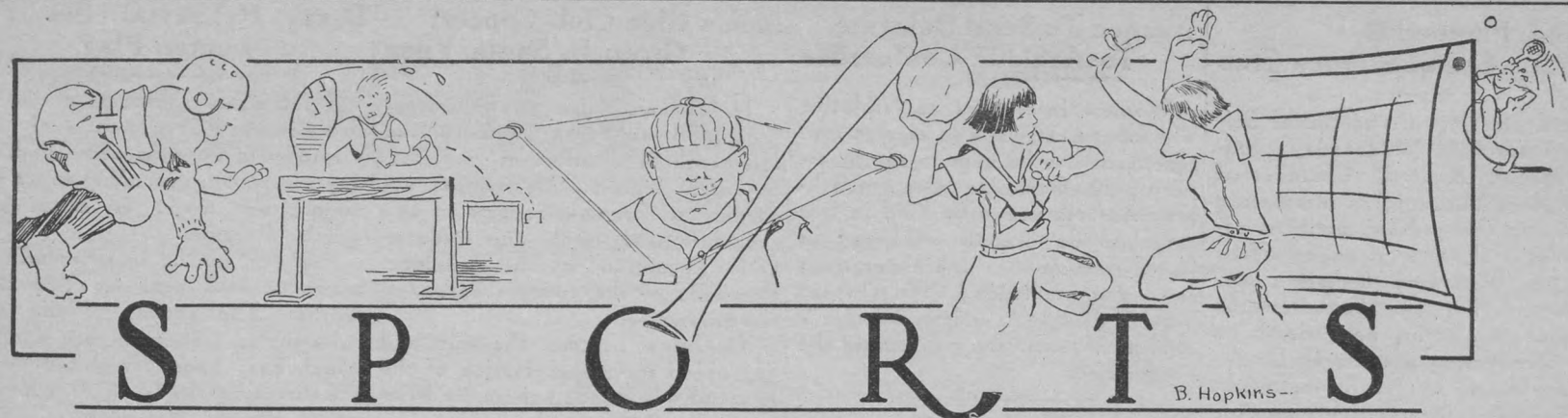
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### Locals Victorious in Pomona Frosh Track Meet

Harold Furman is beginning to get back on his two understadies. He was seen at the track last Saturday. We hope he will be back at school soon.

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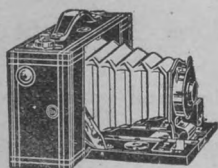
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
