'WAR-CIVILIZATION'S GREATEST MENACE'

Madrid, Spain's capital, is prepared for a six months seige and if all indications are correct it should begin very soon. The government forces are battling fiercely and refuse to admit defeat; they have the insurgents surrounded in Fort Estrecho de Quinto, just as they did in the Alcazar fortress at Toledo. Food is being supplied to the fort by airplanes. The besieged insurgents are plentifully supplied with ammunition and have repelled numerous attacks. Gen. Francisco Franco, military leader of the insurgents, has assumed supreme leadership of the Nationalist cause as dictator of the proviional government and commander-in-chief of all land, sea and air forces.

GENEVA AND SPAIN

The Spanish delegation to the League has published documents charging Italy, Germany and Portugal with aiding and abetting the insurgent Fascists. The Loyalists claim that, if the insurgents had not received assistance the revolt would have been crushed at the outset.

SALINAS STRIKE

Violence is dominating the lettuce strike in Salinas. Most of the trouble has moved to Watsonville; two undersheriffs were attacked and three strike-breakers were injured. Forty picketeers were jailed; on charges of violating the anti-(Continued on Page 3, Column 2)

After three years of coaching at Santa Barbara State college, Nick Carter, coach of the track and field forces of El Gaucho, has asked for a leave of absence in order to take over duties as head coach of the Peruvian Olympic team.

Carter got his appointment through the recommendation of the former United States naval attache at the Peruvian Naval academy. His job will be to build up the track and field contingent of the team to represent Peru in the South American Olympic games which will be held at Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Athletics of this sort are under the control of the government and from that source he will draw his salary.

Carter came here in the spring of 1934 to help Ray Denno then coach of the short pantied sport. In the fall of 1934 he took over the duties as head coach of the green and white team. Since taking over the reins he has built the Gauchos into a power to be reckoned with in Southern California collegiate circles. He is now under contract to the Peruvian government and will remain away for the duration of the contract period, which ends in time for him to get back to State in time to take over the cross country duties next fall.

Ray Denno, former coach here, has been selected to fill the vacancy. Denno is a graduate of State and has the reputation of being one of the best athletes ever to attend this institution. He is a letterman in track from the University of Arizona, and was recognized as the best weight man in the Border conference. Ray also had an outstanding record as a decathalon performer. In Ray's first term as coach he initiated the first full schedule for track and did much to place the cinder sport on the
